Habitat for Humanity starts here

Eliminating poverty housing from the world by having needy and affluent people work together in a Christian Housing Ministry is the goal of Habitat for Humanity International.

It's that same goal for Huron County that has prompted the organization of a steering committee to form the Upper Thumb Chapter of Habitat for Humanity.

A group of interested individuals met last Tuesday and nominated four committee members to lead the group closer towards incorporation and the formation of a Habitat affiliate.

Presently, the state of Michigan is #2 in the U.S. in the number of Habitat affiliations with 60. Nearby, Sanilac County has had a chapter for the last two years and Port Huron and Saginaw both have active chapters.

Leading the steering committee will be Chairman Brian Reinhardt of Sebawaing, Vice Chairman Lisa DiCamillo of Pigeon, Treasurer Rev. Ellen Rutherford and Secretary Scott Richards, both of Bad Axe.

The idea of a Huron County Habitat chapter came about when Pastor Doug Leffler of the Bay Port/Hayes United Methodist Churches in Bay

Port and Pigeon felt challenged by God when he saw parents trying to raise families in the most discouraging of circumstances.

He and other local clergy discussed the possibility of helping to build houses through Habitat, and interest in forming a local group spread.

Habitat for Humanity is not a housing giveaway program, but a joint venture in which those who benefit from the housing ministry are actually involved in the work at various levels.

Each homeowner family — selected by a committee based on their level of need, will-

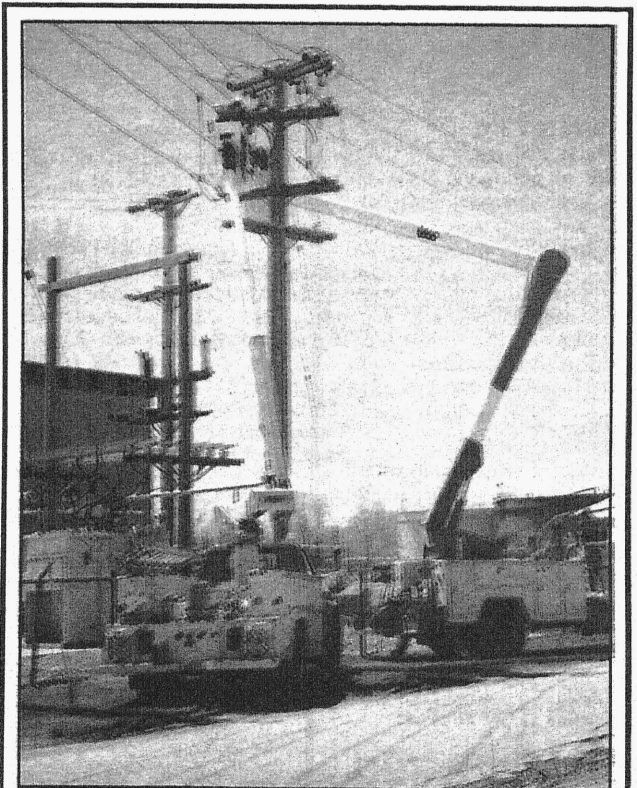
ingness to become partners and their ability to repay the loan — is required to invest "sweat equity" into the construction of their home.

Neither race nor religion is a factor in choosing the families to receive Habitat houses, according to a Habitat fact sheet.

All monies used to build Habitat houses come from private sources, so there are no "strings attached" that would violate Habitat's principals.

However, Habitat does accept funds for the acquisition of streets, utilities, land or

New circuit breakers and regulators have been installed. Foundations and walls are being constructed for a 40x50-foot addition at the plant for which two diesel generators, switch gears and other equipment will arrive in June. When the new generating equipment is in place in summer, 1995, the Plant will have a 7200-kw capacity, 2700 more kws than can be produced presently.

Emulating the forest floor

I have a friend who is planning to build his dream cabin on Kodiak Island this summer. This patch of pristine wilderness is located off the Southwestern coast of Alaska and has one of the world's largest populations of Alaskan Brown Bears.

Unfortunately, or perhaps fortunately, his cabin is lo-

located very near or ancient bear trail which is heavily used during the annual salmon spawning runs.

Rudy, the cabin's owner, will not speak with a forked tongue when he claims to have wild life in his backyard.

