

R. Brent Woodward was the 1995 recipient of the Liberty Bell Award from the Huron County Bar Association. Sgt. Woodward, safety education director for the Huron County Sheriff's Department, received the award last Tuesday at a luncheon held in his honor by the Bar Association.

Woodward has been employed for 30 years with the Sheriff's Department, where he began promoting safety programs in 1973 by doing a presentation on boating safety to students in schools throughout the county. He has been working exclusively on promoting safety since

In 1980, Woodward and his wife Penny, who live south of Elkton, created Safe-

tyville in the basement of their home. The Safetyville project is a scaled-down version of an entire community used to teach safety issues to children in kindergarten and first grade.

In 1990, he again worked with his wife to create another safety program called K.A.D.—Kids Against Drugs.

Woodward is involved in promoting the Bicycle Safety Program presented each year and "Do You Drink & Drive" program for 10th graders.

During the summer, he handles parade security. In his off-time, he enjoys spending time with his family, lifting weights and performing magic tricks.

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

Caseville votes 'no' twice

Voters in Caseville Township rejected a one-mill tax increase for three years last Tuesday which would have allowed the Caseville Township Fire Department to move into larger

The measure was defeated by an overwhelming margin, with 313 no votes versus 102 yes votes.

If approved, it would have allowed the Fire Department to purchase the former Brighton Metals building on M-25 to remodel for use as its base. Fire Department officials say the department suffers from a lack of storage space for its trucks and equipment.

Township Supervisor Joseph Cilc said he believed that voters felt the Brighton Metals building was too old for such a use. He said Township officials will try to come up with an

"We were trying to keep costs down by buying this building and remodeling it," Cilc said. "We thought it was the best deal for the dollar. But now we'll revitalize the committee and try

Sebewaing Village Council listened last Monday, as members of the Sebewaing Historical Society outlined reasons the Esterline Building should not be razed.

The Society presented eight major points citing the Esterline Building was a historic building, a landmark, had solid walls, solid footings, foundations and mortar, outside cracks on the front of the building were normal, and finally that the building was not in danger of falling down, during the May 15 regular Council meeting.

Why won't Japan admit wrong-doing?

Some things don't change, even after 50 years. We're at odds with one of America's largest trading partners — Japan — at this time, because they refuse to open markets fairly for many U.S. consumer and auto sales. In many ways, that's the same scenario as was found 50 years ago, at the end of World War II.

Japan at that time, of course, had been defeated by the Allies. Some of the American guidelines set up to help revitalize that land set the stage for the amazing growth and development Japan enjoyed in the 1960s and still does today.

But, the Japanese government refuses to apologize for the millions of lives lost and property destroyed, due to their beginning of — and participation in — World War II. And it's a crime today, 50 years later.

Dr. Ken Yuasa, a 78-year-old Japanese doctor who performed fatal experiments on Chinese prisoners, said last week he is outraged and saddened at his nation's reluctance to apologize for its World War II actions.

Under orders, he and other surgeons routinely performed amputations, removed organs and practice heart injections on Chinese prisoners, he told the Associated Press.

A current resolution in the Japanese Parliament would offer an apology for Japan's invasions of its Asian neighbors, and label them wartime aggression. That resolution is opposed by conservative lawmakers.

Dr. Yuasa and other veterans say Japan's debate about its wartime actions differs sharply from historic truth. "During the war, we committed atrocities as a group," Yoshio Shinozuka agrees. "We were told these were the orders of the emperor. After the war, we came to see these acts in a different light."

We have no goal of bashing Japan as a nation or its citizens as human beings. But these men see something very clearly — and correctly — that their government would rather avoid. They see the need for repentance and apology as part of a healing process, still very real, even 50 years

Why can't the Japanese leaders see this? Do they believe they can forget the war really happened, if they don't face up to it? If so, that's the same attitude their international traders take. And, besides being immoral, it's wrong... and a crime.

