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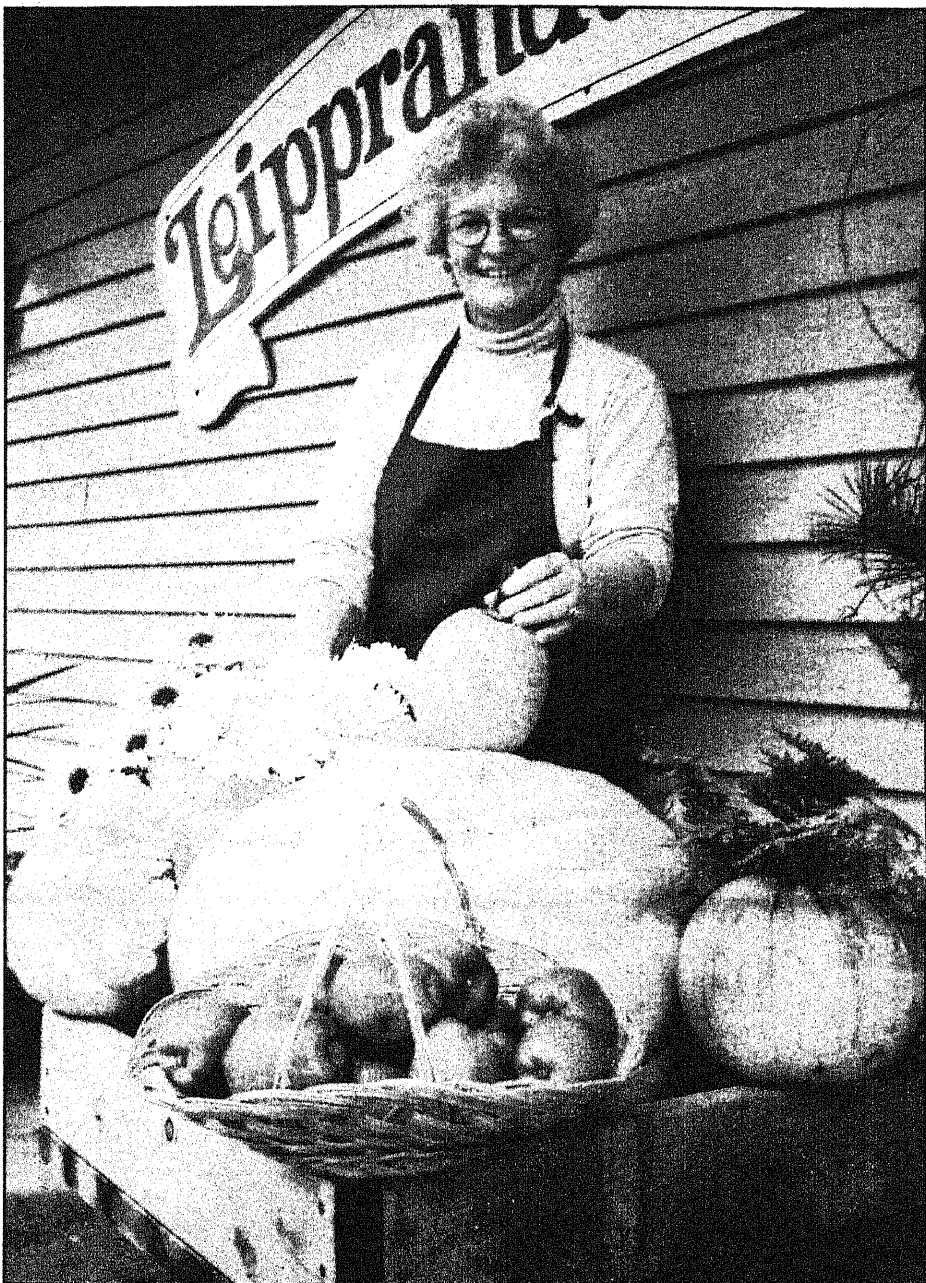

Sugar Factory starts '95-'96 campaign

The beet trucks began rolling last week, and it looks like only the effects from Hurricane Opal will be able to slow them down.

