MASTER AGREEMENT BETWEEN GOGEBIC COMMUNITY COLLEGE AND THE MICHIGAN ASSOCIATION OF HIGHER EDUCATION GOGEBIC COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT 2016-2017

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1		MASTER AGREEMENT	
2	Between the Gogebic Community College Board of Trustees (hereinafter called the College) and the		
3	Michigan Association of Higher Education, Gogebic Community College District (hereinafter called		
4	the F	Taculty).	
5			
6		ARTICLE I	
7		Recognition	
8	A.	The College hereby recognizes the Faculty as the exclusive bargaining representative, as defined in	
9		Section II of Act 366, Public Acts of 1947, for:	
10		"All full-time and regular part-time daytime and evening on-campus and full-time off-campus	
11		instructional employees. This bargaining unit also includes the Nursing, Cosmetology, Vocational-	
12		Technical faculty, Librarians, Division Chairpersons, Health Service Officer, Counseling/Place-	
13		ment Officers, but also excluding all summer and part-time off-campus instructional faculty, Deans,	
14		all supervisory employees and all other employees. Also excluding faculty teaching nine (9) credit	
15		hours or less or twelve (12) contact hours or less each academic year with the exception of faculty	
16		listed under the terms of Appendix G."	
17	В.	The College agrees not to negotiate a contract with any individual instructor covered by this	
18		Agreement nor any other Faculty organization for the duration of this Agreement. This is not to be	
19		construed as prohibiting contracts where programs of special community interest or area services	
20		are initiated under sponsorship of the College.	
21	C.	Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed to deny or restrict to any instructor or the College any	
22		rights either may have under the applicable laws, rules or regulations. The rights granted to	
23		instructors in this agreement shall be deemed to be in addition to rights granted under appropriate	
24		Federal and Michigan laws.	
25	D.	In the event that any provision of this Agreement is or shall at any time be held contrary to law, all	
26		other provisions of this Agreement shall continue in full force and effect.	
27	E.	This Agreement shall supersede any rules, regulations, or practices of the College which shall be	
28		inconsistent with its terms.	
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1		ARTICLE II			
2		Agency Shop Clause			
3	А.	In accordance with the terms of this Article, each Instructor in the bargaining unit within thirty (30)			
4		days of employment shall, as a condition of employment, join the Faculty or pay a Service Fee to			
5		the Faculty. (For the purposes of this Article the word "Instructor" shall be defined as an employee			
6		of the College who is exclusively represented by the Faculty as defined in Article I of this			
7		Agreement).			
8	B.	Faculty Members. Instructors assigned to the bargaining unit shall pay dues to the Faculty in			
9		accordance with its policies and procedures.			
10	C.	Service Fee Payers. Instructors not joining the Faculty shall pay a Service Fee to the Faculty as			
11		determined in accordance with the Michigan Education Association Policy and Procedures			
12		Objections to Political-Ideological Expenditures. The remedies set forth in this policy shall be			
13		exclusive, and unless and until the procedures set forth therein have been availed and exhausted, all			
14		other administrative and judicial procedures shall be barred.			
15	D.	Non-Payment of Dues or Service Fees. If an Instructor does not pay the appropriate amount of			
16		dues or service fee to the Faculty, upon written notification by the Faculty, the College shall deduct			
17		the amount from the Instructor's wages and remit same to the Faculty.			
18		Should such involuntary payroll deduction become legally disallowed, the College shall, at the			
19		written request of the Faculty, terminate the employment of such Instructor within thirty (30) days			
20		of receiving the notification by the Faculty. The parties agree that the failure of any Instructor to			
21		comply with the provisions of this Article is just cause for discharge from employment.			
22	E.	Payroll Deduction. Upon written authorization by an Instructor or pursuant to Paragraph D of this			
23		Article, the College will deduct the appropriate amount of the dues or service fees from the			
24		Instructor's wages. The deductions will be made in equal amounts from the paychecks of the			
25		Instructor, with the first pay following receipt of the written authorization from the Instructor or the			
26		Faculty and continuing through the last pay period in June of each year. Moneys so deducted will			
27		be transmitted to the Faculty, or its designee, no later than twenty (20) days following each			
28		deduction.			
29	F.	Save Harmless Clause. In the event of legal action against the College brought in a court or			
30		administrative agency because of its compliance with this Article, the Faculty agrees to defend such			
31		action, at its own expense and through its own counsel, provided:			
32		1. The College gives timely notice of such action to the Faculty and permits the Faculty			
33		intervention as a party if it so desires, and			
34		2. The College gives full and complete cooperation to the Faculty and its counsel in securing			
35		and giving evidence, obtaining witnesses, and making relevant information available.			
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1 The Faculty agrees that in any action so defended, it will hold the College harmless from any 2 liability for damages and costs imposed by a final judgment of a court or administrative agency as a 3 direct consequence of the College's compliance with this Article, but this does not include any 4 liability for unemployment compensation paid under the Michigan Employment Security Act.

- G. Sections B, C, and D of this article are unenforceable under current law and therefore will not be
 continued. If future legislation or court rulings make these sections enforceable, then they will be
 reinstated as part of this agreement.

