New mission projects totalling \$75,000 were chosen by 428 voting members of the Lutheran Women's Missionary League, Michigan District, attending the 21st Biennial Convention at Boyne Mountain July 8-10. Projects chosen were: Aid to Pre-Seminarians \$10,000, Lutheran Association of Missionaries and Pilots \$10,000, Lutheran Braille Workers \$5,000, New Missions \$12,000, Scholarships \$8,000, Lutheran School for the Deaf/Training Lay Leaders \$12,500, Project Compassion \$7,735, Grants for Women to Michigan Lutheran Ministries Institute \$8,000, Helping Pastors Bring the Gospel to Deaf People \$1,765.

The convention theme, "Lift High the Cross," was reinforced by speakers Rev. Dr. Walter W. Stuenkel, associate pastor at St. Lorenz Lutheran Church, Frankenmuth; Rev. John L. Heins, president of the Michigan District-Missouri Synod and Rev. Dr. William G. Thompson of Utica.

Newly-elected district officers include Second Vice President Carol Ritz of Wayland, Recording Secretary Luella Britton, Treasurer Norah Ducat of Sand Lake and Pastoral Counselor Rev. Robert J. Conrad of Detroit.

Resolutions were passed encouraging members to become actively involved in recruitment for pastors and teachers and to establish designated time for all members to unite in prayer. Worship, bible studies, skits and a fellowship banquet were featured in front of the 900 delegates and guests. Twenty-one ladies from the Thumb area attended as representatives of their respective societies. The next Biennial Convention will be in 1988 at Grand Rapids.

# WOODS and WATERS

## Releasing fish

I watched a fishing show on TV the other day. It was produced by and starred one of those "cowboys-turned Bass pro", who always has a chew of tobacco in their cheek and catches fish on every cast.

This particular person was an excellent fisherman, and despite his constant stream of chatter, was rather entertaining. That was, until he caught a small fish.

Prior to this, he would horse the Bass into the boat, let it hang on the hook for a while as he explained his technique, and then holding it by the bottom lip, extract the hook and slip it into the live well. But, when it came the small fish's turn, he gripped the undersized Bass by the bottom lip, (all Bass pro handle fish this way) gouged out the hook and flipped the Bass about 4 feet in the air and let it hit the water with a resounding smack. Wiping his hands on a towel, he proceeded to explain what a great sportsman he was, and how that little ol' Bass would soon grow up to be a monster. At that point, I began to disagree.

While it was proper for the Bass pro to release the undersized fish, and I agree wholeheartedly that released fish usually come back the next year as bigger fish, the method he used in putting the poor little critter back in the water was atrocious, to say the least.

There is really more to releasing a fish than "throwing it back", as is too often the case. If you plan on releasing a hooked fish, land it as quickly as possible and try not to remove it from the water. Do not let the fish flop in a net or in shallow water. If you must handle the fish, do it as gently as possible.

When handling a fish, a great debate rages as to whether your hands should be wet or dry. It is common knowledge that all species of fish have a protective coating of mucus. The proponents of "wet hand" handling swear that the moisture on their hands will lessen the removal of the coating. The "dry handers" claim that they are able to grip the fish more securely, thus there is little tendency to grasp the fish when it tries to wriggle free. I feel the best solution is not to handle the fish at all, but employ the hemostat method instead. Hemostats are long-nosed clamps used in the operating rooms of hospitals. They are available at surplus, and sporting goods stores and have many uses for the fisherman. The first, and best, is their ability to remove a hook quickly and effortlessly, from the fish's mouth. They can also be used as a miniature, stream-

side flying vise, or they make dandy tweezers to work on thorns and slivers. If you're lucky enough to catch a really big Trout or Bass, (the 2 species that are the most-released fish) and would like to record your adventure on film, try taking the picture while the fish is still in the water. Position the fish by sliding one hand under the belly, and grasping the tail with your other hand. It is surprising how little a fish will fight when held in this position.

After taking the picture, do not let the fish swim away at the first attempt. Fish that have been involved in a violent battle will often still be in shock. Continue to hold the fish by the tail and under the belly, and face them into the current. Moving the fish back and forth will work water through their gills and help revive them quicker. Be careful not to do this if the water is muddy, or riled up from the activity. Heavily silted water will then clog their gills and the fish is as good as dead. Small, weighing scales are deadly on fish. Anytime you hang a fish by its own weight, you may as well put a noose around its neck. A better method is to estimate fish by their length and condition. Besides, it is easier to lie that way. And — isn't that what it's all about anyway....

