## USA's Achenbach is state champ!

 "Saving the best for last" may well be the new motto for USA High School's track star Christie Achenbach.

After spending a track season where she lost to Valley Lutheran's Bethany Brewster each time they met, Achenbach saved her best for the State Final Track Meet this past week at Bay City Western High School in Auburn.

The 1600 meter race promised to be filled with all kinds of excitement as it pitted Suttons Bay's Traci Knudsen, last year's state champ who was picked all year to repeat her crown against Achenbach and Brewster.

However, by the second lap it was obvious that Knudsen was going to have trouble as the race turned into a two-girl affair.

**Achenbach had** jumped into the lead and made a slick move in the third lap that put her in front of the dangerous Brewster. With a 100 meters to go the race turned into a sprint with Achenbach leading Brewster by a step.

While most track nuts felt it was going to be a repeat of other races, and at any moment Brewster would kick in the after-burners, Achenbach,

had other ideas.

Calling on her body to give it just a little more, Achenbach held on for the win, the State Championship and a

new USA school record with a fine 5:05.06.

To show just how close the race really was, Brewster was clocked at 5:05.33 for a dif-

ference of .27 of a second.

**Achenbach and Brewster** met again in the 3200 meter run where Brewster got even

## Area Rotarians raise funds for Oklahoma City

Four Western Thumb Rotary Clubs have conveyed their feelings about the recent bomb disaster to Okla-

homa City Rotary District Governor Frank Angier.

"The area clubs were saddened by the Oklahoma City disaster," the letter stated,

"and appalled to hear the Thumb was linked to this terrible event."

In a project spearheaded by Tom Kreh of the Sebewaing

Rotary Club, local Rotary Clubs—including Caro, Cass City, Pigeon and Sebewaing—banded together to raise money to help the victims of

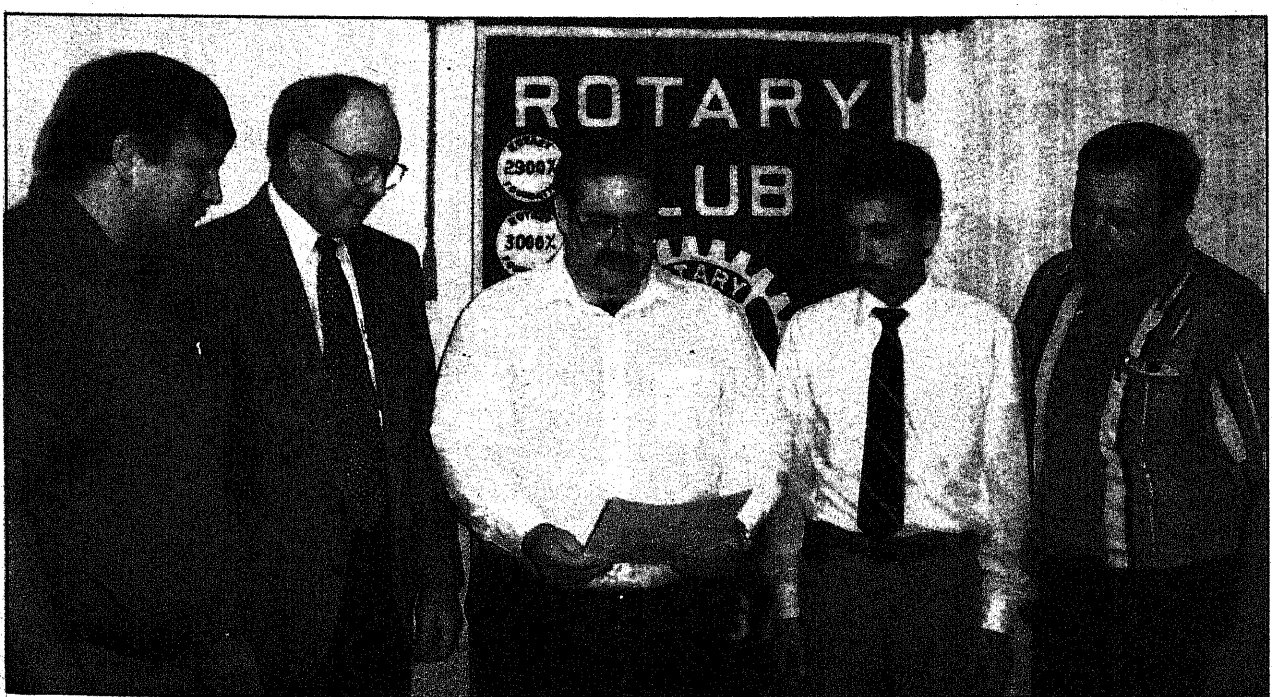
the Oklahoma City bombing disaster.

