

# Saginaw Bay Watershed gets \$335,450 in grants

All that interest that federal and state governments have in improving Saginaw Bay — and the projects they are trying to implement in behalf of the Bay — seem to be getting underway. Huron and Bay Counties recently received eight grants totaling \$335,450, to help restore the Saginaw Bay Watershed, according to new State Senator Joel Gougeon, (R-Bay City), along with Reps. Dick Allen (R-Caro) and Howard Wetters (D-Kawkawlin). The grants are provided by the Saginaw Bay National Watershed Initiative, which is funded by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, and administered by the state DNR. The Initiative is the forum where local, state, federal agencies and citizens work together to restore and protect the Saginaw Bay Watershed.

great opportunity for the communities in the Saginaw Bay Area to have input in how water quality can be maintained without damaging the success of crops in the area," Sen. Gougeon said. He chairs the Senate Agriculture, Forestry and Wildlife Committee. Four grants involve Huron County directly, the first three going for Huron County Extension and the fourth to Huron Soil Conservation District: \$33,000 for implementation of the Farm-A-Syst program, a tool needed for farm families and other rural residents to learn basic strategies for preventing groundwater contamination. \$15,000 to demonstrate to farm producers that row production of corn, sugar beets and dry beans can be done successfully in lakebed soils of the area by reducing tillage techniques. Goal is to reduce sediment, nutrient and pesticide flow to the Bay.

\$6,000 to demonstrate controlled drainage to area landowners in an existing private ditch, to improve surface water by reducing nutrient and sediment loading into Saginaw Bay. Huron Soil Conservation District received \$29,950 to implement the Bird Water Quality Project, which is expecting a 30% reduction in sediment reaching Saginaw Bay. It would introduce several techniques to slow down soil erosion in the watershed, including reduced tillage, integrated crop management methods, farmstead and field windbreaks and wind strips. Of the four grants for Bay County, two are going directly to the county: \$60,000 to develop strategies to allow reuse of sites with environmental contamination to encourage public and private investment needed to clean sites; \$65,000 to design and implement a local database mapping system for rural planning and management. Saginaw Bay Resource Conservation Development Program. \$25,000 grant to hire a civil engineering technician to provide engineering assistance, when requested, to the 22 counties within the Saginaw Bay Watershed. Said Rep. Allen, "Huron County farmers will be able to learn new ways to prevent groundwater contamination with the aid of these grants."

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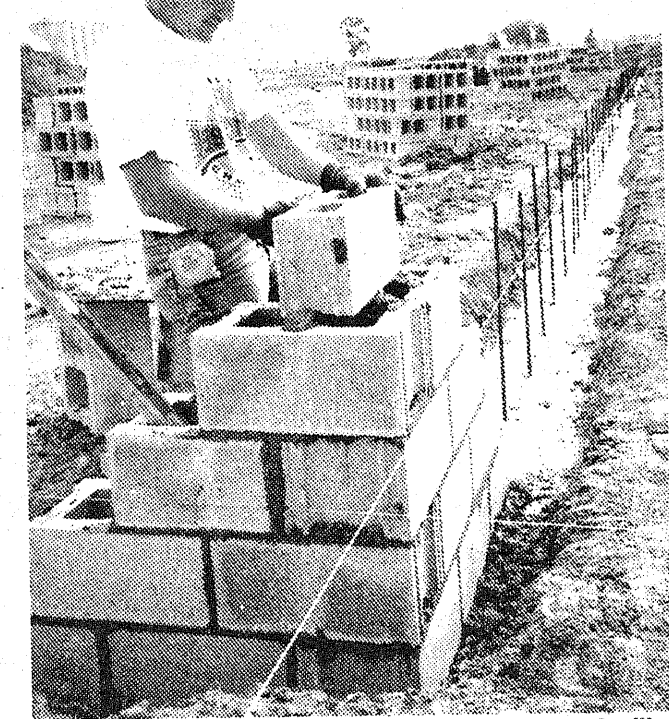
## Preliminary exam today

## It should be an interesting school year...

Michigan's Legislature threw everyone a curve ball with a little english on it, and the result promises to make this 1993-94 school year the most interesting one ever, at least.

