CITY'S GREATEST ARMISTICE DAY TRIBUTE PLANNED

Observance Will Stress Desire for Peace.

Arrangements have been made to make the 18th Armistice day celebration next Wednesday the greatest Chicago has ever known, according to announcements yesterday.

Because of the war fears menacing the world, this year's observance of the end of the world war on Nov. 11, 1918, is arousing special interest as a means of urging continued peace.

Armistice Ball Saturday.
A preliminary celebration will be held next Saturday night when society will gather in the Red Laquer room of the Palmer house for the gala French Armistice banquet and ball, under the auspices of Les Camarades de Combat and several French societies. Rene Weiller, French consul, will be chairman, and Arthur Boisdeau, president of Les Camarades de Combat, will be toastmaster.

M. Boisdeau announced the speakers would be Senator Lewis, Mayor Kelly, Maj. Gen. Charles E. Kilbourne, Maj. Gen. Frank Parker, and a number of foreign consuls.

Principal Program Sunday.
The principal Armistice day celebration will take place Sunday afternoon at the Chicago Historical society building in Lincoln park. For the first time this gathering will be open to the public.

At 2:15 o'clock the various veterans' organizations with military bands and drum and bugle corps will assemble at Clark and Center streets for a parade to the building. The program proper is scheduled to begin at 2:30 o'clock.

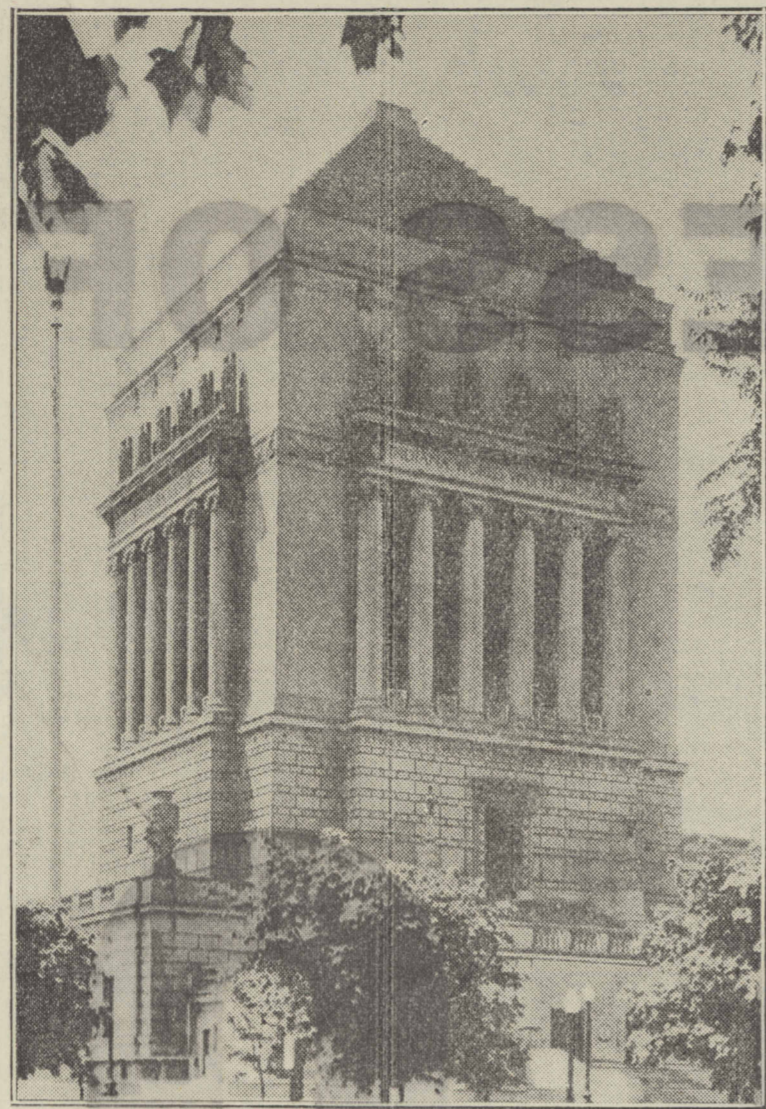
Every major organization of veterans of the United States and allied armies will be represented by ranking officers.

Prominent speakers from the committee of 100 nationally known religious and civic leaders who are sponsoring the Emergency Peace campaign will address 11 community mass meetings Sunday. The goal of their campaign is to "keep this country from going to war and to achieve world peace." The Chicago committee of the campaign is headed by the Rev. Alva Tompkins.

Red Cross to Give Pageant.
Sunday night, as a feature of Armistice day services of the Sunday Evening club in Orchestra hall, the Red Cross will present a pageant, "War to Peace."

