HURON SESQUICENTENNIAL CELEBRATION TO BEGIN!

Michigan's 150th birthday party to itself officially starts this Monday, Jan. 26 - but at least two other events Saturday and Sunday will help observe the 1837-1987 Sesquicentennial events.

SATURDAY, JAN. 24, 7:30 P.M.: A free variety show titled "Music, Magic and Memories" will be presented at the Laker High School Auditorium, Pigeon. It is being planned as part of the statewide "Magic of Michigan" theme, says Huron County Sesquicentennial Committee Chairman Ralph Iden.

Featured at the show will be the Lake Huron Chapter of the Sweet Adelines, Elkton magician and illusionist R.B. Woodward, the Pigeon Men's Community Chorus, the Port Austin Air Force Base Color Guard, plus a skit tracing how Bad Axe became the county seat.

The skit features Earl Bettinger of Bad Axe as narrator, plus performers State Rep. Dick Allen (R-Caro), Bad Axe School Supt. William Pietscher, North Huron High School Principal William Hogan, Laker Teacher Mike Terrell, Ublly Teacher Ron Iwankovitch and Bad Axe newspaper Editor John Telfer. Telfer and Lilian Bettinger of Bad Axe authored the skit.

"We decided to put the show on free of charge primarily because we felt, with some of the hard times of farmers, an admission charge might deny access to the performance for some people and families," Iden said. A free-will offering will be accepted, and 150th souvenirs will be available.

As part of the celebration, the running club known as the Thumb Runabouts will come from Elkton to the auditorium, making a donation during a break in the show.

SUNDAY, JAN. 25, 6:30 P.M.: The one-mile cross-country ski trail at Port Crescent State Park will be illuminated with 150 candles for nighttime skiing - reminiscent of the candles Michigan citizens kept burning in their homes when statehood was announced 150 years ago.

MONDAY, JAN. 26, 12 NOON: The official Sesquicentennial kick-off is a short program at each of Michigan's 83 county courthouses. In Bad Axe, the front steps of the County Building is the location for the Pledge to the U.S. and State Flags, followed by the reading of the Statehood Admission Bill from 1837. A proclamation from Gov. James Blanchard will be presented.

Local churches, schools and other organizations throughout the county are asked to ring bells for two minutes at 12 noon, commemorating the state's birthday. "It's part of an interesting and fun day," promises Iden. "But remember, this is only the beginning."

Earlier this year are performances by an Honors Choir of local students this March, a county parade in June, a possible agricultural museum or theme park, a family reunion and others. More information is available by calling Iden at 269-6431 in Bad Axe.

CHANNEL 35 ON THE AIR

Residents in more than 50,000 Thumb Area homes can now receive Delta College's television programming on the new WUCX-TV 35, re-broadcasting the signal of WUCM-TV 19 from the new Channel 35 tower south of Ublly.

"We're on the air and it's official," said Ruby Iwamasa, acting broadcasting director. "Our new station is providing a stronger signal for the Thumb for some homes, and is a brand new option for others who could not receive us before."

The college is affiliated with the Public Broadcasting Service, featuring all types of non-commercial programs. Delta College also provides a two-year Associate Degree curriculum in broadcasting. Telecourses which grant college credit to at-home viewers are featured. Up to 400 students are enrolled in such courses each semester.

Official dedication of the WUCX-TV 35 facility is scheduled in the Thumb Area the last week in February, station spokesmen say.

AIRPORT PLANNING CONTINUES

If the Caseville Village Council has anything to say about the subject, planning for the proposed Caseville Airport will proceed.

Council voted 3-2 last week to assume sponsorship of the former Caseville Township Airport, which is in line for \$1.1 million in state and federal aeronautical funds. The Village will contact the Michigan Aeronautical Commission, saying it intends to assume airport sponsorship, which would retain the general aviation facility's funding position.