I have another friend who lives in Flagstaff, AZ. His new home, although located in a

housing development, also has an attraction to wildlife. Surrounded by desert and backed against the foothills of the San Francisco Peaks, this adobe abode has been carefully manicured to resemble its natural surroundings.

Last year during a visit, I sipped my morning coffee while watching mule deer

everything" that produced the manicured carpets of green grass dotting every neighborhood in America.

But whatever the reason, we are slowly but surely destroying each little bit of wilderness that remains.

I'm as guilty as the next, for my dwelling — along ringed with planted pine trees, shrubs and flowers — is still a landscaper's delight. Each parcel of vegetation is in its proper place and is a far cry from the natural look.

That's not true with my small piece of property on a northern Michigan trout stream.

This building site for our proposed retirement home has been virtually untouched by humans for the past several decades and except for the half-dozen cedar stakes marking the boundaries of a

log cabin dream, it is as natural as God could make it.

What a contrast between the land in Sebawaing and the land in Grayling.

In Sebawaing, I'm one of the 40 million people who own and use lawn mowers, burning up some 200 million gallons of gas each year and polluting to a point that emission legislation is just around the corner.

The fertilizer that I and other homeowners buy to keep our grass green is 20% of all the fertilizer manufactured. And I buy my share of the weed killers and pesticides which are sprayed on the grass, but eventually finds its way into our water supply.

My property in Grayling is quite different.

I have never moved a blade since it came into ownership. It would be hard to manipu-

late a mower through the cedar swamp bordering the river.

I would need a brush hog to clear a path through the seedlings deposited by the ginat White pines bordering the swamp. And a weed wacker would be needed to do the job on the thousands of ferns littering every square foot of open space.

Sweetwife and I like to stroll through this little bit of wilderness, sniffing at the wild violets and trilliums.

Should we ever decide to build on this piece of property, we have decided to tolerate and enjoy what nature has to offer, instead of turning this small piece of property into another "green lawn."

cavorting among the cactus. I even had the pleasure of viewing a stealthy coyote tiptoe across the red shale and disappear into the Pinion Pines.

My two friends, both excellent outdoorsmen, have chosen to live in natural surroundings: one, when he is on vacation and the other, each and every day of the year. This landscaping concept is sometimes referred to as "forest floor."

The early settlers who pushed the frontier West also lived in a forest floor environment, but they were bent on changing that as soon as it was possible.

Their cutting, burning, plowing and grubbing at the forest line soon developed a civilized landscape — voice of those despicable critters who, although provided the people with skins and meat, also competed with them for land and available food supplies.

I'm not sure if our modern suburbs were an extension of this thought pattern, or if it was our Christian upbringing giving up "dominion over

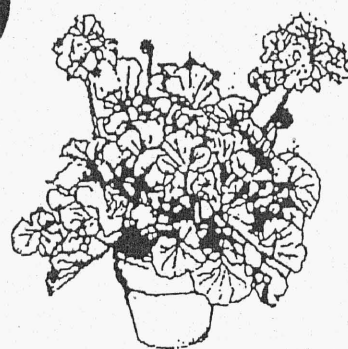
■ Researchers say that during periods of low and high tides, animals such as fish seem to lose much of their natural caution. These are referred to as Major Periods and last approximately an hour. Midway between the Major Periods there are frequently shorter peaks called Minor Periods. The inclination of the moon's orbit to the Equator also affects Solunar Periods and, in extreme cases, there is only one Major or Minor Period for the date.