1		ARTICLE III
2		Bargaining Agreement
3	The Facult	y and the College agree to the following guidelines in their negotiating procedures:
4	1.	It is agreed that all bargaining shall be in good faith, and the respective negotiating
5		committees shall work diligently to formulate an Agreement as expeditiously as possible.
6	2.	Although it is recognized that both Committees are required to gain final approval by the
7		majority of their respective groups, it is understood that in no way should foreknowledge of
8		such requirement impede the progress made by both Committees.
9	3.	It is further understood that each Committee shall endeavor to encourage its respective group
10		to accept such recommendations as are made by the Committees as soon as mutual agreement
11		between the Committees is reached.
12	4.	Upon ratification of the Agreement by the respective memberships, appropriate individual
13		contracts, in accordance with the Agreement and College policy, will be presented for proper
14		signatures.
15	5.	This Agreement will not be effective until ratified by a majority of the membership of the
16		Faculty and approved by the College.
17	6.	The provisions of this Agreement will be in force from August 16, 2016, to August 15, 2017.
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1			ARTICLE IV		
2			Rights of the College		
3	А.	The	College, by its own volition and in accordance with the mandate of the electors of the District,		
4		here	hereby retains and reserves unto itself all power, authorities and duties conferred upon it by the		
5		statu	ttes and the Constitution of the State of Michigan and the statutes and the Constitution of the		
6		Unit	ed States of America.		
7	B.	Amo	ong the rights and responsibilities are included as deemed necessary and advisable the College:		
8		1.	To manage and administer control of its properties, facilities, and employees.		
9		2.	To hire, pay, retain, promote, demote, discipline and dismiss its employees.		
10		3.	To recommend individual courses and programs of instruction, including special programs,		
11			maintain the College buildings, equipment, and instructional equipment, to provide materials,		
12			equipment and non-teaching services to conduct the College, to provide for the development		
13			and utilization of its facilities, to provide for the athletic, recreational, cultural, and social		
14			events for the people served.		
15		4.	To establish through the administrative personnel, class schedules, the duties, responsibilities,		
16			and assignments of Faculty and other employees, and criteria and qualifications for other		
17			contractual services and special programs. The assignment of overload is the sole		
18			responsibility of the Administration of the college.		
19					

1		ARTICLE V
2		Instructor Rights
3	А.	Pursuant to Act 336 of the Public Acts of 1947, the College hereby agrees that every Instructor
4		employed by the College shall have the right to freely organize, join, and support the Faculty for the
5		purpose of engaging in collective bargaining or negotiations and other concerted activities for
6		mutual activities and protection. As a duly elected body exercising governmental power under
7		intent of law of the State of Michigan, the College undertakes and agrees that it will not directly or
8		indirectly discourage or deprive or coerce any Instructor in the enjoyment of any rights conferred
9		by Act 336 as amended or other laws of Michigan or the Constitutions of Michigan and the United
10		States; that it will not discriminate against any Instructor with respect to hours, wages, or any terms
11		or conditions of employment by reason of his or her membership in the Faculty, his or her
12		participation in any activities of the Faculty or collective professional negotiations with the College,
13		or his or her institution of any grievance, complaint, or proceeding under this Agreement or
14		otherwise with respect to any terms or conditions of employment and citizenship.
15	B.	The Faculty and its members shall have the right to use College building facilities in accordance
16		with College policy at reasonable hours for meetings. No Instructor shall be prevented from
17		wearing insignia, pins, or other identification of membership in the Faculty, either on or off College
18		premises. Bulletin boards and other established media of communication shall be made available to
19		the Faculty and its members for reasonable Faculty business.
20	C.	The College agrees to make available to the Faculty in response to reasonable requests from time to
21		time available public information under College policy concerning the financial resources of the
22		district, budgetary requirements and allocation and other such non-privileged information relevant
23		to collective bargaining, including overload pay of employees within the bargaining unit and
24		imprested fund reports, as will assist the Faculty in developing intelligent, accurate, informed and
25		constructive proposals on behalf of the instructors and their students and on behalf of the Gogebic
26		Community College. The Faculty shall reimburse the College for reasonable expenses incurred in
27		furnishing information or making records available.
28	D.	An Instructor shall be notified of any meeting of a disciplinary nature and shall be entitled to have
29		present a representative of the Faculty when he/she is being disciplined, for any infraction of rules
30		or delinquency in professional performance. This, however, does not preclude the discussion of
31		problem areas that do not require disciplinary action. When a request for such representation is
32		made, no further action shall be taken with respect to the Instructor until such representative of the
33		Faculty is present, provided such time shall not exceed three (3) hours or at a mutually agreeable
34		time after occurrence of the incident.
35	E.	All Instructor evaluations will be conducted according to policy jointly formulated or amended by

the Administration and the Faculty, subject to approval of the College. The primary purpose of

evaluation is for the improvement of instruction, and direction and assistance of the Instructor in a
 constructive manner.

3 The following procedure will be used for evaluation:

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- 1. Each Faculty member shall maintain a portfolio providing evidence of successful professional academic performance. The three areas of professional academic performance are:
 - a.) Teaching/Instruction
 - b.) Professional Development and Scholarly Activity
 - c.) Institutional Involvement and Community Service
- 9 2. During the first year of employment, the Faculty member will work with the Division Chair 10 and the Dean of Instruction to build their professional performance portfolio and identify any 11 areas that need improvement. The professional performance portfolio will be completed and 12 submitted to the Dean of Instruction by the end of the first year of employment. The Dean of 13 Instruction will conduct at least four direct observations of the Faculty member's instruction 14 during the first year.
- By the beginning of the second year of employment, a corrective action plan will be developed by the Dean of Instruction, Program Administrator, and the Faculty member for any area(s) identified as needing improvement. This plan will be specific, attainable, and contain a timetable. The plan will be reviewed at midyear and evaluated at the end of the year by the Dean of Instruction and the Faculty member. The Dean of Instruction and Program Administrator will conduct at least two direct observations of the Faculty member's instruction during the second year.
- 4. The professional academic performance portfolio will be reviewed by the Dean of Instruction, Program Administrator, and the Faculty member before the end of the second year of successful employment. A corrective action plan will be developed by the Dean of Instruction, Program Administrator, and the Faculty member for any area(s) identified as needing improvement. This plan will be specific, attainable, and contain a timetable. The plan will be reviewed midyear and evaluated at the end of the year by the Dean of Instruction and the Faculty member.
- 5. The professional academic performance portfolio will be reviewed by the Dean of Instruction, Program Administrator, and the Faculty member before the end of the third year of successful employment. A corrective action plan will be developed by the Dean of Instruction, Program Administrator, and the Faculty member for any area(s) identified as needing improvement. This plan will be specific, attainable, and contain a timetable. This plan will be reviewed midyear and evaluated at the end of the year by the Dean of Instruction, Program Administrator, and the Faculty member. The Dean of Instruction or Program