The airport would be built in a portion of the two-square-mile area bounded by M-25 on the west, Crescent Beach Road on the north, Caseville Road on the east and Dunn Road on the south. Planning for the airport began in 1980 by a Caseville Township Board which unanimously favored the project, but succeeding Board members opposed the plan, as did airport neighbors.

Following a 1985 recall election and cross-suits in Huron County Circuit Court last year, airport backers and opponents agreed to allow the planning structure to be moved from Township jurisdiction to that of another governmental body.

No date for reply from the state to the transfer request is known by Village officials.

'86-'87 sugar factory campaign nears its end

The 1986-87 beet processing campaign at Michigan Sugar Company plants is grinding to a close, and could be concluded by Sunday, Feb. 1, if present conditions continue.

Company officials late last week, as they admitted that there could be a day or so variance either sooner or later. All four plants - Sebewaing, Caro, Crosswell and Carrollton - will attempt to close at the same time, they say.

Trucking from storage at Verona into the Sebewaing plant has been completed, and any remaining beets in Verona or Ruth will be taken to Crosswell for processing. Stored beets at Sandusky are being taken to Crosswell, officials say.

Weather conditions for beet storage "were as good as September and October conditions were bad." Sugar content and purity are holding up "quite well," Sunderland explained, saying conditions "are as good as the product (beets) we put through."

Sunderland commended factory fieldmen and agriculture men for their "heroic efforts" in helping get the beets into storage.

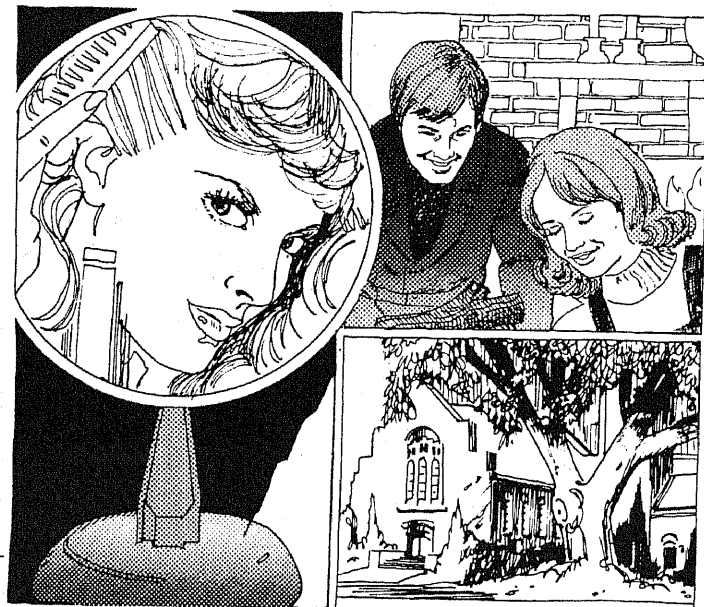

Sixty Seconds Are you listening, God?

READ MATTHEW 7:7-12
Give ear to my prayer O God, and hide not Thyself from my supplication! Psalm 55:1

VILLAGE OF ELKTON — County Of Huron —

THE VILLAGE OF ELKTON ORDAINS:

SECTION 1 — Permission is hereby granted to the DETROIT EDISON COMPANY, a Michigan corporation, its successors and assigns, to construct, maintain and operate in the public streets, highways, alleys and other public places in the Village of Elkton, Huron County, Michigan, all needed and proper poles, towers, wires, pipes, mains, conduits and all such lines and other apparatus requisite for the transmission, transforming and distribution of electricity for public and private use, and to transmit a local electric business within said Village, subject however, to all conditions and restrictions hereinafter contained.

SECTION 2 — The conditions of the foregoing grant are as follows:

A. The grantee shall do no injury to any street, highway, alley or other public place, or to any shade trees, or in any manner disturb or interfere with any water or gas pipes, or with any public or private sewer, now or hereafter laid or constructed by any authorized person or corporation.