By decisively cutting property taxes by more than two-thirds in late July, the Democratic-dominated Legislature dared Gov. John Engler to join in clearing the decks of the current property tax-based school financing system.

And Gov. Engler took up the challenge. The \$5.6 billion in school funding cuts wiped out by fast voting will actually total nearly \$7 billion when they take effect in the 1994-95 school year, next year.

And it's not that far away.

Such a far-reaching tax cut was exactly what Gov. Engler had wanted, as proof of his backing of the defeated Proposal A this past June. He gained some ground toward re-election by fulfilling his vow to cut property taxes, certainly an unfair and outdated way to nearly totally finance schools.

But now that those decks are clear, how DOES the Lansing establishment plan to fund schools? State voters have repeatedly said "no" to sales tax increases (as recently as June) and there aren't enough "sin" tax hikes on booze or cigarettes to total anywhere near the \$7 billion needed, no matter what some may promise.

A sensible solution would be a SMALL sales tax increase (perhaps 1%), a small income tax rise and moderate other increases. Property taxes weren't good... but is this any better??

■ We're into August, the eighth month of the year, and this is TUESDAY, AUG. 3, Day No. 215, which means there are 150 days left in 1993... On AUG. 3, 1492, three Spanish ships, the Nina, Pinta and Santa Maria, and a crew of 90, under the command of Christopher Columbus, "the Admiral of the Ocean Sea," sailed from Palos, Spain, headed for "Cathay." Instead of reaching China, they found the New World of America. They sailed off one-half-hour before sunrise on a Friday... Birthdays today, Singer Tony Bennett 67, and Actress Delores Del Rio 88...

■ AUG. 4, 1912, is the birthday of a Swedish architect, Raoul Gustaf Wallenberg, who became the second person in history to be voted honorary American citizenship (Winston Churchill was the first), for his role in saving 100,000 Jews from almost certain death at the hands of the Nazis during World War II. Wallenberg was arrested by Soviet troops in Budapest in 1945, and according to Tass, the Soviet press agency, he died in prison in 1947... Elizabeth, the British Queen Mother, is 93 today...

■ On AUG. 5, 1583, Sir Humphrey Gilbert, English navigator and explorer, sighted the coast of Newfoundland from his sailing ship, The Squirrel, and took possession in the name of the Queen. That act established the first English colony in North America. Gilbert was lost at sea in a storm off the Azores on his return trip to England... AUG. 5 is National Mustard Day in tribute to "the condiment of kings and the king of condiments." The Mt. Horeb (WI) Mustard Museum contains the world's largest collection of prepared mustards and mustard memorabilia... Former Astronaut Neil Armstrong, the first man to walk on the moon, was born in Wapakoneta, OH, 63 years ago...

■ The first atomic bomb ever dropped on an inhabited area, was dropped on Hiroshima, Japan, at 8:15 a.m. AUG. 6, 1945, which was 48 years ago today. The bomb killed more than 105,000 people, destroyed the city, and caused later death from injuries and radiation to 100,000 more. It was the most devastating weapon ever used in the world...

■ At 12:41 a.m. this morning SATURDAY, AUG. 7, the hemisphere will pass the Halfway Point of Summer, which will leave 46 days, 19 hours and 41 minutes before the Autumnal Equinox at 8:22 p.m. Wednesday, Sept. 22, which is the start of Autumn... On AUG. 7, 1782, General George Washington ordered the creation of a Badge of Military Merit, consisting of a purple cloth heart with silver braided edge. Only three were awarded during the Revolutionary War. The award was reinstated on the bicentennial of Washington's birthday on Feb. 22, 1932, as the Purple Heart, to recognize those wounded in action...

■ On SUNDAY, AUG. 8, the annual Burro Race will be held in Leadville, CO, sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce... Matthew A. Henson, an American black explorer and assistant to Robert E. Peary on his Arctic expeditions, was born on AUG. 8, 1866, in Charles County, MD. An orphan, Henson was cabin boy on a sailing ship, was hired as Peary's valet and accompanied him on seven expeditions. Henson and two Eskimos reached the North Pole on April 6, 1909, and Peary arrived minutes later to verify the location. Henson wrote a book on the expeditions, received the Gold Medal of the Geographical Society, and at the age of 81 was made a member of the Explorers Club of New York...

