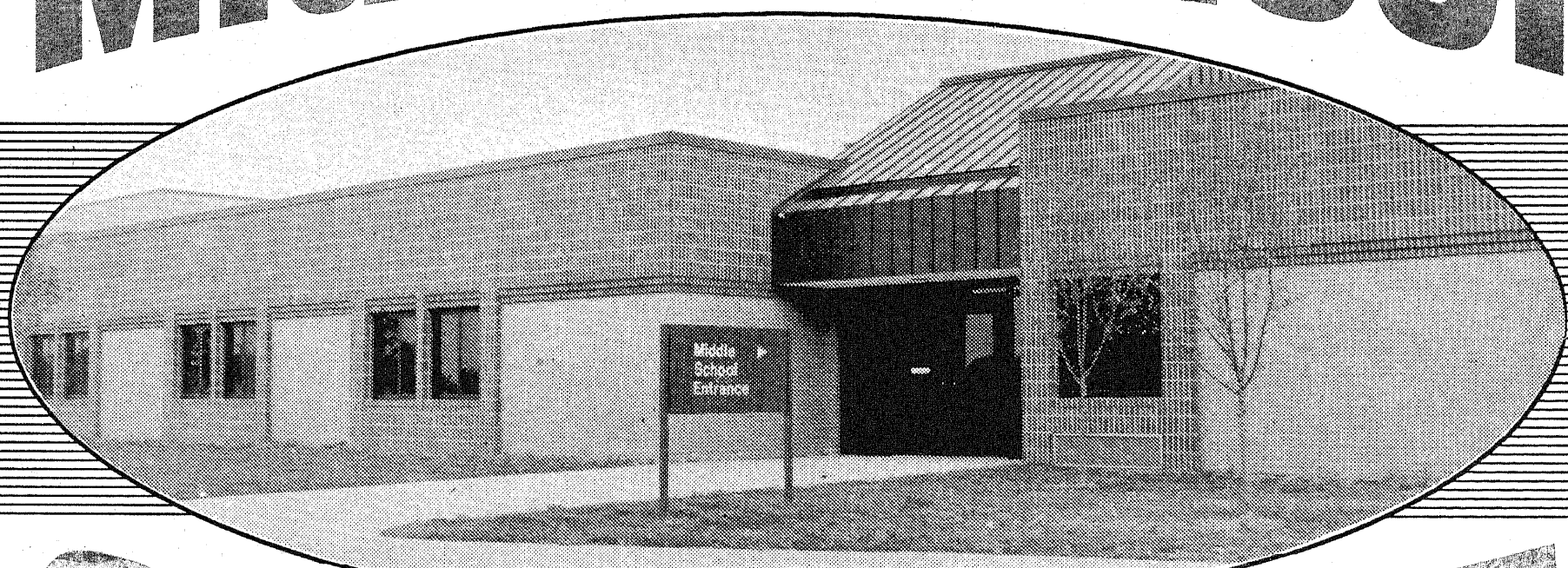

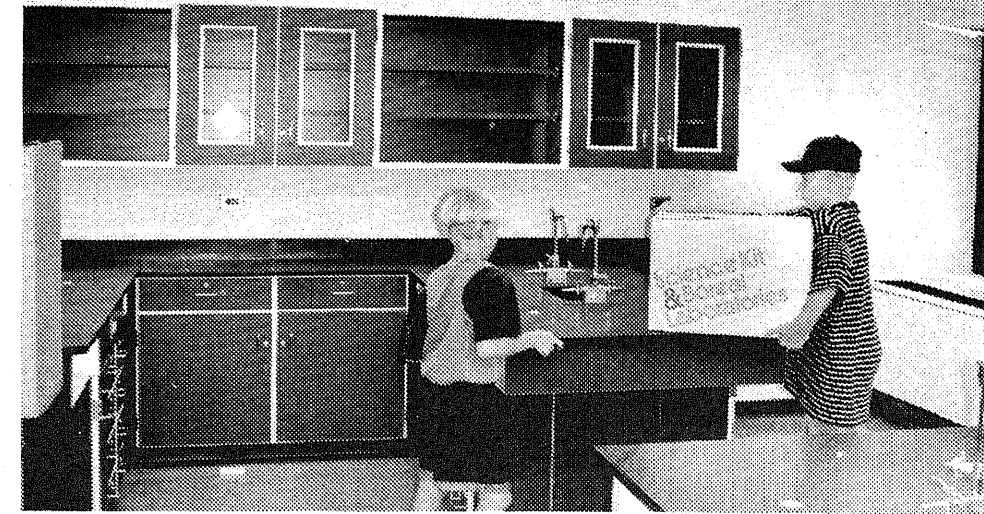

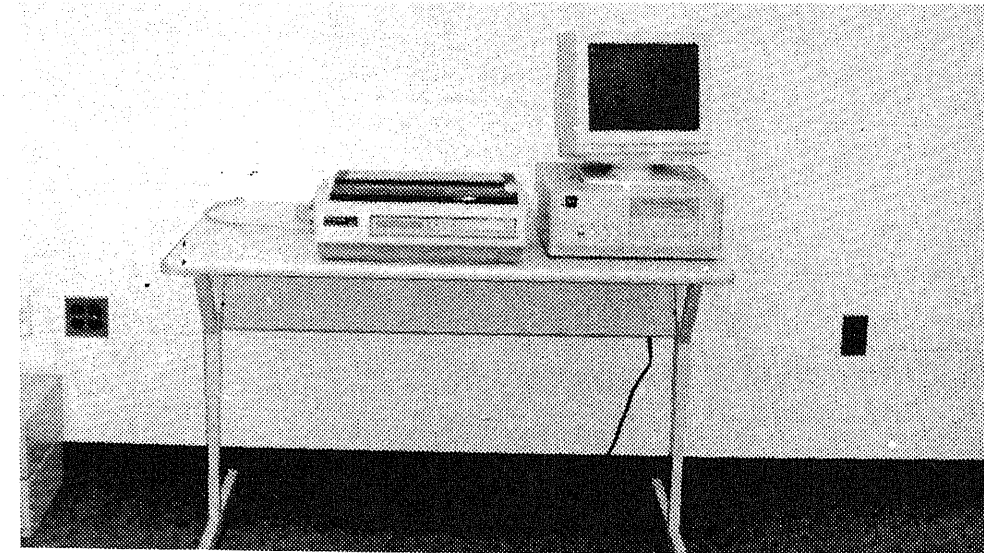
Take a walking tour of the new USA Middle School, in these pages...