According to Sebewaing Plant Agriculture Manager Dick Jacoby of Michigan Sugar Company, the factory began to receive beets last Monday, Oct. 2, with first slicing taking place on Friday.

Although rumors circulated that Company officials were only taking diseased beets during the first part of the operation, Jacoby stated that no such indication had actually been made.

"We are taking beets from anyone who is ready to harvest at this time," Jacoby says. "While it's true some of the beets coming in have been affected by the root aphid and drought conditions, plenty are healthy and looking good."

Jacoby expects the sugar content to be exceptionally low and he is sure the company will not see the tonnage to which this area is accustomed.

"It will be lower than the average," he says. "But, we have to remember this was a very unusual summer."

Michigan Sugar will continue to receive beets at its regular schedule.

"The only thing slowing us down," Jacoby says, "will be the rains pushed into our area by Hurricane Opal."

As of last Thursday, Michigan Sugar had taken in 28,000 tons of beets.

LAST TO DIE: Michigan has not had the death penalty for more than a half-century, and our state's worst crimes are dealt with via life imprisonment sentences instead. Now, a state man being charged in federal court may be executed, since federal law supercedes state law in certain cases. Michigan's last execution was in 1938, when Anthony Chebatoris was hanged for shooting to death a bystander during a bank robbery.

Routine Sebewaing business

Sebewaing Village Council heard a favorable report about demolition of the former Esterline Building, at the corner of Main and Center Streets. After several delays, Mead Company tore down the building last week and has been diligent in cleaning it up promptly.

A building permit for James Burgett was approved as well as new Christmas decorations will be ordered for the village. The cost of decorations will come from a Christmas fund totaling \$2,493.

Council also approved asphaltting the area across from Muellerwise Park, at a maximum cost of \$2,600. The area in question will be associated with the "bump" village employes constructed as part of the one-way street leading to the new marina.

Council heard from Parks & Recreation Committee about total costs of constructing Muellerwise Park. Estimated figures are \$92,000.

There was also a discussion on the request made by Frank Hofmeister as to the purchase of the baseball diamond on former Sebewaing High School property now owned by A.J.D. Management. Hofmeister has also asked for some

