### 2 hunters die on bay

A family outing ended in tragedy Sunday when Saginaw Bay claimed its first two victims of the winter season.

Two family members survived the capsizing of their duck-hunting boats, but the body of one man was recovered Sunday night and his 14-year-old son's body was found Monday morning.

Huron County Sheriff's deputies received a call at 4:59 p.m. Sunday that a boat had capsized one-and-a-half miles off shore from Geiger Road north of Sebewaing.

According to police reports, one of two boats capsized while trying to return to shore about 4 p.m. After the first craft capsized, its passengers were taken aboard the 16-foot boat. Besides taking on the passengers, the second boat also was towing the overturned boat when it too capsized.

"The four victims proceeded to shore by swimming and walking. Two made it in and two did not," said Huron Sheriff's Dispatcher Karen Nieschulz.

Those who survived are Robert McClelland, 57 of Gladwin, and his son Kevin McClelland, 33 of Flushing.

However, Robert's other son, Craig McClelland, 35 of Lennon was found later and pronounced dead at 11:47 p.m. at Scheurer Hospital in Pigeon. The body of Craig's son Ryan McClelland, 14 of Lennon, was recovered about 9:30 a.m. Monday.

At the time of Sunday's accident, wind speeds were about 30 knots with gusts up to 50 knots. An area resident and two Cass City men assisted in the search and discovered the body about 50 yards off shore. Sunday was the last day of duck hunting season.

The two survivors are at Scheurer Hospital recovering from hypothermia suffered in the 38-degree water.

Besides Huron County Sheriff's deputies, U.S. Coast Guard, Sebewaing Police Department and Sebewaing Ambulance workers participated in the search.

## MICHIGAN "by the numbers"

**MANURE LEADERS:** There's probably a larger joke here (which we won't touch...) but Huron County ranks number one in manure production in Michigan, says the new Manure Marketing Directory developed by MSU Extension. This county produced 1.08 million tons annually, the directory says — but there's a good reason.

Huron also ranks first in beef production in the state, second in dairy and poultry and seventh in hog production... so all those animals "leave something behind" and we're leaders!

### Find, keep it in Caseville?

Finders, keepers? Maybe and maybe not. It depends of the value of the property, at least in the Village of Caseville.

Caseville Council, at its last meeting, approved a new found-property policy, following a controversy surrounding a returned purse found by a Caseville resident. The purse wasn't claimed and the finder felt entitled to keep the money in the purse after a 30-day period, according to Village Treasurer Shelley Stirrett.

The policy says that any found property worth less than \$100 will be returned to the finder if the owner has not claimed it within 90 days. Property estimated to cost over \$100 and not claimed within 90 days can be sold at a public sale, with the proceeds going to the village treasury.

## Huron history to meet computers

Huron County has a rich history — and some area residents are interested in preserving the past to help build the future.

The Huron Economic Development Commission hosted an informational meeting earlier this month to gauge interest in a proposed project to create a historic district study committee.

"Our interest is to preserve our heritage," Huron EDC Director Carl Osentoski says. "We have some unique and

valuable resources in our area that we want to preserve.

"For economic purposes, there is the possibility of tourism attractions that could create some excitement and educational opportunities for people in the area, throughout the state, the United States and Canada."

**Hopes are** to incorporate historic preservation as part of the county's economic future by promoting "heritage tourism." Instead of focusing on water recreation, wildlife or hunting the idea is to pro-

mote history as a tourist draw, he says.

"Tourists enjoy beauty, structural and architectural harmony, and the good life," says Dean Smith, a historian who conducted the meeting. "These things are available in Huron County to work on as tourist attractions and for our own enhancement."

Demographics harmonize with the plan and show a large portion of local residents are in the 50-plus age group.

According to a National Historic Preservation study on people's interests, 68% like to visit historic sites, 71% enjoy visiting historic homes, 64% like historic museums and 56% enjoy watching restoration in action.

"In view of this, we need to take advantage of our resources," says Smith. "Before there are too many neon signs and demolition of historic buildings, we need methods to rehabilitate them, preserve them, put them to use, conserve them and keep harmony in streetscapes.