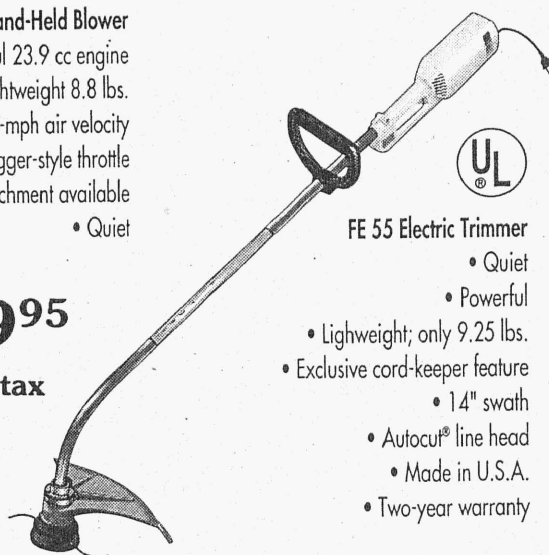

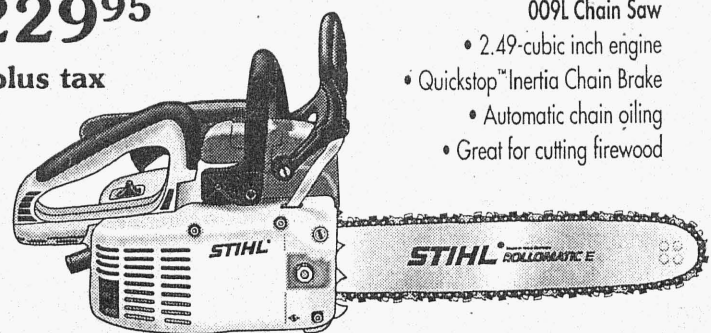

Clabuesch seeks re-election as Huron Probate Judge

Huron County Probate Judge David Clabuesch has announced his candidacy for re-election.

Judge Clabuesch has served as Huron County Probate Judge since May 1, 1987. During that time, the 44-year-old judge says he has dedicated his time to both local and state improvement of the probate court process.

At the county level, Judge Clabuesch says he is proud to have been involved in the Student Drug and Alcohol Program sponsored by Huron Substance Abuse Services

and the Kids Against Drugs (KAD) program sponsored by the Sheriff's Department. These programs have put him in contact with more than 5,000 Huron County children during the past seven years.

Judge Clabuesch also points with pride to his efforts in working with several of the local quilting guilds who have provided more than four dozen infant blankets for abused and neglected children who must be removed from inadequate homes.

"I believe the gift of a new clean blanket made and given with love, can begin the long

healing process for an abused or neglected child," he says.

Always a believer in discipline, Judge Clabuesch has continued to use the Quiet Room concept for those children who are too disorderly to be maintained in normal classrooms, and was among the first probate judges in the State to use a "tether" (electronic phone monitor) to en-

sure that court imposed curfews are maintained.

He says the true responsibility to enforce Court orders begins with the parents, and has used the approach of holding parents of disobedient children accountable in the event they fail to report the violations of their children or when they have violated court orders themselves.

Judge Clabuesch is a member of the Huron County Child Abuse and Neglect Council (CAN), serving as its president in 1988-89 and sits as a member of the local Human Services Coordinating Body and the Community Corrections Advisory Board.

Recently he was appointed as one of only two probate judges in the State to serve on the State Bar Task Force on Children.

He has been an instructor for Saginaw Valley State University, Delta College and Great Lakes Junior College. As for his plans for the future, Judge Clabuesch states

that in the past seven years he has seen the caseload in his Court expand by more than 100%, while staffing has remained virtually unchanged; thus the need for an adequately-staffed court is a must.

Finally, it is Judge Clabuesch's dream to have a local-based continuum of services delivered by the local Department of Social Services and developed through the Human Services Coordinating Body for Huron County's children at risk, and see it used in lieu of the present system of high cost residential and institutional placements, when possible.

"I love this job and I look forward to completing my present term," he says.

"I am excited about continuing my work, for it will be an honor to serve the people of Huron County into the next century."

2 hurt in Sunday accident

An 89-year-old Midland woman and another female were injured in a two-vehicle accident at 11:48 a.m. Sunday morning, at the Owendale-Sebawaing and Elkon Road intersection east of Owendale.

Belleva Rood was traveling east on Owendale Road and started turning north on Elkon Road, when her auto collided with a westbound vehicle driven by Susan Jacob, 41 of St. Clair Shores. Lois Schmidt, 63 of Roseville, was a passenger in Jacob's vehicle. Rood and Schmidt were taken by Scheurer Ambulance to Scheurer Hospital, Pigeon, and admitted in fair condition. Jacob was admitted to Huron Memorial Hospital, Bad Axe, and later released.

Huron County Sheriff's Deputies said the Jacob vehicle tried to avoid Rood's auto, skidded off, turned around and ended in the Owendale Road ditch.

The eight students who attend other schools could cost the Caseville district about \$40,000, based on an allotment of \$5,000 per student, officials say.

