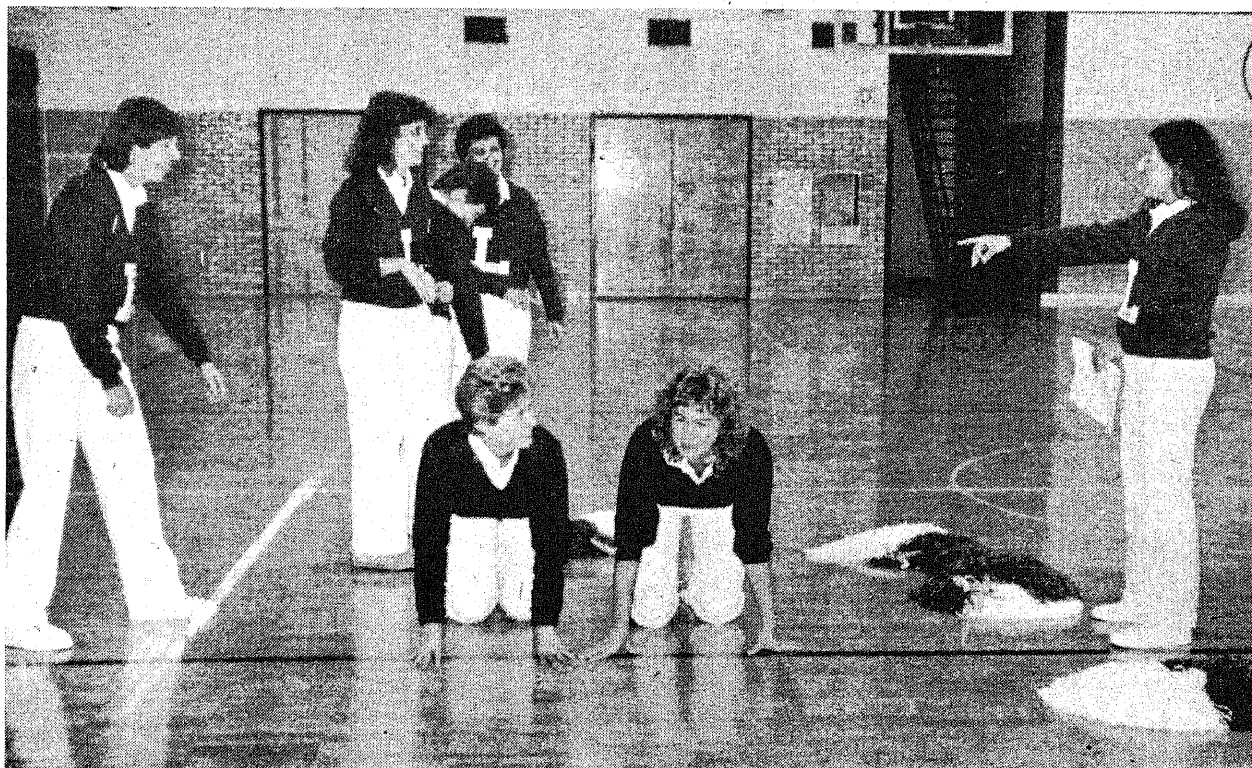

Again this year, members will be filling boxes for the holidays. The food drive will begin Nov. 1 and members will meet following the Nov.

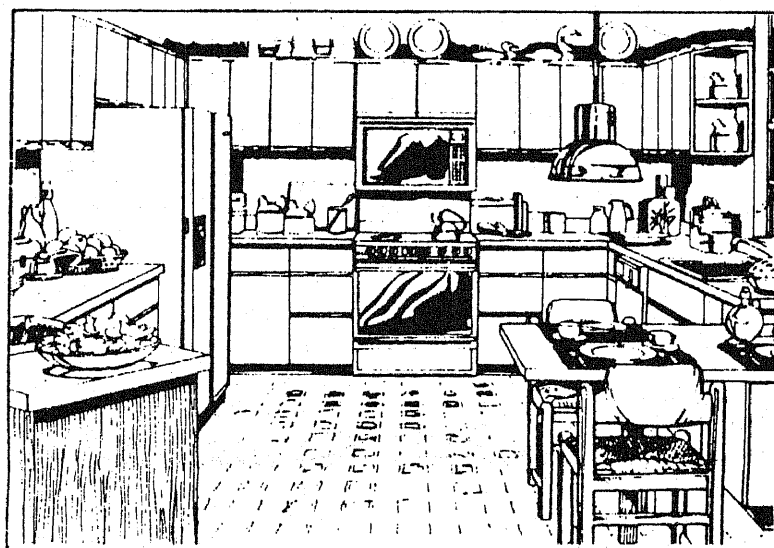
20 business meeting to pack and deliver the boxes.