"The Thumb has received so much negative publicity surrounding the bombing," says Sebewaing Rotary President Brian Reinhardt, "we decided to do something good."

The four clubs, through different in-house methods, raised \$1,455 which was sent to the Rotary Relief Fund.

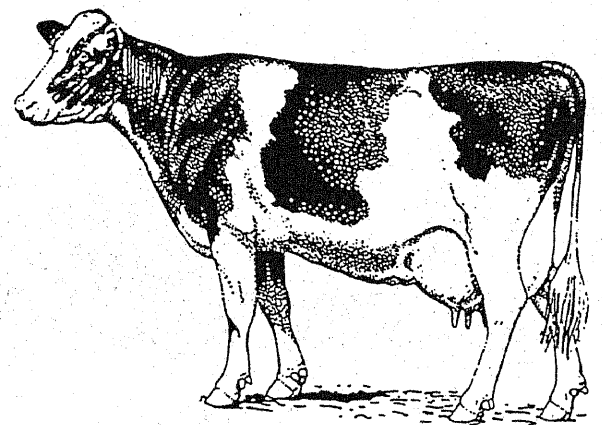
The funds are to be used as Oklahoma City Rotarians see fit, in helping the victims there.

## Ministry of the Word makes donation

Last week more than 200 boxes of surplus used clothing were delivered to the Country Kitchen, a charitable institution in Chattanooga, Tenn., by the Ministry of the Word members.

The clothing will be given to the homeless and needy in the Chattanooga area, organizers say.

Ministry of the Word, based in Unionville, has been giving away used clothing in their Unionville storefront for 14 years.

"In the past, the surplus has been hauled to Mexico and given to the poor there," says Betty Martinez, the Ministry's missionary to Mexico.

"But recently the Mexican government has curtailed the entrance of used clothing until it is possible to cross the border with only a few boxes at a time. Last year, we hauled about 500 boxes to Chattanooga and about 100 boxes to Mexico."

Clothing room manager Patricia Scott says that there is still a large selection of clothing in the storefront in Unionville.

"These clothes are not only for the down and out, but also for the working people who need a boost to their budget. There are no forms to fill out and no questions asked. Just come in and browse."

The only stipulation, Scott said, is that people take only what they can use and that they do not take them to sell.