Lots of beet re-planting

Michigan's fickle weather is already taking a toll on the 1994 sugar beet crop. Planting started early, but weather conditions are necessitating re-planting, officials say.

"We had about 75% of the crop in on time, but then we got rained out with the last 25% going in late," said Paul Pfenninger of Monitor Sugar Company, Bay City.

"Now, we are in a re-planting situation where some of the crops that were planted early didn't emerge, and so we have got about 20% of the crop replanted this last week which will make them a little late."

So far, 70,340 acres have been planted of the 71,595 for which Monitor has contracted in 13 counties including the Thumb. That includes 6,675 acres in Tuscola County, 9,983 acres in Saginaw, 24,915 acres in Bay and none this year in Huron County.

In 1993, Tuscola had 7,081 acres, Saginaw had 9,737 acres, Bay had 24,305 and Huron had 20 acres.

"We have increased our number of acres slightly from last year," said Ina Feathers, of Monitor Sugar. "For this year, we have contracted for 71,595 acres this year and in 1993 there were 70,071 acres."

Pfenninger said he expects to see market prices about the same as last year's prices. Highest payment issued so far by the company on the 1993 crop was \$32 per ton, but Pfenninger said he expects the price will increase slightly when the August and October checks are issued.

The highest payment for the 1992 crop was \$36.02 per ton. Quality of the 1993 sugar crop was down slightly from 1992.

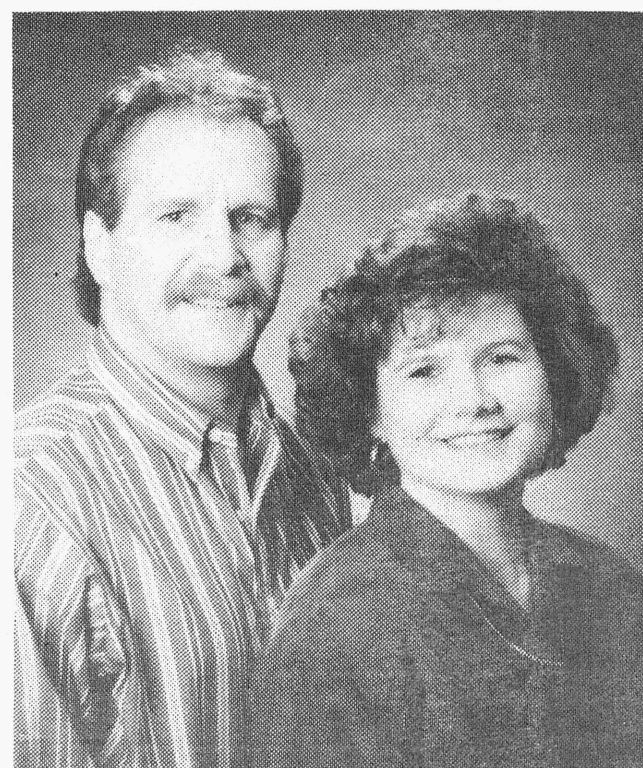

Immanuel Church considers building addition

Sketches and floor plans of a proposed 5,000-square foot addition to Immanuel Lutheran Church of Sebewaing were shown to members at a special voters' meeting Monday evening in Immanuel School Gym.

An addition has been under discussion for many years to provide the congregation with more multi-purpose and meeting space, with kitchen for handling meals for funerals and organizations, and

additional facilities for meetings and smaller worship services.

Also considered for top priority has been a plan to provide barrier-free entry into the narthex and nave from the sidewalk and parking lot.

Further, barrier-free access has been sought for the church basement where rest rooms are located.

Darrell Rievert, congregation chairman, presided over the meeting. Job Dingens, architect for Herrington and

Dingens Architects of Bad Axe, showed proposed drawings and told of various methods to achieve the needed improvements.

Basically, the 5,000-square foot addition would be located at an angle near the southwest corner of the present building.

The proposal would reduce the size of the present parking lot and would require a new pattern for entering and exiting the church.

In the discussion that fol-

lowed, it was suggested that Laborers for Christ be engaged to handle much of the construction work. Laborers are a Synod-recognized organization of experienced, retired workers capable to handle a large part of the construction.