They wanted us to buy Liberty Bonds. I had started to school that fall and there were a lot of kids who couldn't speak English. Well, I could speak English, but I could also speak German and teachers didn't like it.

Once there was a picture in the hall of the school of a German submarine sinking a ship and we kids were looking at it. The teacher came along and said "You little Dutchman." Well, she didn't know that a German isn't a

Once the teacher took us all up to the Depot to see some of the boys going to the Army and on the way back to school, she sent some girls to get some cookies. Well, they either didn't get enough or somebody got more than their

share, because there weren't enough to go around. Anyhow, about five or six of us didn't get any. The teacher said we boys were bigenough to go without. She also told us if we lose the

war, the Kaiser was going to

Then one day a kid came to school and said they had a cousin in the Army. The teacher made a fuss over him and another kid came to school and said they had an uncle in the Army and the teacher also made a fuss over

Well, soon I came to school and said I had a brother in the Army and the teacher said, 'Oh, well."

If you bught a sack of flour you had to buy a lot of oatmeal or other substitutes and sugar was very hard to get — so was coal. My Dad worked in the quarry and he could get coal there. Every once in awhile he went up there and got some, but a lot of people had to cut their shade trees down

Then the Spanish Flu came around and a lot of boys died in the training camps. So many were sick and died around here that they couldn't have a funeral.

I know of one many who died and they did his funeral sermon six weeks after he was buried.

Well, the Bible says there will be wars and rumors of war and earth quakes and storms in diverse places of the earth, but the end is not

But every time you hear about these bombings and storms, we who are Christians know the age is soon to end. But if we are right with God, it can't come too soon.

The tragedy which occurred there a month ago turned our nation's attention, not for the first time, to scary subjects like terrorism, oppression, government interference and militant

And over and over (and I do mean over) I keep hearing the same recurring complaints about our government. Evil reports about sinister activities going on in Washington. Tales recounted in serious, hushed tones as if the "government" is some all-knowing alien life force and "Washington" the central command post for the cyborgs who serve it.

Well, what exactly is a "government?" Unless I misunderstood Mr. LePage back in 11th grade, it is a governing body comprised of people, not machines or demons or space aliens, but human beings that WE "duly elect" based on our wellinformed votes. And Washington? It is not a chamber for ghouls and goblins. It's simply the place the people WE voted for go to do the things we sent them to do.

And that's as plain as it can be said. The oppressive laws and regulations that millions feel are tearing away at the fabric of our nation's democracy are passed by the very fundamental cesses of democracy.

Leaders and lawmakers simply cannot be in Washington unless the ballots say you wanted them there. They cannot pass any laws or formulate any new agencies unless the majority of the American people said they should be there, passing and formulating.

So who is the big, scary enemy? Anyone who advocates taking up arms as opposed to getting together with community members and leaders to formulate a sensible new plan of action. Anyone who condones terrorism as opposed to writing-in candidates they feel are better qualified.

In short, anyone who feels covert bombings are superior to campaigning for politicians they believe in, writing to senators and congressmen to lobby for important issues, or, God forbid, running for office themselves.

For if they did, they would soon find that the issues they think are so black and white are actually made of solid gray. After all, for every discontinued subsidy "this person" cheers for, "that person" loses their livelihood. For every discontinued regulation "you" feel is oppressive, "I" suffer from unleashed dishonesty. For every new law "they" think is long past due, "they" now suffer greater loss of personal freedom. All of this is not to say that the serious concerns being voiced about our current state of government are unfounded,

The things I am hearing and seeing and reading are all consistent. Most everyone agrees there is too much government, too much regulation, too much taxation, too much interference. But we are not powerless. We are not voiceless. We are not choiceless.

So when the issues that are bothering you find themselves on the ballot, or when lawmakers and government officials you think are evil come back up for re-election, remember: you HAVE a weapon. Pick it up and use it! Rock the Vote-