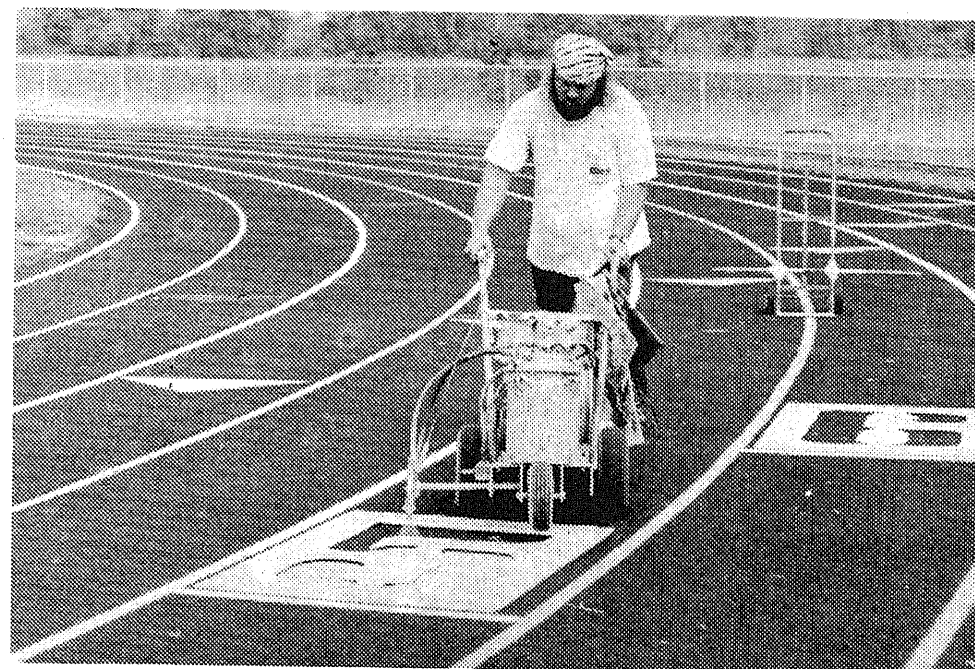
Here is a typical new classroom at USA Middle School, one of 19 learning centers built in the new school to teach fifth through eighth grade students.