1		Administrator will conduct at least two direct observations of the Faculty member's
2		instruction during the third year.
3	6.	After the third year of successful employment, the professional academic performance
4		portfolio will be reviewed by the Dean of Instruction, Program Administrator, and the Faculty
5		member on a regular predetermined schedule.
6	7.	Any professional development costs required to meet the goals of a corrective action plan
7		will be paid for by the College.
8	8.	If the Faculty member, Dean of Instruction, and Program Administrator cannot reach
9		agreement on any corrective action plan, the President of the College will resolve the dispute.
10		The Faculty member may add an addendum to any corrective plan where there is a dispute.
11	9.	Instructors, upon request, will be given access to review their personnel file, with the
12		exception of confidential pre-employment information. The Instructor shall receive a copy of
13		all evaluation materials placed in the file at the time they are placed therein.
14	10.	Personnel files are confidential and are available only to the President, Director of Human
15		Resources and appropriate Dean (not Secretaries). The Instructor shall be allowed to review
16		his or her personnel file by prior appointment with his or her representative present. The
17		Instructor shall be required to furnish the administrator with written authorization allowing
18		the representative to review his or her file.
19		

1			ARTICLE VI
2			Employment Policies and Practices
3	A.	The	College and Administration will give reasonable support and assistance to Instructors in
4		carr	ying out their contractual duties.
5	B.	Con	nplaints made against any Instructor shall be promptly called to the attention of the Instructor.
6		Inst	ructors are encouraged to personally investigate the complaint and attempt to resolve the
7		proł	blem. The Administration shall not use any complaint not brought to the attention of the
8		Inst	ructor in any evaluation or disciplinary action.
9	C.	Pro	bationary Instructors
10		1.	All new Instructors will be on an annual probationary contract. During this probationary
11			period, an Instructor will be provided with guidance, assistance and recommendations for
12			improvement. After three (3) years of successful full-time teaching, an Instructor will be
13			recommended for a continuing contract by the respective Dean to the President, subject to
14			approval by the Board of Trustees. After successfully completing ninety (90) credits of
15			teaching or 108 contact hours, a part-time instructor will be recommended for a continuing
16			contract by the respective Dean to the President, subject to approval by the Board of Trustees.
17		2.	The probationary teacher will be notified in writing by April 1st of each year whether he or
18			she will be retired or terminated.
19		3.	Part-time employment not in the bargaining unit shall not be considered as part of the
20			probationary period.
21		4.	A probationary Instructor denied renewal of his or her probationary contract for the following
22			year or denied a continuing contract at the end of the third year will be given from the
23			appropriate Dean a statement of the reasons for the denial. The Instructor may then file a
24			grievance of the decision to the President in writing within five (5) days, in accordance with
25			the grievance procedure through Steps III. Non-renewal or denial of a continuing contract to a
26			Probationary Instructor shall not be subject to arbitration. The Arbitrator shall have no
27			authority to render any decision regarding the termination of employment of a Probationary
28			Instructor.
29		5.	The President may temporarily suspend with pay any Instructor pending a final decision by
30			the College.
31	D.	Cor	ntinuing Contract Instructors
32		1.	An Instructor on continuing contract who has not reached retirement age shall not be refused
33			employment or dismissed or denied any economic advantage or discharged except for just
34			cause.
35		2.	The President may temporarily suspend with pay an Instructor pending a final decision by the
36			College.

1 E. Employment Reduction or Termination Procedures For Other Than Cause

- 2 1. Whenever it is necessary to decrease the size of the staff because of insufficient funds or 3 substantial decrease in student population, or discontinuance or retrenchment of areas of curriculum, the Administration will provide the affected Instructor with written notice of 4 potential change of status. The affected Instructor may exercise his/her rights under this 5 agreement to maintain his/her status. If after ten (10) working days the Instructor is unable or 6 7 chooses not to maintain his/her status, upon recommendation of the President, the College 8 may cause the Instructor to be reduced in status or placed on leave of absence without pay. The Instructor will receive a minimum of sixty (60) days notice of change in status. When 9 10 and if circumstances shall be appropriate, each Instructor placed on leave of absence will be reinstated if the offer is accepted within fourteen (14) calendar days after the official offer is 11 made. An employee placed on leave of absence is subject to recall for a period not to exceed 12 three (3) years. Such re-employment shall not result in loss of status or credit for previous 13 14 years of service.
- The following shall be considered in the laying off or placing a full-time Instructor on part time status: length of service in the district and academic qualifications. If academic
 qualifications for classes to be taught are equal, the Instructor with the longest continuous
 service in the district will be retained. All administrative efforts will be made to keep the
 Instructor's assignment on the main campus.
- Instructors contemplating change or termination of employment shall tender notification to
 the President in writing by April 1st; except under mutual agreement this deadline may be
 extended to June 30th.
- 4. The College agrees that full-time Instructors who are qualified will be assigned off-campus
 classes in order to provide those Instructors a full load.
- 25 F. Duties and Responsibilities
- Instructional personnel shall cooperate with Division Chairpersons, Deans and Administrators in providing instruction commensurate with the objectives of the College.
 Each Faculty member shall be free to use methods and devices to present instructional material in the most effective manner, consistent with recognized professional practices, and will cooperate in planning of programs and courses which are essential in the College-wide offerings.
- Faculty members are expected to participate in academic advisement, curriculum planning,
 and other items generally considered as a part of the professional duties of faculty personnel
 (e.g., registration, convocations and commencement, etc.). Faculty members are also
 required to participate in one committee per academic year as part of their professional duties.