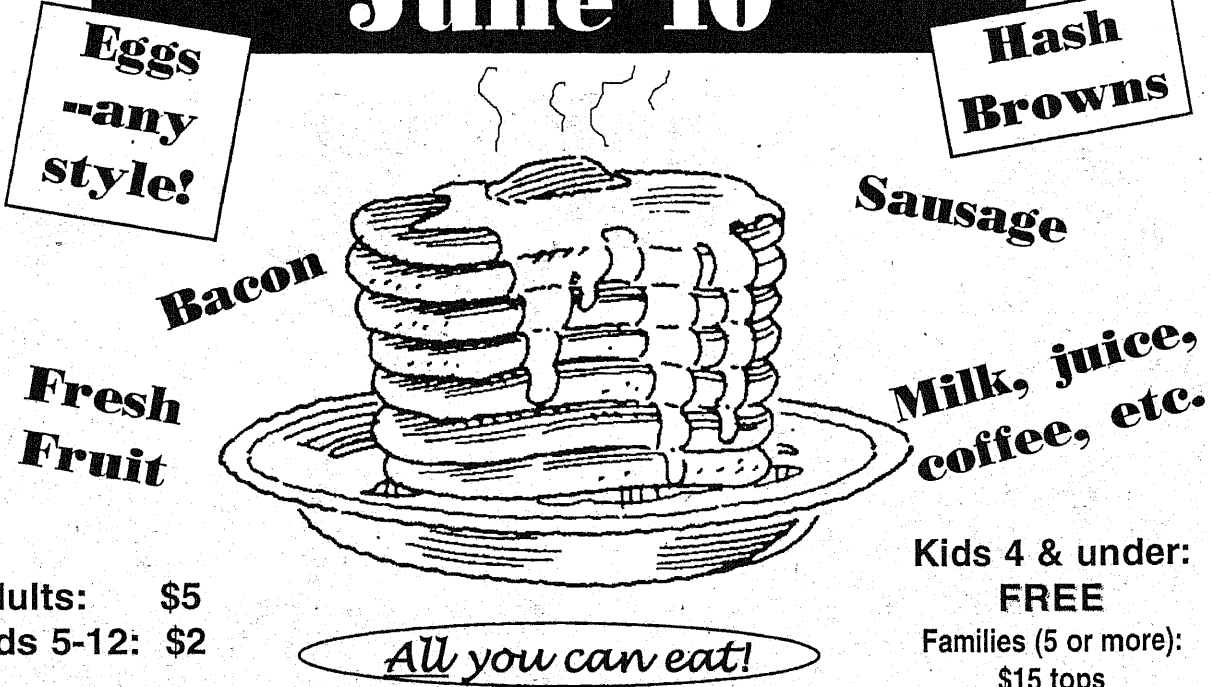

## Moravian Church celebrates 125 years

The Unionville Moravian Church will celebrate its 125th anniversary this Sunday, June 11.

Special services are planned to commemorate the legal organization of the church on June 14, 1870 under founding pastor Rev. E.C. Regennas of Nazareth, PA.

Sunday's festivities will include regular worship at 9:15 a.m. with social time following. At 10:30 a.m. children of the church will share some highlights from their Sunday School year.

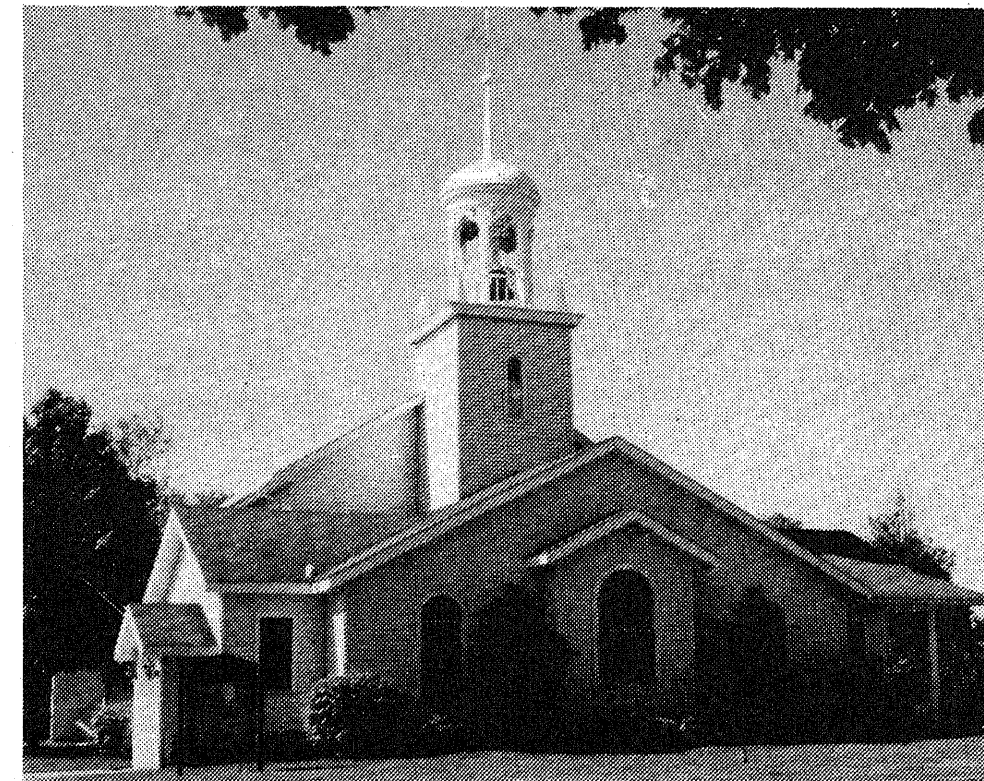
A potluck meal is planned for 11:30 a.m. followed by an afternoon Love Feast, a traditional Moravian celebration, planned for 1:30 p.m.