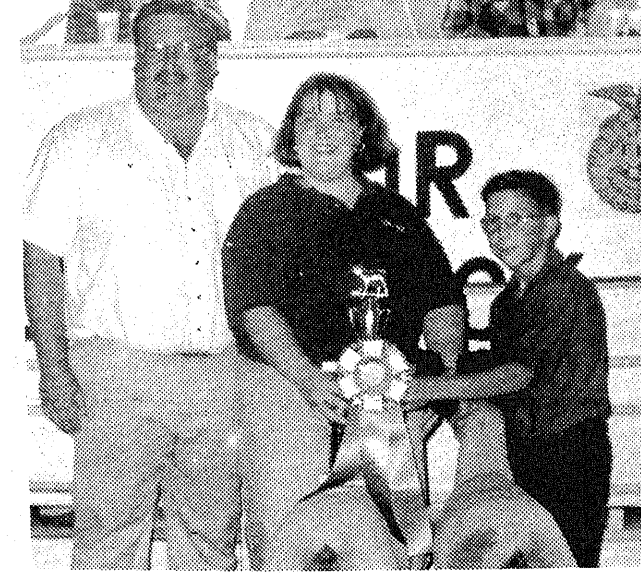
Stephanie Braun of the Laker 4-H Club showed the Reserve Champion Hog, which was sold to Krug Trucking.



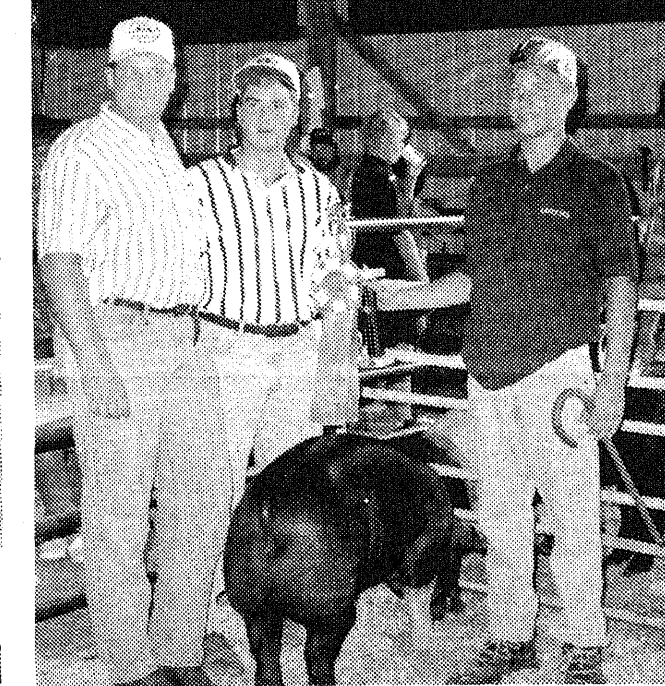

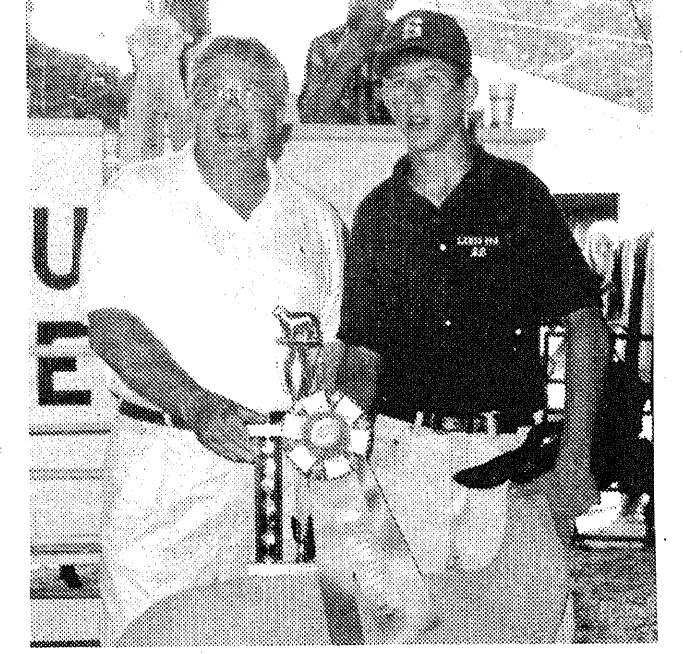
Sarah Zagata of Sebewaing 4-H Livestock was named the Grand Champion Market Steer Showman at the Huron Community Fair.