1		3.	Faculty members are expected to attend all scheduled faculty and all staff meetings, unless	
2			specifically excused by the Administrator in charge.	
3		4.	Faculty members are required to maintain and post a minimum of five (5) office hours per	
4			week. The faculty schedule and office hours must be submitted to the Dean of Instruction	
5			within the first week of classes.	
6	G.	Whe	re an Instructor agrees to teach another class and said class is canceled for any reason or is not	
7		offer	ed in subsequent semesters or years, the Instructor shall have the right to bump into his/her	
8		former assignment and schedule.		
9	H.	Seniority		
10		1.	Seniority is defined as the total number of years an instructor is employed by the College in a	
11			bargaining unit position. Part-time instructors shall accrue seniority on a pro rata basis based	
12			on their annual load.	
13		2.	Seniority shall continue to accrue during a leave of absence defined in Article VIII.	
14				

1		ARTICLE VII
2		Vacancy Qualifications
3	A.	In filling vacancies in professional positions, both instructional positions and administrative
4		positions, the Administration shall give consideration to the qualifications of all applicants. Lists of
5		existing vacancies shall be posted and circulated for seven (7) working days before the vacancies
6		are filled. In filling positions, both the academic qualifications and proven competence of the
7		candidate shall be considered.
8	B.	Where applicants are equally qualified, currently employed personnel will be given primary
9		consideration for these vacancies. The College has sole discretion to determine whether applicants
10		are equally qualified. Final authority to select and approve all personnel rests with the College upon
11		the recommendation of the President of the College.
12		

1			ARTICLE VIII
2			Leaves
3	A.	Dea	th or Illness in the Family
4		1.	Instructors absent from duty on account of death or critical illness in the immediate family
5			shall be entitled to a maximum of three (3) days leave, without loss of pay, per year and the
6			absence beyond this time must be approved by the appropriate Dean. Immediate family shall
7			include: father, mother, son, daughter, wife, husband, brother or sister, father-in-law, mother-
8			in-law, son-in-law, daughter-in-law, regardless of residence.
9		2.	Instructors absent from duty on account of the death of other relatives shall be entitled to one
10			(1) day leave of absence at any one time at full pay and the absence shall not be deducted
11			from the accumulated sick leave. Other relatives shall include: grandfather, grandmother,
12			grandchild, uncle, aunt, nephew, niece, brother-in-law, sister-in-law, or just cousin. If the
13			other relative lives in the home of the Instructor, such death shall be treated the same as that
14			of the <i>immediate family</i> and Paragraph A.1. will be applied.
15		3.	In case more time is necessary under Paragraph A.1. and A.2. because of distance involved or
16			other unusual circumstances, additional time may be granted with the approval of the
17			appropriate Dean. In appropriate situations, approval will not be withheld.
18	В.	Jury	y Duty
19		1.	An Instructor who is summoned to jury duty shall be excused from work for jury duty; if an
20			Instructor is subpoenaed as a witness by anyone empowered by law to compel attendance by
21			subpoena, he or she shall be excused from work. Such Instructor shall be paid the difference
22			between his or her regular pay and the fee he or she receives for acting as a juror or witness.
23			Such leave shall not be deducted from any other leave covered in this agreement. The College
24			reserves the right to request the court to excuse the Faculty member from jury duty when his
25			or her absence works a hardship on the College.
26	C.	Sick	s Leave
27		1.	Full-time Faculty members shall be credited with eleven (11) sick leave days per contract
28			year for absence due to personal illness or injury which will be accumulated from year to year
29			to a total of one hundred sixty (160) days. No payment will be made for unused sick leave.
30			Sick leave shall be prorated for Instructors engaged after the beginning of the year and part-
31			time Instructors.
32		2.	Illness which extends beyond the leave accumulated by the Instructor shall be reviewed by
33			the appropriate Dean and President of the College. At its discretion, the College, acting on the
34			recommendation of the Dean and President, may grant a leave of absence or make any other
35			mutually agreed upon arrangement between the Dean and President, College, and the
36			Instructor.

1		3.	A female Instructor may utilize accumulated sick leave for pay purposes during a period of
2			disability due to pregnancy when the College receives medical evidence certifying the
3			disability. The College reserves the right to establish the actual period of disability with the
4			medical evidence.
5		4.	The College shall furnish each Instructor with a balance statement of accrued sick leave at the
6			beginning of each contract year.
7	D.	Sick	x Leave Bank
8		A S	ick Leave Bank shall be established by deducting one (1) sick leave day from each full-time
9		Insti	ructor's accumulation of sick leave. The Faculty may authorize from time to time an additional
10		day	of sick leave to be deducted from each full-time Instructor's accumulation of sick leave. The
11		Sick	Leave Bank shall be administered by one designee of the Faculty and one designee of the
12		Coll	ege, subject to the following rules:
13		1.	The assets of the Sick Leave Bank shall be used for illness or disability of a bargaining unit
14			member only.
15		2.	Illness or disability may be subject to medical verification by either the Faculty designee or
16			the College designee.
17		3.	No Instructor shall be entitled to the assets of the Sick Leave Bank until three (3) work days
18			after use of the Instructor's last individual accumulated sick leave day.
19		4.	Sick Leave Bank days shall not be utilized beyond the academic year in which his or her
20			accumulated sick leave is exhausted.
21		5.	Additional policies and procedures not in conflict with this article shall be ratified by both the
22			College and the Faculty
23		6.	Part-time Instructors shall also be required to donate one (1) full sick leave day to the Bank.
24			The part-time instructor may then withdraw days from the Bank on a prorated basis according
25			to his/her work schedule.
26		7.	Days that are placed into the Bank shall not be removed from the Bank for any other reason
27			than stated in this section.
28	E.	Lea	ves to Attend Professional Meetings
29		1.	The College shall establish and maintain a travel and conference fund using as a budget
30			guideline an amount of at least one hundred dollars (\$100) per full-time Instructor; said funds
31			to be allocated among the divisions according to the number of full-time Instructors in each
32			Division.
33		2.	The College, upon the recommendation of the President of the College, will approve the
34			attendance of an Instructor at special conferences and meetings. The Instructor will be
35			reimbursed for his or her expenses (including tuition) according to policy established by the
36			College. The Instructor, upon returning from a conference or meeting, will file with the

