The groom's mother wore a tea-length pale pink satin and chantilly lace gown with ruby sequins on the bodice and chiffon pleated motif at the hemline.

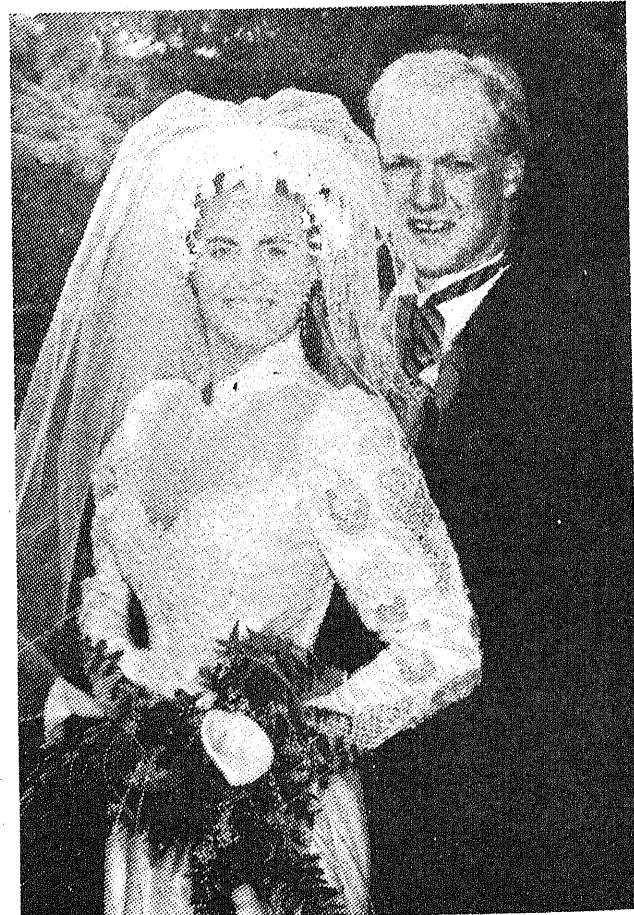
Both mothers completed their look with one magnificent gardenia blossom pinned to their handbags.

He joined the Navy in September, 1986.

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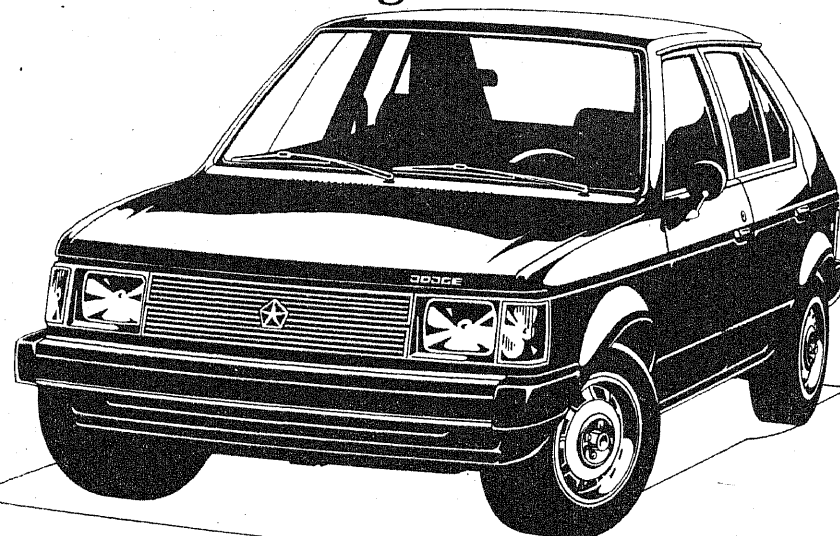

I came to this country eight years ago from Russia to join my American Husband. I met him in Leningrad, during the grain trade. He proposed, and after a lot of red tape we were married.