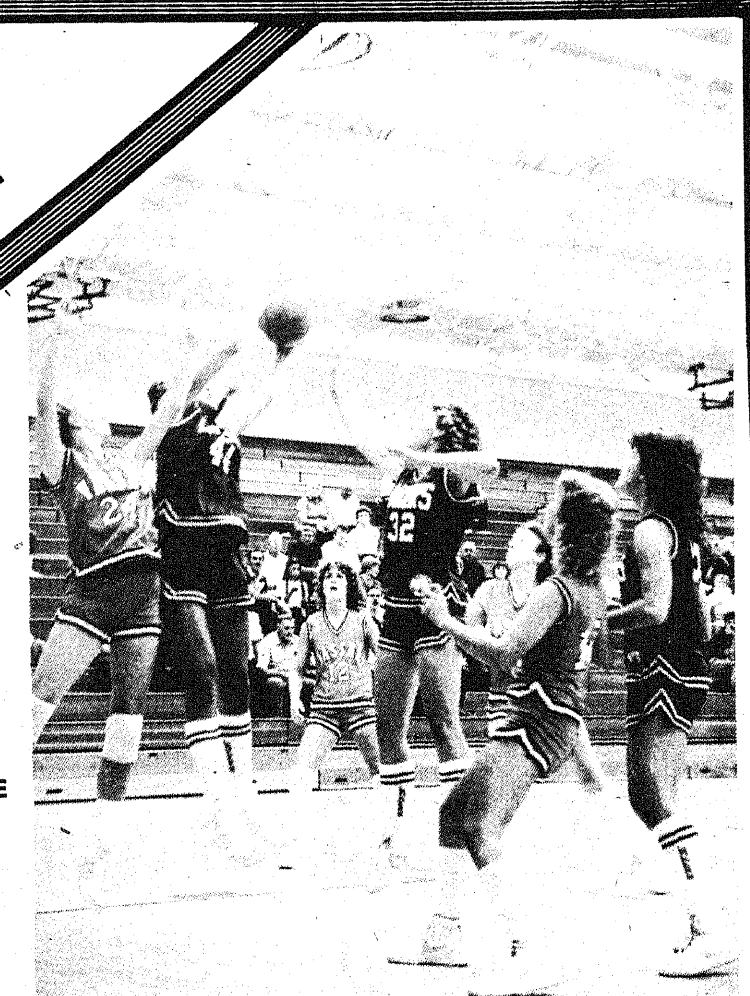

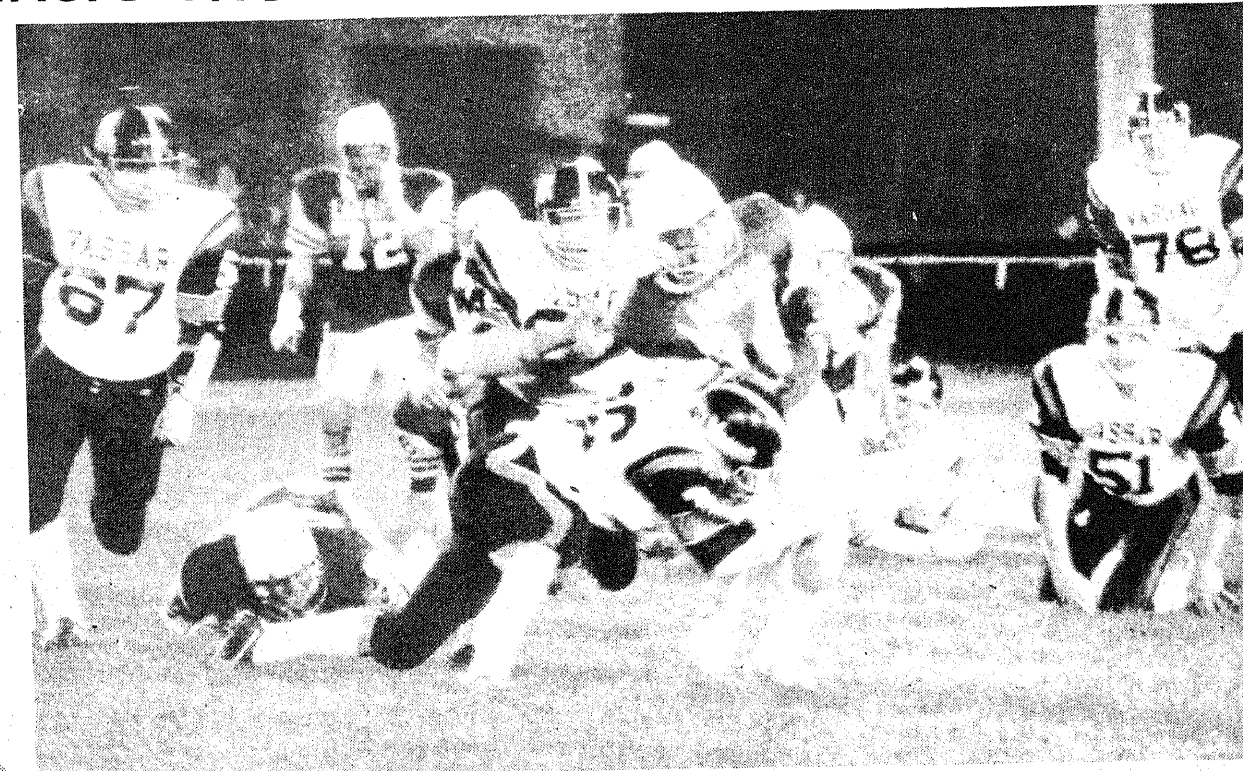

Lakers should do well in Homecoming match-up

The return of eight starters from last year's Thumb B co-champion Elkton-Pigeon-Bay Port High School football squad makes Lakers one of the teams favored to win the league crown this year.

An experienced backfield of running backs Rob MacDowall and Dave Wisenbaugh, along with quarterback Bill LePage are back to provide the heart of the Laker attack. Linemen Eric Bushey, Todd Schember, Kurt Schember and Scott Pobanz also benefit from playing time last year.

Coach Bill McLellan hopes to draw on his squad's experience as 13 of the 15 top players are seniors this year.