"A coordinated effort is needed to revitalize our landmarks."

The State Bureau of History is watching Huron County's preservation efforts.

"They are enthusiastic and were excited because we are rural county. It is unusual for this large of an area and a county to be interested in preservation," says Osentoski. "They offered to help as much as they can with research and whatever we need."

There is a lot of history in Huron County.

Next step is to show support for the proposed program and get county approval to form a historic district study committee.

Proceeds from the tour will go the projects of the Heidelberg Gallery, the Sebewaing Township Library and the Sebewaing Historical Society. The home tour includes:



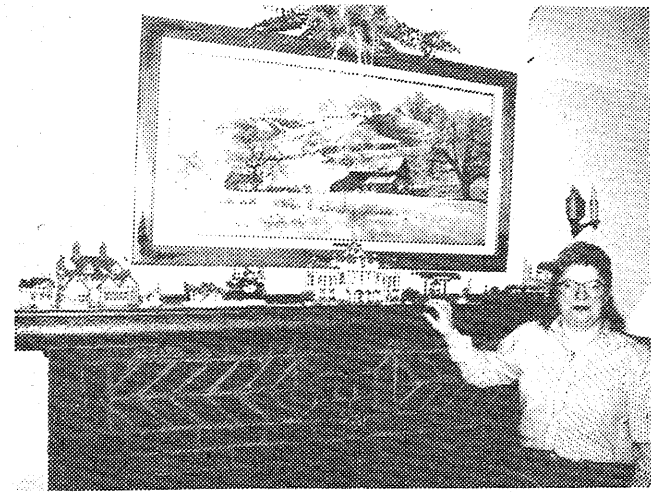

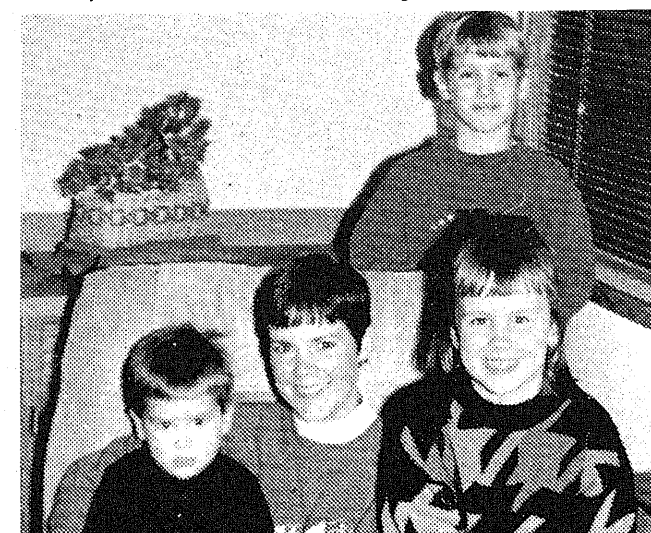

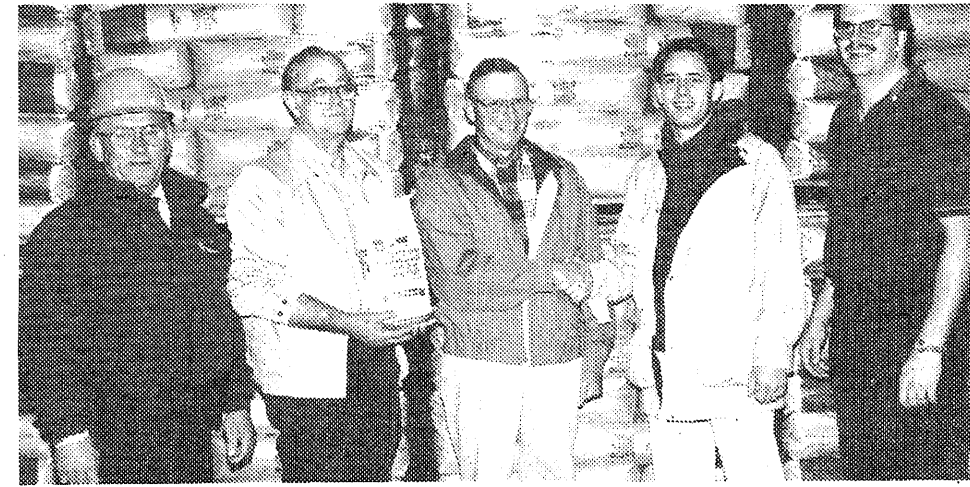

## Fire clean-up underway

Clean-up efforts are now being made, following a Nov. 13 barn fire at the John Richmond farm, on Richmond Road, Bay Port.

Winsor Township Firemen were called to the scene about 9:35 p.m. and found the barn totally engulfed. It contained hay and straw, and no damage estimate has been made.

Firemen called for assistance from Caseville, Oliver and Fair Haven Departments, and about 35 fire fighters were on the scene for nearly eight hours. No cause has been announced.

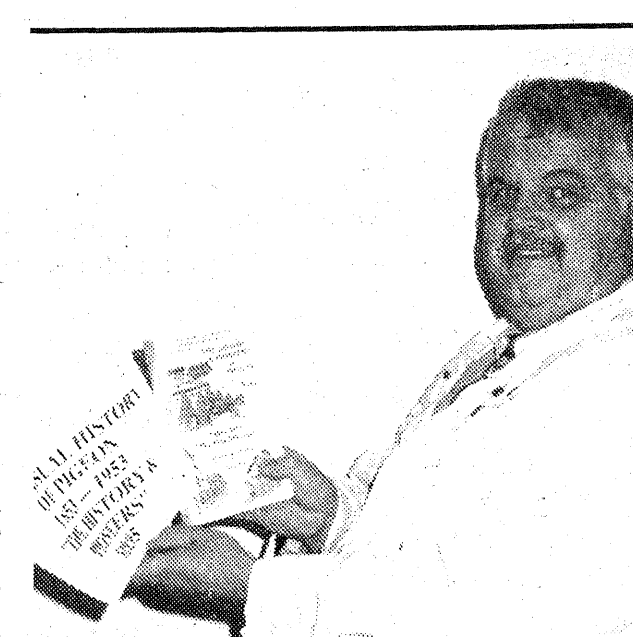

## Check-lanes not worth it...

Some folks, while well-intentioned, are at it again, unfortunately — and your liberty is once again at stake.

