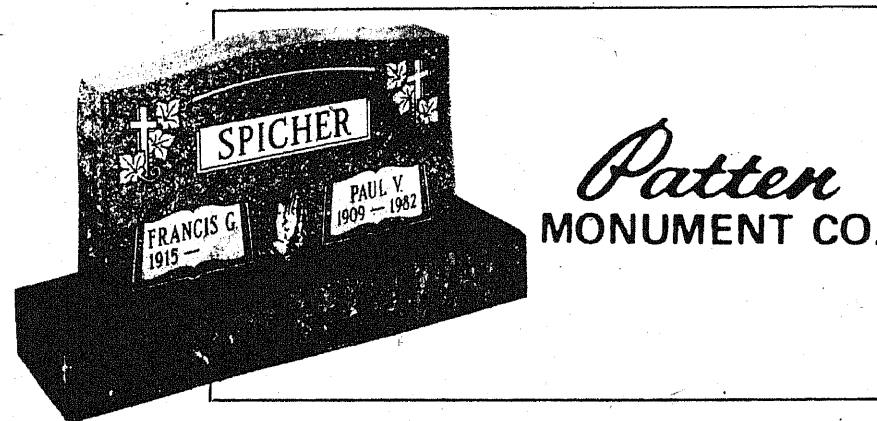

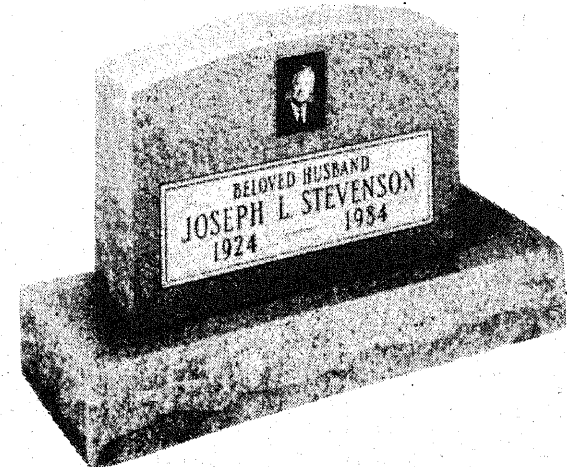

Weather delays completion of harbor

The weather hasn't been kind to anyone in the past few months, and the workers racing to complete Caseville's new Harbor are no exception. Originally scheduled to open April 15, in time for the Perch Festival, the Harbor's official unveiling has been moved back until all the ice is gone from the Harbor basin and all the frost is out of the ground. Harbor Commission Chairman Harold "Bud" Lankey says construction crews have had to contend with ankle-deep mud recently, and that work on the concrete boat ramp and parking areas is at a standstill. Because of the excess mud, trucks brining in the new boat slips haven't been able to get to the basin on the original schedule. "The weather just hasn't cooperated at all. It's been a real headache," Lankey says. **SOME IS DONE:** While the weather has kept much of the groundwork and grading from being done, some construction has progressed rapidly on the harbormaster's office and the bath house.

WORTH THE WAIT: But when the \$1.8 million Caseville Harbor is finally open, it will be one of the best in the Midwest, Lankey says. With 63 boat slips -- 55 of them brand new -- the Harbor will offer cable TV and telephone services dockside. So, space should be in great demand, Lankey says. He previously noted that reservations for docking space have been coming in at a steady stream, saying many popular dates were already full. Only 33 spaces are available for seasonal docking, and a drawing will be held to determine which 33 lucky boaters will be able to rent boat slip spots in the new harbor for the season. Official Harbor opening ceremonies are planned about May 15, subject to change.

Freeland plans Walleye tourney

FREELAND—Freeland Lions Club members are planning the 4th annual Freeland Walleye Festival Saturday, April 29, in cooperation with Freeland Chamber of Commerce. In 1986, the contest-winning Walleye weighed 6 pounds, one ounce. Last year, the winner tipped the scales at 11 pounds, 4 ounces. There will also be an arts and craft show, raffle sales and commemorative T-shirt, sweatshirts and hats, sold by Chamber.