Everything was fine until the day my husband hurt his back going to the aid of another seaman in distress. My husband had to have lower back surgery, which finished his sea-going career. That was it — we lost our house, credit, personal belongings — even our wedding bands.

There were times after that in which we did not eat. We lived in slums where it was not unusual to have holes in the walls, ceilings and floors and the water smelled like toilet water. Only God knows how we managed to survive.

We could never tell my parents, back in Russia, about our dire circumstances. At the same time, there was something in their letters that really bothered us — something they weren't telling us.

How right we were! I've since learned my mother has severe pancreatitis and breast cancer and had to undergo a radical mastectomy.

My parents are getting old and their greatest wish is to see us one more time. Fortunately, I'm now working at a local depart-

ment store and I'm able to make ends meet — but that's it. It would be too much to ask for airfare for both my husband and me, so I only as for myself. Help me if you can, Mr. Ross, to get back to Leningrad. If you do — I will never be able to thank you enough. — Mrs. L.E., Fort Worth, Tex.

Elktonite was 1978 Michigan Mother of the Year!

10 years later, Bauman is still 'outstanding'

It's been 10 years since Jean Bauman of Elkton was named Michigan's Mother of the Year — 10 busy years filled with joy, tears, travel, love, children and grandchildren.

Those who nominated Mrs. Bauman for the honor back in 1978 had the highest praise for her as both a mother and a Christian woman, and none of the qualities that won her the honor of mother of the year are missing now.

BIGGEST CHALLENGE: So much has happened in the last 10 years, but Mrs. Bauman says the biggest change in her life came when her beloved husband, Stanley, died in 1983.

"I really feel as if my better half is gone, like I'm only half a person," she says.

Stanley Bauman was a popular educator in the Elkton school system, and he and Jean traveled extensively throughout the United States and to the Holy Land after his retirement in 1978.

"I'm so grateful Stan and I had that time together, time to see things we'd always wanted to see," Mrs. Bauman says.

LOOK PAST SORROW: But she has not let sorrow over the loss of her husband get her down.

"The one thing that got me through Stan's death was faith in a Lord who doesn't forsake his own," Mrs. Bauman says.

Mrs. Bauman stays busy visiting her seven children and 17 grandchildren, substituting for daughter Deanna Tibbits in the singing group "Living Truth," and speaking at various women's retreats and seminars.

"Bauman's Brookside Abode," as Stan used to call our house, gets pretty neglected sometimes," Mrs. Bauman says. "It seems I'm gone more than I'm here. I miss my home, but I enjoy being with my kids and other people."

A major part of Mrs. Bauman's life today is what she calls her "ministry of encouragement."

GIVES HELP: "I see people with so many problems and I want to help in some way, to encourage them, to let them know they're not alone in the pain," Mrs. Bauman says.

The Bible also gives her another important ministry, that of teaching young women to love and cherish their husbands.

"I sincerely feel home-making and mothering and 'wifeing' is the biggest challenge for any woman," Mrs. Bauman asserts. "It's my heart's desire that young people build homes as husbands and wives together."

Her advice to young couples is "never, ever, go to sleep with anger between you. I'm just so glad I had no regrets when Stan died, that I should have said or done something for him that I didn't."

Families are threatened by so many forces today, Mrs. Bauman says, and the challenges of motherhood are much different than when she was raising her

children. "I'm glad my children are reared now. We were strict but loving with our children and I think they've turned out well. But now there's so much out there — drugs, brazen immorality, and deviant lifestyles."

"I was brought up in a Christian home. I maintained a Christian home, and now my kids have Christian homes."

FAMILY MATTERS: Mrs. Bauman points to pictures of her children and grandchildren, and shows all the cards and flowers she received for Mother's Day.