■ Three days after dropping the first atomic bomb on an inhabited area, an American B-29, named "Bock's Car," dropped the second bomb, this one on Nagasaki, Japan. The target was the Japanese city of Kokura, but because of clouds and poor visibility, the bomber headed for a secondary target, Nagasaki, where an estimated 70,000 persons were killed and half the city was destroyed... Effective at noon AUG. 9, 1974, President Richard Milhous Nixon became the first U.S. President ever to resign his office. He was succeeded by Vice-President Gerald Ford, who became the first person to serve as vice-president and as president, without having been elected to either office. # Brian Reinhardt named Trinity/Sebewaing's new youth leader

 Brian Reinhardt has taken over as Trinity United Methodist Church's youth leader, succeeding Mike Engler, who left to accept a job with the Evangelical Mennonite Church, Fort Wayne, IN., after serving since August, 1990.

Although the position is only three years old, it had been the Sebewaing church's dream project for about 12 years. The need for a youth leader and Christian education ministry was recognized under the administration of former Rev. Donald Crumm

as a long-range project. The youth leader job was conceived by Rev. Al Bamsey, who was program director of the Detroit Conference of the United Methodist Church. **That plan** was taken over by current pastor Lawrence Brooks when he took over in 1985. Money to fund the position comes from a bequest left to the church from the estate of the late Henry Gattel.

"The youth leader is a much needed program and I've happy to continue the great work that Mike has done," said Reinhardt, 33 of Sebe-

waing. "I've help Mike with a lot of his projects, but I never full understood the scope of everything he was doing and how good of a job he was doing. "He will be hard to replace and I'll try my best." **Both Reinhardt** and Rev. Brooks praised Engler's efforts and the "fantastic" job he has done with area youths not only form the Trinity United Methodist Church, but also the outreach work Engler did with youth from

other churches — and also those who weren't affiliated with any church. According to Rev. Brooks, church statistics, at least in part, are attributable to Engler's strong leadership: ■ church membership has increased about 6.3% from 287 to 305; ■ average weekly attendance increase of 13.8% from 123 to 140, plus a significant jump in contributions. Intangible, yet possibly far more important, results include:

■ the number of lives of youth and children have changed for the better through this program, Rev. Brooks noted. While Reinhardt had many things to learn about his new position, he was familiar with some of the duties from assisting Engler. Reinhardt also owns the Village Pizzeria, and has been a member of the church since 1987.

# Woods & Waters

## Baked, broiled or fried

It was one of those rare, late summer days. Saginaw Bay was like a mirror and the walleye boats surrounding Big Charity Island took on a mirage effect as they seemed to perch above, rather than on, the water. We had been fishing since early morning and towards midday — when the late summer sun was nearing its zenith — things were beginning to heat up.

And two other fellows were guests aboard the boat, which was skipped by a craggy-faced captain whose skin was the consistency of saddle leather and he had a constitution to match. He was definitely in charge and reminded us of that fact each time we would move forward to pluck one of the bouncing rods from a holder perched above the down-riggers spread across the back of the boat. Fishing had been slow that morning and we lounged near the back of the uncovered craft to shoot the breeze about anything and everything. I had been taking the usual amount of guff about the fishing hat that I was wearing.

It was a baseball type, with a long neck shield attached to the back, foreign legion style. While the hat may have looked out of place on the back of a walleye boat in

Saginaw Bay. I was perfectly comfortable in warding off the barbs as I knew that it was good sun protection for the balding pate lying beneath. None of the other three wore any headgear and each, except the leather-skinned captain, ducked beneath the tiny canopy from time to time in order to escape the blistering rays of the sun. **By mid-afternoon** one of the guests, a ruddy-faced red-head, began to show signs of heat exhaustion and the flushness of his face

matched the bright pink shade of a horrible sunburn which had crept across most parts of his exposed skin. The captain, sensing the urgency of the situation, placed him under the canopy, doused him with some water and headed the boat shoreward. Things turned out okay, but our fair-skinned fisherman spent some very uncomfortable days recovering from his "day in the sun."