The Insurance Institute for Highway Safety recently issued a statement, noting the pleasant results of stepped-up enforcement of safety belt laws in North Carolina earlier this year. Reports say the institute claims 45 lives were saved in the first six months of the program, plus seat belt use rose to 80%. That's fine and commendable (although totally unprovable,) but the main point from the institute's statement is the next part of the story:

The institute said police officers conducted 967 safety-belt checkpoints during one week this past July. They ticketed 7,665 motorists without belts, and issued 619 tickets because children were not traveling in required child seats.

Officers at the check lanes also found 1,708 drivers without valid licenses, 492 drunken driving violators, 84 drug violators, 19 firearms violators, 11 fugitives from the law and 10 stolen vehicles. Institute President Brian O'Neill says the statistics show such check lanes have additional benefits. "Criminals are being apprehended at checkpoints instead of officers having to track them down," he says.

Stopping crime in any manner is commendable, of course. But the thought of check lanes located anywhere police wish, across the state — stopping EVERY motorist, period — is very scary. Police searching EVERY vehicle for ANY violation, whenever they wish. The thought should make most folks' blood boil.

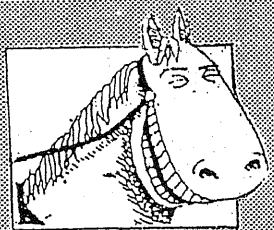
You expect such stops at international borders, such as entering or leaving Canada. You should expect such stops if you're driving erratically or if police have questions about one particular car. But simply opening a huge fish net to catch EVERY vehicle on the road, innocent and guilty alike, is unfair to the vast majority of people — the innocent.