Festival boosters point out that for the first Festival there will be a pancake/sausage breakfast by Freeland Woman's Study Club from 6-11 am, and a chicken barbecue starting at noon, sponsored by Freeland Knights of Columbus.

Hundreds of anglers, young and old, will be lining Caseville's breakwall along with the banks of the Pigeon River, trying to catch the tasty panfish. And to properly celebrate the perch run -- as well as starting off the tourist season with a bang -- the Caseville Chamber of Commerce will once again be presenting its Perch Festival, Saturday, April 15 through Sunday, April 23.

WHAT'S INCLUDED? The big parade, officially starting the festival, will wind its way through downtown Caseville on Saturday, April 15, starting at 1 p.m. After the parade on Saturday, and again on Sunday, both at 2 p.m., children can enjoy a special matinee movie at the Bay Theatre for only \$2. This special showing is sponsored by Tom Thumb Co-operative Preschool, and proceeds will benefit the school. And while the kids enjoy a movie, adults can visit the new Caseville Post Office during its Open House from 2 to 5 p.m. **SUNDAY FUN:** On Sunday, the Caseville Kiwanis Club will once again serve a delicious pancake breakfast at the school from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. Proceeds again go for community betterment projects. After a busy day fishing, bingo buffs can enjoy a few games at the American Legion Hall on Caseville Road starting at 7:30 p.m. And, more bingo games will be played Wednesday night at the Eagles Club, starting at 7:30 p.m. **FISHALL WEEK, THEN:** On Friday, April 21, the Caseville Eagles Club will once again be the hot spot in town, as its home-cooked fish fry kicks off at 5 p.m. and continues until 8 p.m. **Please Turn to Page 4**



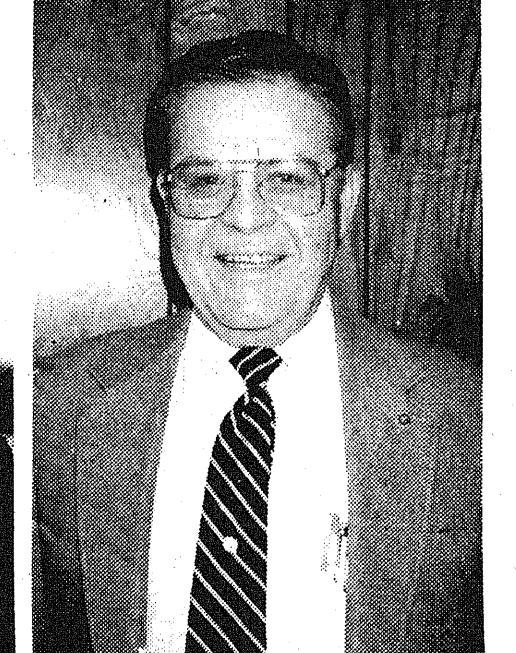

KIDS' FUN: Young anglers will be able to try their casting prowess in the Kiddie Casting Contest at Caseville Resort on the final Saturday of the festival.

Winding up the week on Saturday, April 22, the popular Talent Show and Lip Sync Contest are planned at the school at 7 p.m.

WEEK-LONG EVENTS: Caseville's Optimist Club will be operating a concession stand at the breakwall for the convenience of perch anglers both weekends of the festival from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Euchre, cribbage and pool tournaments will be in progress at the Blue Water Inn and Riverside Bar all during the week for those whose fishing creels are full (or empty, too!)

FISH CONTEST: There will be plenty of anglers hoping to win the two \$100 prizes in the perch fishing contest that runs all during the festival.

Both the heaviest and longest fish will win \$100 for lucky anglers.

Organizers have designated three weigh-in stations for entering the contest --

- Walsh's Gun and Tackle,
- Caseville Resort, and
- Saginaw Bay Marina.

In case of a tie, weight will determine the winner of the longest fish contest, and girth will determine the winner of the heaviest fish, according to the rules.

GIFTS FOR SHOPPERS: Caseville merchants are sponsoring a give-away all during the Perch Festival, too, for folks who WON'T be fishing all the time.

A mystery person will be roaming through local stores, giving away gifts and "Caseville funny money" -- redeemable at participating businesses.