1			President of the College a written report on the activities of the Conference or meeting with
2			any recommendations. An accounting of all expenses incurred should also be presented on an
3			expense form provided by the office. At the next meeting of the College, the President of the
4			College will make the necessary report and recommend proper disposition.
		3.	
5		э.	The Instructor who is to be absent shall be responsible for making advance arrangements for
6 7	F.	Dore	his or her classes. The appropriate Dean must give approval to the arrangements made.
8	1.	1.	Two (2) days of paid personal leave per academic year shall be granted annually to all full-
		1.	
9			time Instructors, provided it shall not be on the day before or after a school holiday, vacation
10			period, or other school recess. Instructors contracted for less than full-time but at least three-
11			fifths time or more will be granted one (1) day of paid personal leave. Substitute or part-time
12			employees will not be eligible for any paid personal leave days.
13		2.	It is agreed that paid personal days used by Instructors shall be deducted from the Instructor's
14			sick leave accumulation.
15		3.	Application for paid personal leave shall, except in emergencies, be made to the appropriate
16			Dean at least three (3) days prior to the date of such leave on a form provided by the Board,
17			which is attached hereto as Appendix A.
18		4.	A verbal request will be considered if the emergency is of a nature to make advance request
19			impossible, but must be reduced in writing upon return to work.
20		5.	No more than fifteen percent (15%) of the Faculty entitled to use personal leave days may use
21			their personal leave day on any one day. The granting of personal leave days shall be based
22			on a first requested, first served basis.
23		6.	Subject to Provisions 1-5 above, an Instructor may opt to accumulate personal days from year

26			students by making arrangements to have his/her classes and course content covered.
27		7.	For 2016/17 only, each faculty member will receive one extra personal leave day for
28			participating in a Professional Development Day in August 2016.
29	G.	Pro	fessional Leave of Absence
30		1.	Leave of absence may be granted for purposes of professional advancement subject to
31			approval by the College upon the recommendation of the President of the College, when in
32			their judgment, the professional competence of the Instructor and the general welfare of the
33			College shall be benefited. Such leave shall not be less than one (1) semester; not more than
34			two (2) consecutive semesters at any one time, and shall be without pay.
35		2.	To be eligible for application for professional leave, the Instructor must have satisfactorily
36		2.	fulfilled the three-year conditional basis for employment. Application for professional leave
50			runned the unce-year conditional basis for employment. Application for professional leave

1 must be filed with the President of the College. The due date of such application shall be 2 March 1st for leaves beginning with the first semester, and October 15th for leaves beginning 3 with the second semester. The Administrator shall inform the applicant in writing that the 4 request is granted or rejected within sixty (60) days after the due date for filing the 5 application. Within fifteen (15) days following the approval of an application for professional 6 leave, the applicant must indicate his or her acceptance or rejection of the leave requested. A 7 plan for the leave period shall be filed with the President of the College.

8 3. The Instructor shall be reinstated following his/her leave of absence in a position determined 9 by his/her qualifications and the needs of the College. The Instructor may be placed on the 10 salary schedule in the same classification as he/she would have been if not on leave of 11 absence.

H. Community Service Leave

- 13 1. An Instructor who is an elected or appointed official of local government may have up to five 14 (5) days off duty from work to attend necessary training or civic functions related to his or 15 her governmental position. The days off will be deducted from personal leave and if 16 additional days are needed, the Instructor will make arrangements for his or her classes to be 17 covered by qualified Instructors.
- 18 I. General Provisions
- 191.The Board of Trustees, upon recommendation of the President of the College, may approve20leave of absence (voluntary or involuntary) without pay, not to exceed one (1) year. The21Board of Trustees may grant one year extension upon written request prior to expiration of22the leave. The Instructor will return to his or her previous position at the same status.

24 J. Parental Leave Bank

25 Parental Leave includes maternity, paternity, and adoption leave. A Parental Leave Bank shall be established by Faculty members voluntarily donating up to 10 sick leave days from his/her 26 27 accumulation of sick leave. The Parental Leave Bank shall have a maximum of 40 days. Faculty members are eligible for 10 days of paid Parental Leave to be deducted from the bank with a child 28 29 is born or come under his/her primary care. These days do not have to be repaid to the bank. 30 Faculty members are eligible after completing 1 year of employment at the College. The Parental Leave Bank shall be administered by one designee of the Faculty and one designee of the College. 31 32

1		ARTICLE IX
2		Communication Procedures
3	A.	The parties recognize the valuable assistance to be gained from effective communication between
4		Faculty, the College, and the Administration. Accordingly, it is agreed that the College and the
5		Administration and the Executive Committee of the Association will meet periodically to discuss in
6		an attempt to resolve problems of mutual concern to the parties especially in the areas of wages,
7		hours, and working conditions. Such meeting and the agenda, therefore, will be called by agreement
8		between the Administration and the President of the Faculty whenever such a meeting is desired by
9		either party. Each party mutually agrees that neither is obligated to bargain collectively with respect
10		to any matter whether covered or not covered in this agreement for the duration thereof.
11		

- ARTICLE X 1 2 **Grievance Procedure** 3 A. The grievance procedure shall be as follows: Step I: In the event that an Instructor believes there is a basis for a grievance in relation to his or 4 5 her rights under terms of the existing Collective Bargaining Agreement, or in the event that a representative of the Faculty believes there is a basis for a grievance in relation to application of the 6 terms of the existing Collective Bargaining Agreement, the grievant shall first discuss the alleged 7 8 grievance with the Dean or other administrator immediately responsible. The Instructor may be accompanied by a representative of the Faculty if he or she desires. The grievance shall be filed 9 10 within five (5) school days of the occurrence or awareness giving rise to the grievance. The Faculty shall have no right to initiate a grievance involving the right of an Instructor or group of Instructors 11 12 without his/her or their expressed approval in writing. 13 **Step II:** If the grievance is not resolved at Step I, the grievant shall state the grievance in writing on 14 a form available from the Faculty, and the form shall be delivered to the Dean or other administrator concerned along with a copy to the Faculty Executive Committee. Within five (5) 15 working days (defined as Monday to Friday inclusive, excluding recognized legal holidays) the 16 Dean or other administrator shall meet with the Faculty's Grievance Committee. Within five (5) 17
 - Working days after such meeting, the Dean or other administrator shall deliver a written disposition
 of the grievance to the committee.
 - Step III: If the grievance is not resolved at Step II, within five (5) working days the Faculty's Grievance Committee shall so note in writing on copies of the grievance form and the administrative disposition and deliver the writing to the President. Within seven (7) working days the President or his or her delegate shall meet with the Grievance Committee. Within seven (7) working days after such meeting, the President shall deliver a written disposition of the grievance to the Faculty's Grievance Committee. The Faculty Grievance Committee has the sole right to dismiss the grievance or present it to Step IV after the President's response.
 - Step IV: If the grievance is not resolved at Step III, within seven (7) working days the Faculty shall request in writing of the President that the grievance be submitted to arbitration. If the parties cannot agree on the selection of an arbitrator within five (5) working days after such request, an arbitrator shall be selected in accordance with the rules and procedures of the American Arbitration Association.
 - B. If any of the time requirements of the above procedures are not met, the grievance shall be
 automatically moved to the next step. The time requirements shall be strictly observed, but may be
 waived or extended by written agreement of the parties.