Guest speaker for all of the day's events will be Rev. Burke Johnson, President of the Western District Executive Board of the Moravian Church.

Special artwork depicting the church's history has been commissioned and is available for a nominal cost. Sweatshirts and t-shirts have also been designed to commemorate the occasion.

The original church and parsonage combination was dedicated on Oct. 6, 1870. This soon proved too small and a new church was constructed and dedicated Aug. 18, 1872.

The following year, membership reached 60 and continued to grow. In 1929 this building was remodeled and

a basement added. In 1962 a Christian Education addition was built and a narthex addition in 1982, giving the congregation its present house of worship.

All worship services were conducted in the German language until January, 1918, when the church council voted to begin the introduc-

tion of English into Sunday morning services.

With the gradual acceptance of English, the 1927 church council approved English services every Sunday. The following year women were given the right to vote in council meetings.

Throughout 125 years of the coming and passing of dedicated communicants and the

accounts of their efforts and accomplishments, members say some constants still remain - a strong and steadfast belief in the Triune God, a desire to serve God through thought and deed, and adherence to the Moravian motto which states "In essentials, Unity; In nonessentials, Liberty; In all things, LOVE."

## Court affirms intercounty drain decision

Robert Jahr and William Jahr of Sebawaing, father and son owners of farm property along the State Intercounty Drain on Caro Road, southeast of Sebawaing, were notified last week that the State Court of Appeals had affirmed Huron County Circuit

Judge Richard Knoblock's decision—and ruled in their favor in their long-running lawsuit.

The Jahrs' attorney, Peter B. Capling of Bad Axe, had presented oral arguments in Lansing in October, 1994. He was notified by the appeals court last week that it had affirmed

the ruling of Huron County Circuit Court Judge Knoblock.

The case began in 1985 when a group of Tuscola County farmers petitioned for a clean-out of a portion of the State Intercounty Drain to reduce the danger of summer flooding from rains. There followed a hearing, and awarding a contract to an excavating firm.

The firm however, decided to default its bond, saying it had bid too low. After that the Drainage Board for the State Intercounty Drain of Huron and Tuscola Counties, convened a second hearing of necessity.

There the board determined that work "beyond the scope of the original petition" was needed and prepared to contract for the greatly-larger project which, it decided, was needed.

The Jahrs then sued the Board asking that the project not be permitted. They retained Capling as their attorney.

He claimed before Judge Knoblock that the Drainage Board had no right to call the second hearing and that the Board's proposal exceeded the scope of its authority.

Judge Knoblock agreed that the Board proposed work beyond the original petition and that it lacked authority to convene a second hearing without a new petition from landowners.

The Intercounty Board, however, decided that the drain was necessary and it was therefore free to develop any "solution it deemed suitable in scope and procedure," and it carried its appeal to the Michigan Court.

said that Bucholz was a passenger in a car driven by Stacy McCreedy, 16, who was treated and released from Scheurer Hospital.

Police reports say the McCreedy vehicle was eastbound on Filion Road when it swerved to miss a vehicle driven by Elizabeth Greene which was backing out of a private driveway. Greene's vehicle struck McCreedy's car, which then hit a culvert and flipped over at least three times, the dispatcher said.