We should not be presumed guilty... and then have to prove our innocence... any time and at any place police desire. That's why the Fourth Amendment to our U.S. Constitution prohibits unreasonable search and seizure.

Police deserve support and help of citizens. But stopping everyone is definitely unreasonable...

## Horsin' Around

## If you don't love them

Wow! I've never been accused of being ahead of my time... but in this instance, I think I may have done it. Back when our first horse came to Berne Road - almost 25 years ago - there was a short/sweet golden rule that governed the ownership and management of all horses: "you gotta show 'em who's boss."

Well, I always had a strange aversion to that fascist rule and flatly refused to employ it. It's ineffective at best, and - like the 800-lb. gorilla who "sleeps anywhere he wants," the 1200-lb. horse with the walnut sized brain is always the boss anyway! But despite the respect that their size commands, I never let fear or trepidation be the governing rule in our stable either. The philosophies I came to embrace - as I advanced in skill and knowledge - were all based on my simple love and fascination for the animal, warts and all. And so I gladly worked around the many "inconveniences" which are the sometimes stark reality of horse ownership. This uncharacteristic patience of mine may be due - in large part - to the very special character who was our first horse. His sheer beauty and magnificence was his ticket to continued adoration. I held nothing against him, because - in my heart - I felt he was what he was: a perfect and beautiful creature of God.

Well, these basic beliefs and philosophies left my sister and I sort of "on the fringe" of horse society to these many years. We seldom pursue any discipline to perfection, and only dabble in the equine sports and recreations for which our horses seem to show a natural affinity. Despite this fact, many of our friends continue to encourage us to browbeat our horses into show animals. Others believe Tex's prowess on the racetrack should have been more profitably exploited. Some wonder why we contest at such a leisurely pace when the object is speed; still others think we should at least pursue some notable achievement in the breeding and raising of horses.

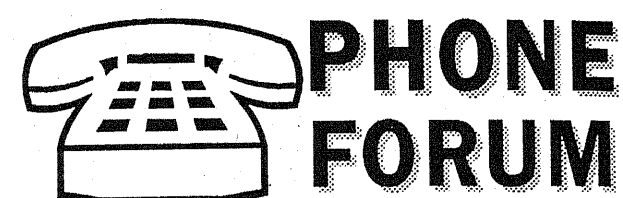
But we never felt pressured by the need to excel in any of these areas. Sure, the occasional ribbon or trophy does wonders for one's self-esteem, but for me - the sheer joy and mystery of day-to-day horse ownership has been enough. I guess I just never got over that initial awe for the creature who "flies without wings."

Now, to my amazement, a recent Christmas catalog of horse literature offers page and page of books on new-age horse philosophy. Experts and authors are churning out training manuals by the dozens, which uproot the old "show 'em who's boss" philosophy and every imaginable discipline has jumped on this new-age, holistic bandwagon! Gone for good, it would seem, are the old "tie and tether, hobble and hurry" training methods of old.

But these new approaches still lack the most basic proponent of my own lifelong formula for simple horse-handling success:

*If you don't like them, don't try them; and if you don't love them, don't buy them.*

**J.B. of Sebewaung:** What is the status of the M-24 extension and whether or not it is going to be completed in our lifetime? Thank you.

They work hard. *(I certainly agree that too few Thumb people tip. That's one big thing I've noticed in my 17 years "back" here — folks don't give waitresses enough in tips, if anything. Remember folks, they should get 15% to 20% of your total bill, for their good efforts.)*

**E. of Caseville:** To Chris of Sebewaung: you can say slow drivers are a problem, but come on, they are much less a problem than speeding drivers. And you know that's true.

**B. from Sebewaung:** It really frightens me that someone like Newt Gingrich can become Speaker of the House. God help this country when someone like that becomes a "leader." All he cares about is the Republican party, not what's good for the country.

**S. of Pigeon:** I just read figures that say taxes as a percent of our Gross National Product are only 19 percent under President Clinton, compared to 21 percent under Reagan. "It's been a lot of fun, just a lot of fun," Gaskill said. "Hopefully I haven't embarrassed anyone too much."