- C. The arbitrator shall have no power to alter, add to, or subtract from the terms of this agreement.
 Both parties agree to be bound by the award of the arbitrator and agree that judgment thereon may
 be entered in any court of competent jurisdiction.
- 4 D. Fees and expenses of the arbitrator shall be shared equally by the parties.

1		ARTICLE XI
2		Miscellaneous Provisions
3	А.	The College will pay for any physical examinations for initial hiring using the physician designated
4		by the College.
5	B.	The Instructors will be notified of their class schedules as soon as reasonably possible prior to the
6		beginning of each semester.
7	C.	In the event that a College car is not available for transportation purposes and the Instructor must
8		use his or her personal automobile, mileage will be paid at the College-approved rate, but never less
9		than the IRS rate as established on Form 2106 for income tax purposes.
10	D.	Copies of this agreement shall be printed at the expense of the College and presented to all
11		Instructors now employed or hereafter employed by the Board.
12	E.	The College shall notify the Faculty prior to any College action concerning amendment, deletion
13		and/or modification of the Early Retirement Policy.
14	F.	With College approval, an Instructor may enroll in a class or program offered by the College or
15		other institution of higher education, provided it is determined to benefit the Instructor's classroom
16		performance. The College shall reimburse the Instructor the cost of books, tuition and lab fees,
17		subject to the limitations of the budget established in Article VIII, Leaves to Attend Professional
18		Meetings, Paragraph 1.
19	G.	All agreements for stipends must be provided in writing, including the scope of the work and
20		compensation, before the work begins (i.e. the beginning of the academic year or semester).
21	Н.	Counselor's work hours will follow the non-affiliated staff work hours.

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All step salary increases are suspended at 2014/2015 levels for 2015/2016 and 2016/2017.

- A. Instructors with 30 semester hours (or equivalent quarter or trimester hours) beyond a Master's
 Degree shall receive an additional \$1,000 in annual salary.
- 9 B. Instructors with twenty (20) or more years of service with the College shall receive an additional
 \$1,000 in annual salary.
- C. Each Nursing Instructor's teaching load shall be determined totaling the contact hours worked during the regular academic year plus those worked during the summer session. The Nursing Instructor shall be compensated for contact hours in excess of thirty-six (36) according to Article XV, Paragraph C. For 2016/2017 only, one contact will be added for each NUR course where enrollment exceeds 40 students.
- 161.Fringe benefits will be prorated using contact hours generated during summer and regular17academic year.
- 18 2. Paragraph I of this Article does not apply to Nursing Instructors.
- D. The Cosmetology Instructor shall receive compensation during the summer session on a credit hour
 proration basis of his or her annual salary.
- A non-Faculty Lab Assistant shall be hired to provide some hours of relief for the Cosmetologist.
 Hours of work for the Lab Assistant will be determined by agreement between the Cosmetology
 Instructor and the Dean of Instruction.
- E. Non-teaching Instructors covered by this Agreement shall be assigned a regular work load of forty
 (40) hours per week, exclusive of lunch hour, during the regular academic calendar year.

Assignments in excess of the regular academic calendar shall be paid at their regular hourly rate (their base annual salary divided by 1424) for all scheduled hours worked under the extended contract. The schedule of hours to be worked shall be established prior to the end of the regular academic year by the immediate supervisor, on a weekly basis. The total contract work period (regular college academic year and extended contract period) shall not be in excess of ten (10) months, except by mutual agreement.

- Sick leave credits for work beyond a regular academic year shall be prorated and added to the
 Instructor's regular accumulation.
- 9 2. The regular work load for the Health Service Officer shall be three (3) hours per day, 10 exclusive of lunch hour, and shall be compensated for at the rate of three-eighths (.375) of the 11 step on the salary schedule.
- Employment of non-teaching Instructors will be for the regular school year only. Work
 assignments in excess of regular calendar year will be with the recommendation of immediate
 supervisor and approval of the College.
- 4. The following positions will not be included in the calculations as part of a regular teaching
 load beginning with the 2006-07 academic year. The compensation for these positions will be
 the following:
- 18 Intramural Director2 contact hours per semester
- 19 Athletic Director3 contact hours per semester
- 20 Basketball Coach4 contact hours per semester
- F. Division Chairpersons shall be appointed by the President on an annual basis. Each Division
 Chairperson shall receive two thousand dollars (\$2,000) per academic year as extra compensation.
 In addition, the Chairperson shall receive fifty dollars (\$50) extra compensation for each assigned
 Instructor to his or her division.
- G. Instructors may receive additional compensation or release time for certain extracurricular activities. Special duties such as inter-collegiate sports, student government, clubs, drama, and other activities the College deems necessary are subject to this provision. The compensation or release time shall be established by the Dean of Student Services and the Instructor involved. No person shall suffer a reduction in compensation for extracurricular activities unless specifically agreed to by the individual.
- H. On-campus day or evening classes taught by part time instructors shall be paid at a pro rata basis
 according to the salary schedule.
- I. Fees paid directly to the College for credit by examination, Cosmetology examinations for prior learning, and any other testing conducted by faculty outside of normal credit based instruction whereby the college receives a fee, shall be shared equally by the College with the Instructor conducting the examination.