Cost estimates were in the area of \$95-\$125 per square foot, plus fees, architectural

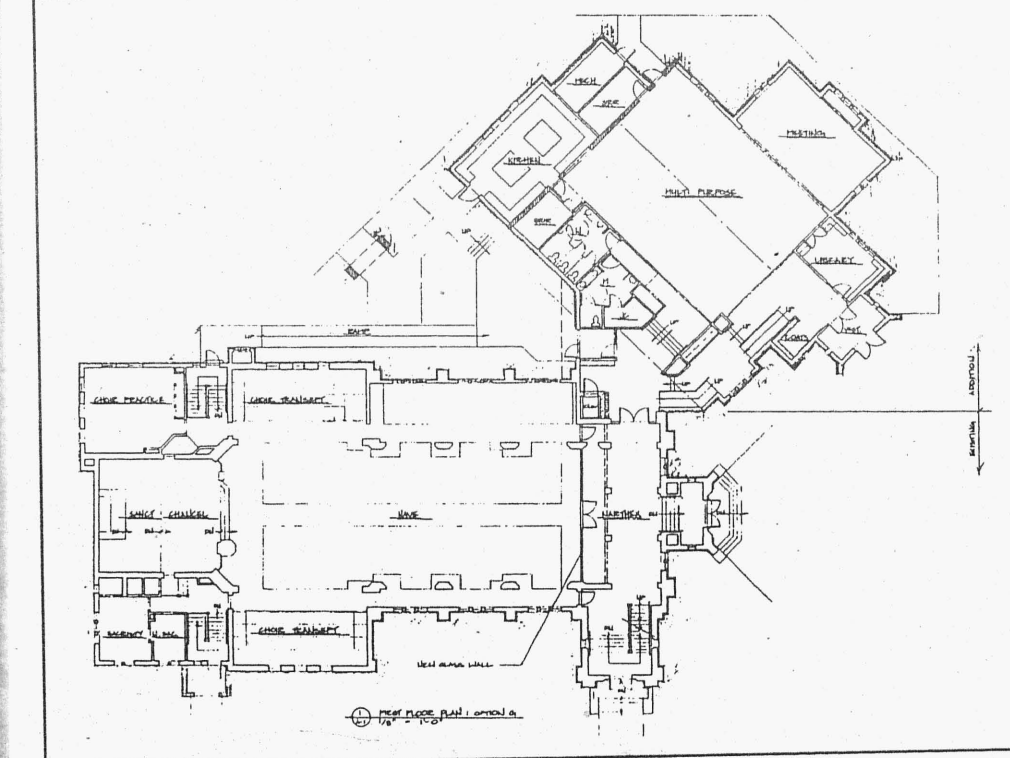
costs and site preparation placed the project at about \$750,000.

Members were urged to study the question and discuss it further in about a month, after plans have been revised and more information has been provided.

The present church's construction contract was let on

March 12, 1950, razing of the earlier frame church began March 25 and was completed in six days.

Groundbreaking was held March 26 and the cornerstone was laid on July 16. Construction required slightly more than one year, and dedication of the church took place Sept. 16, 1951, with an attendance of 4,000 persons.

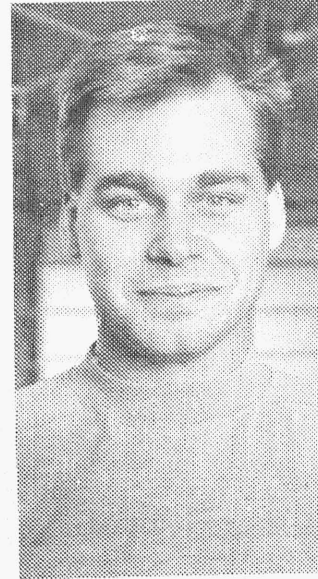

Sebawaing tax rate stable

Sebawaing Village's tax rate for the 1994-95 year will remain exactly the same as last year — 18.7387 mills — as approved at Monday evening's meeting of the town council.
In other business, Sebawaing Township Supervisor Willett Oeschger joined in Council discussion concerning a building inspector to handle permits for the village and township.
Scott Millerwise handed in his resignation as village building inspector so there would be no conflict of interest when he accepts a contract to build or remodel a project which requires a permit from him. Millerwise said he will fulfill his 30-day notification contract and that he will help out with inspections through 1994 if Council members so desire.
Oeschger told village officials the Township Board is presently handling permit applications for construction through Huron County's inspection system. He added that if the village and township bodies can create a joint plan, his board will consider utilizing that format.
For now, Council voted to designate Joseph Cilc of Caseville as inspector so he and Millerwise can work independently and give prompt consideration to applications from residents and businesses. Cilc, a registered builder, also inspects for Lake and Hume Townships.
Council was notified by the Thumb Area Consortium that three youths will be approved as Summer Youth workers. — By WALT RUMMEL

