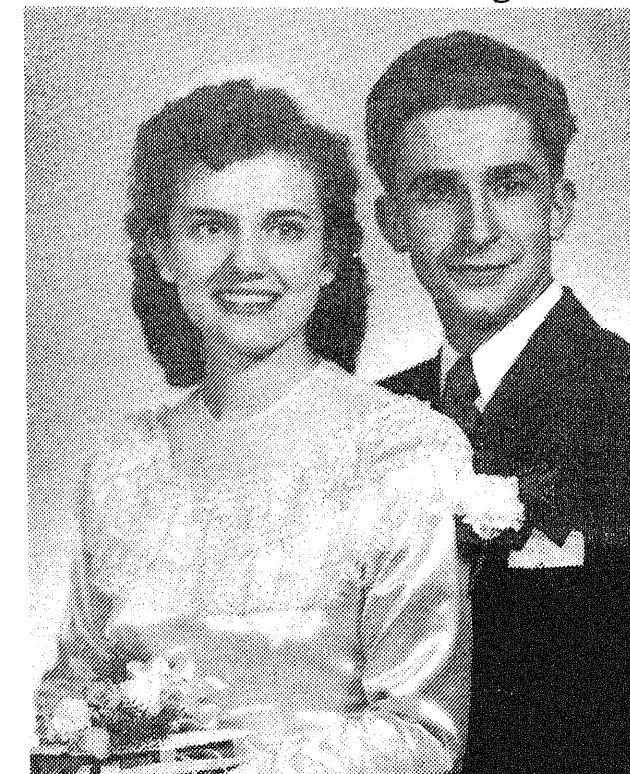

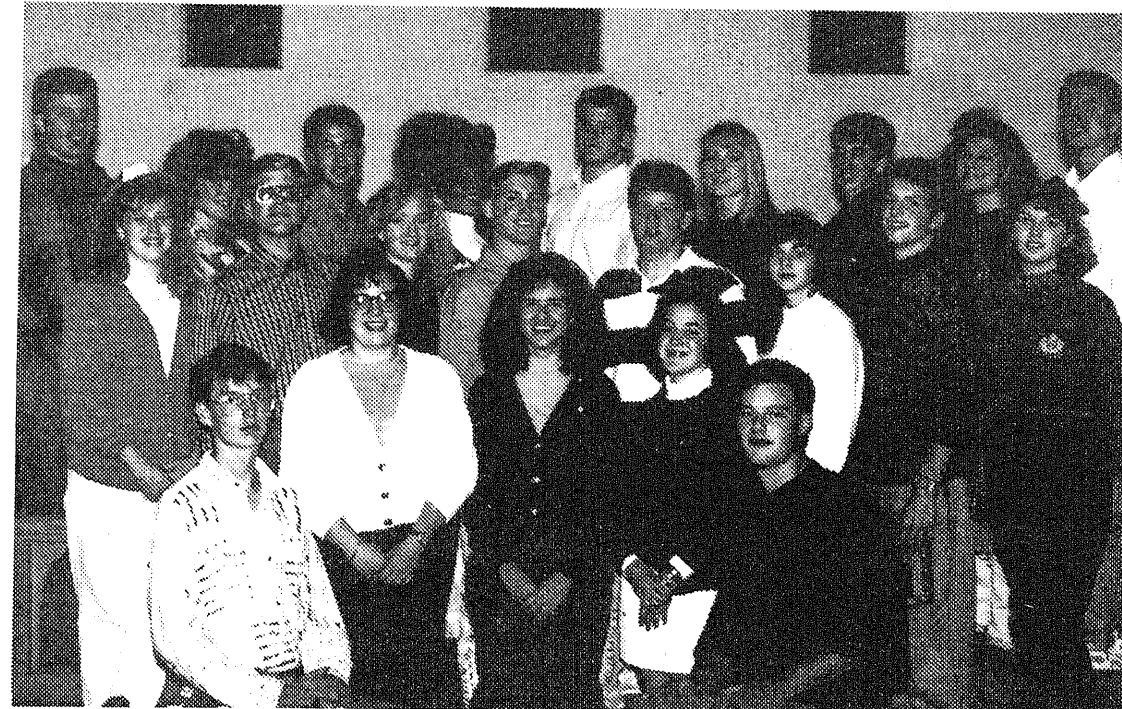

Griem trial date set

The trial of Ronald F. Griem, Port Austin, is scheduled for Feb. 5 for the alleged stabbing death of Mariano Sanchez July 18.

Griem is charged with one count of open murder in connection with the incident and a charge of being a habitual offender.