**Incidents of heat stroke, sunburn and skin cancer** continue to increase each year, despite the fact we now have the best protection ever against the sun's rays. Armed with the notion that a bronzed body is a healthy body, we continue to cook our skin each summer. The truth is that golden tan is already a sign that your skin has been injured. So, what do we do? **The only way to escape** skin damage is to never go outdoors — but, until we erect a silver dome over Saginaw Bay, fishermen as well as other outdoor enthusiasts, are going to be exposed to the sun. And in order to minimize the damaging rays of the sun,

we must use some common sense and wear proper clothing — a good hat and sunglasses and use sunscreens. We can get a clue on the proper clothing by following the actions of the desert nomads. While I'm sure that hikers and fishermen in Michigan would not like to dress in turbans and long flowing black robes, making sure you wear a good hat — even with a Lawrence of Arabia-style neck drape, and a long sleeve shirt will do wonders in keeping Old Sol at bay.

**If you feel restricted** by that many clothes, at least put on the proper sunscreen before going outside. Solar radiation, the culprit that damages our skin, is divided into two parts; A and B. It has long been established that the B part of the ultraviolet spectrum is the most damaging. But recently, it has also been found that the A portion — once considered relatively harmless and responsible for that nice summer tan — is also a high suspect for cancer causing burns. Dermatologists tell us that we must use a sunscreen

with a SPF (Sun Protection Factor) of at least 15, in order to do any good. And, it must be applied one to two hours before you venture into the sun. Of course this depends on the variations of skin pigmentation you may possess. **If you want to have fun** in the sun, go ahead. Just remember some simple precautions, like the right clothes, a proper hat and some sun screen.

And, oh yes, I forgot to mention. Our brilliant House of Representatives is considering a bill that would require the application of SPF 15 sunscreen on all exposed skin. Who's going to enforce such a law? Why, "Tan Cops," of course?????????

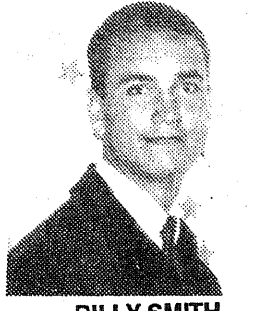

# Munch Bay Port's famous sandwiches this weekend!

It has been almost 44 years since the first Bay Port fish sandwiches were offered to the public.

In the early 1940s, Carmel Carmichael bought 150 to 200 pounds of fresh herring every day and had them shipped six days a week to Indiana, where he operated a little stand called the "Chat and Nibble Fish Sandwich Stand."

In 1949, after Henry Engelhard and two partners purchased the commercial fishing equipment of the Bay Port Fish Co., Henry told his wife Edna, "If that can be done in Indiana, we have an obligation to utilize Bay Port's fresh fish in the form of an 'Original Bay Port Fish Sandwich' and market it here."

The Bay Port Chamber of Commerce, of which Henry was an active member, was planning a July 4 Homecoming.

**He felt it** would be a perfect opportunity to introduce a new use for the product of the hometown fishing industry.

Edna shared his excitement as he wrote to Carmichael, asking him for the recipe. Carmichael wrote back saying, "I'm not much of a letter writer, but if you have a place for my wife, young grandson and me to stay, I need a vacation and would like to see your end of the operation anyway."

**Carmichael wrote** back saying, "I'm not much of a letter writer, but if you have a place for my wife, young grandson and me to stay, I need a vacation and would like to see your end of the operation anyway." "And we will operate a concession stand for you."

A few days prior to the July 4 celebration, the Carmichaels arrived.

A rough stand was erected on the midway. Fish were purchased, cleaned and packed in ice.

Edna had ordered the necessary supplies — hot dog buns, pure peanut oil, cornmeal, flour, etc.

**Customers were** lined up four deep on three sides of the stand, waiting to try this new product called the "Treat of the Fish Town of Michigan — Bay Port."

While the nearby hot dog and hamburger stands were empty of customers, everyone migrated to the "Fish Sandwich Stand" to try the original Bay Port Fish Sandwich.

**That year** they served 300 fish sandwiches, and the success of the next few Fourth of July celebrations convinced the Engelhardts to open an 8x8 foot stand on their front lawn in 1953.

With three daughters nearing college age and an obvious demand for the fish sandwiches on a more regular basis, Edna decided to sell the sandwiches from a building she erected on their front lawn.

The operation opened for business in the spring of 1953.

