Tips to help survive the hot weather...

Overexertion in hot weather — when the heat index rises to 100 degrees F or higher — is as risky to your health as overexposure to subzero temperatures in winter.

Howard Doss, Michigan State University Extension safety leader, says the optimum outside temperature range for humans engaged in strenuous work is 65 to 75 degrees.

When the temperature exceeds 85 degrees, mental activity and physical dexterity begin to decline.

At this temperature level and above, the body temperature rises and heart rate and blood circulation increase, though oxygen intake may remain constant, setting the stage for severe heat stress.

Doss recommends the following for working during periods of high humidity and high temperatures:

- Slow down. When temperature and humidity are high, your body has a greater physiological workload than normal.
- Heed early warnings of heat stress, such as headache, heavy perspiration, a high pulse rate and shallow breathing. Take an immediate break in a cooler place.
- Dress for hot weather. Lightweight, light-colored clothing reflects heat and sunlight and helps you maintain normal body temperature. Cotton is cooler than polyester clothing to most people, Doss says.
- Eat carbohydrates in hot weather. Avoid foods high in fat. Metabolizing fat takes more oxygen and produces higher body heat than metabolizing carbohydrates. Proteins increase water loss.

- Drink plenty of water. Heat-wave weather can cause rapid loss of water from the body at a higher rate than you may realize. Don't allow yourself to become dehydrated.
- Consume plenty of foods and liquids that are good sources of potassium. Most fruits and fruit juices are rich in potassium.
- Avoid thermal shock. Get used to hot weather gradually. Take it easy the first two or three hot days. Your body will probably adjust if you take it slow.
- Get out of the heat occasionally. Physical stress increases with time in hot weather. Try to get out of the heat for at least a few hours each day.
- Don't get too much sun. Sunburn makes the job of keeping cool much more difficult. The ultraviolet rays of the sun also cause skin cancer, Doss advises.

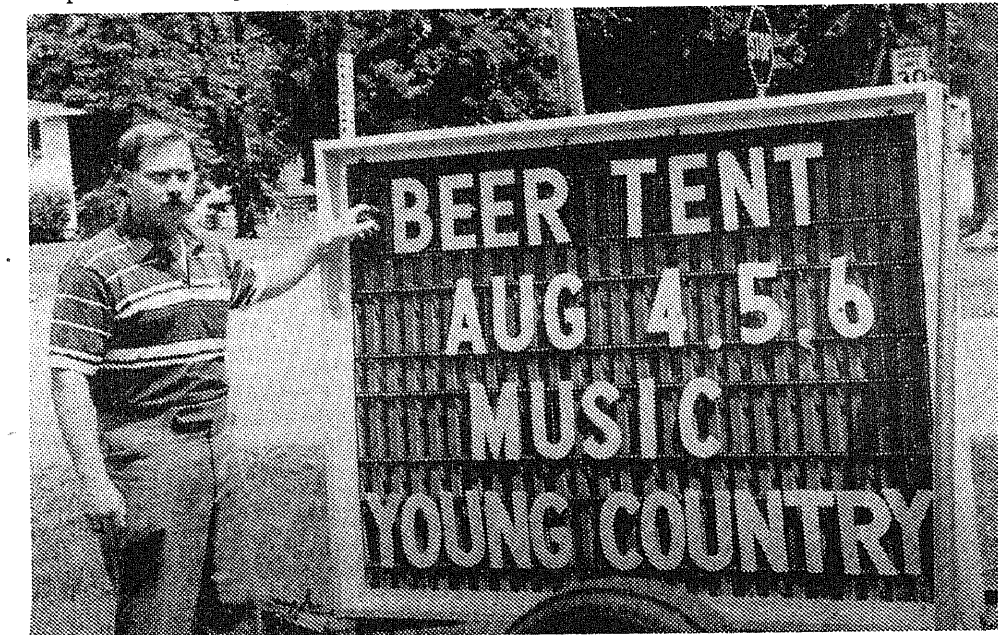
The Chicken BBQ tent is under the direction of the

Fund-raiser at Caseville Rod & Gun Club Bill Quinn benefit is Sunday

If anyone had ever thought to ask, Bill Quinn probably would have said he lived in a perfect world.

He had a successful business in Downtown Caseville, a loving wife and two children he idolized.

He was an avid hunter and every year traveled up north to hunting grounds teeming with deer. He loved fishing, and was lucky enough to live right on Saginaw Bay, full of tasty game fish.