1	J.	The Instructor's contractual salary shall be the salary on the salary schedule, plus longevity pay.
2	K.	Full-time instructors will move a full step on the salary schedule each year. Part-time instructors
3		shall move a full step on the salary schedule after they accumulate thirty (30) credits or thirty-six
4		(36) contact hours of seniority.
5	L.	Compensation for summer classes shall be as follows:
6		Instructors will be compensated at a rate of 1.5% per contact hour multiplied by the instructor's
7		base salary.
8	M.	The highest step a new Faculty member can be initially placed is step 3.
9		
10	N.	Faculty members who elect to teach at the Department of Corrections shall be paid a one-time \$750
11		stipend. If the faculty member elects to drive his/her own vehicle, they shall be paid an additional
12		\$150/per credit.

1			ARTICLE XIII
2			Salary Provisions and Procedure
3	А.	1.	The following classifications and descriptions will be used for initial placement
4			and subsequent movement within the salary schedule. Initial placement and subsequent
5			movement on the salary schedule will be based upon the individual's degree, approved credit
6			hours and experience. No more than six (6) years of out-of-system experience shall be
7			permitted when initially placing an individual within the salary schedule.

18			degree.
19			c. Courses that assist the Employee in improving instructional skills.
20			d. Courses specifically designed for Community College personnel.
21			e. Informal educational experience (examples being non-credit seminars and workshops)
22			may be given credit equivalency by the appropriate Dean. Any such decision shall be
23			neither precedential nor grievable. The agreement shall be reduced to writing and a
24			copy of the agreement shall be placed in the personnel file of the Instructor.
25		5.	A written request for approval shall be submitted to the appropriate Dean prior to enrollment
26			in a course or informal education experience. The Dean shall respond in writing to the
27			request.
28		6.	All credit course work must be taken through a regionally accredited institution recognized
29			by the U.S. Department of Education.
30	В.	Tuit	ion will be waived for college offered courses for faculty members, their spouses, and
31		depe	endent children, as defined by the IRS. In the event that the course is not completed with a
32		pass	ing grade, the tuition will be paid to the college by the faculty member within 30 days. Full-
33		time	Faculty whose load is reduced below full-time will be eligible for 100% Tuition Waiver for 1
34		year	. Procedures surrounding this policy will be established by the College.

1		ARTICLE XIV
2		Insurance
3	A.	All full-time Instructors covered under Article I, Section A, will be eligible for insurance coverage.
4		Except as modified by section C below, coverage for part-time instructors will be prorated if
5		accepted by the insurance carrier. The College shall provide the following MESSA PAK insurance
6		coverage:

B. Instructors electing Pak A will pay 20% of the health insurance premium costs of the selected
 MESSA option per pay period. Payment shall be via individual payroll deduction through an IRC
 Section 125 salary reduction agreement or by reduction under MCLA 408.477. The 125 reduction
 agreement documents shall be drafted by the College's attorney and approved by the Union's
 attorney.

C. Instructors working ten (10) or more credits during the academic year shall be eligible to elect
 prorata two-person or family health insurance coverage, or at the employee's option may elect to
 receive fully College paid single-person health insurance coverage.

20 D. Instructors not utilizing any College-paid hospitalization for optional insurance coverage shall be 21 entitled to a \$3,000 cash in lieu payment annually. The payment will be made on the last available

- 1 pay date in the month of June at the end of the fiscal year. This benefit will be prorated for part-2 time instructors.
- 3 E. All instructional Employees completing their annual contractual responsibilities shall have 4 insurance premiums paid by the Board for the months of July and August.
- F. Any full-time employee who is on sick leave and who had exhausted accumulated sick leave and
 who has completed three (3) years of full-time employment with the College shall have his or her
 insurance premiums paid for six (6) months or until the expiration of the accumulated sick leave,
 whichever is later.

2		Instructional Load Policy	
3	A.	A minimum full-time Instructor's load shall be thirty (30) credit hours or thirty-six (36) contact	
4		hours per academic year, but shall not exceed twenty-five (25) contact hours per semester. A full	
5		load may consist of on-campus day or evening classes. Off-campus classes shall not be assigned	
6		unless a full load cannot be derived from on-campus classes.	
7	В.	A full-time Instructor as defined in Article XV, Paragraph A, (excluding non-teaching assignments)	
8		with an instructional load beyond three (3) preparations per semester shall be compensated at the	
9		rate of one hundred fifty dollars (\$150) for each preparation beyond three (3) preparations per	
10		semester.	
11	C.	An instructor whose academic year load is beyond thirty (30) credits or thirty-six (36) contact hours	
12		shall be paid overload at the following rates:	
13		3.0% per credit or 2.5% per contact hour	
14		provided the load generated three hundred sixty (360) student credit/contact hours per academic	
15		year. The combination of credit/contact hours most advantageous to the Instructor shall be used in	
16		the determination of the Instructor's full-time status and/or academic overload. For each student	
17		credit/contact hour beyond nine hundred (900) per academic year, with the exception of student	
18		contact hours attributable to an extra teaching assignment for which overload is paid as above, the	
19		Instructor will receive one nine-hundredths (1/900) of his or her contractual salary to a maximum of	
20		thirty (30) percent of the Instructor's base salary. If additional students are assigned beyond the	
21		thirty (30) percent of salary maximum overload, the Instructor may refuse to admit the student to	
22		his or her class.	
23	D.	Determination of overload will be made by the second full pay period in the second semester, with	
24		payment for overload to be spread over the remaining pay periods or paid in a single payment when	
25		the overload has been completed. The method of payment is to be determined by the Instructor.	
26	E.	Students may pursue study on an independent or directed study basis for all courses offered by the	
27		College. Independent study courses are normally offered for capable students who require minimal	
28		Instructor interaction. Permission to enroll in an independent study or directed study course will be	
29		granted under the following conditions:	
30		1. For a course appropriate to the student's program of study, if the lack of enrollment in that	
31		course precludes it's being offered as a scheduled class.	
32		2. For documented, extenuating, personal circumstances which preclude an individual's	
33		enrollment in a scheduled class appropriate to his/her program of study. Such cases must be	
34		approved by the appropriate Dean.	
35		3. Remuneration for Instructors of students enrolled in independent study courses will be at the	
36		rate of thirty dollars (\$30) per generated contact hour. Remuneration for Instructors of	

students enrolled in Directed Study courses will be at the rate of 1.25 nine hundredth (1.25/900) of the Instructor's contractual salary per generated contact hour. Classification of a course as directed or independent study shall be approved by the Dean of Instruction prior to the start of the course. An Instructor's maximum combined generated credit hours of directed and independent study courses shall be limited to twenty-five (25) generated contact hours per academic year. The contact hour maximum may be exceeded by mutual agreement.