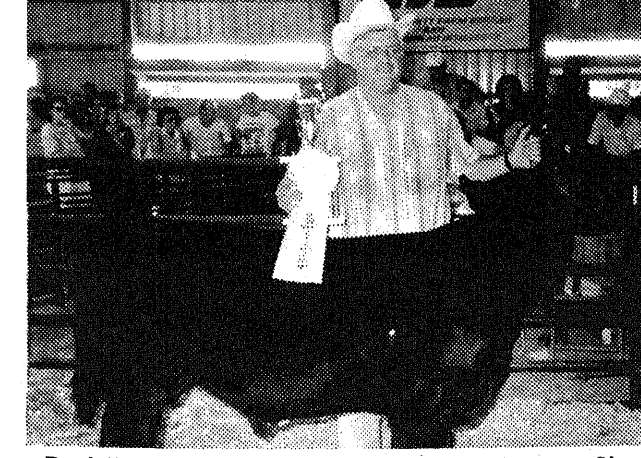

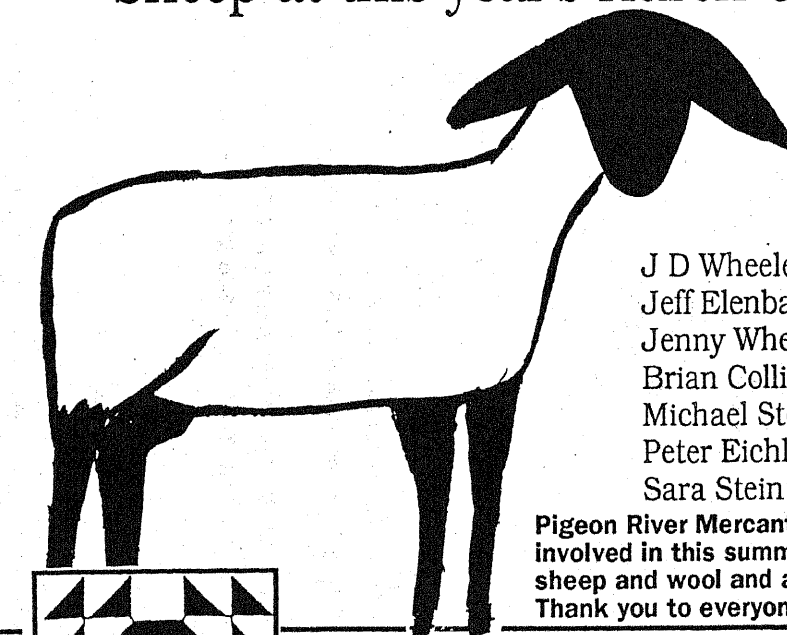

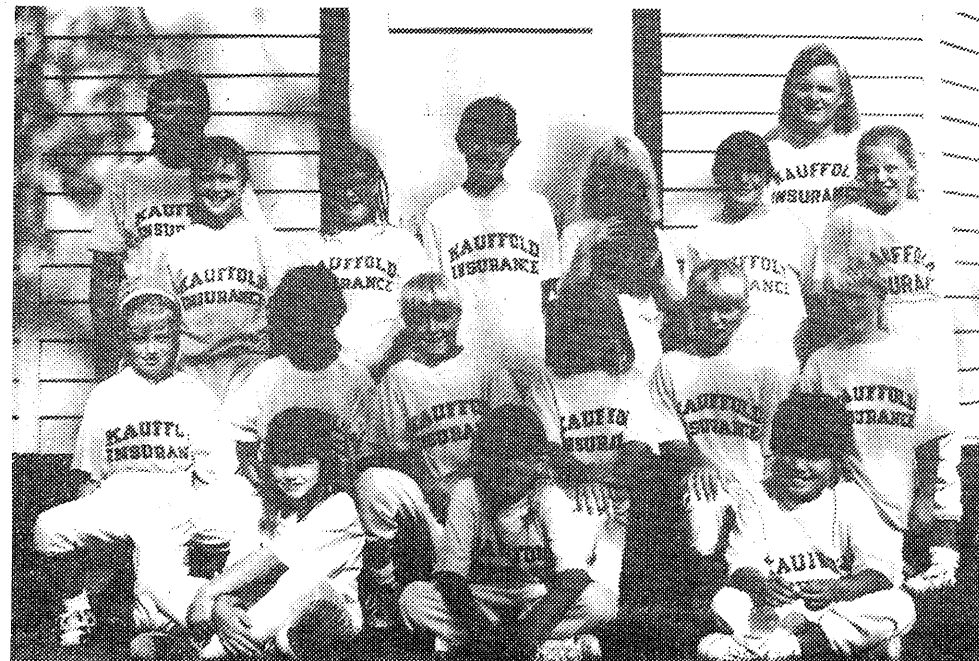