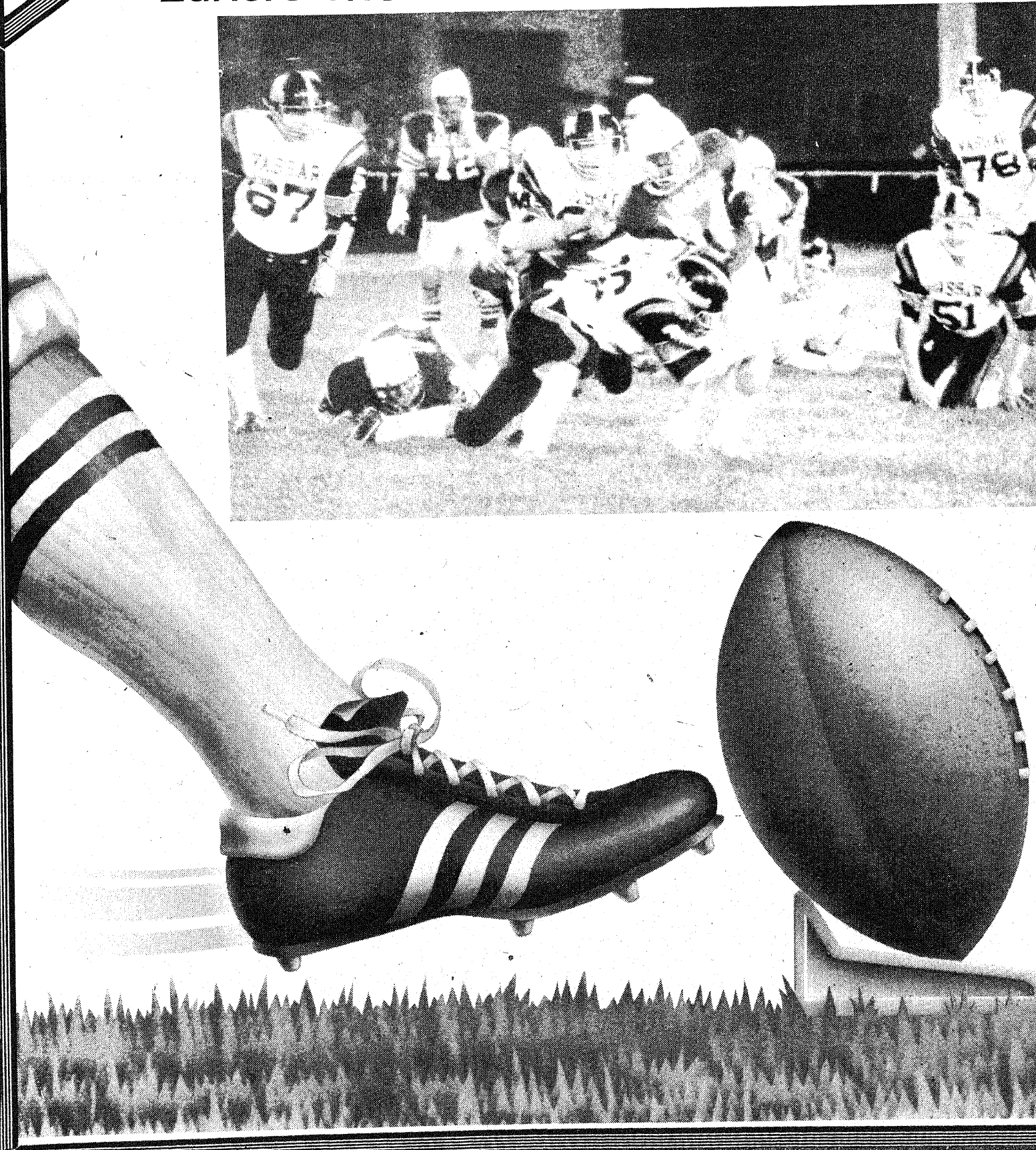
With Friday's victory over Vassar, Lakers took a big step toward defending the league championship they shared with the Vulcans last year. McLellan expects tough competition from Caro and North Branch this year and adds that Bad Axe and Cass City are greatly improved over last year.

"Our first goal is a Thumb B championship," says McLellan who led the Green Machine to post-season playoffs for the last three years.

This year, Lakers rely on a solid inside running game with MacDowall and Wisenbaugh with the loss of last year's explosive senior tailback John Rathje. Also lost to graduation were linemen Jeff Desotell and Mark Manenti, quarterback Dave Cunningham and end Dave Voelker.

The Green Machine is hoping to improve on last year's overall record of 8-2 by achieving an undefeated regular season and then tackling the post-season playoffs.

CAUTIONS ABOUT FUNERAL INSURANCE

The purchase of life insurance of a small face value to cover funeral and burial costs is a very common practice. Millions of these so-called "industrial insurance" policies are sold annually. The main advantage is that it can be paid for with small weekly or monthly installments; but there are also a number of disadvantages to be considered.

For one thing, when paid in this way, the yearly premium can be 20 to 25 percent greater than when paid once a year on a larger policy. Another problem is that this type of insurance is sometimes poorly regulated, and not all policies are equally sound. Many large insurance companies are now writing policies known specifically as "funeral insurance." This is a limited, ordinary life policy that is paid up in a relatively short time. When death takes place, the cash value is paid off to the beneficiary. You can also arrange to have the policy tied to a specific funeral home to cover the cost of prearranged plans.

Laker's Green Machine dominates Vulcans in 21-8 victory

The Elkon-Pigeon-Bay Port Green Machine avenged their only regular season loss last year by dominating Vassar in a 21-8 victory last Friday night.

All three Laker touchdowns came in the first half, as the Green and White gridders held the powerful Vulcan offense scoreless during the game.

A steady drizzle at the Laker High football field began in the second quarter and lasted throughout the game. The adverse weather conditions resulted in turnovers by both teams as they handled the slippery pigskin.

