In a saucepan, cook celery and onion in half the butter, until tender. Stir in soup, cheese, milk and mayonnaise; mix well. Fold in noodles, tuna, mushrooms, and olives. Turn into a 13x9x2 inch baking dish. Bake, uncovered, at 375° for 20 minutes. Melt remaining butter. Mix with bread crumbs. Sprinkle around edges of baking dish. Arrange almonds in center. Bake until heated through, 10-15 minutes longer. Serves 10-12.

TANGY TUNA-MACARONI SALAD

1/4 cup red wine vinegar 1 teaspoon dry mustard 1 teaspoon paprika