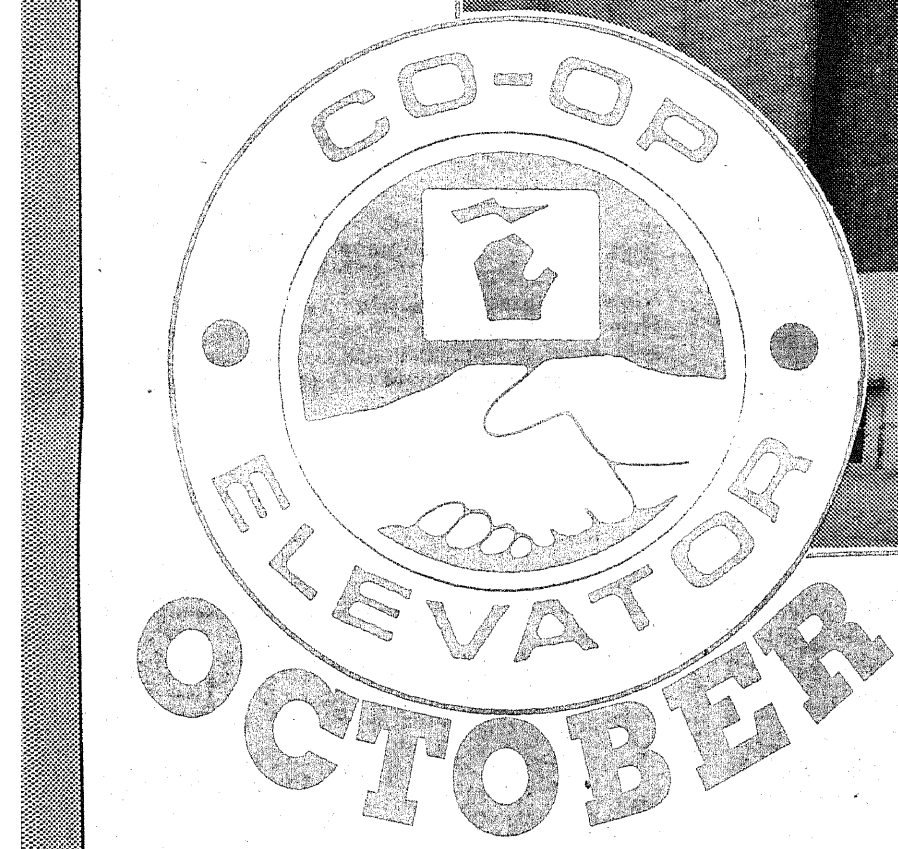

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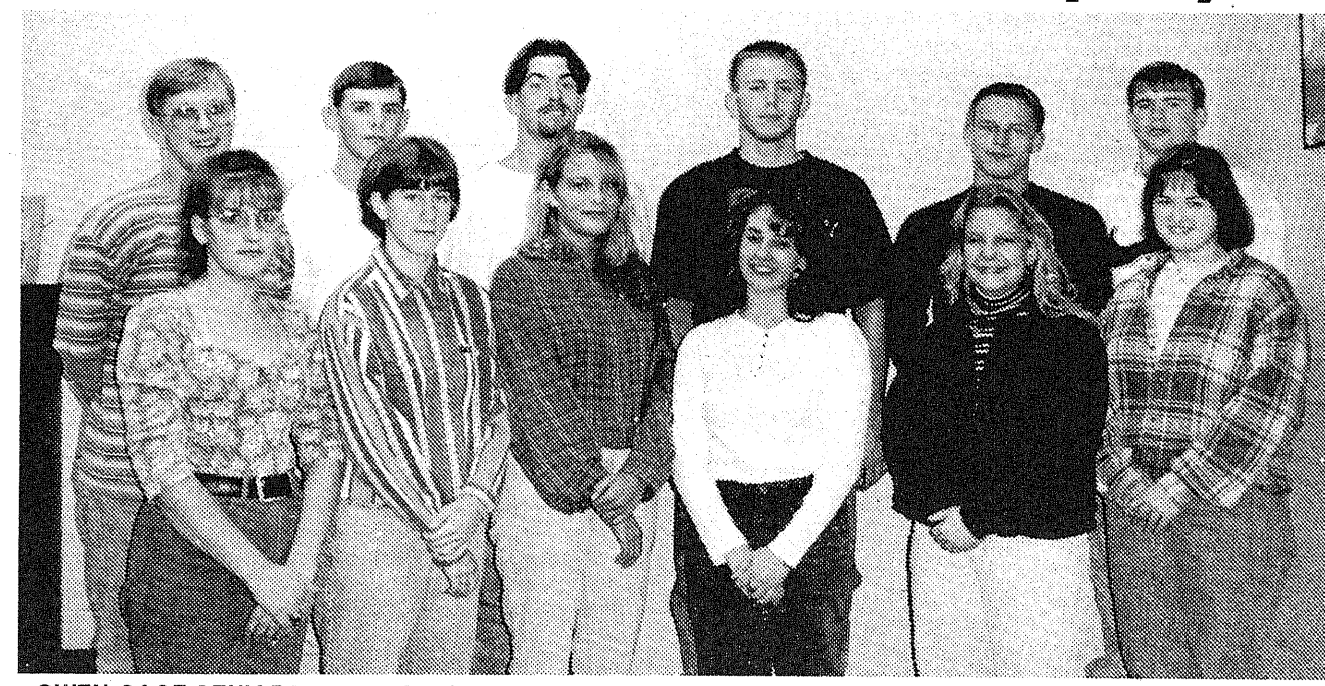

New Pigeon water rates

If you live in Pigeon and use a lot of water, you're going to be paying more for the clear liquid, under the new water rates now in effect.