Fullback Rob MacDowall capped an 80-yard Laker drive with a one yard scoring plunge for the first touchdown of the game. Ed Gentile kicked the PAT to give Lakers a 7-0 lead with 21 seconds left in the first quarter.

The Green Machine took advantage of a Vassar mistake to score its second touchdown at 9:10 of the second quarter.

After Lakers halted a Vulcan drive, the Vassar punter tumbled his knee to the ground in an effort to pick up a low snap from center. This caused the ball to be turned over to the home team at the Vassar 35-yard line.

The Green and White offense then drove down the field and Dave Wisenbaugh

carried the ball over the goal line on a six yard run at 9:10 of the second quarter. Gentile's PAT kick was again perfect to boost the Laker lead to 14-0.

The remainder of the first half was played on the Vassar end of the field, as booming kickoffs by Wisenbaugh and an unyielding Laker defense kept the Vulcans pinned deep in their own territory.

The defensive squad of the Lakers scored the final touchdown for the home team. Dave King blocked a Vassar punt at the visitor's goal line and teammate Todd Schember scooped the loose ball in the end zone for the score. The final point scored by Lakers in the game was added by Gentile's toe to give Lakers an insurmountable 21-0 halftime lead.

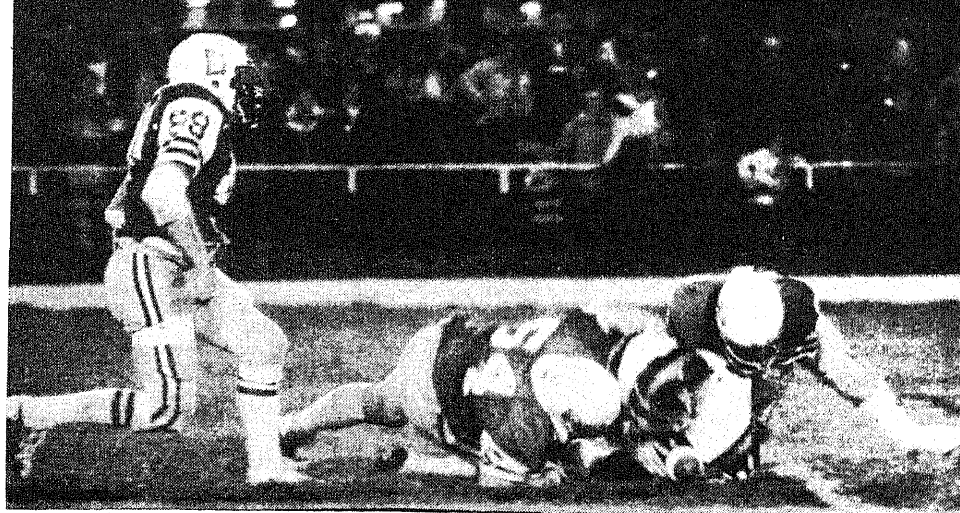
Vassar's only score was registered when a bad snap to Laker punter Scott Pobanz caused a fumble which was recovered in the end zone by Vulcan Joe Dupont.

The second half provided a comedy of errors as Lakers fumbled the ball four times and lost possession on three occasions. Vassar fumbled twice and threw two interceptions to turn the ball over to Lakers on three occasions.

which was recovered in the end zone by Vulcan Joe Dupont. Vassar quarterback ran in the two-point conversion following the touchdown to conclude all scoring in the game at 8:17 remaining in the game.

The Green Machine rushed for 160 yards and quarterback Bill LePage completed four of 10 passes for 54 yards through the air.

MacDowall was the leading Laker groundgainer with 100 yards on 23 carries. Wisenbaugh added 50 yards on 12 carries to the offense attack.

Vassar was held to just 90 yards rushing and 87 passing.

Laker coach Bill McLellan thought his team controlled the line of scrimmage against the huge Vassar front four. The Vulcans yielded ground grudgingly, but Lakers were able to run the ball successfully against the defending Thumb B co-champs.

McLellan expects his team to be tested this week by Caro in a rare Saturday afternoon game, with kickoff scheduled at 3 p.m. The Tigers have a quick quarterback who can run or pass from an option-type offense, the Laker coach says.

JVs OPENED: The Vassar Vulcans claimed a narrow 14-12 victory over the Laker Junior Varsity Squad last Thursday night at Vassar.

