Get dialing fingers ready...

You'll have to dial 1 + the area code + the phone number for every long distance call you make, beginning Nov. 1. Currently, customers are required to dial zero or one plus only the seven-digit phone number within their own area code. That changes as of Nov. 1, telephone officials say, to include all 10-digit phone numbers. Growth in the state is quickly using up all possible three-digit phone prefixes, and having customers dial the area code for calls within that area code opens up additional number sets for new customers in the future. For example, instead of dialing 1-479-xxxx on a call to Harbor Beach as is currently done, Western Thumb callers will be required to dial 1-517-479-xxxx after Nov. 1. The change, to be announced in ads and phone bill messages, is similar to the new 810 Area Code opened this summer, relieving pressure on the 313 Area Code.

75 HC Farm Bureau years

The Huron County Farm Bureau group will celebrate its 75th anniversary on Wednesday, Aug. 31 at the Knights of Columbus Hall west of Bad Axe, with dinner served at 6:30 p.m. Caseville's Andy Nowak will provide light dinner music on his keyboard. Guest speaker will be the MSU director of the Cancer Control Project for Huron, Sanilac and Tuscola and Lenawee Counties, who will update members on the findings of the three-year study which ends Sept. 30. President Dave Armbruster will call the business meeting to order, with recognition of past presidents and county secretaries following. These policy recommendations by the Policy Development Committee will be discussed: waste management, auto insurance reform, roadside littering, education and school reform, among others.

MICHIGAN "by the numbers"

MICHIGAN COURTS OFTEN are ignored by parents (usually fathers) who are ordered to pay child support. Only 48% of custodial parents (usually mothers) received the full amount of child support ordered by judges in 1989, says Fairshare, a monitoring group. Another 26% got partial payments, while the remaining 26% received no payments at all.

Huron handbook changes

Huron County Commissioners are making revisions to the personnel handbook for Huron County Courthouse employees. Currently, the handbook's regulations only apply to non-union employees, and Commissioners want to expand the handbooks to provide regulations for all county workers. A personnel handbook has been in place for several years, but had never defined guidelines for non-union workers. Department heads will also have input in the creation of the new regulations to cover matters unique to their office. According to labor contract regulations, County Commissioners can set work rules and have the new regulations supplement the contract. The updated handbook is expected to have a section on discipline action for infractions.

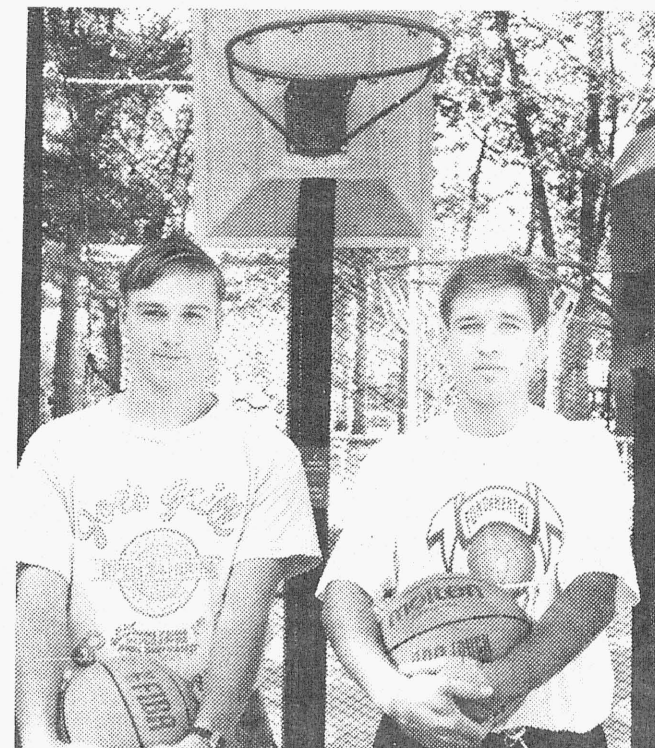

Local guys earn national Bankshot Basketball awards

At first glance, Bankshot Basketball looks to be a cinch to play. Just bank the ball off the backboard from three different spots, add up the points and call it a day.
But ask anyone who has played it, and they'll tell you it's not as easy as it looks.
Those backboards aren't built at the same angle as a normal backboard and the ball can take some strange twists and turns on its way down.
Todd Bauer and Scott Starkweather, though, have mastered the mysteries of Bankshot Basketball.
After all, they both work at the Caseville Putt-Putt Entertainment complex that Starkweather's dad Jim owns, and they have plenty of opportunities to get on the Bankshot court to shoot hoops.
They put their shooting skills to work recently at the National Bankshot Championships in Millford, Ohio — and came back with an armload of awards.
Starkweather finished on top of the teen division, while Sebawaing native Bauer