**When he started** announcing the play-by-play action, the press box was open to the weather and part of the concession stand, Gaskill remembers.

"If the wind was coming from the north, we really got cold," he says. He's made a few gaffes down the years, most of which shouldn't be printed, he chuckles. He remembers calling the 50-yard line, "our 50-yard line, and more than

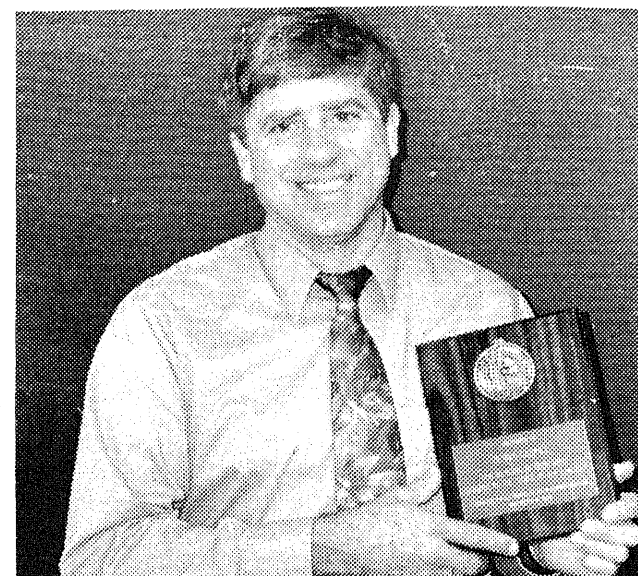
once has mispronounced names.

Laker senior Jenny Smith added two more baskets and a free throw, then Drury stepped to the line and added two charity shots to bring the Lakers back within three points.

The quarter ended with the Martians up 46-40.

With four minutes to play in the game, the Lakers trailed by only three points after a Drury bucket and two Weidman free throws.

Full court defensive pressure slowed down the Laker offense and the Lakers had to resort to fouling to regain possession of the ball.

That led to the Martians stepping to the line five times before the end of the game, and scoring five points from the charity stripe. In contrast, the Lakers went to the line only twice and scored only three points.

"This crew hung together," Beachy said. "They have more heart than anything. They're just gutsy kids. This

group has put in more time with basketball than any I've had. They've really worked."

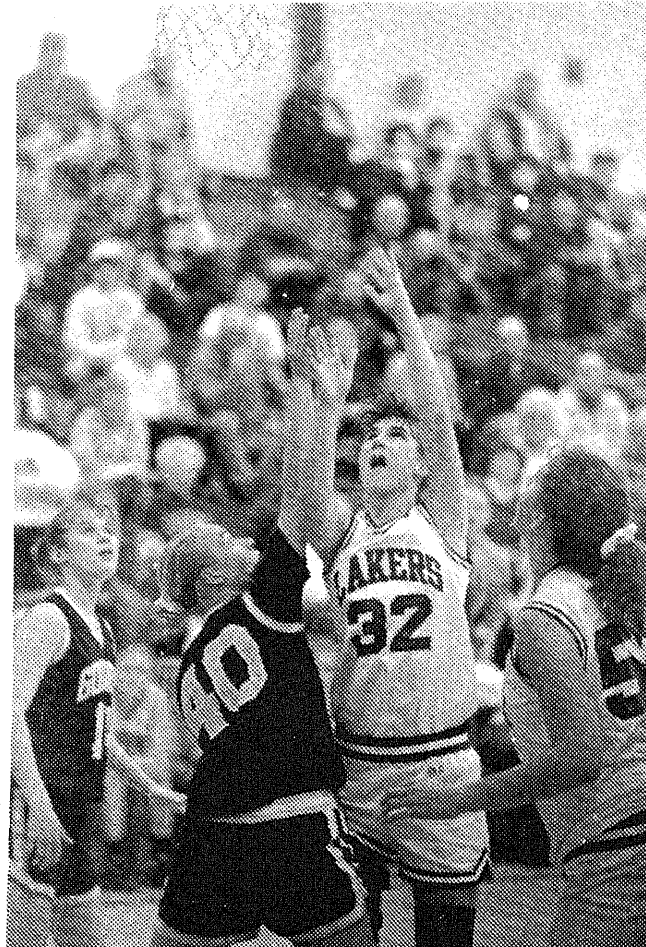

## CRP and wildlife

The field was made up of brome, bluestem and switchgrass, but it was the switchgrass that really got to me. Each step was a chore.