The junior Lakers battled back from a 14-2 Vulcan lead at halftime, but fell just short. Lakers only points in the first half were recorded when Vassar fumbled a punt out of the end zone.

In the fourth quarter, Ken Ziel rambled 35 yards for a touchdown. Craig Haag then passed to Jim Warren for the two-point PAT conversion, to narrow the score to 14-10.

Vassar took an intentional safety with time running out for Laker's final score of the evening.

Brad Krohn ran for 61 yards on 11 carries to lead the Laker offense. Outstanding defensive performances were turned in by Bryan Parrish with 19 tackles and Chris Heck with 18.

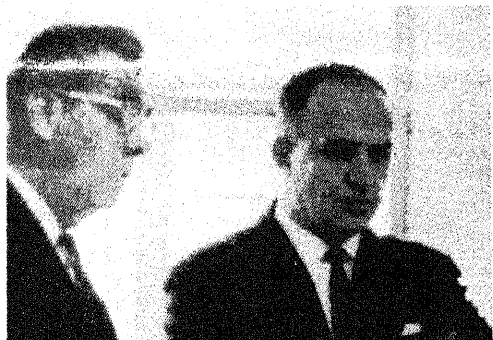

From The Beginning...

(Editor's Note: The following story has been compiled from several years of newspaper articles which have appeared in The Progress-Advance since 1960.

Many details of actual happenings and discussions are firmly buried in the memories of our parents and grandparents. Many still vividly recall the events that took place.

But -- as with any undertaking involving a great number of people and their tax dollars -- there was opposition, anger and often even bitterness before the separate communities of Bay Port, Pigeon and Elkton pooled their plans, money and dreams to form one of Michigan's premiere consolidated school systems, Elkton-Pigeon-Bay Port "Laker" Schools.

Considering economies of scale, the Pigeon School District's Board of Education began considering consolidation with nearby districts. An early plan included Caseville, Pigeon and Owendale but was not adopted. Then came talks with Sebawaing, which also proved fruitless.

Finally, Pigeon and Elkton districts realized they were very similarly matched -- and decided on a "wedding." Soon after, Bay Port joined the consolidation. And the new district became a reality.

In the end, there was a new school building and a new future for our children. What follows is an account of details that brought about today's Laker High School -- as it educates what will become its 25th graduating class in this 1984-85 school year.)

"The building of a central high school to serve the Elkton-Pigeon-Bay Port area will increase the educational opportunities for boys and girls of the district."

That statement, which appeared in the Feb. 26, 1959 issue of The Progress-Advance, was made by Robert J. Davis, superintendent of schools for the then-forming Laker School District.

"Many times in an average Class C school there are not enough students to make up classes in specialized areas, such as advanced math, foreign language, speech, art, drafting and shorthand." These were just a few of the goals that were to become the beginning of the Elkton-Pigeon-Bay Port School District and Laker High School. But where did it all really begin?

THE BEGINNING OF THE FUTURE

In February, 1959, the former President of Harvard University, Dr. James B. Conant, while speaking on America's Public High School System, was quoted as saying "the the number of small high schools in the nation must be drastically reduced through district organization."

This theory certainly agreed with that of the local Board of

Education. The late Dr. C.A. Scheurer, then Board president, believed that the merging of the separate Elkton, Pigeon and Bay Port School Districts into one single unit was based on the desire to develop a strong educational center.

That year Dr. Scheurer noted that citizen's committees, curriculum study groups and high school faculty members had been working with the Board of Education to develop a building plan which could then be recommended to the patrons of the enlarged school district.

Classroom facilities for the proposed high school building were planned to meet an enrollment of 650 students. The general layout was developed so that added classrooms could be joined to the basic academic area when needed. Other areas, such as shops, a gymnasium and a cafeteria were part of the plans.

But, was the public ready to pay the additional millage needed to build the central high school?

March 3, 1959 was the date set for the special 'Bond Issue' Election. The issue at hand was a \$1.25 million bonding to finance the proposed central school. By this time, the Board of Education had already acquired a site, midway between Elkton and Pigeon, for construction.

The \$1.25 million was considered to be enough money to construct a school, equip the building, construct a bus maintenance garage, and develop driveways, parking lots and sidewalks.

