WHAT is said to be the largest electric shovel in the world is now in operation at a strip coal mine at Middle Grove, Ill. This giant shovel, which is illustrated above, is as tall as an eight-story building, weighs 1,300 tons, and takes 30 tons of earth or coal at a single bite. It moves about under its own power, traveling on four huge crawlers, each as tall as a man. A strip coal mine is a mine from which coal is taken off the earth's surface after a covering layer of soil or sand has been removed.

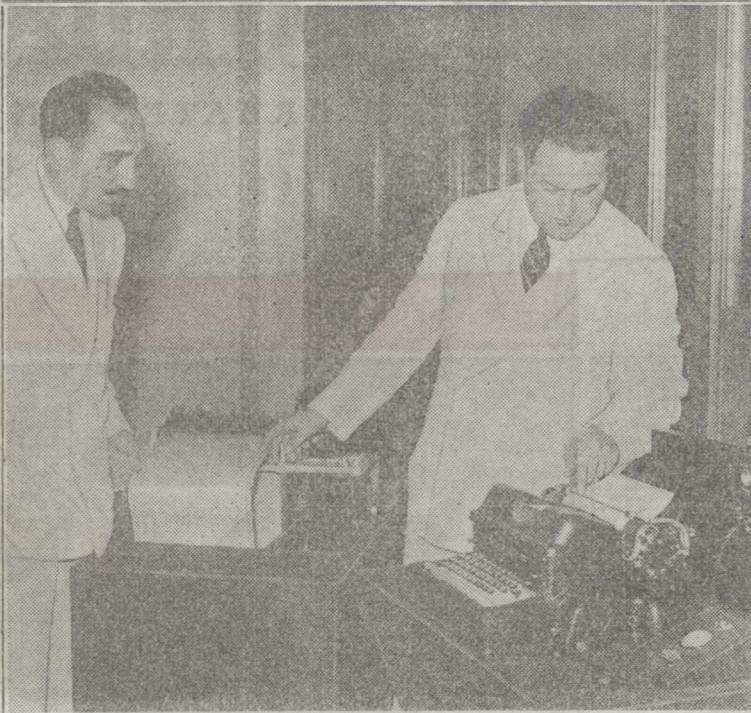

Typing by Radio



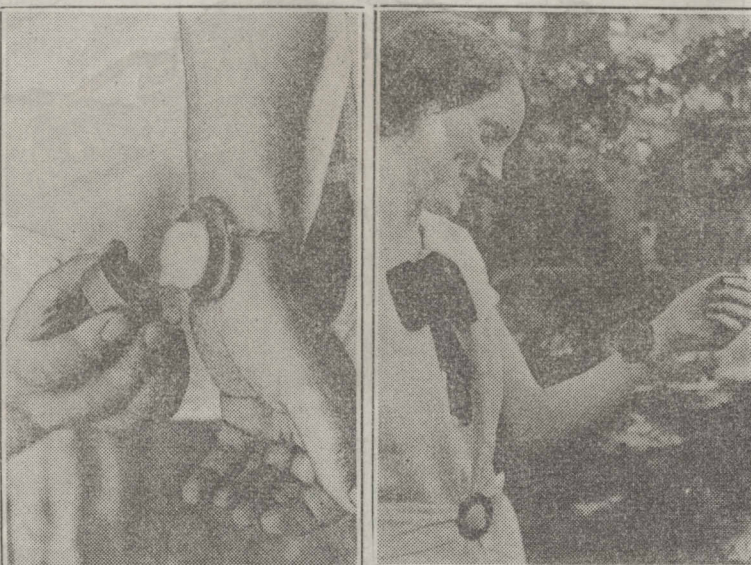

How Chinese Editors Outwit Censor

Chinese newspapers, excepting on rare occasions, are subject to censorship. Occasionally, however, the editors outwit the censors, as is indicated by the clipping shown above, by using blank characters which indicate to the reader that something has been left out. As a result, any news well supplied with blank type attracts considerable attention, defeating the object of the censor responsible for suppression of the news item. The clipping is from a recent issue of the China Evening News of Shanghai and tells of a conference between Dr. C. T. Wang, former minister of foreign affairs, and Wang Ching-wei, head of the executive yuan at Nanking.

