For lounging indoors they contrived to put a small radio in one side of milady's chaise longue, and they resurrected the trundle bed for small daughters who like to be near their mammas.



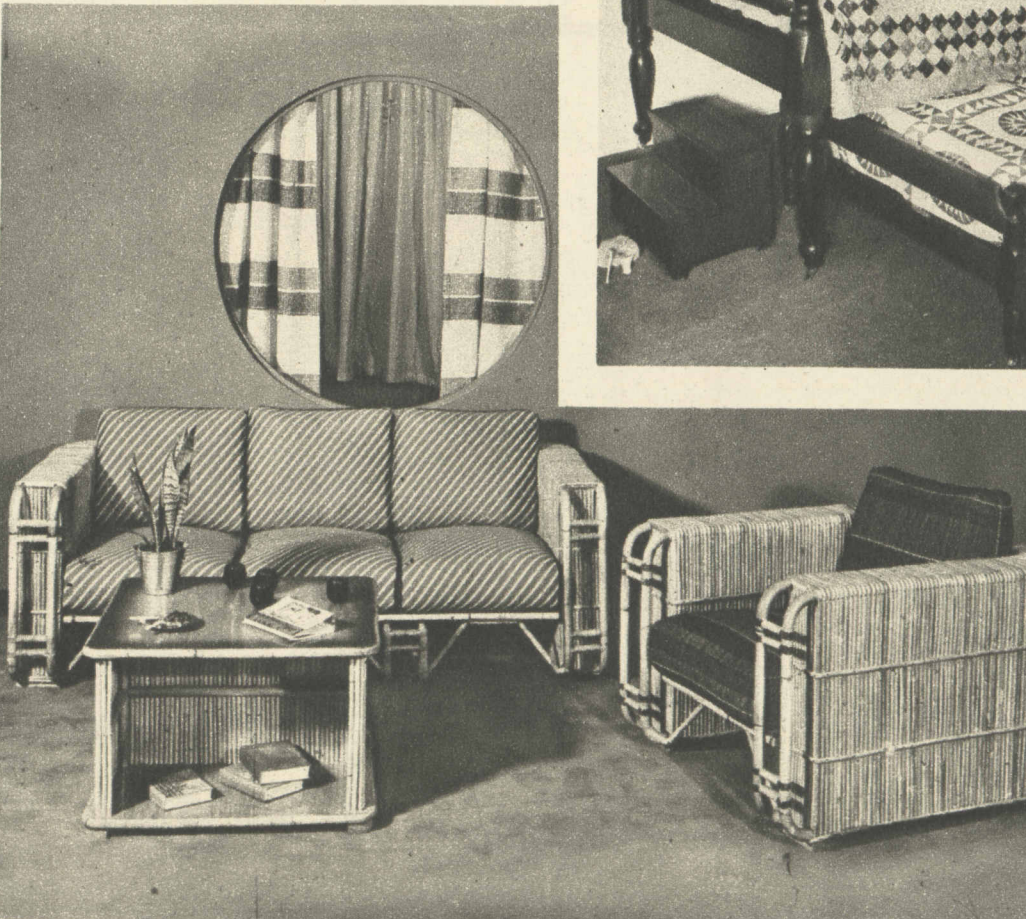