Quinn had a loving mother who taught him valuable lessons in life and in the classroom, and six brothers and sisters whom he loved dearly.

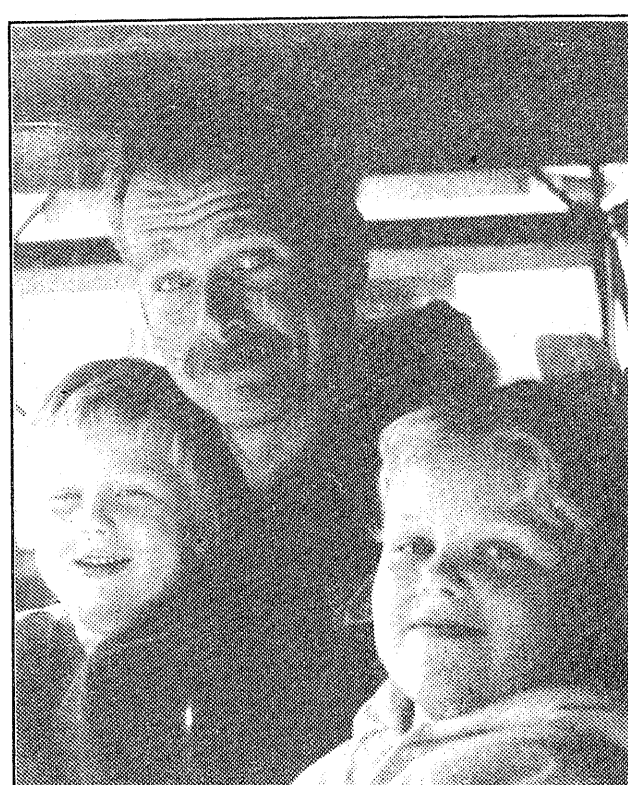
He served as a volunteer fireman with the Caseville Township Fire Department for 14 years because he truly cared about his hometown, friends recall.

His firefighting brethren held him in high enough esteem to elect him president of the department, a sign of his dedication.

But on April 2, Bill Quinn lost a two-year fight against cancer—a fight that brought him and his family closer together and rallied a community around him.

Hope Quinn, his wife of 23 years, continues to operate Quinn's Shell in Caseville while raising daughter Ashley, 10, and son Cody, 7.

The Caseville friends and community who rallied in support of Quinn during his illness are rallying again in support of his wife and children by holding a benefit Fish Fry and Hog Barbeque at the

Caseville Rod and Gun Club on Dunn Road east of M-25 this Sunday, Aug. 6 from 11 a.m. to 8 p.m.

Most of the fish to be served at the benefit were donated by fishermen in the Bill Quinn Memorial Walleye Tournament, held on July 23.

Although all of the entry fees were paid out in prize money, most of the winners donated their prizes back to the family, according to tournament and benefit organizer Mike Walsh, who was a close friend of Quinn.

"We had 300 pounds of cleaned walleye fillets donated back from the tournament for the fish fry," Walsh said.

"And the John Tait family donated a hog and Bill Chandler donated two smoked turkeys."

Bay Port Fish has donated whitefish and Rodney Heck is donating the barbeque wagon and tent, while local florists have donated flower arrangements for the benefit, Walsh said.

More donations of food are welcome as are offers to help at the event.

Free-will donations will be accepted at the benefit and all money raised will go to Quinn's family, organizers say.

Quinn was the type of man who saw the good in everyone, says his sister-in-law Marie Quinn.

"He was one of the most wonderful people I ever knew," Marie says. "I don't know anyone who didn't like him. He idolized his children and he loved his wife very much."

While his Shell service station was a successful business, Quinn could have done much better, she says—but his heart was too big.

He could have had a gold mine, but if you needed \$5, he'd give it to you," she says.

His mother, Barbara Quinn, taught at Caseville Public School for over 30 years, and after losing her husband in a car accident, raised Quinn and his siblings by herself.

All of her children eventually passed through her classroom, as did most of his friends.

What Bill Quinn enjoyed most were the simple things in life, Marie says, including riding around looking for deer, a good dinner with lots of fresh roasted corn by the fire on Charity Island, or just watching his children playing and laughing.

"He had a fire pit in his backyard and when he'd get a fire going, anyone driving down the street would be invited to stop in and the package of hot dogs would come out," Marie says.

Every year, Quinn and a group of hunting buddies would travel to Ontonagan for their yearly deer hunt.