- 5. Independent or directed studies shall be voluntary.
- 6. No administrator will direct an independent study if there is a qualified instructional
 employee available and the employee volunteers to direct the study.
- F. All additional assignments beyond those required for a full-time instructional load shall bevoluntary.

Instructors shall be reimbursed two hundred fifty dollars (\$250) for each co-op student assigned to
 them for placement and supervision.

- H. All on-and-off campus classes may be offered to qualified full-time instructors in the bargaining
 unit regardless of load before being offered to part-time instructors.
- I. The teaching of summer classes shall be voluntary. Up to five (5) bargaining unit members may request to spread their teaching load over the entire contract year. The implementation of such a request shall be subject to the approval of the college and such approval may be given at the sole discretion of the college. An Instructor shall make such a request by April 1. If such a request is granted, the order of determination of load shall be summer classes, fall classes, and spring classes.
- J. Instructors teaching wet laboratory courses shall receive the extra preparation pay from paragraph B
 for each course taught. The following courses are considered wet laboratory courses: BIO101,
 BIO102, BIO215, BIO160, BIO161, BIO 250, BIO 251, NUR 110, NUR 120, NUR 130, NUR 210
 and all CHM (Chemistry) courses that have a laboratory.
- K. Faculty participating in advising outside the regular academic year (i.e. Summer Freshman
 Experience Workshops) will be paid at a rate of 1/168 x Base Salary for each day.

1		ARTICLE XVI
2		Academic Freedom
3	А.	The Instructor is entitled to full freedom in research and in the publication of the results, subject to
4		the adequate performance of the Instructor's other academic duties; but research for pecuniary
5		return should be based upon an understanding with the authorities of the institution.
6	B.	The Instructor is entitled to freedom in the classroom in discussing his or her subject, but should be
7		careful not to introduce into teaching controversial matter which has no relation to his or her
8		subject. Limitations of academic freedom because of religious or other aims of the institution
9		should be clearly stated in writing at the time of the appointment.
10	C.	The College or University Instructor is a citizen, a member of a learned profession, and an officer
11		of an educational institution. When the Instructor speaks or writes as a citizen, the Instructor should
12		be free from institutional censorship or discipline, but his or her special position in the community
13		imposes special obligations. As an individual of learning and an educational officer, the Instructor
14		should remember that the public may judge the profession and the institution by his or her
15		utterances. Hence, the Instructor should at all times be accurate; should exercise appropriate
16		restraint; should show respect for the opinions of others, and should make every effort to indicate
17		that he or she is not an institutional spokesperson.
18	D.	The instructor retains all rights to his or her intellectual property. Upon termination of employment,
19		the instructor grants a license to use his or her intellectual property relating to current course
20		materials to the College for a period of one year. Such license preserves ownership of the
21		intellectual property in the faculty-author, thereby enabling him or her to control subsequent uses of
22		the work.
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1		ARTICLE XVII
2		Early Retirement
3	А.	The decision to participate in the Early Retirement Incentive Plan is expressly voluntary on the part
4		of the employee.
5	B.	The Instructor must have served at least ten (10) consecutive full-time or equivalency years for
6		Gogebic Community College, were hired prior to September 1, 2008, and actually retire under the
7		terms of the Michigan Public School Employees Retirement System. Instructors hired on or after
8		September 1, 2008 are not eligible to participate in the Early Retirement Incentive Plan.
9	C.	The Instructor must make application for retirement and provide a written statement of resignation
10		of their position to the College by May 1 st for retirement at the end of fall semester or September 1 st
11		for retirement at the end of spring semester. The statement of resignation will indicate that the
12		resignation is for purpose of retirement and state the effective date. An instructor who has
13		purchased or will be purchasing service credit and is retiring early, must notify the College in May
14		of the year prior to the effective retirement date.
15	D.	To receive payments as specified herein, a MAHE member must opt to retire at the end of the
16		academic year in which he/she first becomes eligible to retire.
17	E.	The incentive shall be thirty-two thousand dollars (\$32,000). Payment shall be in three (3) equal
18		installments to a 403(b) account for the benefit of the Instructor in January each year following
19		retirement for three (3) years. These payments are non-elective contributions to a 403(b) account
20		for the benefit of the Instructor and are subject to all applicable contribution, compensation and
21		related provisions outlined in the Internal Revenue Code. MAHE agrees to hold the College
22		harmless against any claim or damage whatsoever by the IRS, MAHE or individual members with
23		regard to payments made in this manner.
24	F.	Full retirement as provided herein shall be limited to four (4) bargaining unit members during any
25		given year. In the event more than four (4) bargaining unit members opt to retire during one year,
26		the total available package shall be divided equally among the retirees.
27	G.	The Instructor, through requesting early retirement, agrees that such shall serve as
28		satisfaction/waiver of any other claim for compensation (e.g., unemployment compensation, etc.)
29		against the Gogebic Community College.
30	Н.	The Instructor also agrees to waive, in writing, any and all rights and claims against the College
31		arising under the Age Discrimination in Employment Act. The Employee is advised to consult with
32		an attorney before signing the Agreement, and will be given sufficient time to decide whether to
33		sign.
34	I.	The Employee will have seven (7) days to revoke a signed waiver.
35	J.	Service credit purchased by the Instructor may or may not be used to determine eligibility for
36		retirement, at the option of the Instructor.

1 K. The Instructor must submit their MPSERS member statement with their letter of intent to retire

1	ARTICLE XVIII
2	Duration of Agreement