Greene and her passengers, Nicole Leipprandt, 15, and Devon Jurczak, 15, and were not injured in the accident.

Bucholz was transported to Scheurer Hospital where she was pronounced dead on arrival. The Elkton Ambulance and Scherer Ambulance responded to the accident, and the Huron County Sheriff's Department is handling the investigation.

Alcohol was not a factor in the accident, the dispatcher said. McCreedy, Bucholz and Greene were wearing seat belts, while Jurczak and Leipprandt were not.

## Laker School Board, renewal vote is Monday

Next Monday, voters in the Laker School District will be asked to renew a five-year 18-mill tax on non-homestead and non-agricultural property.

Two incumbents, Virginia Leipprandt and James Clabuesch, are also seeking to return to their Board of Education seats.

While such a millage request isn't unusual, it's important that voters understand what will happen to the district's finances if the renewal is turned down, says Laker Supt. Robert Drury.

The 18-mill renewal applies only to commercial and business property and vacation homes that are not claimed as primary residences. It does not apply to primary homes and property used for agricultural purposes.

Proposal A's passage a year ago mandated that six mills are automatically levied on homestead and agricultural properties. But non-homestead and non-ag properties would be taxed at the 18-mill rate.

But the new funding measure added a wrinkle to taxing plans: if local residents turned thumbs down on an 18-mill renewal, even though it didn't apply to their properties, the state would shave money from the district's share of state funding. For every dollar lost from turning down the 18-mill measure, a school district would also lose a dollar of state funding.

Right now, the Laker district has some \$62.8 million in taxable State Equalized Value for commercial and industrial properties. That SEV, taxed at 18 mills, generates \$1.13 million for the district. So if local voters nix the 18-mill renewal, Drury says, the district stands to lose over \$2.2 million — the local revenue and the state's share.

In contrast, homestead and agricultural property in the district has an SEV of over \$138.9 million, taxed at six mills. "This is a renewal of tax that is already being paid," Drury said. "All districts must carry it. Everybody gets to vote on it but it doesn't affect the average homeowner. Our concern is to get people out to vote on it."

# Can you help find them?

Our good friend, Sebewaing native Elmer Krauss of Florida and Sebewaing, faxed us an article last week from the May 14 Tampa Tribune.

It was a column by Edwin A. Roberts, Jr., titled "Family Photos Dusted Off for Mother's Day."

The column opened with Roberts writing, "Frederica Karl was 16 years old when, after journeying alone from the Loire Valley (in France) to the village of Sebewaing at the top of Michigan's 'Thumb', she went to work on a farm in sugar beet country."

Naturally, that reference caught Krauss' eye, but the article had much more to relate. The year was 1857 and that woman, the Roberts column went on, was his great-grandmother. She married Eustace Bachmann, and for a while both newlyweds worked in the fields.

Following "troubles on the farm" they took up residence in New York City, where he became a building custodian. The columnist said he expects there are other members of the Karl family in Tampa — Fred Karl is president of Tampa General Hospital — so he wondered if he and Fred might be related, because the other's antec-

ents also came from Michigan.

The Roberts column stated that Frederica and Eustace had two daughters, one of whom was the columnist's maternal grandmother. Her youngest of three daughters, Agnes, was Roberts' mother, who died 16 months ago.

The Tampa Tribune column was written for Mother's Day, so Roberts devoted the rest of it to his feeling of loss from his mother's death. That included recollections of family picnics, fishing trips and other events.

His mother's most famous culinary creation, Roberts wrote, was a clear-broth clam chowder, which made her famous locally. It was her masterpiece, but "she could never quite bring herself to reveal the recipe."

In the true style of a loving son, Roberts told about his mother's abilities and skills, her tenderness and spirit. His father died in 1970, his mother in 1994. He closed the column telling of her advice to son Edwin when she thought he'd be drafted for the Korean War. She said, "When you get over there, just make sure you shoot the other fellow before he shoots you."

"Then she went into her bedroom and stayed there for a long time," he concluded.

