## National survey says...

### Women lie about weight; men about everything else!

We've all got our little "secrets," some of which would make families or friends giggle... while other "little white lies" might cause more serious trouble or pain.

But a recent national questionnaire shows men and women differ when it comes to those little lies. Women tend to concentrate on fibbing about one subject, while men can't seem to stop at all.

One in two women (48%) would be most tempted to lie about their weight, while men prefer spreading their lies around, according to the national random survey of 800 men and women conducted by Redbook magazine with EDK Associates.

Men are more likely to cover up than women in several areas. For example, men are most tempted to lie about their salary than women—15% vs. 7%, their height (2% vs. 0%), and their age (8% vs. 6%).

Men save the bulk of their lying for things other than salary, height, age, weight, and money spent on clothes—they either don't know what they're going to lie about (28%) or it's something else entirely (21%).

Ironically, men and women are both equally impressed with each other as liars—when asked

who lies more, men or women or both, it's a close race for both sexes (59% men, 54% women).

Both sexes have pulled the same tricks, too—four out of 10 people (40% men, 41% women) have called in sick at work under false pretenses.

However, a higher proportion of women think men lie more (22% vs. 15%) than vice versa (15% vs. 14%).

Men are also more apt to tell their wife or girlfriend that they look good in an outfit when they really didn't think so (38% vs. 25%).

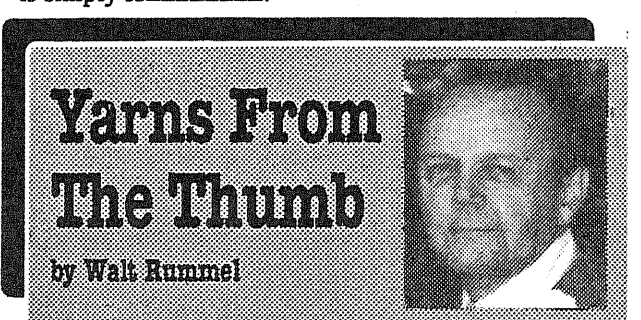
Both men and women believe it is more appropriate to lie in a personal relationship (65% men, 69% women) than at work (45% men, 42% women).

So perhaps that's hopeful, on the business front. But it doesn't say much for personal feelings. Maybe the old adage you were taught by your grandparents and parents should apply, when getting (or giving) compliments: take it all with a grain of salt.

Expect to answer for... and respond to... any and all truthful or "made-up" comments. You're likely to be caught in the middle of the created ones, and that may not be healthy for your friendship or family relations!

I realize that everyone enjoys going out and being with their friends, and that everyone gets a bit excited at the prospect of seeing a movie whose previews have piqued their interest... but it's important to remember that many other people are in the audience as well, and that once the movie has begun excited chatter should be kept to a minimum, and snacks should be enjoyed quietly and discreetly. (You see, some people are actually interested in the plot!)

I guess what I'm trying to say - in my usual over-wordy way - is simply shhhhhhhhh!

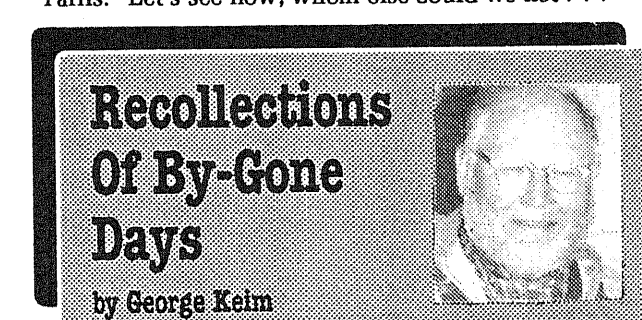

### Times are changing; USA expansion is needed

However, with this automation, new skills and techniques have been put in place. Those who have the training move on; those who don't, stand still.

In education we are always striving to teach our children what they will need after graduation. We cannot educate our children properly with the old tools. While I'm not an expert in education, common sense tells me it's time for change.

The time for change is now: interest rates are low, contractors are looking for work and the future of our children is at stake.

"Why not make USA schools such a facility? We could keep our educational facility local to serve our community."

"As the educational demands of today continue to change and increase, USA Schools have to meet these challenges of tomorrow."

"We, as the people of these communities, have a tremendous opportunity to improve the educational benefits of this district. By construction a middle school adjacent to our high school, we will help to assure the young people of our schools a better chance of success in their futures."

"A new middle school will benefit our district in several ways. New concepts like Outcome Based Education are more beneficial to students at one site. This concept, not only benefits the advanced and gifted students, but benefits all levels of education."