B. The trimming of trees when necessary to make the lines safe and accessible, shall be done in compliance with all existing governmental laws, ordinances, rules and regulations.

C. The construction of the said lines shall be in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Michigan Public Service Commission or its successor.

D. The said grantee, before entering upon any street, highway, alley or other public place for the purpose of erecting and constructing any poles, wires, pipes, mains, conduits, or other apparatus, shall notify the Village or its representatives of the proposed construction, and shall, if the Village so requires, file with them a sufficient plan and specification, showing the nature and extent of the proposed erection and construction.

E. No street, highway, alley or public place shall be allowed to remain open or encumbered by the construction work of the said grantee for a longer period than shall be necessary to execute the said work, and the grantee shall at all times conform to all ordinances of the Village, now or hereafter in force, relative to the fencing and lighting of obstructions and excavations.

F. The grantee shall save the Village harmless from any judgement that may be recovered against the Village by reason of the wrongdoing or negligence of the said grantee in the erection and maintenance of said poles, mains, wires and other apparatus or construction.

G. Said grantee shall make due provisions upon five (5) days notice in writing by raising its wires or otherwise, for the passage of any barn, building, or other structure on or over any street, highway, or public place occupied by the poles, mains, wires, and other apparatus of said grantee.

SECTION 3 — In consideration of the granting of this franchise, grantee agrees that its rates and charges for electric service in the Village of Elkton shall not exceed its rates and charges for like service elsewhere in its service area, as evidenced by its uniform rates schedules at the time on file with and approved by the Michigan Public Service Commission. It is understood that the grantee is subject to regulation by the Michigan Public Service Commission and that any order, rule, or regulation by that Commission, or its successor, will prevail over any regulation herein contained or provided for in case of conflict.

SECTION 4 — This grant shall take effect if said grantee shall, within fifteen (15) days from the date of the passage of this Ordinance, file with the Village Clerk, its written acceptance of the terms of the same, and upon the confirmation of this grant, by the affirmative vote of a 3/5's majority of the electors of said Village voting on the franchise at a regular election to be held on Monday, the 9th day of March, 1987, as provided for by the Statutes and the State Constitution. If not confirmed by the electors voting on the franchise at said election, this Ordinance shall be null and void.

SECTION 5 — This Franchise and Ordinance shall be and remain in force for thirty years from and after the date of its confirmation by the electors of the Village of Elkton, Huron County, Michigan.

SECTION 6 — Nothing in this grant shall be construed to alienate the title of the public in and to any street, highway, alley or public place or any portion thereof, neither shall anything herein be construed in any manner as a surrender by the Village of Elkton of its legislative power with respect to the subject matter hereof, or with respect to any other matter whatsoever; nor as in any manner limiting the right of the said Village of Elkton to lawfully regulate the use of any street, avenue, highway or public place within its jurisdiction.