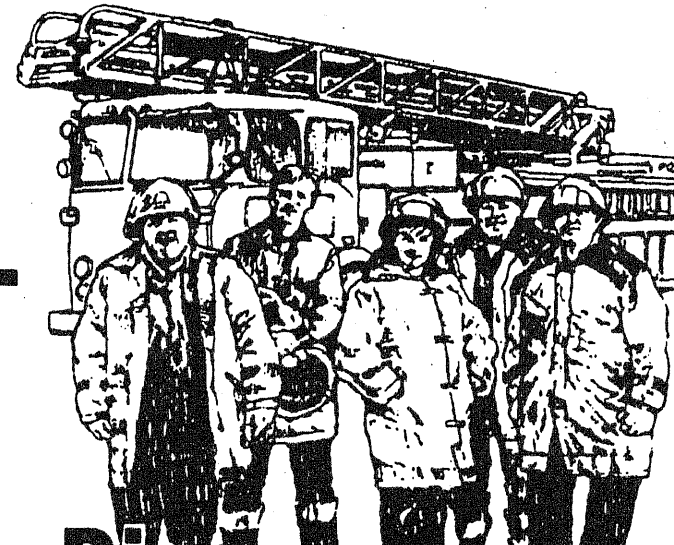
A Huron County Sheriff

deputy responded to an anonymous call about 5 a.m. on July 18, requesting an officer at Sanchez's home on Grassmere Road, Bad Axe. Griem remains housed in the Huron County Jail without bond.

If is his convicted of first-degree murder, he faces the maximum penalty of life in prison with no parole. Also, Sandra K. Raffin is charged with being an accessory to a felony after the fact in connection with Sanchez's slaying.

Originally, she also had been charged with first-degree murder, but she made a statement to police and pled guilty to the lesser charge. Raffin is scheduled for sentencing Feb. 19.

According to the Huron County Prosecutor's office, the maximum penalty for accessory to a felony after the fact is a penalty of five years in prison and a \$10,000 fine.

Beets are looking better...

The sugar beet harvest is much better than a week ago, but it still needs "a dozen perfect days", said the Sebewaing Plant's Ag Manager Dick Jacoby.

By Sunday night, about 30% of the crop had been delivered—200,000 tons—but 415,000 tons were still awaited.

One year ago, 220,000 tons had been delivered, but that was 40% of a 520,000-ton crop.

"The mud is horrible", Jacoby said, taking much down time in all areas.

Some single vehicles deliver 35-36 tons per load, while double trucks bring as many as 50 tons at a time.

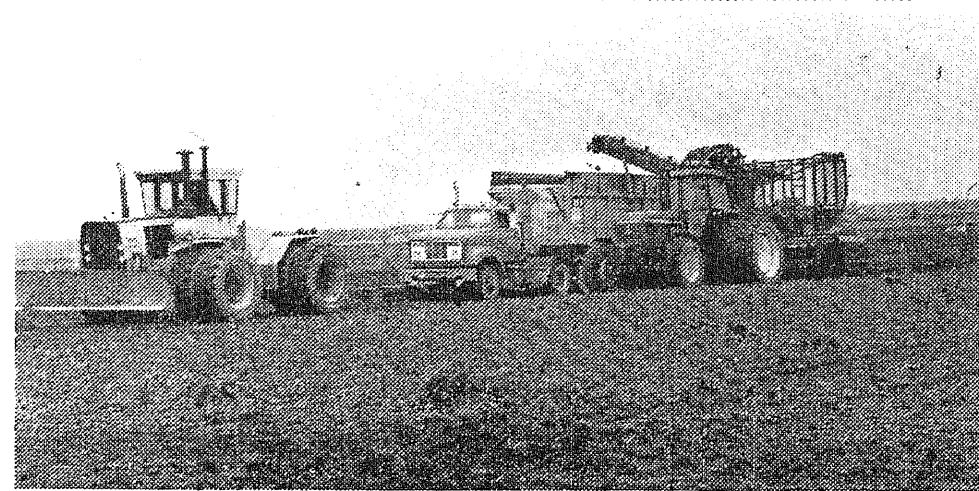
Thirteen pileers are in action, offering 19 dumps simultaneously.

But those drying fields have turned into a quagmire of thick, stiff mud that sucks truck tires deep. As the photo illustrates, most farmers have had to use one tractor to harvest their sugar beets, and one tractor to pull the truck through the field. Another option some farmers are using is a dump box, towed alongside the harvester, filled with beets, and then dumped into a truck waiting on drier ground.

Along with the beets, some farmers are finishing their dry bean harvest, and bright green wheat can be seen rapidly growing, sinking deep roots before freezing winter snows come.

Commercial perch fishing ban pleases some, angers others

The flame under the long-festering competition between commercial fishermen, sports fishermen and fish consumers was turned on high last week when the Michigan DNR announced that it is proceeding with plans to ban commercial Perch fishing in Saginaw Bay by the end of 1990.