Other organizations have planned parades or other forms of observance for Armistice day itself. There will be a brief ceremony at State and Madison streets at 11 a. m. when shopping crowds will pause a minute with bared heads. Veterans' organizations on the south side also are planning a large parade.

O'Hearn was the central figure in a series of fights between the school board and Noble Puffer, county superintendent of schools, over alleged hugging episodes. Puffer ordered his discharge, the school board refused. In the end Puffer had his way but the school board appointed O'Hearn business manager. W. J. Lasecke, formerly a public school teacher of Lansing, Ill., was selected by the school board as new principal and took up his duties Monday.

RAILWAY SURGEONS MEET TODAY.
More than 1,000 medical men from thirty states are expected to attend the three-day forty-seventh annual Congress of Railway Surgeons which will open in the Palmer house today. Dr. G. G. Dowdall is chairman of the committee on arrangements.

ELECTION BOARD TO START VOTE CANVASS TODAY

Under supervision of the election commissioners, 53 three man teams will start at 10 a. m. today to make the official canvass of ballots cast in the 3,765 precincts under the election board's jurisdiction. Alexander J. McKay, chairman of the board, estimated the official count would require three or four days. He said it is planned to issue the official proclamations on Nov. 16. Each team will have a caller, a tallier, and a carrier. Three of the teams will canvass the ballots cast in the 192 precincts in the nine suburbs under the board's jurisdiction, and the others will review the tallies in the 3,573 precincts in Chicago. Party watchers will witness the official canvass.

Gasoline Stove Blast Kills Woman in Indiana

Marion, Ind., Nov. 4.—[Special.]—Mrs. Carrie Weeks, 49, died today a few hours after she had been burned in an explosion of a gasoline stove in a housecar she occupied with her husband.

EUROPE CALLED BIG WINNER IN AMERICAN VOTE

British, Nazis, Fascists, Reds Cheer Roosevelt.

BY DAVID DARRAH. (Chicago Tribune Press Service.)
LONDON, Nov. 4.—Great Britain and Europe in general are big winners by President Roosevelt's landslide victory, in the opinion of political observers here. They were unanimous tonight in applauding the result.

It is considered that his reelection is insurance against the adoption by the United States of an isolationist policy during the next four years. There seems little hope that these will be peaceful years and the British are most eager to get all possible backing in the United States.

News Dominates Papers.
News of the American election dominated all evening papers. It was eagerly discussed by the British, who were strongly sympathetic for President Roosevelt.

The lion's share of the editorial page of the Star was devoted to an article in which A. G. Gardiner urged settlement of the war debt dispute as the best way of "smoothing President Roosevelt's path to a more active participation in European affairs." The author said his reelection gave the President "authority to take part in salvaging the world civilization which he could not exercise before."

Berlin Sees U. S. Going Nazi.
BERLIN, Nov. 4.—"The American decision, important for the whole world, shows the American people entrust their fate to the [Nazi] principle of leadership," according to the Deutsche Allgemeine Zeitung. This sentiment is echoed in most German papers in comments on the American election.

The Berliner Tageblatt's chief editor, Paul Scheffer, said he believed in President Roosevelt's victory may lead to the "one party system" now ruling in Germany.

Simultaneously the papers express hope that President Roosevelt will help revive world trade by increasing the imports and exports of America. Official quarters are less optimistic. They assume America will insist on payment for goods delivered to

date before resuming exports to Germany.

Moscow Pleased.
MOSCOW, Nov. 4.—(P)—Russians today received news of President Roosevelt's reelection with undisguised gratification, primarily because they regard him as a known quantity who has shown friendship toward Russia.

Soviet quarters expressed the view that the reelection would insure no change in Russo-American relations.

Italy Much Satisfied.
ROME, Nov. 4.—(P)—News of President Roosevelt's victory was received cordially in Italy today, partly because his energetic exercise of executive power has been frequently regarded by Italians as in "Fascist tradition."

Declining an official statement on the reelection so as not to seem too interested in American internal politics, Fascist authorities said, nevertheless: "There is general satisfaction in Italy, where the theory of continued opportunity for great leaders is in-grown."

French Hall Relection.
PARIS, Nov. 4.—(P)—French official circles hailed today the reelection of President Roosevelt. The President's "will to collaborate internationally" and his desire to strengthen world peace was declared officially as making the United States' choice "extremely fortunate" for France.

Premier Leon Blum said the reelection "will be interpreted by the entire world as a success for democracy."

League Views Vote as Stabilizing.
GENEVA, Nov. 4.—(P)—League of nations circles today viewed the reelection of President Roosevelt as one stabilizing hope in a situation which has rapidly been deteriorating. Diplomats here voiced the belief President Roosevelt would wield a powerful influence for the maintenance of world peace, yet without entangling the United States in any European quarrels.