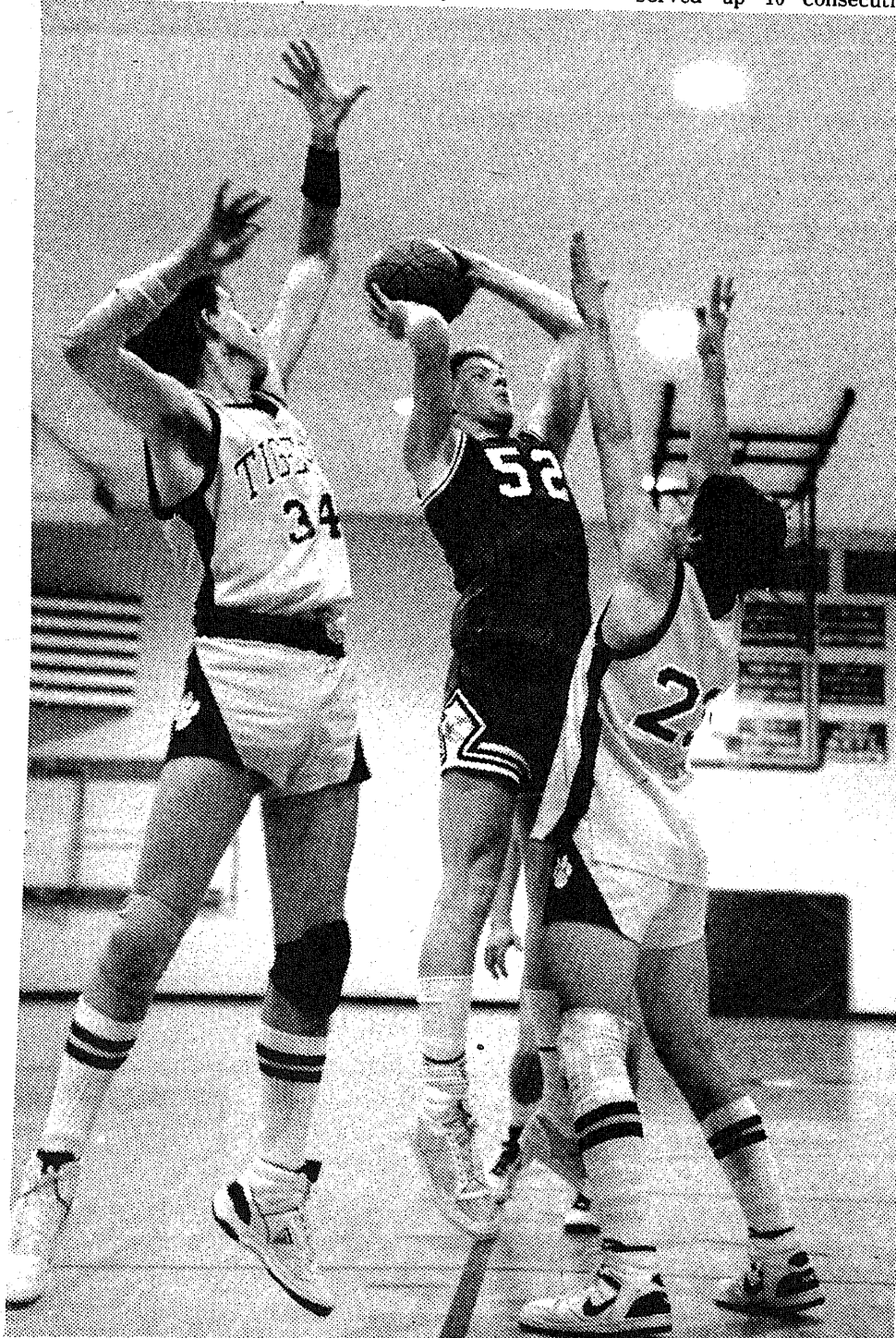

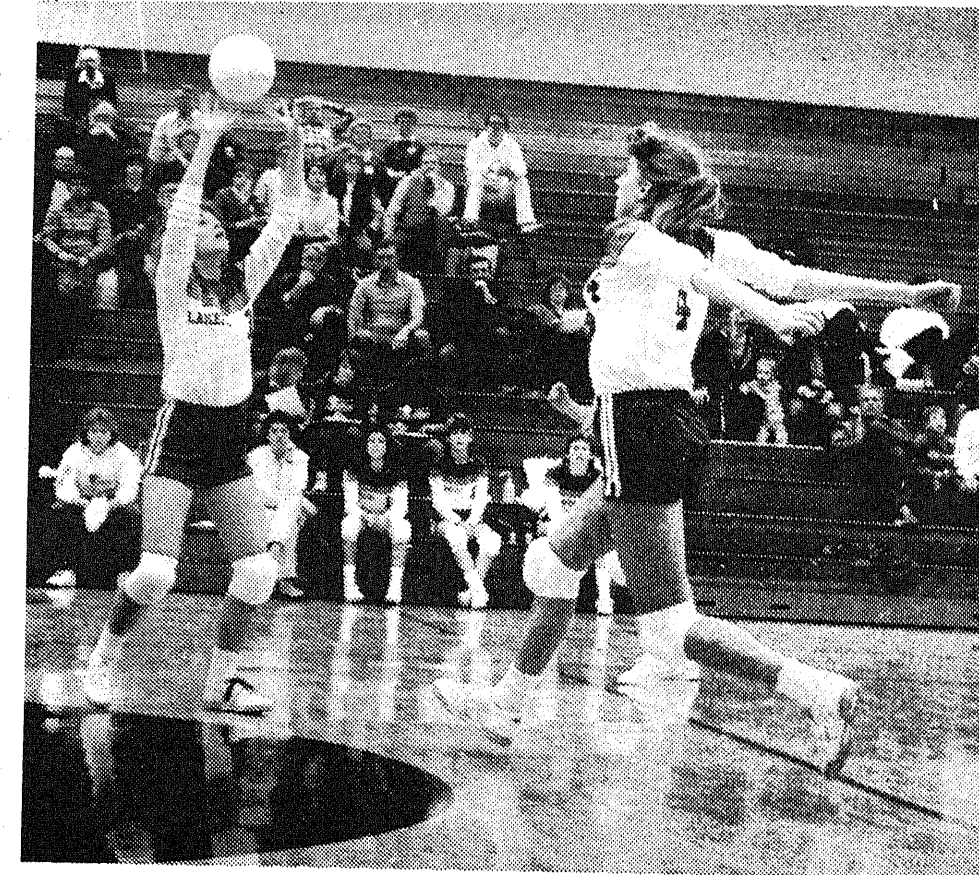
Last week, Elkton - Pigeon - Bay Port volleyball opponents reacted in contrasting fashion, but the result was the same — victory for Laker High.

Top individual Laker records are boasted by