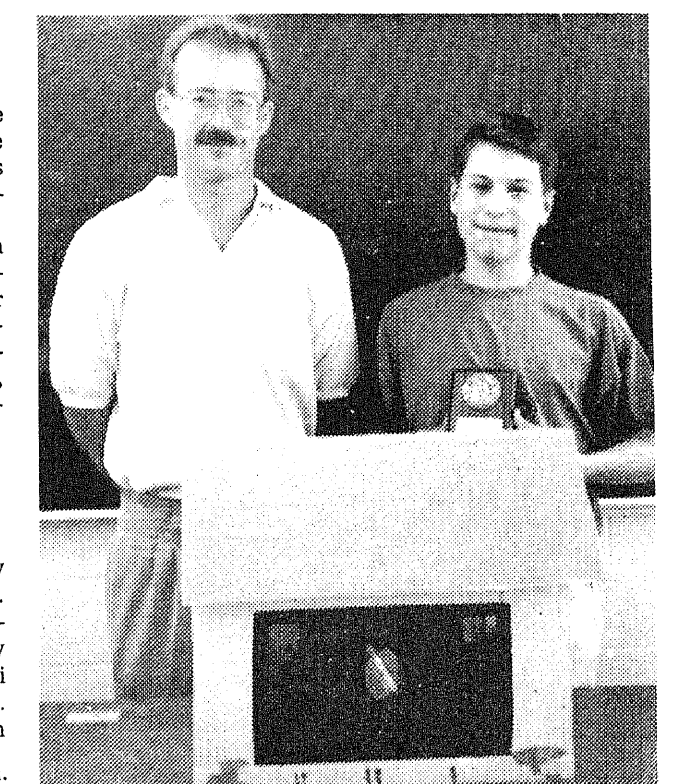

NEED FOR ORGAN DONORS

As medical technology improves, the need for organ donation only increases. As more transplantation procedures become successful, are recognized and become routine, the demand can only rise.

Although the quality of life of patients with renal disease who are on dialysis has improved somewhat, the incidence of kidney transplants has been increasing. Renal transplantation frees the patient from his dialysis apparatus and is less costly than long-term hemodialysis.

Like wise, the acceptance of cardiac transplantation as a reimbursable procedure will further increase the demand for brain-death donors. Until truly acceptable artificial organs can be manufactured, it becomes imperative to make available from acceptable donors a larger supply of organs.

Not every type of death allows for transplant-suitable organs. However, there are more than enough such deaths to meet all transplant needs if most people volunteered to become donors.

Danger from above

The fishing was lousy. It usually is on a falling barometer. But since this was the last day of a fishing trip in a remote portion of Michigan's Upper Peninsula, Dick and I had decided to forget about the fishing tables and try our luck on a flat, meandering stream north of our camping spot.

I really didn't know the barometer was falling, but Dick, the weather expert, had explained his premonition over a streamside lunch. He had built a small fire to heat some tea water and when the smoke hung close to the ground instead of threading up through the forest canopy that covered our heads, Dick shook his head.

Dawn had broken clear that morning, but clouds soon rolled in, and by early afternoon the sky took on a yellowish cast and a certain uneasiness settled over the woods. Dick was the first to notice how quiet it was. "You know," he remarked in his New Jersey drawl, "I haven't heard a bird chirp for the last half hour—something's coming."

"What do you mean, something," I asked.

"A storm," he answered,

"and it's going to be a hum-dinger." With a sense of urgency I had rarely seen in Dick, he broke down his rod and began hoofing it back towards camp. I followed dutifully behind, glancing at the sky each time we broke into a clearing, and as if on cue, the gentle rumbling of thunder began to filter in from the west.

We had camped on a high ridge about 50 yards from the river and set up our tent on the edge of a flat, treeless plain that looked slightly out of place in the middle of the jack pine forest.

Dick had picked the spot because it offered the best protection against the murderous hordes of mosquitoes that called this river valley home, and he was right. Most of the time we spent in camp, a gentle breeze kept the insects at bay.

When we reached the tent Dick tossed his rod inside, motioned for me to do the same and jerked down a large piece of canvas we had rigged as a dining fly.

"This isn't a good place to stay," he said flatly without much emotion, "too high,

and the tent poles will make good lightning rods."

He rolled up the canvas, grabbed some rope and headed down the east side of the ridge towards a dense grove of cedars a few yards from the river.

"We should be all right down here," he said when we reached the cedars, and using a small belt axe began trimming a hole in the center where he would eventually hang the canvas fly to form a small tent. Before he finished a lightning bolt lit up the sky and the following crash of thunder seemed so close we both jumped a little.

Nestled beneath the canvas the storm suddenly seemed further away. The lightning continued to flash and the thunder crashed for the better part of a half hour and diminished only when a cooling rain began to beat out a rat-tat-tat drum roll on the tightly stretched canvas.

That storm-interrupted fishing trip took place many

years ago, but during that afternoon, having been caught in dozens of thunderstorms since then, I have come to respect the tremendous fury associated with this natural phenomenon. The wise outdoorsman should take heed of some cautions:

■ If you're caught outside,

take shelter in a building or vehicle if available. If not, find a low depression away from tall trees or tents. (Metal poles are like lightning rods.)

■ If you smell ozone, feel your hair stand on end, or see St. Elmo's fire, you are being positively charged and you should lie flat, NOW!

■ Don't carry guns, metal

fishing rods or any other metal objects during a thunderstorm.

■ If you don't remember anything about this article, fix this one point in your memory—in any given year, more people are killed by lightning than all the tornadoes and hurricanes put together...

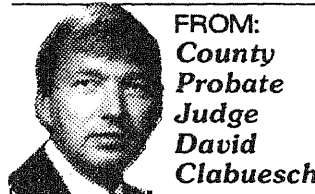

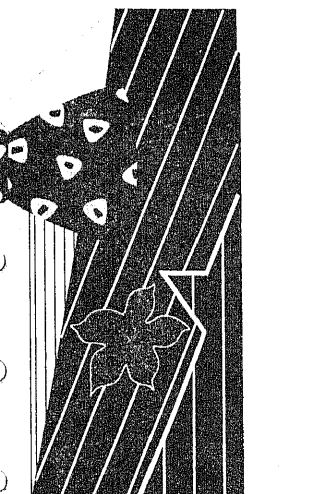