About this same time, citizens' groups from Elkton, Pigeon and Bay Port were meeting to plan strategies for the success of the Bond Election. As the election date grew near, the issue was the topic of many discussions... and many arguments.

People were continually reminded that the recent merger of the three area school districts had been to provide better education, with an ultimate goal of constructing a central high school facility.

During the February, 1959 Board of Education meeting, Trustee Wesley J. Murdoch spoke of the drastic overcrowding presently seen, and noted the need for more classroom space, due to the increasing grade school enrollment.

"Both the Pigeon and Elkton high schools are filled to capacity," Murdoch said. "Elkton has a fifth grade using the basement. Pigeon's grade classrooms will be filled to capacity next year and as seventh and eighth grades are restored, Bay Port's facilities will once again be fully utilized," Murdoch stated.

"Building a central high school by spreading the costs over

Not many administrative changes, either

A truly amazing aspect of the first 25 years of Elkton-Pigeon-Bay Port School is the small amount of "turnover" of administrators.

To date, only two persons have occupied the Superintendent's chair since 1961 — and just four people have served as Laker High Principals.

PRINCIPALS

Orville Snider became high school principal in February, 1960 and served as the district's first principal.

He performed his duties until January, 1971, when Edward H. Wolford took over. Snider has retired.

"Coach" Wolford worked in the top high school job until leaving Michigan for Texas, where he is a college coach.

He served until September, 1973, when Duane Guenther took over as Principal. The present Laker High Guidance Director worked until the start of the 1979-80 school year.

That's when incumbent Laker High Principal James Ballard assumed his duties, in September, 1979. He is in his sixth year at the top.

SUPERINTENDENTS

James Matteson began work as the first Laker Superintendent in July, 1960, as the district was being formed.

He served until July, 1973, when Harry J. Brunet took over the school leadership reigns. Matteson has since retired. Brunet is now in his 12th year as Superintendent.