McArdle (12-0), Jim Macdowall (12-2) and Kevin Truemner (13-3).

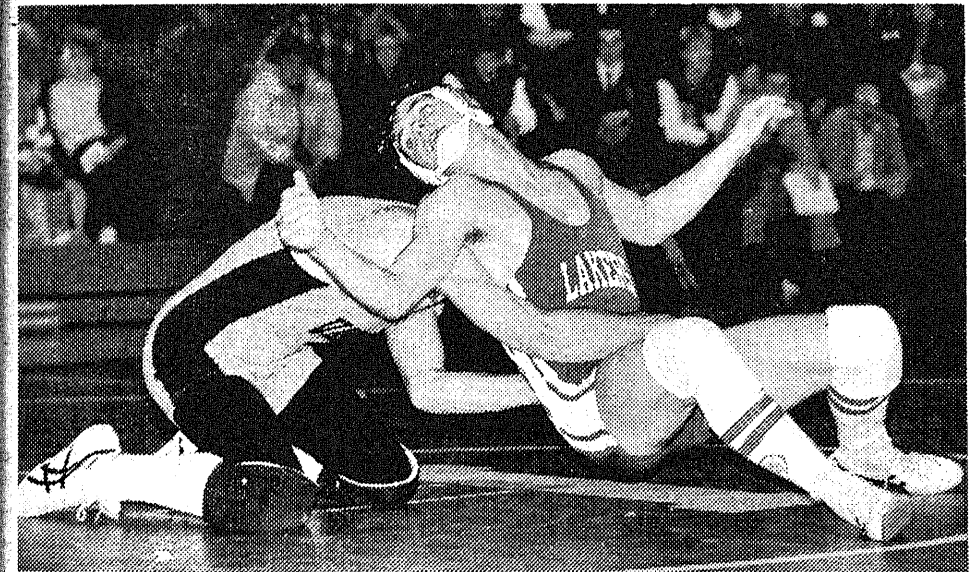

Laker Coach Bill McLellan noted Wertz scored most of his points from close to the basket, with many resulting from Lakers beating the Spartan press down the floor.