placed second in the adult division and third overall. The tournament included divisions for juniors, teens and adults.
Bankshot Basketball, which has been a popular attraction at Starkweather's Putt-Putt complex for six years, features 18 different stations, each presenting a different shooting challenge.
The player must bank the ball off the backboard and send it through the hoop. But the backboards aren't all straight.
At some, the ball must be banked from the left or right or off the top of a board that bends backwards.
Each station also has three different shooting stations, with the player getting a point for a successful basket from the yellow circle, two points from the blue circle, and three points from the red circle.
If the player makes all three baskets, he earns bonus

points, and can earn up to 10 points at each station except for the last two, which are the most difficult.
Bauer said the contest baskets were a bit different than the Caseville ones, especially the last two, which were drastically different and more difficult.
He also competed the Black Hole challenge, in which he had to put the ball through a netless rim after banking off two backboards that were spaced far apart.
He won a plaque for his shooting skills at the Black Hole, even though he wasn't successful at making the shot.

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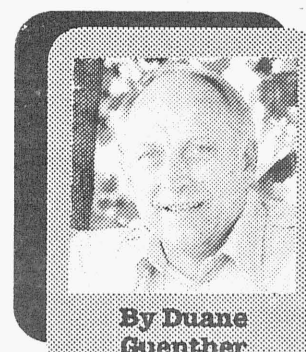

Our tax dollars at work...

Last week I had a chance to visit the Platte River Campground, which many consider to be the premier camping spot in Michigan.
The Campground is under the jurisdiction of the National Park Service and is located near the southern tip of the Sleeping Bear Dunes National Shoreline. It is about seven miles northeast of the tiny hamlet of Honor in Benzie County.
The park property was formerly called Benzie State Park and for the last 20 some

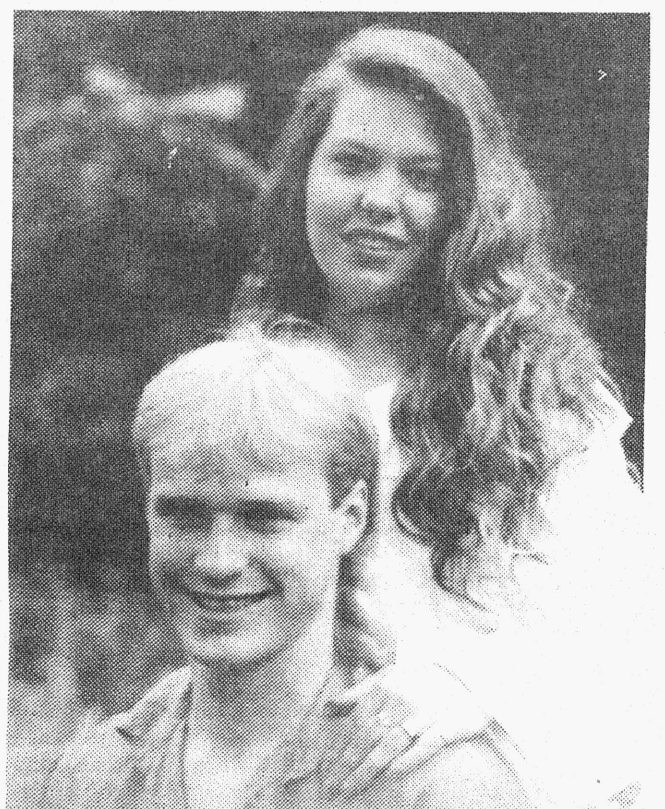
Researchers say that during periods of low and high tides, animals such as fish seem to lose much of their natural caution. These are referred to as Major Periods and last approximately an hour. Midway between the Major Periods there are frequently shorter peaks called Minor Periods. The inclination of the moon's orbit to the Equator also affects Solunar Periods and, in extreme cases, there is only one Major or Minor Period for the date.

since being deeded to the National Park Service in 1972, it has remained essentially a rustic campground.
However, that all has changed, and since its reopening in May of 1992, visitors to northwestern Michigan have been treated to an ultra-modern camping facility that still allows for a unique wilderness experience.
In forming the new park, the entire surroundings have undergone major renovations. I say major, because the final price tag was close to \$4 million.
They began by rerouting Lake Michigan Road, which ran parallel to the Platte River. In its place they created a beautiful day park complete with modern restroom facilities, covered picnic areas, a canoe launch and a fish cleaning station.
There is no fee for this portion of the park and during my stay, we found it to be very under-used.
The camping facility was moved further north and its made up of four major paved loops which vary from a high of 53 campsites in loop 4, to 24 campsites in loop 2.
Ninety-six of the campsites have electricity while 53 do not. None of the sites have individual water, but pumps are available near the restrooms.
But that's not all. There are also 25 walk-in sites that are anywhere from 50-yards, to 1.5 miles from the parking area.
And to top it off, there are five group sites which can accommodate a large number of people camping to-