Do these names ring any bells with local readers? With Karl family members? About Agnes? Or Edwin?

## Swatting flies

It was a soft, mellow spring evening, reminiscent of those we get during the summer — but one look at the calendar told me that season was still several weeks off.

I was sitting near the river's edge, on an old lawn chair I had thrown in the back of my pickup expressly for that purpose, absentmindedly swatting flies.

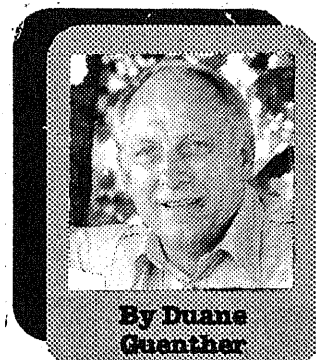
They really weren't flies, but midges. Larger than a mosquito but smaller than a fly, their numbers this year have caused concern among river residents.

I remember from my college entomology class this tiny, fly-like insect has a cyclical stage which fluctuates every few years. There is a high number this year, for they dance over the water in clouds numbering in the thousands.

The larvae of the bug is aquatic, so it's natural to have population explosion near water, like the river where I now sit. This particular specie produces an insect with a long, slender body, which looks ominous, but is non-biting and relatively harmless.

Their large gatherings, especially in the late afternoon or early evening, can be pesky to humans, but the adults are an important link in the food chain of the river, and to the fish living beneath its surface.

Tonight, they dance just above the water enticing the fish to jump, and that's the reason I'm here. The midges aren't the only flies above the water, several other species, of the hundreds who live out their short lives in this vicinity, are also deeply involved in their nightly mating rituals. I immediately recognize some, while others are just "flies" to me.

My fly rod is old, but fits me like a well worn glove. I bought it years ago from an envied friend. Envid, because he had the guts to leave a secure life in the teaching profession and take a gamble

turning a broken down canoe livery/hamburg stand into a classy fly fishing lodge. He succeeded, but died prematurely before reaping the full benefits. His son carries on the business, while his ashes float on the river he loved.

Each time I fish this stretch of the river, I sense his presence, and the rod, which binds us together, is the only one I use here.

Several more "plops" indicate the fish buffet has begun and I move toward the center of the river in order to make casting room.

I take a tiny fly from the plastic box resting in my shirt pocket and with the aid of a magnifying glass snapped to the brim of my baseball cap, attach it to the leader.

It's a non-descript fly, one I tie myself which represents a lot of insects in general and none in particular. It has an important splash of white in the wings. Not to attract fish, but to help my failing eyesight.

The fish begin to feed in earnest, dapping the surface with angel-like kisses, and producing concentric rings which float downstream.

I quickly hook a fish, small, not more than ten inches, but feisty for its size. A short fight erupts on the surface and the disturbance will put most of the other fish down for a few minutes. The reprieve gives me a chance to look around and think.

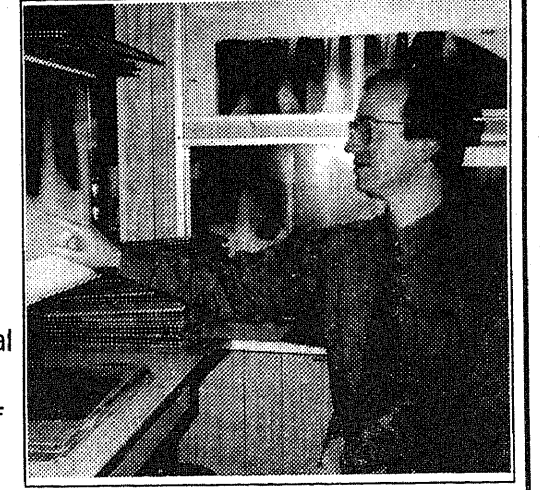
A distant "plop" from upstream tells me one glutton is back at the feeding trough and I move slowly towards the sound.

A hundred flies engulf my head and I swat at them aimlessly, glad that they chose this night to go dancing with their mate...