I wasn't close enough to the ground to bore under it like the short-hairs who hunted in front of me — instead, I bucked the waist-high tangle, goose-stepping over the matted humps.

A shout from Mike told me his German Shorthair was on point and I eased in with my over/under at port arms.

He kicked at the grass and the rooster flushed straightaway, just above the tips of the switchgrass, making a beeline for the slough at the end of the field.

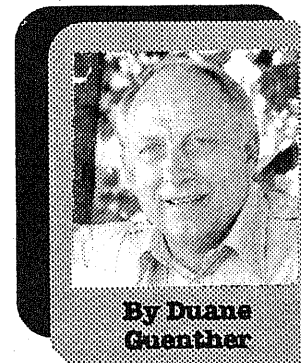
I'm always amazed when instincts take over. I honestly cannot remember shouldering the gun or sighting on the bird.

All I remember is the cock spinning head over heels when I pulled the trigger. We had a tough time finding the bird.

Switchgrass not only does a good job of hiding the bird when he's healthy, but also makes it very difficult to locate one who is wounded. But, as usual, Tyler came through and soon the satisfying weight of another cock pheasant was tugging at the shoulders of my game bag. "You can thank CRP for that rooster," Mike exclaimed, as he handed me the dead bird. "And, when you get back home, tell those congressmen from your state how important this program really is."

I had heard of CRP before, it stands for the Conservation Reserve Program, and was part of the 1985 Farm Bill. And I guess that I wasn't surprised to hear how adamant Mike was in his support of the program, since wildlife, and especially pheasants, are a benefactor of the bill.

But, I didn't really understand the big picture, until I visited the South Dakota Game, Fish and Parks Department office the next morning.

It seems that since the creation of the CRP Program farmers and ranchers in South Dakota have enrolled nearly 2.1 million acres of land. Their contracts, for which they receive an average of \$40 per acre, are for a

period of 10 years and call for the owners of the qualified land to retire it from crop production and plant it with grassy cover.

Main objective of the program is to stall crop production, thereby reducing subsidies by the government and improve soil conditions by letting the land lay fallow.

But, for sportsmen, the real boon came with tremendous increase in wildlife habitat.

In South Dakota, during the nine-year period of the bill, wildlife numbers have sky-rocketed.

Not only in pheasant production, which increased to a 25-year high just three years after the bill was implemented, but also with many other game and nongame species, such as deer, rabbits, ducks and meadowlarks.

Game officials were quick

to point out that much of the reason the wildlife has benefited is the direct connection between CRP and the habitat it provides.

While South Dakota is a good example of what the CRP program has accomplished when it comes to wildlife restoration, it is not the only state that benefits.

Neighboring states, like North Dakota, Nebraska, Iowa, and Minnesota have also experienced tremendous surges in wildlife numbers.

Nationwide, there are 37 million acres of CRP planted in wildlife cover, with more than 300,000 acres located in Michigan.

Getting a little closer to home, the Thumb Area USDA offices report almost 55,000 acres in Huron, Sanilac and Tuscola Counties.

While this land may be con-

sidered marginal by agricultural standards, it is top-quality nesting and brood-rearing habitat for birds and other forms of wildlife.

Complementing the 37 million acres is additional habitat provided by state game officials, as well as national organizations like Ducks Unlimited and Pheasants Forever. The Thumb Pheasants Forever Chapter, alone, provides nearly 2,000 acres of food and cover each year in our three-county area.

So why the big fuss over CRP?

Because the loss of CRP is entirely possible, pending the outcome of the 1995 Farm Bill.

Contracts made with individual farmers will begin to run out next year, and will be reduced to almost nonexistent numbers within 5 years.

