

Lefty's: Something to eat for everyone!

Back when rock music was young and poodle skirts were "cool" Lefty's Drive-in near Bay Port was created as one of the first fast-food restaurants in the area.

It continues today as the only true drive-in restaurant in the Western Thumb Area.

There's no electric boxes at Lefty's Drive-in asking to take customers orders. Perky teenage girls take and deliver the orders to the cars in the reminiscent style of happier days.

Besides rock music and poodle skirts, raising broil-

ing chickens was a new market trend in the 1950s and some Bay Port Area farmers decided to turn it into a business.

Wendel "Lefty" Loeffler built Lefty's Drive-in restaurant to cash in on the new craze for chicken dinners.

"Raising broiler chickens was a new thing in the area at that time," said Al Beachy, who is a silent partner in the restaurant. "And, the drive-in was created by Lefty to cash in on the market for chicken dinners."

According to the former Tuscola County Cooperative Extension Service Director William Bortel, Michigan had several farmers who raised broiler chickens, but the industry left the area in the early 1970s.

"We used to have a lot of broilers raised in the state, but the broiler industry left the state because of the weather and poor economic conditions," said Bortel. "We kept the egg production part of the industry, but raising broilers moved to Georgia. Georgia was cheaper to raise chickens because the buildings didn't have to be heated."

Over the years, Lefty's menu has drifted away from featuring chicken dinners.

Thursday night's 9/10-inch rain combined with sunny weather will keep this already-chest-high corn growing up, up, up.



'Good buys' at YFC Auction July 21

Kicking off the 1990 Pigeon Farmers' Festival will be the popular Bluewater youth for Christ Benefit Auction, set for Saturday, July 21, beginning at 9 a.m. at the Pigeon Recreation Park.

A bake sale, crafts tent and auction will highlight the day's events, plus lots of opportunities for hungry buyers to purchase foods, ranging from doughnuts to barbecued hamburgers and homemade pies.

The Benefit Auction, which last year netted almost \$30,000, is Bluewater Youth for Christ's largest fund-raiser of the year. This year, they're expecting to beat last year's record year by offering dozens of top-drawing auction items.

Items range from a used 1981 Plymouth Horizon to a grandfather clock, gold and silver jewelry, handcrafted wood furniture by L.J. Gascho, a children's playhouse, large selection of quilts, afghans and comforters and the popular macrame lawn chairs.

Other items which are expected to sell will include Fostoria ware, a Madam Alexander doll, a Shirley Temple doll, baseball cards, old coins and more.

Another "returning event" will be the auctioning of special dinners, which last year raised about \$3,000. This year's dinner selections will include a Pennsylvania Dutch meal, Chinese dinner,

Hawaiian dinner, Christmas dinner and several more.

"We're excited about the timing of this year's event, right before the Pigeon Farmers' Festival," says Dan McLaughlin, a YFC staffer who has worked hard on the event.

"People are excited about the festival and we think we can kick it off well with the auction."

90 YEARS AGO JULY 20, 1900

80 YEARS AGO JULY 22, 1910


OTHER THUMB AREA DEATHS

Is there a place to buy lamb or rabbits for our freezer?



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Aug. 20 organ auction for Historical Society



The Pigeon Historical Society is trying a new idea for fundraising this year, with an auction of an antique reed organ.

The organ, built by Clough and Warner Organ Co. of Detroit in 1877, is a fully restored and refinished parlor organ.

Historical society member Al Robinson, assisted by member Mabel Swartzendruber, have spent many hours refurbishing the mechanicals of the organ, and the exterior was refinished by Lawrence and Pam Roestel.

The organ will be on display

at the Pigeon Village Hall from July 16 until August 20, and sealed bids will be accepted.

Robinson said the Society reserves the right to accept or reject any or all bids.

Bids are scheduled to be opened on Monday, Aug. 20, at 10 a.m. at the Village Hall. Bidders don't have to be present, Robinson noted, but they are invited to be there so they can raise their bid if they wish.

The organ is made of solid walnut, and all the stops are made of brass and porcelain, Robinson noted. A matching walnut stool with a nee-

dlepoint cover is also included with the organ.

"The nice thing about this organ is that it is ready to play. It's been cleaned and refinished and it's ready to put into a living room," Robinson said. "That's rare.

"Most organs you find are sold 'as is' and they have to be cleaned and repaired before they can be played. This one is all ready to go."


Lefty has long since moved to Florida, but his relaxed style of dining is a favorite spot for travelers along M-25 who can get service whether or not they wear shoes or shirts.

There is a picnic table and grassy areas for diners who don't want to sit in their cars, said Beachy.


Lefty's Drive-in is open from 9 a.m. to about dark, and the new owners hope to stay open through hunting season this fall.

4 INJURED IN PLANE CRASH

A family reunion Sunday turned tragic when a small, single-engine plane crashed in a bean field less than quarter a mile from the reunion site on Barns Road near Millington.

Immediately following take-off from a private landing strip on Barns Road, the plane lost altitude, the right wing clipped trees and cartwheeled before landing on its belly, said witnesses at the scene. The 5:45 p.m. crash was two miles southwest of Millington on Milliman Road in Millington Township.

Four persons were hurt in the accident. They were taken to St. Mary's Hospital and St. Luke's Hospital both of Saginaw. "The plane didn't sound right," said Donald Jensen, a relative of the victims. "They just cleared the grass at the west end of the run way, hit trees on the other side of the road and crashed.

"The engine was about 60 feet away from the plane," said Millington's Village Chief of Police Steve Roggentine. Officials from the Federal Aviation Administration are investigating.