"I'm so happy that even though my kids are far away in distance, we all stay very close." Her children are:

- Kenniston, a teacher at Spring Arbor College;
- Sharolee Roberts, who with her husband is a village missionary in Wisconsin;
- Andrejean Heydenberg, who also teaches at Spring Arbor;
- Ronaldon, a businessman in Dallas, Texas;
- Ted, who is a school administrator in Colorado;
- Deanna Tibbits, a vocal teacher in Caro, and
- Tamara Barbret, who travels and sings full-time with "Living Truth."

"I have a new grandchild, and that new baby has been keeping me busy," Mrs. Bauman says.

BLESSINGS: In her house, full of the memories of a

close, loving family, Mrs. Bauman points out a plaque has to give, and, of course, with love no matter what, no matter where."

"Lord, bless our family with openness to real communication, with sharing in all our joys and sorrows, with freedom to let each other grow, with

understanding for the gifts each has to give, and, of course, with love no matter what, no matter where."

Mrs. Bauman says she has tried to raise her family with that prayer in mind and encourages other mothers to do the same.

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LET US HONOR THOSE WHO GAVE THEIR LIVES FOR OTHERS

It is time to honor our heroes who have given their lives for us on the field of battle, so that we may continue to enjoy the blessings of liberty in our land. Voelker family farm honored in centennial year

Four generations of Voelkers have lived on the farm south of Pigeon that Jacob Voelker bought on Oct. 20, 1887.

Jacob originally immigrated from Germany to Canada, where he met the woman who would become his wife, Elizabeth. He built the house which still stands on the homestead in 1907, with brick purchased in Sebevaing, family members say.

The house has been remodeled twice, once in 1936 and again in 1961, but the original brick is still visible on the exterior of the house.

SECOND GENERATION: When Jacob decided to quit farming, son Oscar bought the farm from his father.

Oscar and his wife, the former Martha Gettel, had six children, one of them the present owner, Otto.

Otto Voelker says he can remember when the farm supported a variety of animals such as chickens, dairy cattle, hogs, steers and the horses which were used for farming.

"There's been cattle on this farm every day since 1890," says Voelker, explaining that cattle are still raised on the farm in a feedlot operation. Most of the corn grown on the 420 acres Voelker and his son Ross farm today is fed to the feeder cattle.

THIRD FAMILY: Otto and Anita Voelker, who are celebrating their 40th anniversary in June, he and his new bride will be making their home in the house that has seen four generations of Voelkers.

Otto and Anita will be moving to a cottage they own on the lake, and Otto admits, "It's time for me to get out of farming."

Ross says, "This farm and land's been good to us. There have been three generations on this farm and I'll be the fourth one raising a family."

"I feel like since we take from the land, we should put something back. So we've always tried to buy our fertilizer and equipment locally, for instance I believe we owe that to the community."

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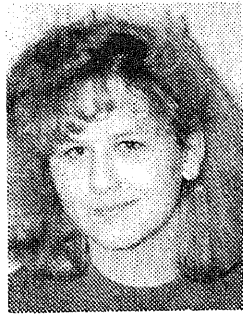

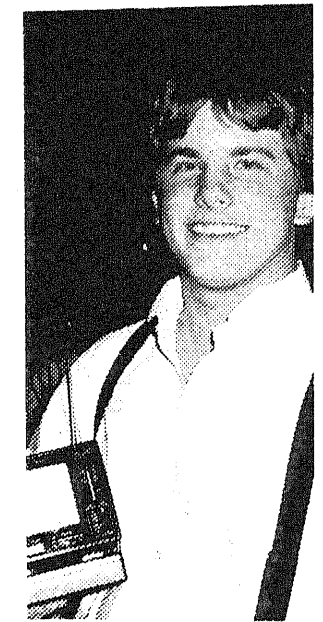

THE FOLLOWING IS A MANDATORY NOTIFICATION BY THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH.
Sampling by the Michigan Department of Public Health has confirmed the presence of lead in drinking water from certain piping systems where the water has remained stagnant for a period of time. Levels in excess of the current drinking water standard (50 parts per billion) have been detected. Laboratory testing has shown that the principal sources of lead are lead piping and lead based solder and fluxes used to join copper piping. Based on these results and those from other studies, the Michigan Department of Labor, Bureau of Construction Codes and the Michigan Department of Public Health have supported legislation which prohibits the use of lead based solders and fluxes in potable water piping systems. The plumbing industry and homeowners who may construct potable drinking water piping systems must no longer use lead based solders and fluxes for joining copper piping. Other solder materials or joining methods are available and must be used. Lead piping has not been allowed for new installations for about the last ten years. Building copper piping water systems constructed to date likely contain lead based solder and flux.

