Ross says although his father leaves the day-to-day operation of the farm to him, Otto still pitches in to help feed cattle and do other small jobs





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

Sampling by the Michigan Department of Public Health has confirmed the presence of lead in drinking water from certain piping systems where the water has remained stagnant for a eriod of time. Levels in excess of the current drinking water standard (50 parts per billion) have been detected. Laboratory sting has shown that the principal sources of lead are lead pipin and lead based solder and fluxes used to join copper piping ased on these results and those from other studies, the Michiga Department of Labor, Bureau of Construction Codes and the Michigan Department of Public Health have supported legislation which prohibits the use of lead based solders and fluxes in potable water piping systems. The plumbing industry and homeowners who may construct potable drinking water piping systems must no nger use lead based solders and fluxes for joining copper piping. other solder materials or joining methods are available and mus e used. Lead piping has not been allowed for new installations for about the last ten years. Building copper piping water system constructed to date likely contain lead based solder and flux.

Water is the universal solvent and even relatively stable water then stagnant for a period of even a few hours in contact with lead solder and flux can result in a significant concentration of lead in e water, the health department is recommending that those ping systems in which the water has remained stagnant over night or for longer periods be flushed for several minutes prior to using the water for drinking or cooking purposes. This typically has been found to satisfactorily reduce the level of lead and other netals that may concentrate in the water within the building's

"The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) sets drinking water standards and has determined that lead is a health concern at certain levels of exposure. There is currently a standard of 0.50 parts per million (ppm). Based on new health

"Part of the purpose of this notice is to inform yopu of the otential adverse health effects of lead. This is being done even hough your water may not be in violation of the current standard.

"EPA and others are concerned about lead in drinking water Too much lead in the human body can cause serious damage to the brain, kidneys, nervous system, and red blood cells. The eatest risk, even with short-term exposure, is to young childre and pregnant women.

"Lead levels in your drinking water are likely to be highest."

f your home or water system has lead pipes, or if your home has copper pipes with leader solder and, if the home is less than five years old or, if you have soft or acidic water, or, if water sits in the pipes for severla hours."

Besides lead in water from certain piping systems, there are ther exposures pathways to lead includings: ir-from industrial discharges automobile exhaust; food-from iarome deposition of lead on croips and leader solder seams in some food containers; nonfood items-lead based paint, dirt, solder r any object containing lead.

It should be noted that the minor source of lead exposure and lead poisoning in the United States is due to children consuming

People who may have concerns about hte concentration of lead rom their building or household piping are advised to contact a eputable private laboratory for a water analysis. Others who may lave specific concerns relative to any possible health effects are urged to contact their physician.

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Anita Gettel Will Miss Her Daily Route After 21 Years

Laker bus driver Anita Gettel will park her bus and turn in her keys for the final time on June 14.

Gettel has been transporting thousands students to and from school for 21 years, starting in September 1967.

"I was a housewife back then, and after having raised three kids, I decided it was time to get back into public again," she recalls.

"The hours were perfect because I'd be working when the kids were in school, and I would get home shortly after the kids got there," says Gettel.

WHY NOT? Bill Gordon, who was transportation administrator then, asked Gettel if she would be interested in driving a bus

"My husband, Omer, had been driving a milk truck, and I had had experience in driving loaded milk trucks. I thought that if I could drive a truck, I shouldn't have any trouble with a bus.

"But I did get excited and nervous about driving a big rig," Gettel recalls.

LIKED JOB: "I enjoy driving for the kids and I really like the responsibility. If I didn't like it, I sure wouldn't have done it all these years."

MEMORIES: Gettel enjoys recalling some of the more memorable incidents of her career as bus driver, such as sliding in a ditch from a road covered in skate ice years ago.

"Back then, we had stick shifts in the buses. I started off slowly, but when I changed gears, the bus started sliding. It seemed like forever before we went into the ditch, time passed so slowly.

"It was scary, but the kids were happy because they were going to be late for school," she remembers. Gettel says she remembers one little kindergarten student who slipped under the rail that used to divide the driver's seat from the students' seats

the students' seats.

"He crawled up beside me and said, 'Mrs. Gettel, how's your love life?' He was so cute and so serious about it.'

Gettel says she regrets not keeping a diary of her experiences because of so many encounters like that little kindergartener.

CHANGES: The longtime driver says things have indeed changed, between 1967 and now.

"You can definitely see a change in kids these days. I can tell a child nowdays to sit down and he'll just look at me. Then he'll sit down, and 10 seconds later he'll be at it again. It seems like they

know the rules, but they just don't care," Gettel says.

Driving nearly the same route for 21 years, Gettel says she probably could do it blindfolded — but she won't try.

"Some of the kids I'm driving now, I drove their parents when they were in school," says Gettel.




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He was a USA senior when he enlisted in the "delayed entry program," during which time he attended classes once a month at the Reserve in Bad Axe.