Never before have so many farmers, sportsmen and game officials worked together to enhance wildlife habitat and hunting opportunities, not only in our local areas, but also statewide and nationwide.

Wildlife experts agree that the loss of CRP will be devastating, especially for pheasant hunting which has seen a dramatic recovery across the nation.

The time has come when farmers and sportsmen must stand together and make their position known. Talk it over with your friends, relatives and neighbors.

Call or write your Congressional delegates and make your wishes known. The extension of the Farm Bill, and thus the CRP Program, will ensure super hunting opportunities for decades to come.

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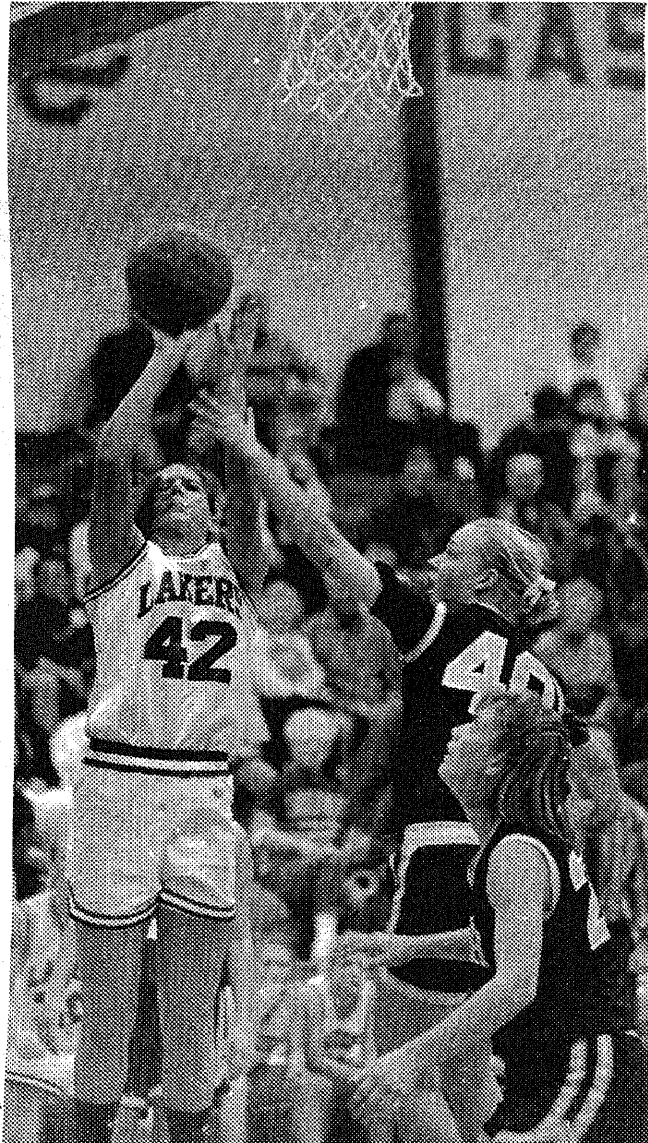

All patrol cars, fire trucks and ambulances will display red ribbons throughout the campaign to remind motorists of the consequences of drinking and driving.

State Police encourage motorists to commit to safe, sober driving, especially throughout the holiday season, and to tie a red ribbon on their vehicle in support of MADD's Red Ribbon Campaign.

Red ribbons serve as a reminder not only to the driver, but also to passersby who see the ribbons to stay sober when behind the wheel.

During last year's Thanksgiving weekend, eight of 29 traffic fatalities involved al-

cohol. During the Christmas holiday, four of the eight traffic fatalities involved alcohol, police say.

Overall in 1993, 575 of the 1,414 state fatalities involved alcohol. That equates to 40.7% of all fatal accidents involving alcohol, they say.

Statistics in 1993 show that a person was injured by a drunk driver every 26 seconds on our nation's road-

ways and two of every 5 Americans will be involved in an alcohol-related traffic crash at some point in their lives.

The Red Ribbon Campaign is about being responsible and caring enough about your family to not put them or yourself in danger, they say.