His brother Dave, a Caseville Department of Public Works employee, hunted in Newberry every fall and the two would have friendly disputes about whose camp was better.

On one of Quinn's last outings, Labor Day last year, friend Tim Poisson installed a recliner in a van and took Quinn to the Newberry camp so he could see for himself what his brother's hunting area looked like.

But Bill Quinn's last trip was a dream come true—when his mother and wife accompanied him to Hawaii in February.

"He really wanted to go to Alaska, but he felt the cold would be too hard on him," Marie says. "He really enjoyed his trip there. It was a big highlight for him because he was pretty weak by then."

2 die in 2 area crashes

Three persons were killed this past week in two separate accidents in the Western Thumb.

On Monday, July 24, a Vassar girl was killed when the truck in which she was riding collided with another truck.

Sabrina Fackler, 9, was pronounced dead at the scene of the 5 p.m. crash, at M-138 and Bradleyville Road, west of Fairgrove, in Tuscola County.

She was a passenger in the vehicle driven by her mother, Ruth Ann Fackler, 32 of Vassar, which was westbound on M-138 when it collided with a milk truck driven by Frederick Kausch, 56 of Owendale, traveling southbound on Bradleyville Road. Police said he failed to stop at the intersection.

Ruth Ann Fackler was listed in critical condition at Bay Medical Center, Bay City. Kausch and his two passengers were also taken to Bay Med, where they were treated.

On Wednesday, July 26, a Saginaw man died when his vehicle failed to stop at a stop sign south of Fairgrove and collided with another vehicle.

Richard Sotomayor, 31 of Saginaw, was westbound on Dixon Road when his vehicle failed to yield at the corner of Higgins Road. His vehicle was struck by a northbound auto driven by Clifford Carmer, 59 of Citra, Fla. Both vehicles came to rest in a nearby field.

Carmer was listed in critical condition at St. Mary's Medical Center, Saginaw, while his passenger, Shirley Carmer, 55, was taken to St. Luke's Hospital, Saginaw, where she was listed in fair condition.

Tuscola County Sheriff's Department is still investigating both accidents.

As we see it Second-guessing would have lost World War II

It's all the rage these days to take pot-shots at why we really had to drop two atomic bombs on cities in Japan — even though the second bomb fell 24 hours before Japan agreed to surrender to end the world's bloodiest war, 50 years ago this month.

Comments have already appeared in this spot noting our leaders made the best possible choice, yet a surprising number of supposedly-informed people are really wondering if dropping those bombs was necessary, wondering whether Japan would have surrendered anyway — and wondering if it was all a mistake.

In the next week, we'll observe that 50th anniversary around the world, and we sometimes feel uncomfortable in our role as the only country in the world which has dropped atomic bombs on other humans in anger.

But as has been stated here before, the bomb ended the war earlier and saved American lives. It also saved more Japanese lives, which would have been lost in island or mainland fighting.

Yes, there was a desire for revenge in dropping not one but two atomic bombs, but who brought the U.S. into World War II by bombing Pearl Harbor in 1941? Japan did.

Possibly the only great irony here is that, now the U.S. and Japan are such good trading friends in the worldwide market of the 1990s, we are too embarrassed to continue seeking apologies for Japan's role in the war. Even now, half a century later, Japan is too shrewd to offer such an apology, even though our dead and living veterans deserve one.

Rather than second-guess whether our leaders should have used the powerful weapon available to them — which they DID utilize — we should be grateful those leaders made the best choice available to them at the time.

If some of today's spineless leaders had been at the controls back then, the proud history of the United States would be only a memory, here in this colony of Imperial Japan.

There's no need to feel badly about righting a wrong and ending an evil war, period...

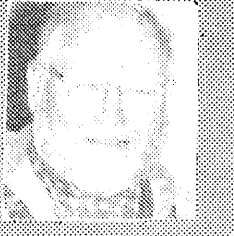

Friends may call at the funeral home on Tuesday from 3 to 9 p.m. and on Wednesday from 9 a.m. until the time of service at 3 p.m.

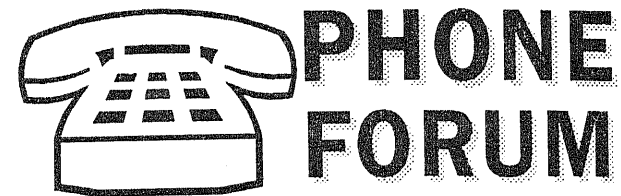
GERTRUDE NIESCHULZ 1913 - 1995

So Ilitch wants Michigan to dump \$200 million (which will grow to \$400 or \$500 million) to give the Tigers a new stadium.