## Don't post on poles, GT urges

Warm weather has arrived in Michigan and with it the garage sale season and political campaigns, bringing with it a flood of signs nailed to utility poles.

To insure the safety of General Telephone technicians during this time, GT of Michigan has asked customers to "post no bills." "Campaign posters and garage sale signs on telephone poles are quite dangerous," says Max Preston, state vice president-general manager. "Nails or tacks used to fasten the signs increase chances of serious injuries to telephone employees." General Telephone technicians use spiked "climbers" strapped to their legs to climb poles during installa-

tion or repair work, Preston explained. "If a spike hits a nail, the technician could lose his or her footing, causing serious injury. They can also tear clothing," Preston adds.

"We're asking the public to help keep our technicians safe and avoid placing signs on telephone poles," says Preston. "If they hung a poster, they should remove the sign as well as the fasteners."

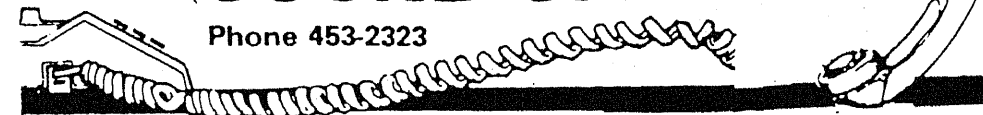

# Caseville senior citizens praise performance of 'polite' Explorers

## Police Explorers keep eye on troublemakers

In addition to crowd control and a ride-along program with Huron County Sheriff Deputies, teens involved in the local Police Explorer Post are getting a chance to be the eyes and ears of senior citizens in the Caseville area.

In the past months, some residents of the Oakwood Senior Citizens Housing Project in Caseville had concerns about mischief caused by some children on bicycles.

Reports of reckless riding on sidewalks at the housing complex, children peering in windows, riding bikes through flowerbed and throwing dirt at the buildings were noted to both Caseville Police and Huron County Sheriff Deputies -- but little could be done to provide surveillance over a long period of time.

Sheriff Richard V. Stokan decided to give the high school students in Police Explorers a chance to watch for children causing trouble at the housing complex because the Explorers have performed well in other useful tasks such as crowd control during parades.

Volunteers from the Explorer Post spend about four hours per night, mainly on weekends, watching for children causing trouble with residents.

And, Sheriff Stokan says, the action seems to be effective -- as the parents of some of the children have been contacted by the Sheriff's Department, and the troublemakers seem to be staying away for Oakwood.

"It's worked really well, it's youth dealing with youth. The older people also see a more positive side of youth," says Sheriff Stokan. He notes parents have been very cooperative when they have been contacted about their children's presence at the housing complex.

**HAPPY RESIDENTS:** "I think this is a wonderful thing they are doing," Oakwood manager Eileen Rutter says about Police Explorer volunteers. She adds residents have told her they feel safer now and also commented about how polite the volunteers are.

"Hopefully this has solved the problem," says Rutter. Oakwood resident Florence Rake says young troublemakers hadn't bothered her personally, but is glad they are being watched carefully.

"They really should be kept out, this is no place for them," she notes about the children causing the problem.