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The first paragraph reads as follows, the "o's" representing the parts deleted: "Information from well-informed quarters in Nanking states ooooooooooooooooooooo Wang Chen-ting (C. T. Wang) ooooooooooooooooooooo took advantage of a pleasure trip to Wushih yesterday morning and went to Nanking, where he conferred with Wang Ching-wei. Dr. C. T. Wang is planning to go to Manila with the Olympic team, and the official spokesman indicated this was the purpose of his interview with Wang Ching-wei, but our reporter learned from those close to Dr. Wang that the real purpose of his trip was ooooooooooooo to view the scenic spots of the capital . . ."

Blank type in profusion in the item excited the curiosity of the Chinese translator in the offices of The Chicago Tribune in Shanghai. A telephone call to the offices of the China Evening News disclosed that Wang Ching-wei, who as head of the executive yuan was the equivalent of a premier, had tendered his resignation as a direct result of complications with Japan.

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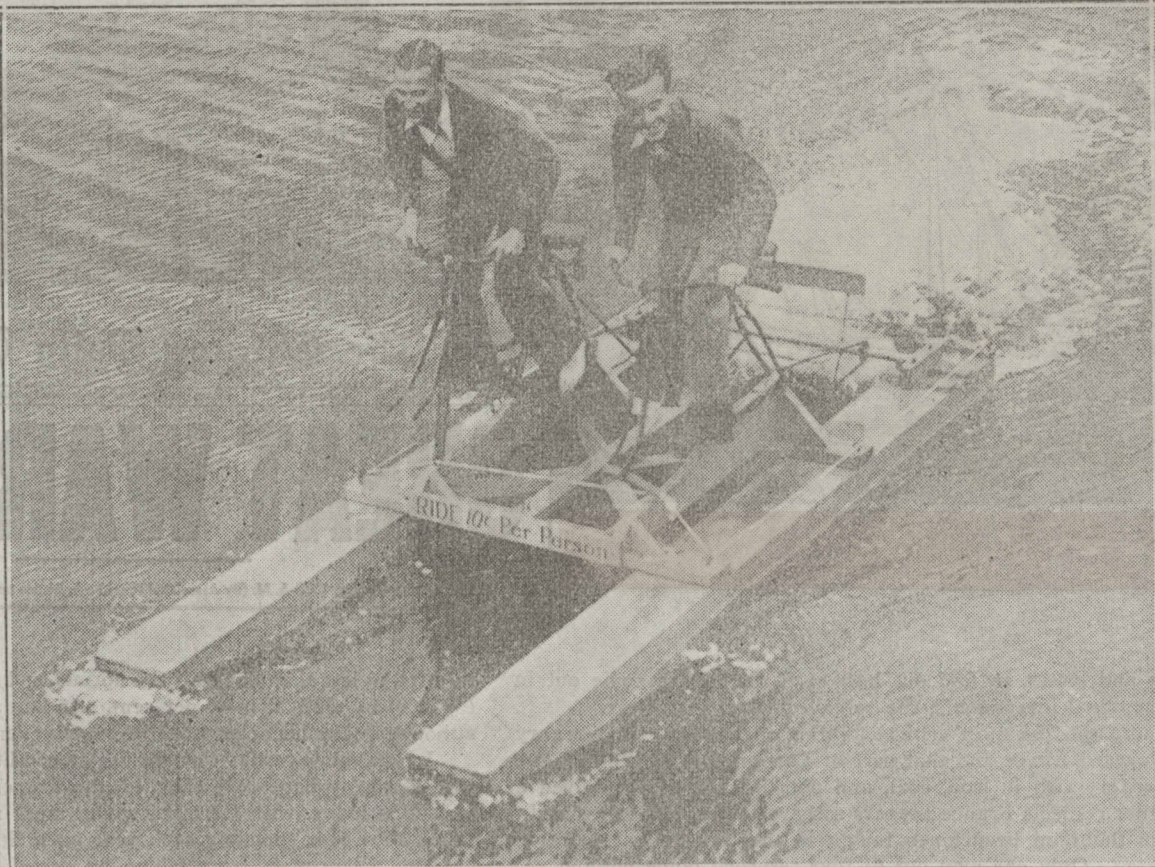

REVIVAL of the popularity of the bicycle in this country has caused amateur inventors in numerous places to construct adaptations of the pedal-driven vehicle. In Seattle two youths, Stanley Nelson (left) and Fred Nelson (right), set two bicycle frames upon a pontoon, connected the sprocket wheels to a paddle wheel, and produced a craft that could outspeed the fastest rowboat.