The new DNR program would simply stop commercial Perch fishing without compensation of fisheries that fishery owners say would put many of them out of business. For years DNR and a committee of commercial fishermen and legislators had been studying a program that would close commercial fisheries' Perch-catching operations with a "purchase plan" to compensate the companies for their losses.

The basis of the plan was a decision by an administrative law judge which stated that the commercial companies should be compensated for their financial losses. The recent announcement by DNR officials, however denied the compensation part of the plan.

Commercial fishermen stated that removal of all commercial Perch fishing operations would deny fish consumers their "rights" to enjoy Perch as food. "The sky-high prices of Perch are an indication of how much consumers want

Perch and how high a price they're ready to pay for them", one fisherman said.

FISH CONSUMERS HAVE "RIGHTS" TOO

Now, all those consumers—and there are many more of them than of any other group—are about to be denied their enjoyment. The high value of Perch makes them an easy target for black-market fishermen who would be far harder to control by DNR enforcement departments than the relatively-few commercial fishing companies that are still in business.

H. Dale Cubitt, Bad Axe attorney who represents most companies or individual commercial fishermen, is on vacation and could not be reached for comment on the new DNR decision.

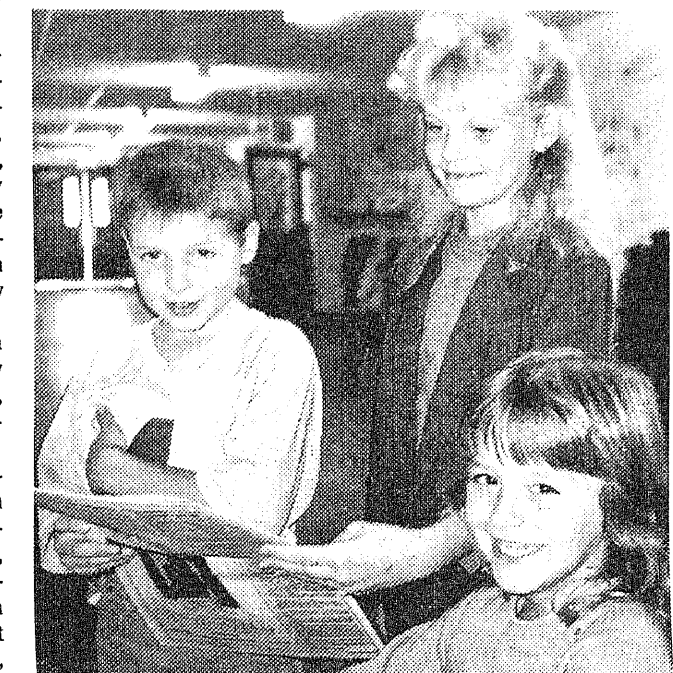

POLITICAL, NOT BIOLOGICAL ...

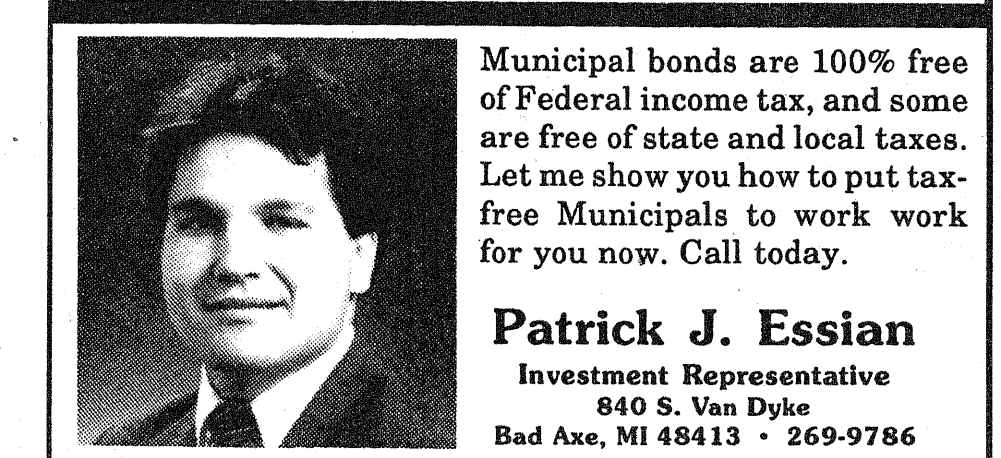
"We commercial fishermen feel that this is a strictly political decision, because there are more sports fishermen than commercial fishermen, of course", said Forrest Williams, Bay Port and Caseville, co-owner of Bay Port Fish Company.

"The DNR decision, by their own admission, has no biological basis whatever, because we take only about 16% of the total Perch catch, while sports fishermen take more than 5 times that many, about 84% of the catch", he added. DNR biologists have admitted repeatedly that commercial Perch catch have no impact on Perch numbers in the Bay, he added.