Once Labor Day passed and schools opened, Edna took the operation through mid-November to accommodate the sugar beet truck drivers who stopped, often daily.

Their clientele grew to include many visitors to the area from throughout Michigan, the nearby states, as well as Canada.

**By 1956** the Engelhardts built a larger stand and added fries to the menu. When the last daughter left for college, Edna's mother suffered a debilitating stroke — and in 1964, Edna immediately closed the business to care for her until she passed away.

The operation was idled until 1978, when the Bay Port Chamber of Commerce decided they needed a good

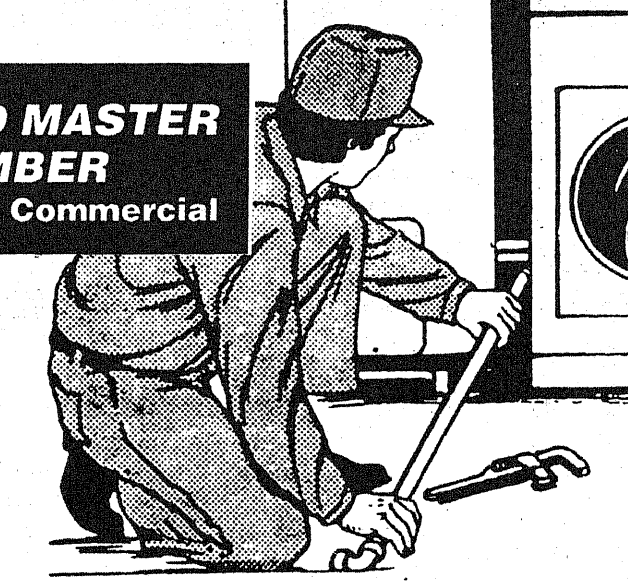

Edna Engelhard passed away suddenly on Sept. 10, 1992, and soon after that, volunteers crews worked tirelessly to complete the pavilion — which will be dedicated this Saturday in her honor during the 1993 Bay Port Fish Sandwich Festival.

The pavilion was designed by Pigeon Lumber & Supply Co., for use as a stage during the annual Festival and also as a place for local residents and families to gather.

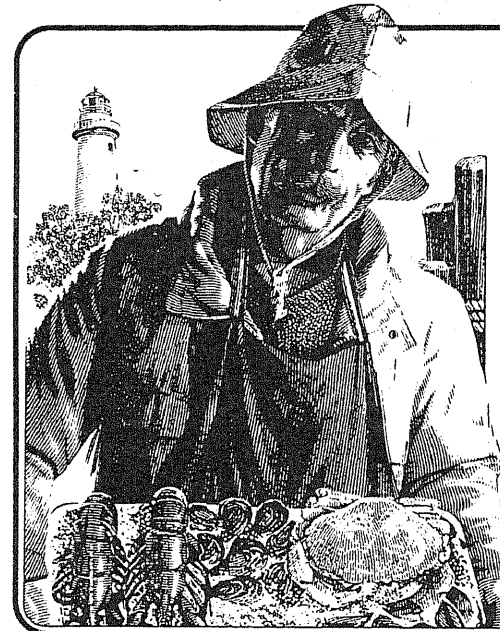
Construction on the 24x40 structure, which sits on the former Silver Dollar Saloon property purchased by the Bay Port Chamber, began in late September and is complete — with lights and all — for this weekend's Festival.

Much of the funding for the nearly-\$6,000 project came from local donations, including many businesses who donated much or all of their services in the construction process (see related advertisement), plus proceeds from last year's tractor raffle, 10% of the net profits from service organizations who participated in last year's festival and proceeds from last March's townwide Fish Fry.

# History of Edna Engelhard

Edna Engelhard's contributions to the Bay Port community will be remembered this Saturday in a special Pavilion Dedication planned after the Grand Parade at 10:30 a.m.

She was born in 1911 in Unionville and graduated from Sebawaing Public School. Following graduation from Bay City Business College, she worked as a purchasing agent and secretary for Bay City Hardware Co., traveling to new product shows in Chicago and New York City.

She married Henry Engelhard of Bay Port in 1938. Employed by the Bay Port Fish Co., her husband's job became the focus of many of her activities, as she became an expert in fish cookery.

