

leader of a district storm (gold or silver) 1. New cap for SS men (compare figure upper right) is worn with smaller service uniform. Leaders, beginning with leader of a storm, wear in addition silver cords. 2. Insignia for SA and SS leaders and men. Above the title: Rank insignia and civil insignia of the SA and SS. The reproduced insignia are those of the Highland and Bavarian east district divisions, with the exception of the railroad and marine storm. The SS insignia carry the numbers of a Wuerttemberg regiment. . . . In the SA organizations the colors of the insignia, pipings, and shoulder straps are different, according to the division. The examples on this page are taken from the Highland and Bavarian east district divisions.

Putting masculine Germany into uniforms of types portrayed above is only one aspect of complete regimentation of the German people—a regimentation which includes reshaping of thought in the Nazi mold, suppression of rights, and control and censorship over newspapers. Under the Nazi system, to a greater degree, it is reported, even than under the kaisers, have German newspapers been shorn of freedom of expression.