He became "the soldier's reporter," covering the bombing of London, and battles in Africa, Sicily, Italy and France, earning him a Pulitzer Prize in 1944. He was killed by Japanese machine gun fire on the Pacific Island of Ie Shima, four months before the end of the war... singer Tony Bennett is 69 today and actress Dolores Del Rio is 90...

The first atomic bomb ever detonated over an inhabited area was dropped from the U.S. B-29 "Enola Gay" at 8:15 a.m. Japanese time AUG. 6, 1945. The bomb exploded about 1,800 feet above the center of Hiroshima, killed 105,000 and destroyed the city. Another 100,000 were injured, many died later from radiation. It was the first time in history that such a devastating weapon was used by any nation, and effectively ended World War II within a few days...

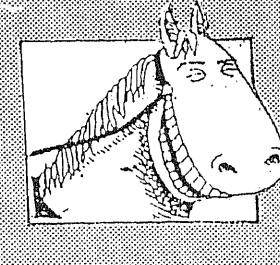

Nowhere else will you find this much fun and entertainment in one convenient locale! I will be there, working, walking, helping, eating and enjoying...and I hope to see you there.

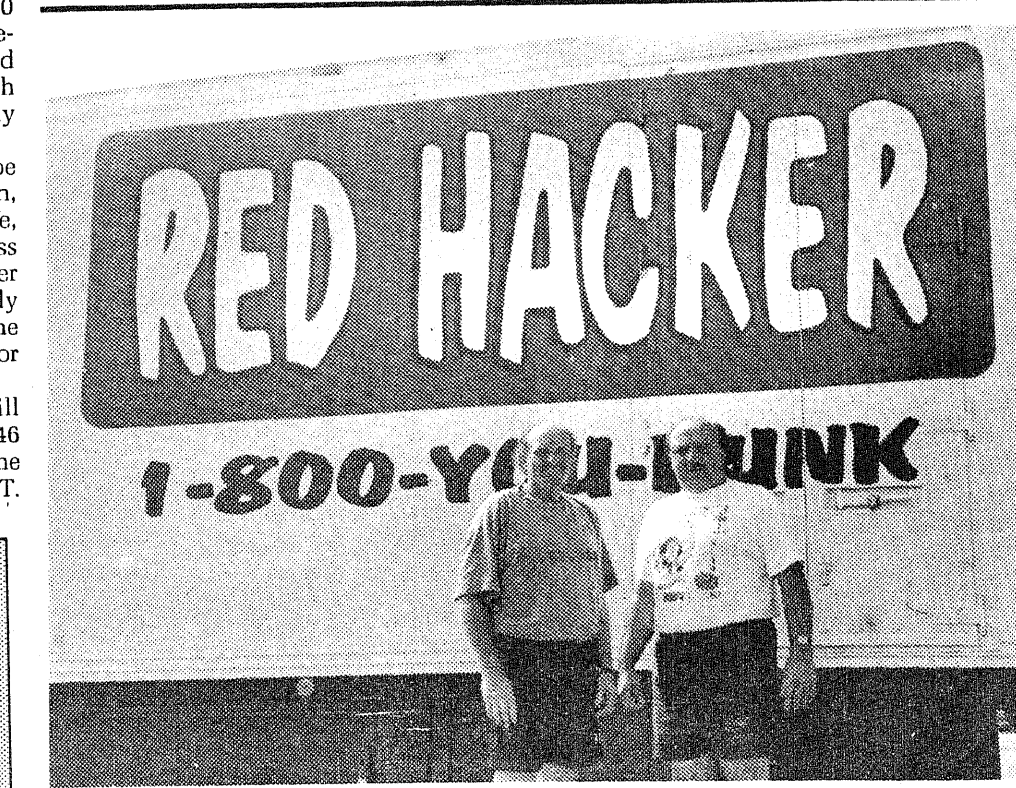

About 140 cyclists wheeled into Sebewaing last Thursday on the fourth leg of the "Tour of the Thumb" bicycle trip.

The trip, sponsored by the Tri-City Cyclists, originated in Memphis and wound around the Thumb and ended in Au Gres, 310 miles later.

Thursday's trip began in Port Austin and ended up on the front lawn of the USA High School, where participants in the "Tour" erected a tent city for their evening stay. The school was open for the use of bathroom facilities and hot showers.