Her gourmet fish presentations became well known as she and her husband entertained many guests in the commercial fishing industry and the media.

One guest, the late Charles Floyd, requested she come to East Lansing and prepare her fried fish to be recorded on film for distribution, promoting the utilization of fish — one of Michigan's best natural resources.

Overnight guests were of-

ten served stuffed fish for dinner and a breakfast of fried fish prepared by 5 a.m. **Three daughters** enhanced the Engelhard's lives, Carolyn, born in 1940; Mary, born in 1942 and Kathleen, born in 1944.

It was for their college education that Engelhard became involved with Bay Port Fish Sandwiches — seeing the popularity of the sandwiches made at special town-wide events encouraged her to make them a treat available regularly in a sandwich stand she made on their front lawn.

Engelhard was also an expert seamstress, sewing all her girls' clothing, even their coats. Her fancy doll clothes were always in demand at special projects at Bay Port Public School.

She was very involved with both church and civic organizations, holding the office of President of Lutheran Women's Missionary League on the local, state and zone level through their church, Immanuel Lutheran, Sebawaing.

Engelhard also taught the mentally handicapped at Immanuel for 26 years.

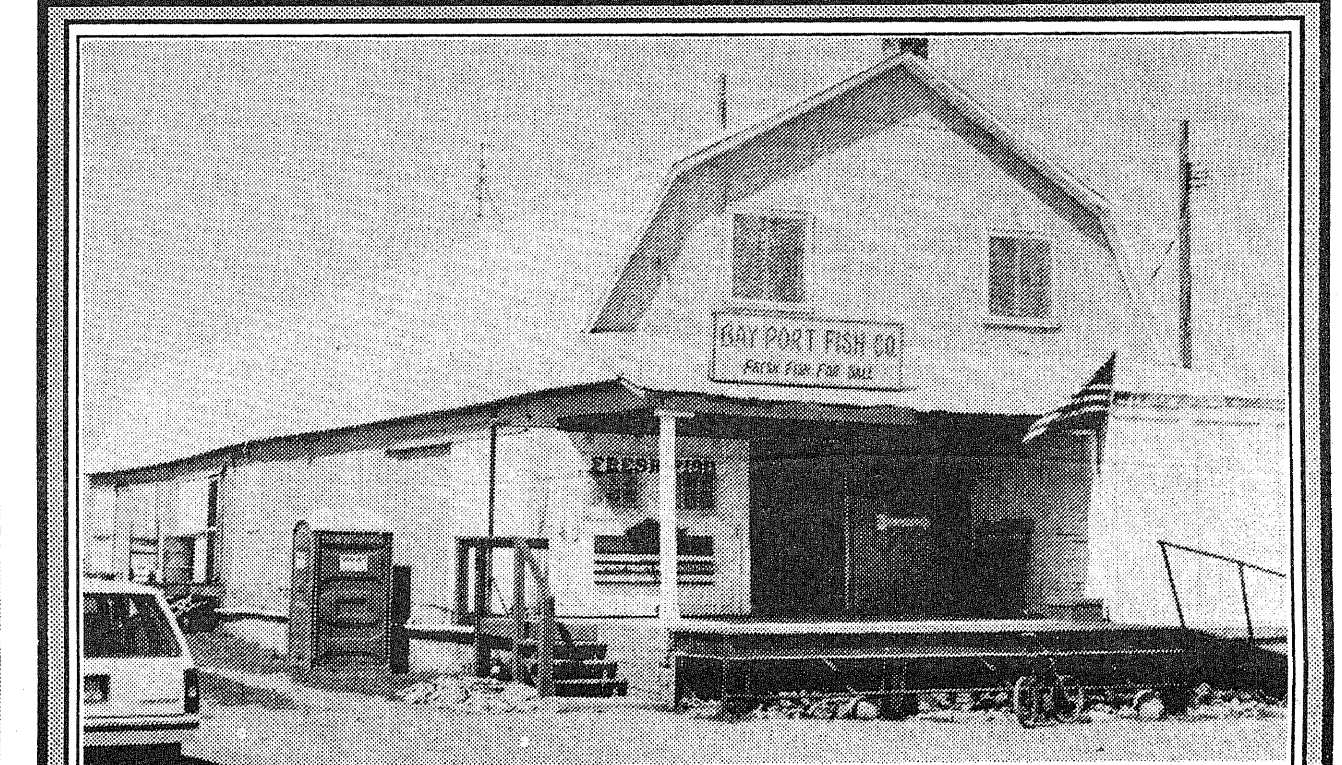
She organized the Christian Education Handicapped Association of Michigan and

wrote many articles on baptism and confirmation, which were published in "Breakthrough" magazine of Bethesda Lutheran Home, Watertown, WI.