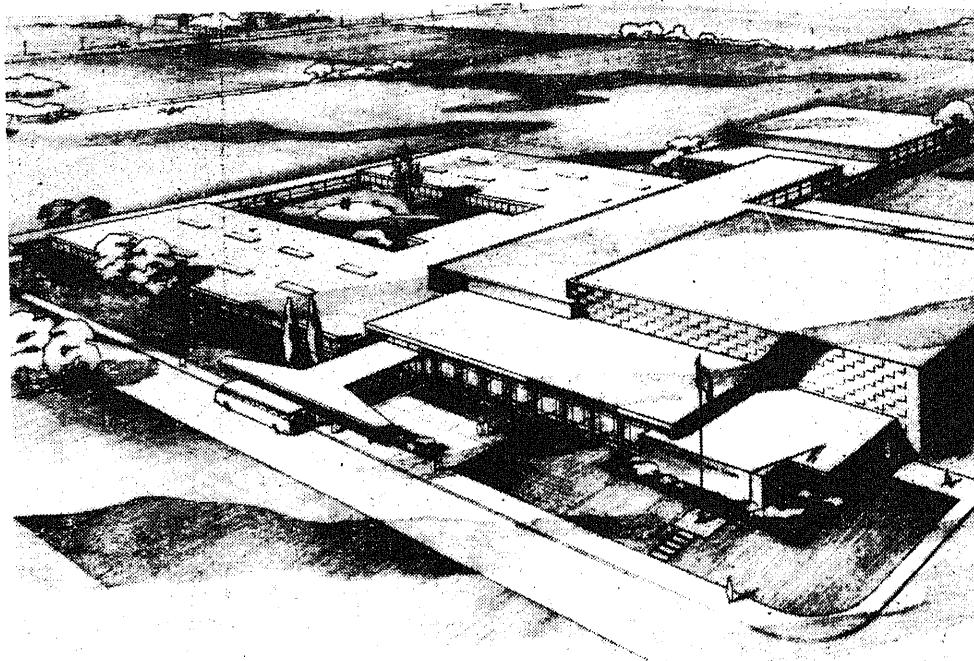

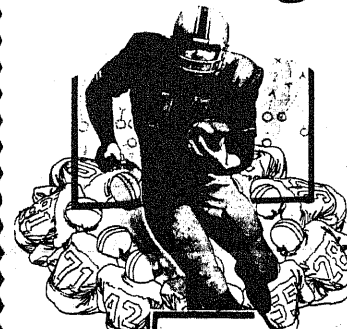

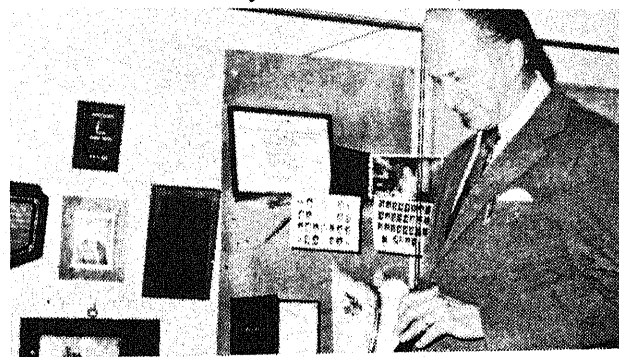
Just one. Vocational teacher **PAUL BOOTH** has the distinction of being the only staff member who has served in the district the entire 25 years since consolidation. He was hired in 1955 to teach industrial arts in the Pigeon School District. He taught industrial arts and mechanical drawing for 13 years at the new Laker High, and then started the present home construction program. To date, his classes have completed 12 homes in Caseville, Kinde, Pigeon, Elkton and other local communities. Paul and his wife Phyllis

Several faculty members have also passed away, as have students and other school supporters.