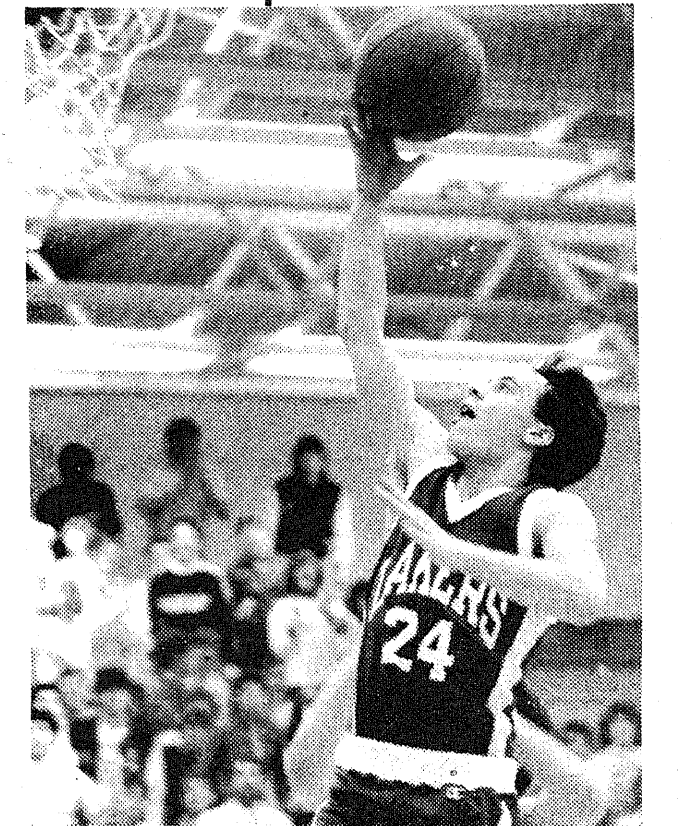
Juniors Kel Hill and Dean Roestel also received more playing time as a result of Beer's injury.

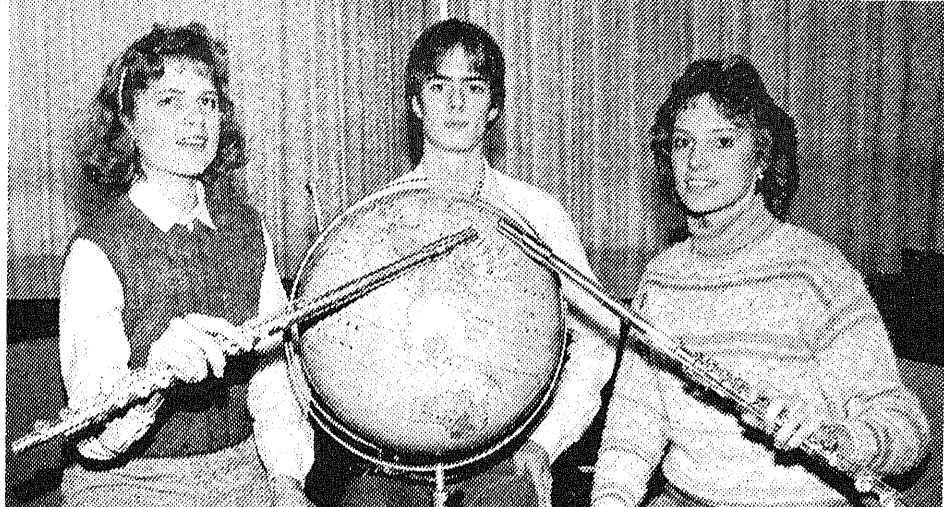
After several weekends of rehearsals in St. Johns, Michigan, the three musicians will travel on June 21, 1987 to Hong Kong and Canton, China.