She was active in the Bay Port Women's Club for over 20 years and was responsible for bringing the Dow Chorale Group to Bay Port in 1954.

She passed away Sept. 10, 1992 — just a month after last year's successful Bay Port Fish Sandwich Weekend.

## City kids get ready for Huron Fair, too

By AMY HEIDEN

Brian Collison may be considered a "city kid," but this summer he's turned into a farm boy.

And next week at the Huron Community Fair, he'll join the ranks of generations of farm kids who've exhibited animals at the fair.

Collison purchased two sheep, "Frank" and "Lucy" in May, with an eye towards the fair. Since then, he's had to make the half-mile trek twice a day from his home in Pigeon to the barn where Frank and Lucy are stabled to feed, water and train his animals.

"I have to get them used to noises and teach them to walk calmly," Collison says. "And walking them firms up their muscles. It's sometimes a pain to come out here when you have other things you want to do."

He'll show Frank and Lucy in their respective breed classes and Frank will be pressed into service in showmanship, because Frank is a bit easier to handle than Lucy, he says.

But after the fair is all over, the two sheep will go through the Junior Livestock Association's Auction on Thursday, Aug. 12.

And hopefully, he'll receive a high enough bid to break even on his project and replenish his bank account.

He used money from his account to purchase the sheep, but his parents, Dale and Neila Collison, helped him buy the dozen 50-lb. bags of feed the sheep have eaten this summer.

The experience in buying, raising, training and financing the upkeep of Frank and Lucy has taught young Collison valuable lessons in responsibility — and that's the whole point of any child raising and showing animals, according to advisor Donna Wheeler.

She and her husband, Laker FFA Advisor Don Wheeler, have helped numerous kids through the years with their livestock projects through FFA and 4-H, as have hundreds of volunteer parents.

Steers, feeder calves, sheep and hogs are the animals many children like to raise because of the possibility of a profit through the JLA auc-

tion, but many others are raising poultry, rabbits, judging crops, doing craft or cooking projects, or other projects.

"It teaches them a lot of responsibility," Donna Wheeler says. "They have to be responsible for purchasing the animal at the right time, keeping records, weighing the animals and training them. I think they learn a lot of poise and self-confidence."

Preparation for the fair starts months in advance, Wheeler says. Steers must be bought, reg-

istered and ear-tagged by Jan. 15, while a feeder calf should be obtained by April and sheep by May.

The animals must be taught to stand quietly while being groomed, how to walk on a lead, and kept in prime physical condition. Accurate records have to be kept on how much feed the animal consumes, its weight gain and all veterinary work.

Then a couple of weeks before the fair, the children all spend a day at the fair grounds cleaning and painting the pens.

If any parent wishes to enroll their child and has not received a mailing, information may be attained by calling 883-3730.

Parents are encouraged to pay book fees at registration. Immanuel offers a wide range of athletic opportunities for students, Cohrs says.

"It's a summer job for them," Wheeler says. "At the end of the summer, they get paid. It's a lot of fun. They wouldn't miss that week of the fair for anything."

"City" kids such as Brian Collison are able to raise and show animals if they can find a place to board them for the summer, Wheeler says.

"That's the biggest challenge. A lot of kids rent a place or they work off the rent."

Most FFA and 4-H members also compete in showmanship classes for their various breeds, where the animals conformation faults don't matter. The children are judged solely on their handling skills.

The Grand Champion from each species then competes in the Sweepstakes event, in which he or she must demonstrate versatility by handling other species.

The JLA Auction is the endpoint for all the hard work with steers, calves, sheep and hogs and many businesses support the auction by purchasing the animals.

Wheeler says that although the bidding seems to be dominated by the county's larger businesses, smaller businesses can participate by pooling funds with other business owners in their communities to help support kids from their schools.