Water is the universal solvent and even relatively stable water when stagnant for a period of even a few hours in contact with lead solder and flux can result in a significant concentration of lead in the water. The health department is recommending that those piping systems in which the water has remained stagnant overnight or for longer periods be flushed for several minutes prior to using the water for drinking or cooking purposes. This typically has been found to satisfactorily reduce the level of lead and other metals that may concentrate in the water within the building's piping system.

"The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) sets drinking water standards and has determined that lead is a health concern at certain levels of exposure. There is currently a standard of 0.50 parts per million (ppm). Based on new health information, EPA is likely to lower this standard significantly.

"Part of the purpose of this notice is to inform you of the potential adverse health effects of lead. This is being done even though your water may not be in violation of the current standard.

"EPA and others are concerned about lead in drinking water. Too much lead in the human body can cause serious damage to the brain, kidneys, nervous system, and red blood cells. The greatest risk, even with short-term exposure, is to young children and pregnant women.

"Lead levels in your drinking water are likely to be highest."

...if your home or water system has lead pipes, or
...if your home has copper pipes with lead solder and,
...if the home is less than five years old or,
...if you have soft or acidic water, or,
...if water sits in the pipes for several hours."

Besides lead in water from certain piping systems, there are other exposures pathways to lead including:
air from industrial discharges automobile exhaust; food from airborne deposition of lead on crops and lead solder seams in some food containers; nonfood items-lead based paint, dirt, solder or any object containing lead.

It should be noted that the minor source of lead exposure and lead poisoning in the United States is due to children consuming lead based paint chips.

People who may have concerns about the concentration of lead from their building or household piping are advised to contact a reputable private laboratory for a water analysis. Others who may have specific concerns relative to any possible health effects are urged to contact their physician.

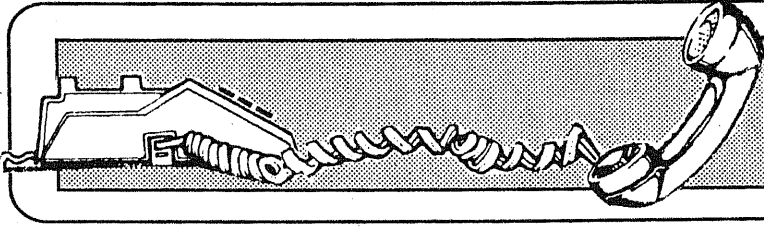

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Anita Gettel Will Miss Her Daily Route After 21 Years

Laker bus driver Anita Gettel will park her bus and turn in her keys for the final time on June 14.

Gettel has been transporting thousands of students to and from school for 21 years, starting in September 1967.

"I was a housewife back then, and after having raised three kids, I decided it was time to get back into public again," she recalls.

"The hours were perfect because I'd be working when the kids were in school, and I would get home shortly after the kids got there," says Gettel.

WHY NOT? Bill Gordon, who was transportation administrator then, asked Gettel if she would be interested in driving a bus.

"My husband, Omer, had been driving a milk truck, and I had had experience in driving loaded milk trucks. I thought that if I could drive a truck, I shouldn't have any trouble with a bus.

"But I did get excited and nervous about driving a big rig," Gettel recalls.

LIKED JOB: "I enjoy driving for the kids and I really like the responsibility. If I didn't like it, I sure wouldn't have done it all these years."

