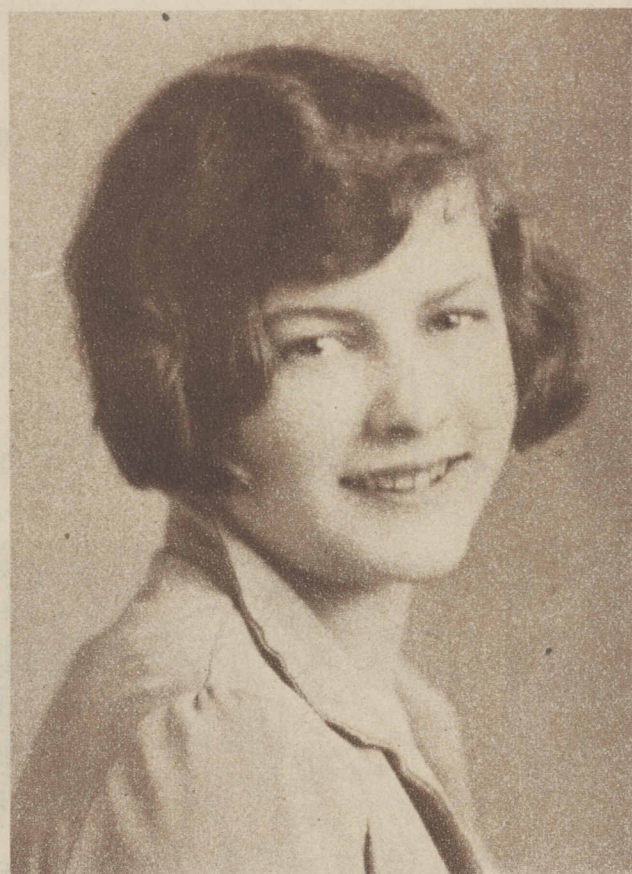

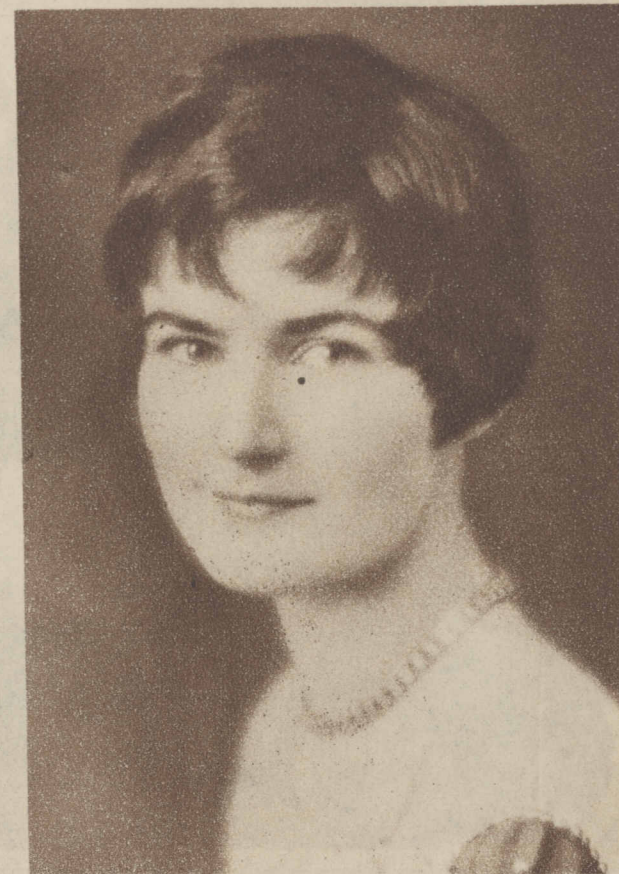

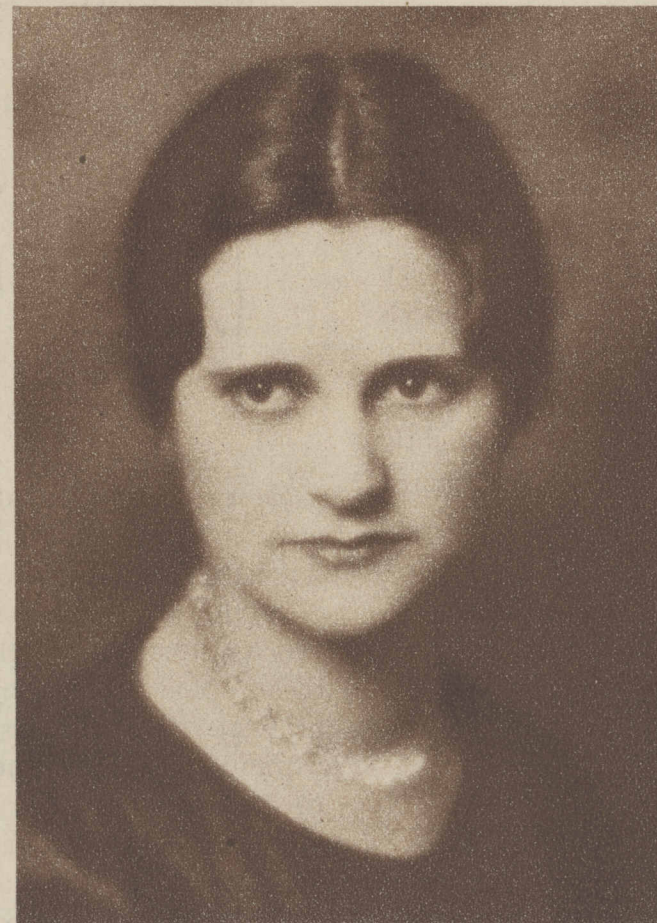