gether.
The loops, walk-ins and sites are each served by one or several modern restroom facilities, with showers. While going to the bathroom is free, the showers operate with a token (worth 50¢) for three minutes of water.
While my description may sound very similar to many other parks you have visited, I can assure you that this park is different.
Each site has both a paved area for campers or RV's and a tent pad for tents. You may camp with up to six people on your site for \$15, if you choose electricity, \$10, without, and \$8 for a walk-in site.
The group sites are the best buy at \$20, and they are the only sites which you can reserve ahead of time.
Sweetwife and I thought we would have little trouble finding a site when we rolled in at 5 p.m. on a Wednesday.
Our hearts dropped a little when we spotted the CAMP-GROUND FULL sign. After entering the office and pleading with the National Park employe that we would take anything, she conveniently vacated a site which had been vacated earlier than expected. We gobbled it up.
The site, in loop 2, turned out to be a dandy.
I was impressed with the distance between sites which afforded a real camping experience in a modern setting.
Rules of the campground are that you must remain on your site, and the profusely growing natural vegetation, including wildflowers, that encircled our camping spot indicated that the rules were strictly enforced. And the best news, the campground was very, very quiet.
While Lake Michigan is about a mile from the campground, there is still plenty to do.
We took our canoe and floated that Platte River and fished in Loon Lake. One day we hiked the dunes to the lake shore and then followed the beach for better than two miles to the mouth of the Platte River.
It is perhaps one of the best life.....

Once a child has started school, there are books to guide parents with helping the child with homework, or specifically with math or learning to read.

STRESS IN YOUR CHILD'S LIFE

A trend we see today that concerns us is the tendency to teach children to read at an earlier age.

Along with this trend, is the structured learning in art, music, sports, etc. at a hectic pace. In an effort to accomplish all these things early in a child's life the pace becomes hurried and stressful.

Young children tend to see hurrying as a rejection, that their parents do not really care about them. An effective tool against hurrying is play, what was previously looked at as recreation sports, summer camp, music is not competitive.

Reading to a child who does not yet read alone can be part

of a satisfying and positive play.

Actions between child and parents promotes communication and caring without the pressure to learn letters or sounds.

Pushing a child to read too soon may result in longtime difficulties and may deprive him or her of a necessary part of childhood.

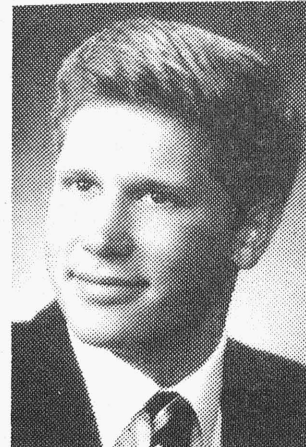

One-hundred-and-thirty Michigan hunters have been selected to participate in September elk hunts—one is from Unionville and another is from Harbor Beach.

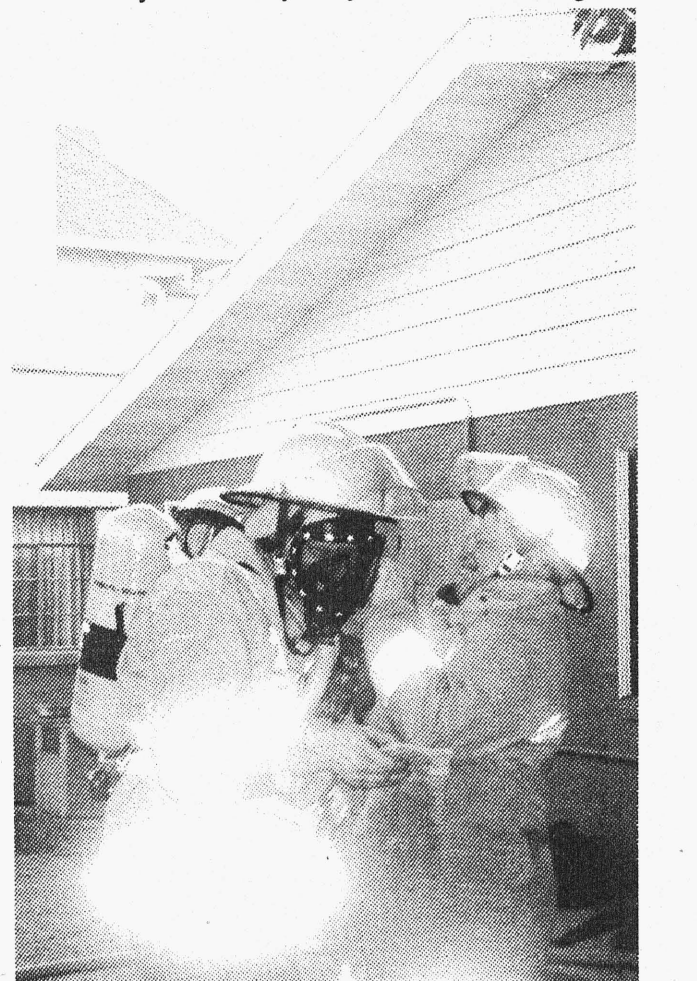
Of those selected 65 will participate in the Sept. 7-11 hunt and the remaining 65 in the Sept. 14-19 hunt.