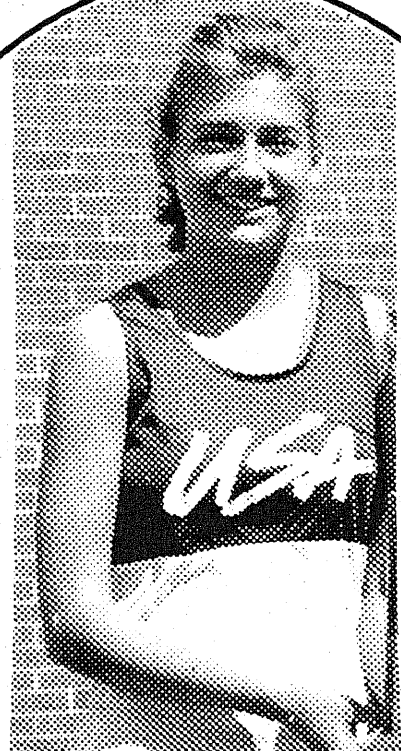

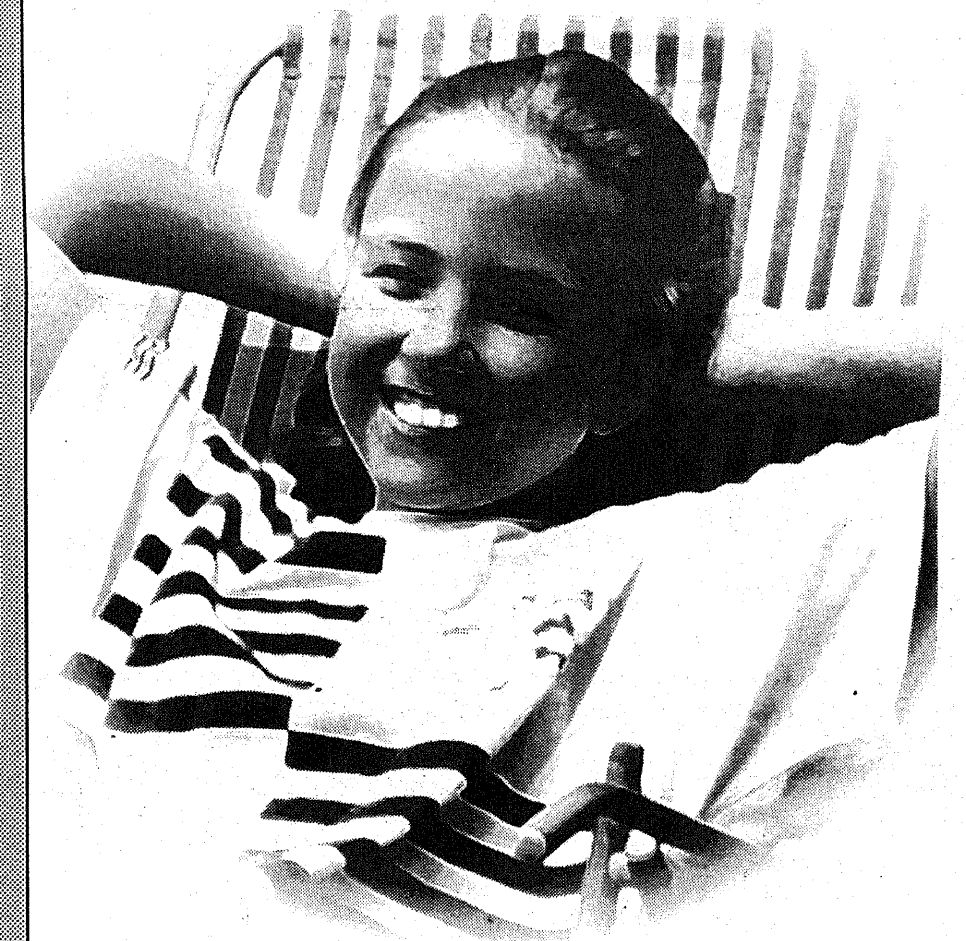
