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Caseville event this weekend Bowfishing draws hundreds

 Bowfishing sounds like a strange marriage of sports, using a bow and arrow to catch a fish instead of hook, line and sinker. Actually, it's quite a useful and challenging sport, riding local waters of so-called rough fish while providing some off-season shooting practice for bowhunters. The bowfishermen go after carp, dogfish, gar pike, gold carp and goldfish—and nowhere do they get more of them than during the two-day Great Lakes Bowfishing Championship, set this Saturday and Sunday, June 5-6. This year the tournament is celebrating its 10th Anniversary with some special events, but the focus remains on getting as much fish as possible. The tournament benefits the National Wildlife Education Foundation Youth Camp, which owns the Sleeper Outdoor Center near Caseville. The camp is used by all sorts of local groups to educate children about wildlife and outdoor activities. For example, rock singer Ted Nugent holds a special Kids' Kamp every year at the Outdoor Center to introduce kids to bowhunting and the outdoors. Sixth-graders from Laker Junior High spend a week at the camp during the spring. Foundation assistant director Bob Easterbrook, Jr., who heads the tournament, said that not only does the camp benefit from the tournament, but Saginaw Bay anglers ultimately benefit, too. "It's really one heck of a sport and a lot of fun," Easterbrook says. "It benefits the sport fish because the bowfishermen get rid of the carp and other rough fish. And at the same time, it benefits waterfowl too." Carp and other rough fish can hurt a sports fishery with their feeding habits, Easterbrook says. The carp "vacuum" their way across the lake floor, eating vegetation that protects the other fishes' eggs, as well as eating the eggs themselves. Consuming that vegetation leaves less for visiting waterfowl, too. So bowfishermen (and women!) do their best to shoot as many fish as possible. And since 230 four-man teams have signed up for the tournament, the maximum allowed, that translates into a lot of fish. Last year's tournament brought in a world-record 67 tons of rough fish—that's 134,000 lbs. of fish that was turned into fertilizer on a farmer's fields. "The farmer told us that when you plant a seed out there, jump back cause it's coming right back up," Easterbrook says. That 67 tons of fish caught by the tournament's entrants was more than all the other tournaments in the country combined, he says. "Our tournament is the largest of its kind in the country, and the second largest of any kind."

The Caring Arms Task Force is a partnership between the Lt. Governor's office, the Institute for Children, Youth and Families and the Extension Service of Michigan State University.

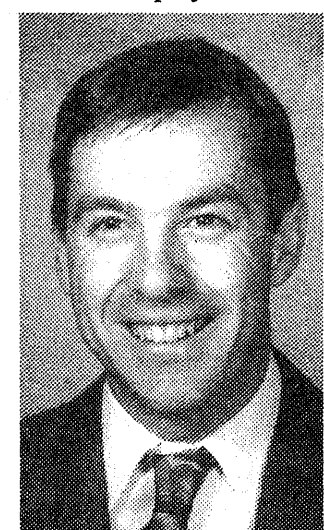
"Our goal is to reward, recognize and promote programs that make a difference in the lives of families and children," says Binsfeld.

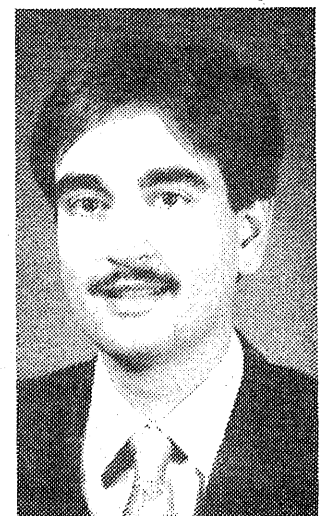

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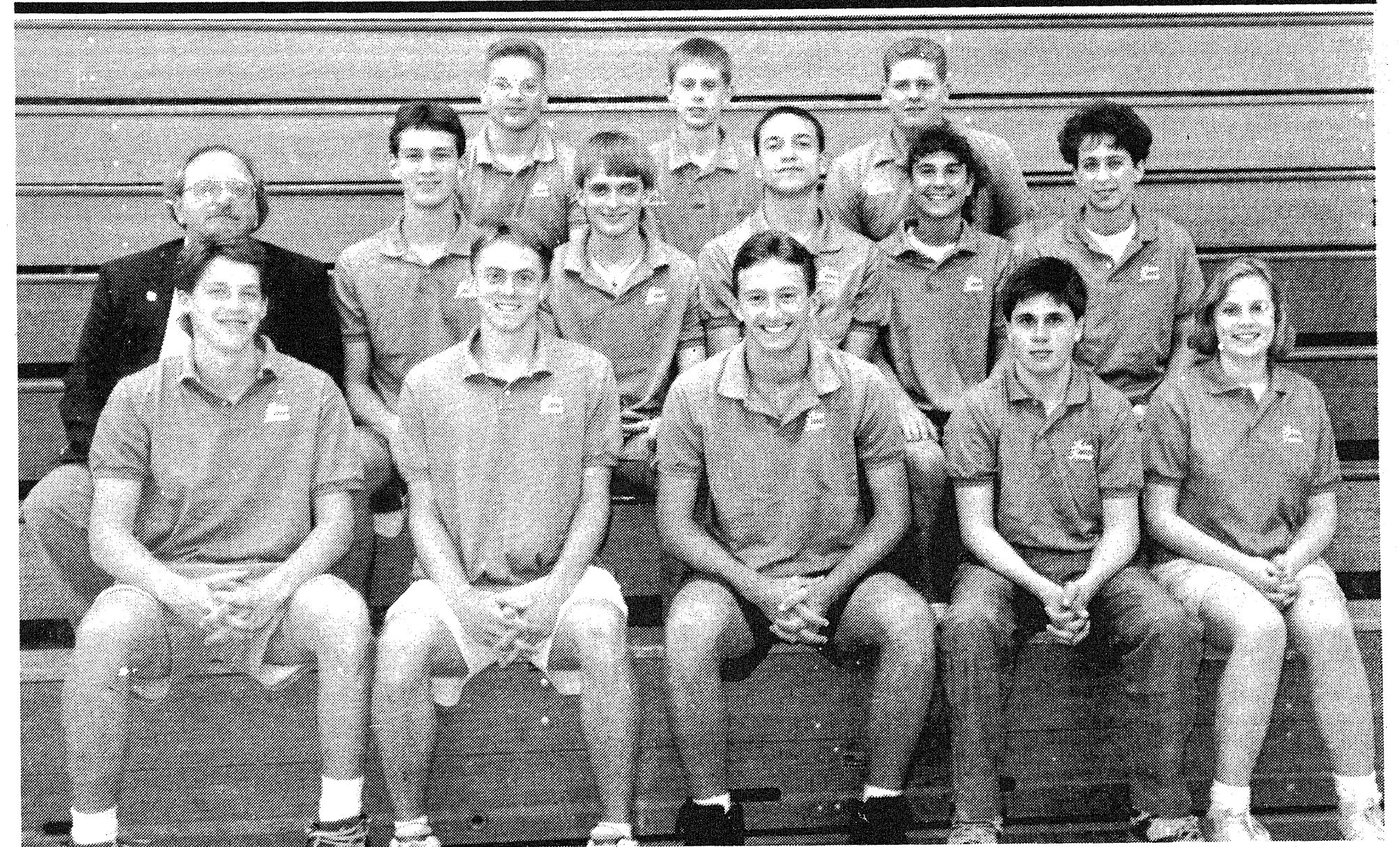