The group then biked to Bay City on Friday and ended their trip in Au Gres on Saturday.

who works in a Milwaukee meal program, while Schumacher is a Catholic Nun who works in a soup kitchen in Detroit.

While Ampe has been riding for over 25 years, this was the first big trip for Schumacher.

"When they told me I would have to do a 60-mile stint, I didn't believe I could do it," she said.

"But she did," Ampe added. The "Brady Bunch" from Columbus, Ohio were also in the group. Kent Brady, a firefighter, and his wife Julie, an insurance executive, pulled a sulky which carried

their four-year-old daughter Rhianon and their 14-month-old son Nicholas.

While young Nick was the youngest rider on this six-day trip, Hermon Hoffer of Ashley took the cake as the oldest participant.

Hoffer is 90-years-young and rides a sleek lay-back bicycle with a tiny front wheel and jacked-up handlebars. From a distance, his set up looked like a Harley.

"I've put a little over 3,000 miles on the bike this year,"

Hoffer said, smiling. "It's a beauty of ride and really easy on my knees."

And to think I had just wined kneeling down to take his picture...

Tuscola 'crash' test Aug. 9

Tuscola County will test its Emergency Operations Plan Wednesday, Aug. 9, in a two-phase program that includes a simulated airplane crash at Caro Airport.

James Jashinske, director of Tuscola's Emergency Management, a division of Tuscola's Sheriff Department, says most of the exercise will be functional, with personnel in the Emergency Opera-

tions Center testing skills. The second phase will be a full-scale "airplane crash," with Explorer Scouts playing the role of crash victims. They will be transported to Caro Community Hospital, which will also be testing its disaster plan.

The program will begin at 10 a.m. Part I will be at Caro Airport and Part II at EOC Headquarters in the basement

of the Sheriff's Department. Jashinske said the operations will include simulators, retired Michigan State Police Lt. Ben Sizemore, John West of Lapeere County EMS and Chief David Mattlin of Caro Fire Department. Evaluators from Sanilac and Huron County will be on hand to record TCEM's ability to handle multiple disasters, Jashinske said.

Cody bobbed his head nervously as we left the trail and I pointed him down the ancient avalanche slide to our left.

Within moments the seasoned Paint was clattering over slick volcanic rock which lay hidden in the tufted grass littering the hillside.

We were picking our way down a mountainside just outside Flagstaff, Ariz. While some people are fortunate enough to live in a deer woods, on a trout stream, or near the shores of the Great Lakes, my friend has the San Francisco Peaks in his backyard.

And even better, he has his hunting horses browsing in a pasture just a stone's throw away.

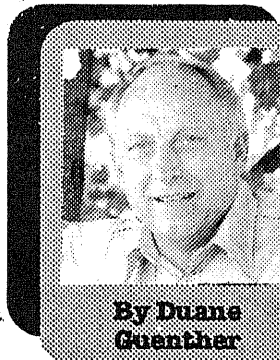
Since I was flying back to Michigan early in the morning, Fred and I had to rearrange plans for an overnight horse ride into the high country.

Our itinerary called for picking up a couple of subs at a nearby deli, rounding up the horses and trailering them to a nearby trailhead where we would head up the mountain for a late lunch in the snowfields and be back home in time for supper.

A great idea if the horses — or should I say horse — would have cooperated. Horses running free in a large pasture area are a little difficult to catch in comparison to those penned in a convenient corral.

Cody was okay, a 25-year-old gelding who had spent his first 20 in the show ring. He was a sucker for an oat bucket, and came in at the first shake of grain.

Granite was a horse of a different color. A Pinto gelding, he could trace his ances-

try to the wild mustangs who roamed the high country of the Four Corners' Region.

Although he came in close

enough to tantalize Fred, any move with the halter hand would cause him to bolt like a kid playing tag.

After a long period of frustration, Fred returned home for a coil of rope and we made a temporary corral using the horse trailer and several conveniently located trees.

Once inside, I was elected to close the open end and withstand any charges Granite may attempt. Like a docile child, he knew when he was caught and offered little resistance to Fred's approach.

Since we were behind schedule, our trip up top was speedy and without any breaks. This would be all right for any seasoned horseman, but it took a toll on a neophyte like myself.

Our destination was a saddle between two of the highest peaks in the range.

At about 10,500 feet, the saddle is at the edge of the year around snowfields and although the temperature was in the 90's at the base, we had to don down jackets while we munched our sandwiches.

The vistas were outstanding. Probably not as great as they could have been, but the National Forest Service prohibited horse traffic at any higher altitudes than that where we had stopped.