MEMORIES: Gettel enjoys recalling some of the more memorable incidents of her career as bus driver, such as sliding in a ditch from a road covered in skate ice years ago.

"Back then, we had stick shifts in the buses. I started off slowly, but when I changed gears, the bus started sliding. It seemed like forever before we went into the ditch, time passed so slowly.

"It was scary, but the kids were happy because they were going to be late for school," she remembers.

Gettel says she remembers one little kindergarten student who slipped under the rail that used to divide the driver's seat from the students' seats.

"He crawled up beside me and said, 'Mrs. Gettel, how's your love life?' He was so cute and so serious about it."

Gettel says she regrets not keeping a diary of her experiences because of so many encounters like that little kindergartener.

CHANGES: The longtime driver says things have indeed changed, between 1967 and now.

"You can definitely see a change in kids these days. I can tell a child nowadays to sit down and he'll just look at me. Then he'll sit down, and 10 seconds later he'll be at it again. It seems like they

know the rules, but they just don't care," Gettel says.

Driving nearly the same route for 21 years, Gettel says she probably could do it blindfolded - but she won't try.

GENERATIONS: And, driving has given her the opportunity to sometimes transport two generations of the same family.

"Some of the kids I'm driving now, I drove their parents when they were in school," says Gettel.

Retirement plans for Gettel include some travel, "and I'm thinking of going fishing with my grandson. I've always wanted to fish, and now I have the opportunity to do as much as I want.

"But I'll always be on the move. I can't bear to be standing still."

unit is called "cavalry," Ken tells that it's based on the traditional movement and mobility of today's tanks compared with the "horse" units of years ago. Even today, horses take part in tank parades, and retreat is called with a covered wagon.

He was a USA senior when he enlisted in the "delayed entry program," during which time he attended classes once a month at the Reserve in Bad Axe.

He went active in Detroit on July 29, 1987, took his basic in Fort Knox, KY, graduating on October 1, and finished advanced initial training there on the last day of January.

Then he moved to Fort Hood, 60 miles north of Texas' capital, Austin. He's been there since, but expects to spend about 18 months in Germany, a regular part of the 4-year enlistment.

Thinking back over his concerns of a year ago, Ken acknowledges that training, especially basic, has been "tough."

He's quick to add, that "it's got to be tough," because he's part of a hard-core company and all the men in it want to keep it that way - tough.

Their CO - commanding officer - is tough because he's watching out for us, Ken explains.

"When we're in the top physical condition, when we're ready for anything, then we're safest and surest to survive whatever comes along," he adds.

He's proud that his unit has been classed as the "best physical condition platoon." That's when you learn best, and that's when you ARE best, Ken says.

He's glad that his officers are demanding, that they insist on perfection. "Some soldiers complain about the Army's insistence on cleanliness, on shoes, clothes, rifles, everything being spic and span.

"But we've found that even one speck of dirt in the

wrong place can chew up an engine in this technological age," he pointed out.

And, he added, then we learn respect, as another bonus.

Just to prove that he isn't totally starry-eyed in his career, he admits that there have been low points.

For instance, he recalls with a smile, that 18th birthday to which he'd been looking forward for so many years, was a real downer for him.

"I was in basic training, we'd been out in the field for a week, I was soaked through from rain and it was thundering. The sky was filled with flashes of

lightning, and we were sitting low for lightning protection.

"Suddenly I thought, 'What am I doing here?'"

But soon the field training was done, basic was out of the way, and the skies turned sunny again.

Then Ken remembered all the benefits of the GI Bill. He thought of everything he's learning, and that soon he'd be training in field welding, which interested him greatly.

He thought of future training in light wheel mechanics, and he met up with some Michigan men - from Warren, and Muskegon and Lansing.

The talk was about the possibility of going to Germany for part of their term. Things were looking rosier by the minute.

Besides, he'd just received his Presidential Ribbon. And, not to be overlooked, tomorrow would be payday!