Japs See No Change.
TOKIO, Nov. 4.—(P)—Foreign office officials, speaking informally, today viewed President Roosevelt's reelection as indicative of the continuance of friendly relations between United States and Japan. They said they saw no possibility of alteration of President Roosevelt's far eastern policy.

Argentina Enthusiastic.
BUENOS AIRES, Nov. 4.—(P)—Relection of President Roosevelt was hailed with enthusiasm throughout South America today. A consensus of newspapers showed his return to the White House was desired by South Americans because under the Roosevelt régime the "good neighbor" policy has apparently been made permanent and the reciprocity trade program has been expanded.

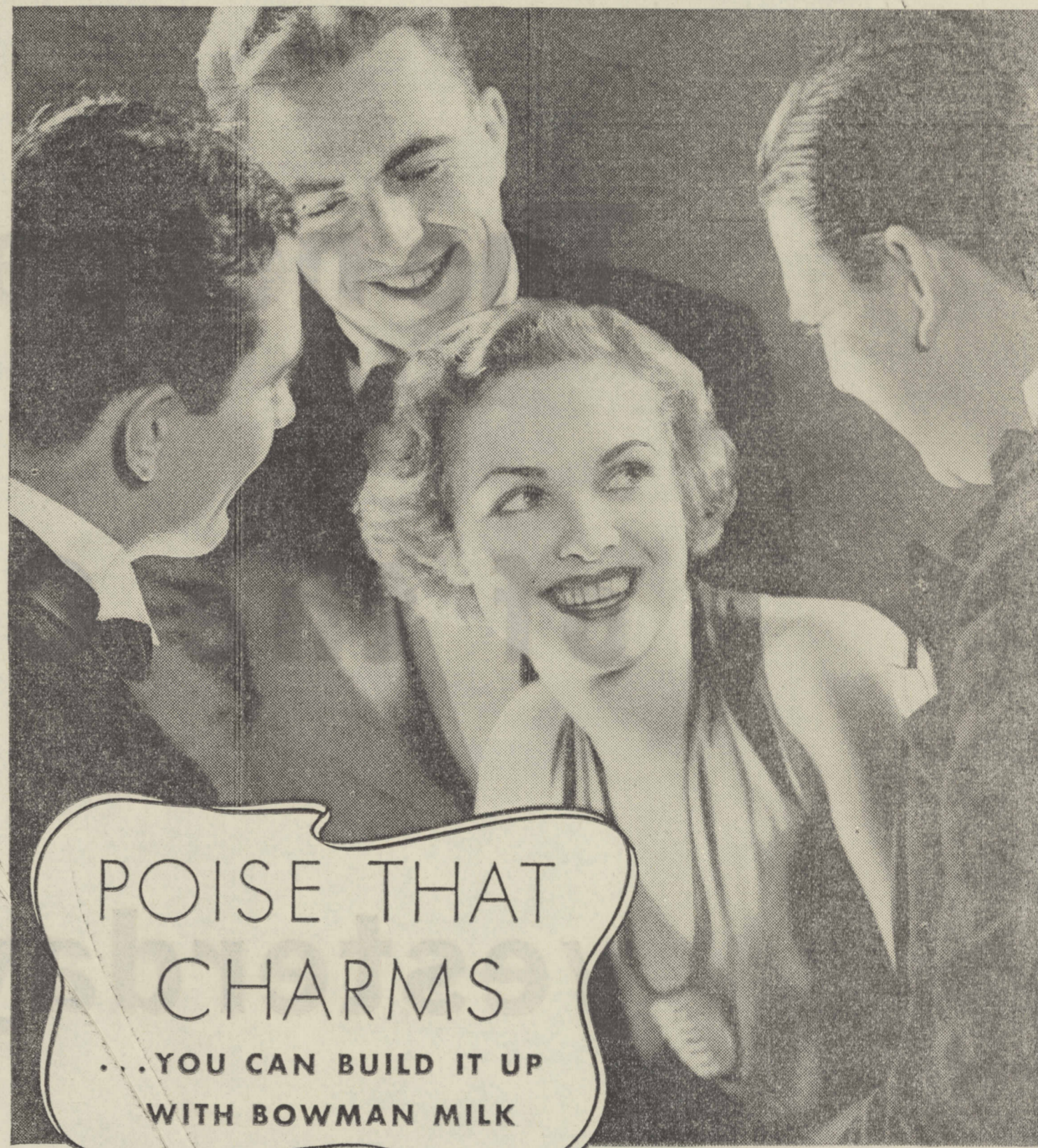