MISS B. G. WAUKESHA, WIS.

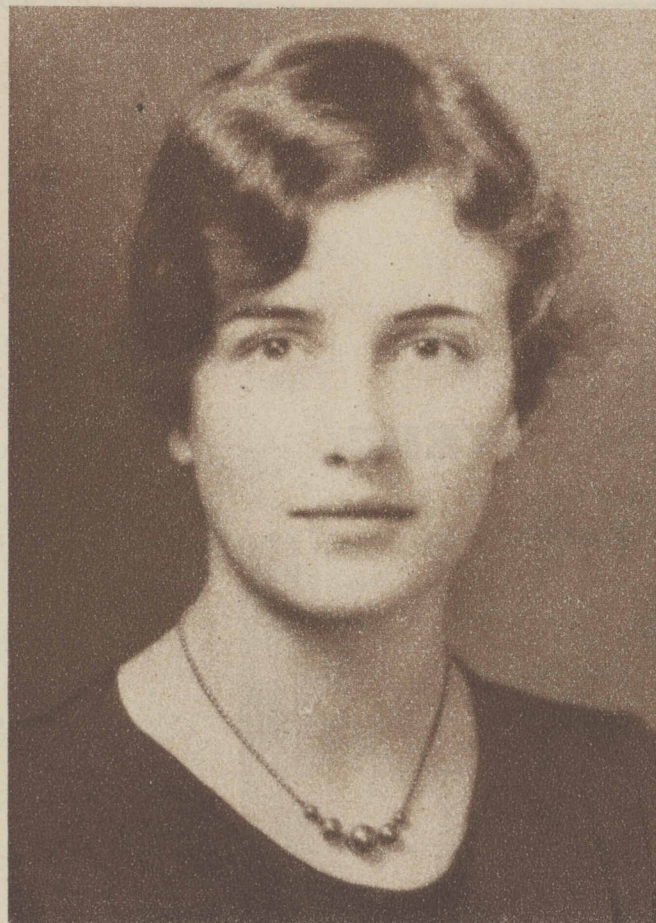
MISS A. K. HOLLAND, MICH.
