



They plan to marry in February.


# 25th Anniversary

# Not Leaning Tower of Pisa, but Pigeon...



ITALY HAS NOTHING on Huron County when it comes to towers—especially the leaning kind.  
Pigeon farmer Bob Thiel, Sr. has his own leaning tower, except this one is a 70-ft. concrete silo full of corn silage for his dairy cattle.  
Built about 35 years ago, the silo started its dangerous leaning when Thiel filled it in October with silage. At first, it leaned only a few inches, but now it's about four feet off plumb.  
"I think the foundation has deteriorated from all the corn acid," Thiel said. "Either that or the Chinese were drilling for oil and hit it."  
Once the fall harvest is completed, Thiel plans to bring the silo down, and salvage the 600 tons of silage. He'll then enlarge his feed bunker for the extra silage but he says he won't replace the silo.

# Woods and Waters

## Cold camps

Simon paused and slipped behind the trunk of a giant pine tree.

It was a good place to check his backtrail and, as he had done all afternoon, he carefully searched the forest for telltale signs of the war party he had nearly run into that morning.

He was sure they had not seen him, but for safety's sake, he continued to scan the woods for any movement.

Satisfied he was not being followed, Simon descended into a tiny valley following a trickle of water that would soon become a rivulet flowing into the Ohio River.

Since the light was rapidly fading, he decided to stop for the night. Although the water looked inviting, and there was plenty of dry wood for a campfire, he knew spending the night in such a spot was not a good idea, especially with Indians around.

Moving several hundred yards up the side of the hill, Simon found a stand of three cedar trees which would provide him with the perfect camp for the evening.

Away from water and game trails, it would be unlikely anyone would pass his way.

Several whacks from his belt axe opened a tiny cavity in the middle of the drooping branches and he crawled into the nest dragging his plunder behind him.

It was dark now, and instead of using eyes, he put his ears, with their razor-sharp hearing into use.

Positioning his back against the trunk of one of the cedars he dipped into his possible bag and withdrew a couple strips of venison jerky and began to munch his supper, all the time sorting out the night sounds of the forest.

Later, with his blanket draped over his head and tucked beneath his butt and

feet, he fell asleep.

Simon, like many of the frontiersmen who had roamed their edge of the wilderness, had just made a cold camp — denying himself the comforts of a proper shelter, a hot supper and a warm campfire.

That was a part of his life and he willingly accepted it. Today, on the eve of the 1993 big game seasons held throughout our country, a few hardy nimrods will also subject themselves to a cold camp.

These hunters do not have to do it for motels, snug cabins and warm tents abound, but they choose to camp this way in order to experience a little of the glamour they associate with frontier life.

Some will go to extremes, — but with a little persua-

like the fellow my hunting buddy encountered on a Colorado elk hunt earlier this year.

This hardy individual had backpacked to the 12,000-foot level and operated out of a spike camp in pursuit of his trophy bull.

He lit no fires — smoke will give away a hunter's presence — his bed was a down-filled mummy inside a one-man bivvy sack, he breakfasted on stream water and an energy bar and lunched on a zip-locked bag of granola and dried milk, to which he added water from whichever stream was nearby.

Later in the week, my buddy spotted him with a stack of boned out elk meat he had just packed out of the valley where he had downed his bull.

He was planning on carrying it down the mountainside — but with a little persua-

tion, he agreed to load it on my friend's pack horse.

While this example may be a little extreme, plenty of hard-nosed hunters will experience some discomforts in order to have a quality deer camp, and my brother and I are a couple of those.

Although our deer camp is not as spartan as the young lad's in Colorado, we like to call it our "cold camp." It's a small shack located within 200 acres of hunting land.

Void of electricity and running water, which gives it a personality of its own, our camp resembles many found throughout Michigan.

It has a barrel stove, plywood bunks, an outhouse, gas lanterns and a gas cook stove.

The only modernization has been the switch from white gas to propane and an oak table top supported with 2 X 4's. We have found that any inconveniences have actually added a sparkle to camp life.

The long walk to the outhouse does nothing to warm up the first contact with the seat, but still is the camp's favorite.

Visiting sleepers roast on the top bunk for the old hands have slyly captured all the bottom ones.

Food prepared on a propane

stove is eaten wherever you can find a place to sit or stand, and still tastes better than the gourmet restaurant located a few miles away.

Water is stored in plastic containers and is so precious I seldom remember anyone washing their hands — except, perhaps, after one has gutted a deer. Our camp has no locks on the doors or the gate that guards the property.

There really is nothing worth stealing, except for the thousands of memories stored in the hunter's minds.

And some people even think they're not worth much. Glad I'm not one of them.....

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

# Elmer Ropp celebrates 25 hardware years

Walking into Elmer Ropp's hardware store is a little bit like walking into the past — with its squeaky wooden floor, a selection of everything from paint to baseball bats, fishing equipment to refrigerators, nails to bright red Radio Flyer wagons. Like the sign over the small office says, "We have it if we can find it." A bit of humor penned by former employe Sue Dean Gottschalk. Ropp has been the master of Thumb Hardware and Appliance Center in Elkton for the past 25 years.

It was Nov. 4, 1968, when he and partner Larry Werner purchased the hardware store from Roger Forster. Two years later, Ropp bought out Werner's interest and now runs the business with his son Dennis.

**Ropp started** his career first with Don Brown Electric, now Kretzschmer Hardware in Pigeon, working there 12 years while learning to service televisions and appliances.

He and his wife Elsie, who passed away last December, worked side-by-side to make


Thumb Hardware a success. Ropp says the best thing about his business is "it's still here" — not a small accomplishment in this age of competition from giant retailers coming to small towns.

When Ropp and Werner bought the hardware, all the merchandise including appliances was housed in one section.

In the spring of 1969, they purchased the adjoining two buildings for expansion.

And two years after purchasing the business, long-time employe Merle Eggert joined the firm as a service technician. Jane Rosenthal has been with the store for 16 years, Ropp said.

Ropp and Werner held a Grand Opening Dec. 5-7, 1968, and 25 years later, Ropp has good cause for another celebration.



**Active workers are voting**

Union workers at Active Industries were to vote Monday on a new three-year contract that calls for improved wages, no changes in medical insurance, plus other improvements.

Members of Allied Industrial Workers Local 628 at Active Industries, Inc., Elkton, voted Monday on a contract calling for 5% wage increases for each year of the contract for skilled tradesmen, and 3% raises for all other classifications in each year.

The contract also calls for increases in pensions, life insurance and disability payments. Employees would also be able to participate in self-funded 401(k) retirement plans under the new contract, and changes were made to the vacation pay policy.

If the new contract is approved by workers, it will be into effect immediately, according to union President John Bivens. "I think we have a fair and equitable contract on the table," Bivens said.

At a meeting on Saturday, workers were informed of the details of the proposed contract.

The plant employs 512 workers, including 200 who were recently called back from layoffs, and 50 newly-hired employees.


"We are checking around for a new company to pick up garbage because rates are going up and we want to see if we can find a company with lower rates," said Village Clerk Raylene Reder.