Both horses are old hands at mountain travel. Fred is a dedicated elk hunter who works his animals in the high country of Colorado.

And to show me how good they were, we had jumped off the trail on our trip down and let the horses have their heads to pick the best way.

Granite led the way. Calling upon generations of breeding instincts, he wove through the volcanic rock with hardly a slip. Cody on the other hand, had only been a mountain horse for five of his 25 years, and as Fred so aptly put it at the end of the ride;

"Cody doesn't like to go downhill."

Now he tells me. The grace the animals showed was beyond compre-

hension for a non-rider like myself.

Weaving in and out of seemingly impassable areas, they managed to find a path fitting their fancy and slipped down the mountain side as though it were a stroll in the park.

Even a couple of barking Doberman Pinchers protecting campers at the trailhead did not phase them.

However, when we passed the dogs, Cody's nostrils flared a couple of times and he rolled back his eyes as if to say,

"If those buggers get loose, you better hang on."

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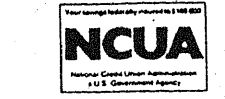

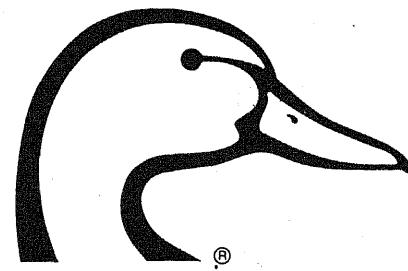

NOTICE OF FINDINGS AND PUBLIC EXPLANATION PROPOSED PROJECT IN WETLAND

The Village of Unionville has considered all practicable alternatives to its Water System Improvements Project which includes activities located in a wetland as follows:

The new water main is to run under the Wiscoggin Drain near the well houses, approximately 450 feet south of Cass Street. The bottom of the Wiscoggin Drain is classified as a wetlands area. The drain will be restored to its initial condition after construction of the main.

There is no practicable alternative but to locate project activities in a wetland and it is anticipated the project will proceed. This determination is based on the following explanation:

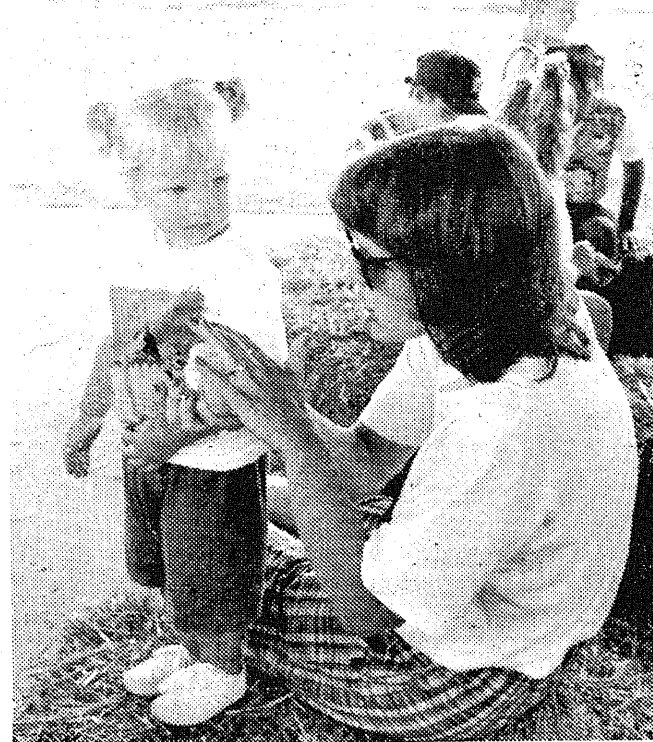

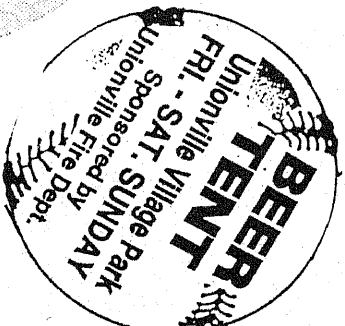
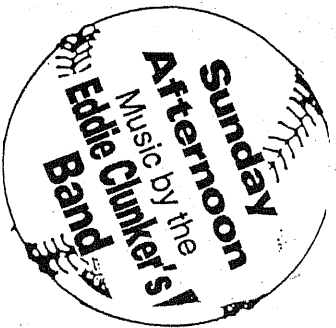