Here's Huron bridge plan

Proposed Huron County bridge construction work scheduled for this year totals about \$1.2 million and will soon make it easier to get from one side of the county to the other.
According to Huron County Road Commission Secretary/Manager John Martin, all of the projects are 95% state and federal funded.
■ Construction of a bridge on Berne Road over the Pinnbog River between Herford and Moore Roads is nearing completion. The bridge is on the border of Chandler and Oliver Townships and is about two miles north of Elkton. Proposed construction cost is \$233,000 and C. R. Hunt Construction Company of Cass City is doing the work.
■ Two narrow 'camel back' bridges on Filion Road are being replaced. One bridge is over the Pinnbog River and the other is over the Pigeon River. Work on the bridge over the Pinnbog River is underway and the other will start shortly.
■ The Pinnbog River bridge's cost, which is between Herford and Soutletown Roads, is \$280,000 and the Pigeon River bridge between Sturm and Gagelown Roads is \$299,000. They are in Chandler and McKinley Townships respectively, and C.R. Hunt Construction is contractor.
■ Work to replace the Farver Road bridge between Canboro and Kilmanagh Roads in Grant Township is underway. Replacement cost is \$180,000 and Wagner Ready-Mix Inc. of Harbor Beach is contractor.
■ Also, the replacement of the Geiger Road bridge between M-25 and Kuhl Roads is scheduled to begin in June. The project has a \$152,000 price tag and McDowell Construction of Columbiaville will do the work. The bridge is in Fair Haven Township.
■ One of the top projects slated for next year is the I-o-n-g awaited replacement of the McAlpin Road bridge between Gettel and Lange Roads, about two miles southeast of Sebawaing.
"I've got the preliminary design on my desk right now for that project," said Martin on Thursday. "It's been tough to work out a design for that bridge. We should be able to let bids on it next year." It has been closed for about five years. — By MARY DRIER

Huron road vote June 27

Instead of just complaining about the roadways, Huron County residents will have a chance in June to improve travel conditions. The Huron County Road Commission is requesting approval of two mills for five years Monday, June 27, for county-wide highway improvements.
If approved, it would be the first road millage levied by the county.
"A county-road millage is something new for us, but it is becoming more prevalent as our other revenue sources dry up or level off," said John Martin, Road Commission secretary/manager. "Our major source of road funds comes from state gas taxes and some federal money, but neither one of those sources have kept pace with inflation."
There are about 10 counties, including Tuscola, which a levy

2 local farmers teach safety

Two Western Thumb men were among fifteen volunteers who devoted their time and energy to become 4-H leaders and tractor safety teachers.

Pat Greuhn of Owendale and Dennis Fritz of Pigeon, plus several other volunteers, taught tractor safety to 76 youths in Huron, Tuscola and Sanilac Counties earlier this year. That includes 27 youths who participated in Huron, 15 in Tuscola and 34 in Sanilac.

"The 4-H Tractor Safety Course is effective due to the time and concern of the area farmers who volunteer their services," says Huron Health Department agriculture specialist Geraldine Smith.

"I like to see that the next generation is brought up right," said Greuhn, who farms about 1,600 acres. "We give them the skills to save a life and prevent an accident."

Each year, 300 children die from preventable farm injuries, and 24,000 more are seriously injured in ag-related accidents nationwide.

4-H Tractor Safety Courses are co-sponsored by the county 4-H programs and Farm Bureaus. Courses are designed to provide safety education for future and present tractor operators.

Besides Greuhn and Fritz, other volunteers include Gail Bennett, Kent Houghtaling, Les Roggenbuck, Rory Roggenbuck, Bob Tanton, Alan Innes, Randy Stone, Dennis Fritz, Randy Maschke, Warren Braun and Steve Schumacher.