But the mystery person won't give anything to anyone not wearing a Perch Festival button, available from any Caseville merchant, Chamber officials remind folks.

"Come to Caseville for fish, for the food, for fun or just to visit, during the annual Perch Festival April 15-23," Chamber leaders say. "You'll be glad you did!"



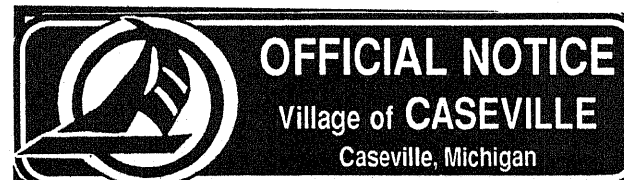
Optimists sell snacks

Another project involves baseball for the Festival,

so bleacher repairing and gravel hauling will be undertaken.

A Fish Sandwich Queen will again be chosen, and Lori Schweitzer volunteered to assist Sue Schweitzer with the 1989 Queen committee for selection and crowning.

As another project, Sandy Chalou was chosen to attend a grant workshop in Flint on April 19-20.

Plans are to prepare a grant that would help the community purchase the

Silver Dollar property, tear down the old building and erect a new structure and beautify the area which borders the township park.

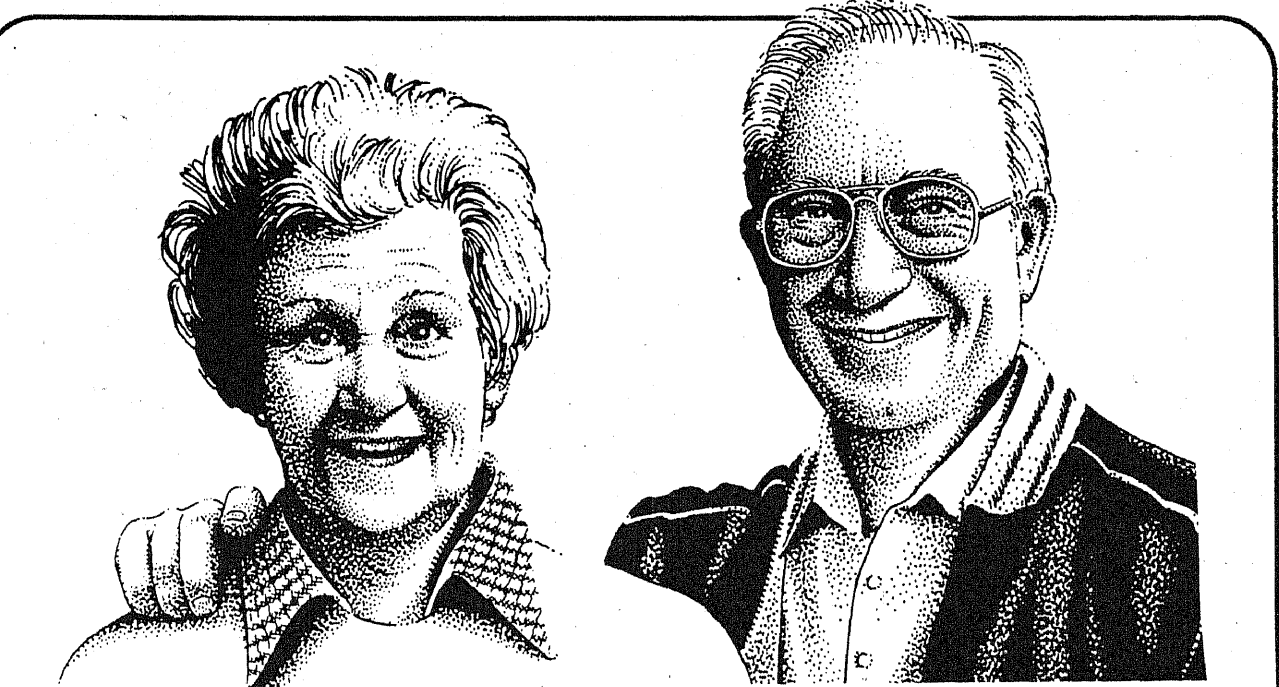