One of the more notable inspirations for hundreds of local students was the late **STANLEY BAUMAN**, whose 38 years in education spanned several generations. He was a first Laker Band Director and served as Elkton Elementary Principal from 1962 until his retirement in 1978. He died Feb. 24, 1983.

His love of music was spread throughout his entire family, as all of his and wife Jean's children became music majors in college. The family performed as musicians many times, including a memorable performance at his surprise retirement party.

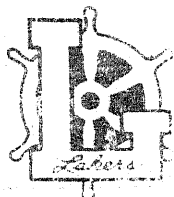
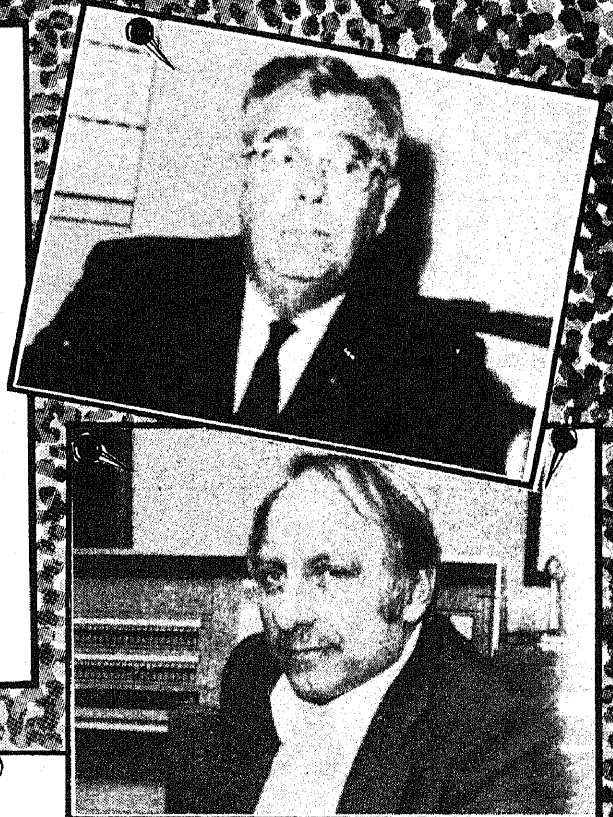

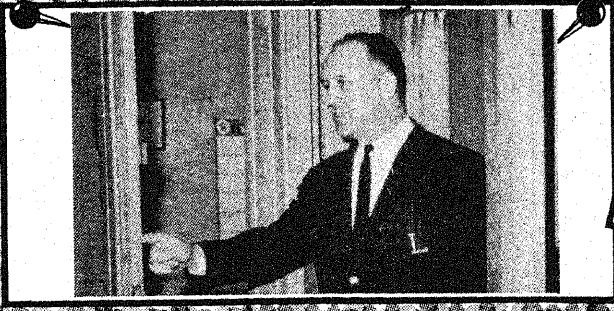