The Huron Community Fair is set for this Sunday, Aug. 8 through Saturday, Aug. 14 at the fairgrounds just south of Bad Axe.

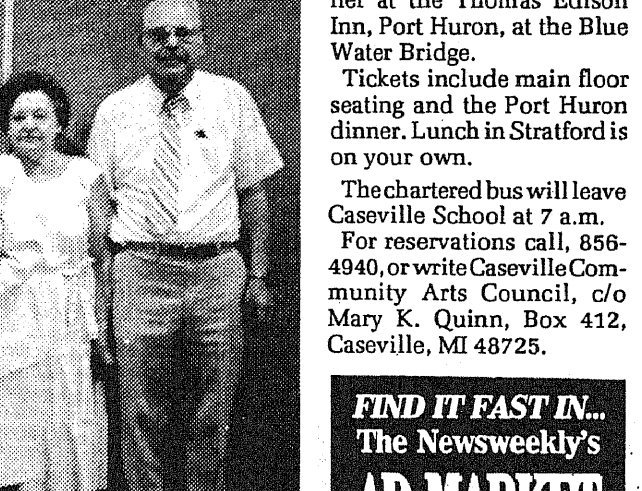

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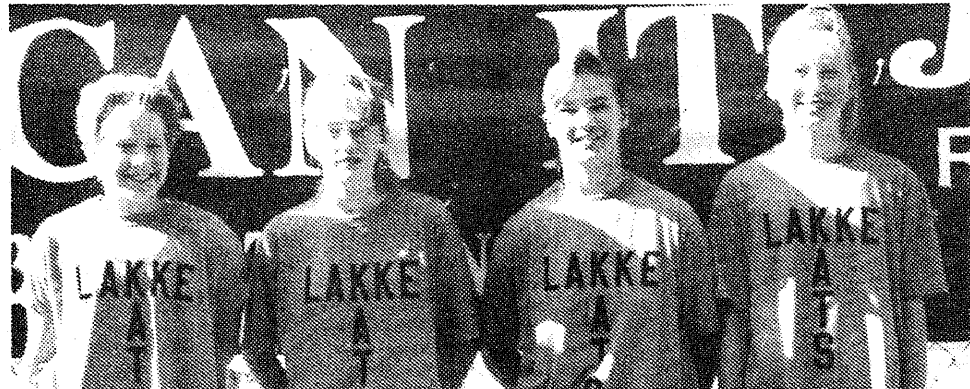

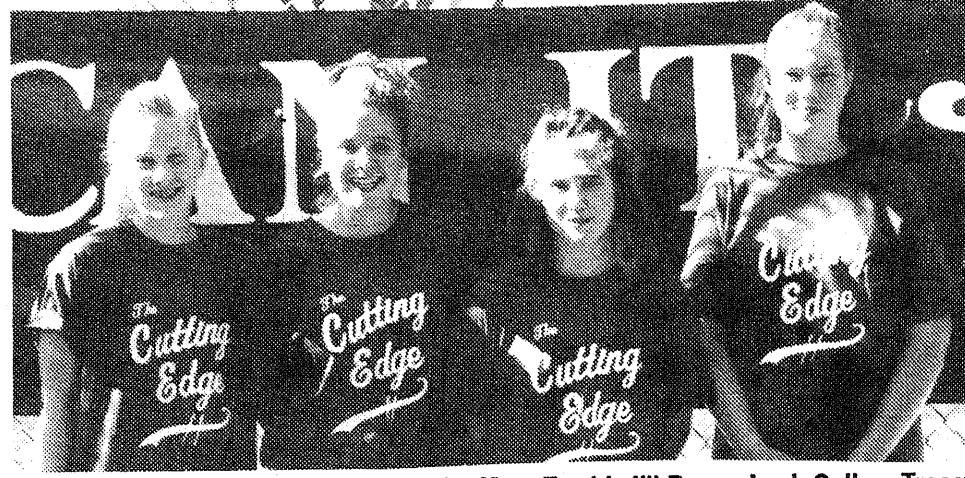

site improvement.

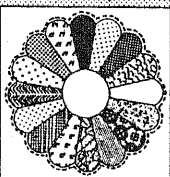