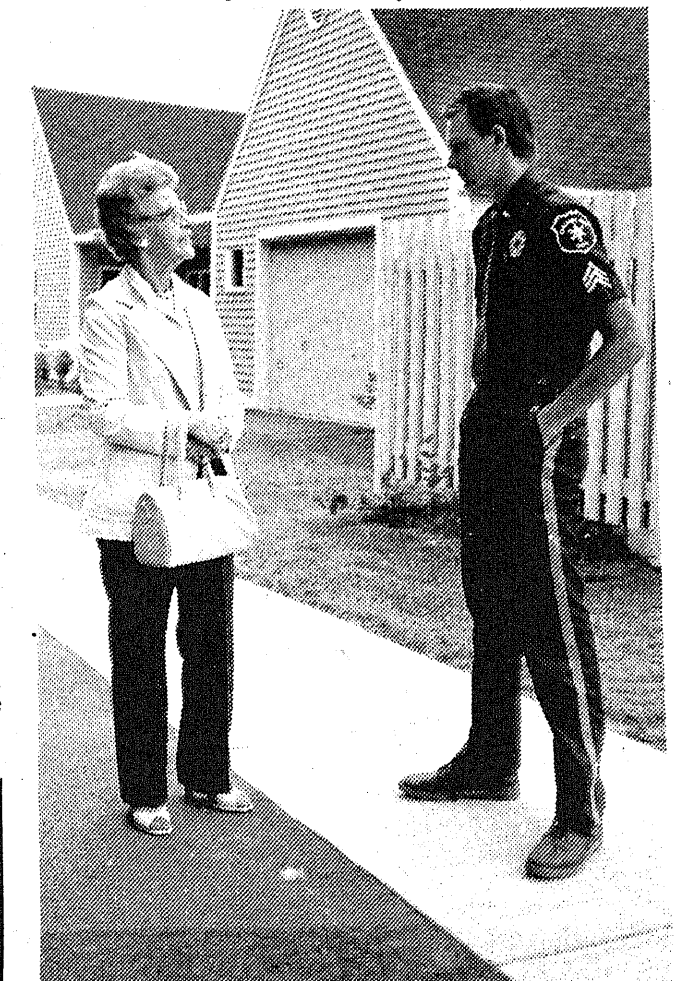
Margaret Rogers, another Oakwood resident, agrees that the bike riders haven't been around to cause trouble since the Explorers began patrolling the grounds.

"They're nice kids," she praises the volunteers and adds, "They just walk, walk, walk."

Although the Explorers have no authority to make arrests, they can observe and note the actions of troublemakers at the housing complex and identify those children to sheriff deputies for followup, the Sheriff says.

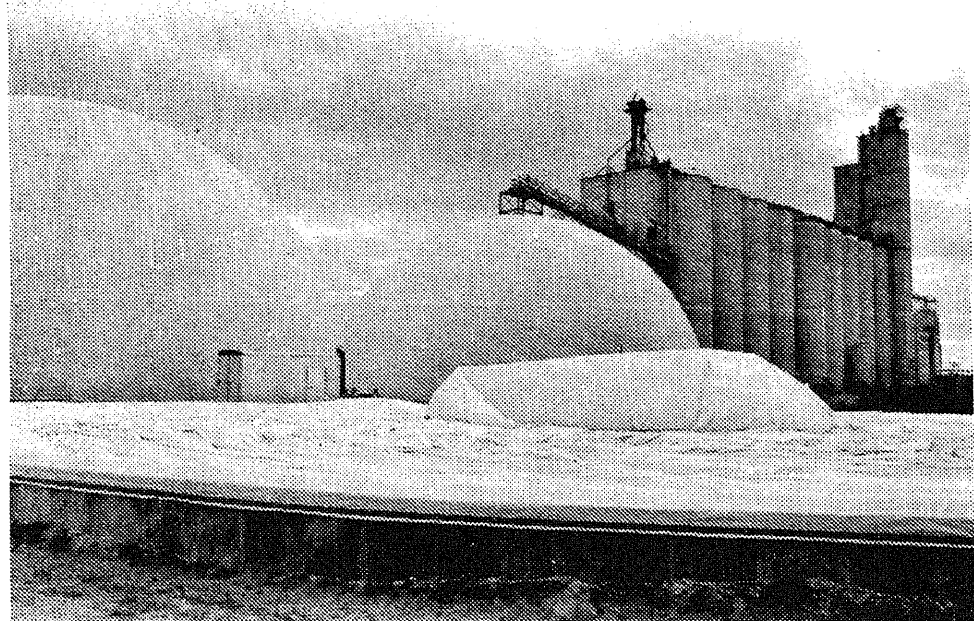

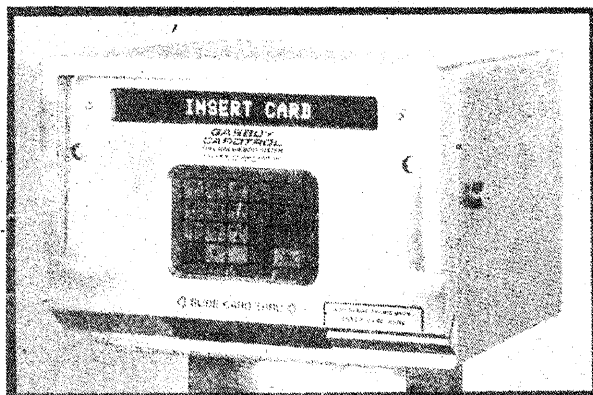
