you don't watch out! Yes, it's time to think about Halloween and Halloween parties. How would you like to serve pumpkin head canapes, hobgoblin salad, witches' brew, and cold chills for refreshments?

Or maybe you'd prefer to bring forth a heartier menu - say, pumpkin face ham loaf, witches' salad, creamed potatoes, ghost sandwiches, and Halloween shiver cakes?

Mary Meade, Tribune cooking editor, has a booklet which should help a great deal. It contains ten menus for Halloween refreshments and five menus for Halloween suppers or luncheons, along with recipes for preparing the various dishes. There are twelve pages full of suggestions in this orange-covered printed booklet. It's called "Halloween Menus." These typical recipes come from the book:

Cider Frappe

Dissolve % cup (1 cup minus 2 tablespoons) sugar in ½ cup hot water. Add 2 cups cider, 1 cup orange juice, ¼ cup lemon juice, and 2 cups cold water and freeze to a soft mush in the refrigerator freezing tray. Serve in small, slender glasses. The frappé is meant to be sipped, not eaten with a spoon.

Pickled Goblins

For each goblin cut off an end of a hard-cooked egg so that the

Hobgoblin Salad

Cut the tops from large oranges or red apples and hollow out the centers. Cut eyes, nose, and mouth from the side of the fruit. If oranges are used, cut only through the outer skin, leaving the white membrane showing through. Fill the cavities with diced fruit mixed with salad dressing and place the tops back on the salad as covers. . . .