Last month, Pigeon Village Council approved raising water rates to eliminate the deficit in the water operations fund. The increase went into effect with the Oct. 1 billings and was retroactive to July 1, Village Clerk Janet Heckman says.

The average homeowner will see a small increase, while users of large amounts of water will notice big increases. Formerly, water users were charged on a decreasing scale. Now everyone will pay the same flat rate of \$1.55 per thousand (M) gallons.

Help is now nearby for people who are coping with the life-changing experience of undergoing cardiac surgery.

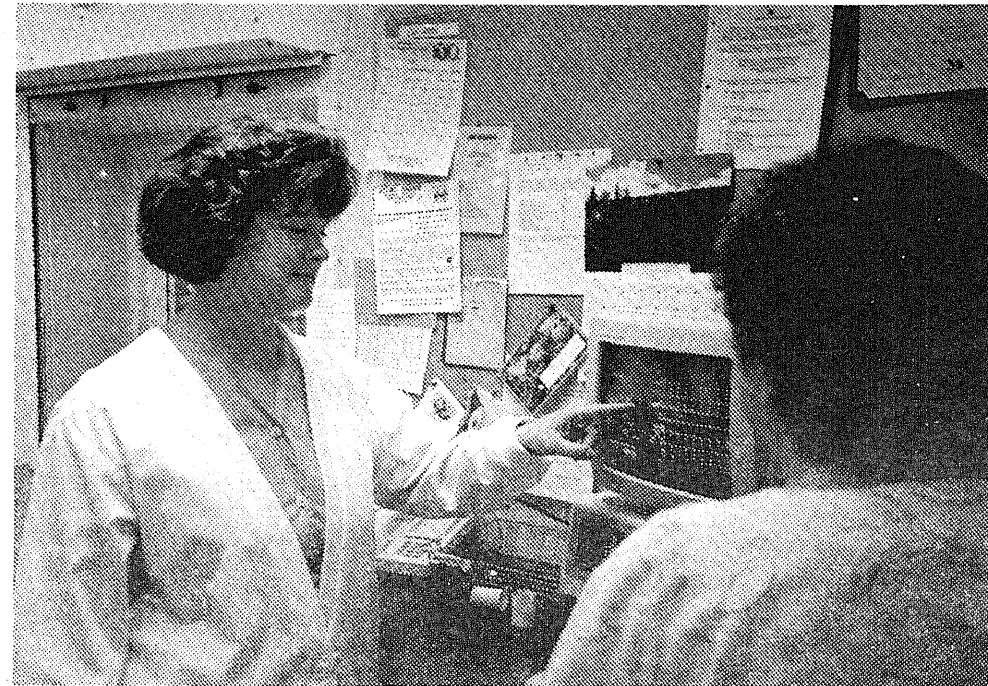

Pigeon seeks new park options

More than 12 acres of new land have been added to Recreation Park on Pigeon's north side — and village officials are seeking residents' opinions on what kinds of recreation that new land should host.

Should there be a walking path? An archery range? More ball fields? A pole barn to use for ice skating or roller hockey or community events?

"We're trying to look at things that aren't too costly to do," Village Clerk Janet Heckman said.

The Village was able to purchase the land with a \$94,500 grant from the Department of Natural Resources' Recreation Trust Fund, Heckman said.

A survey was mailed to Pigeon residents along with their October water bills asking for opinions on what to add to the park.

Some of the options mentioned included walking paths, shuffleboard courts, resurfacing the present tennis courts, and overnight parking for campers.

Heckman said a lot of interest has been shown in walking paths, because more and more people are now walking for health reasons.

Those surveys should be returned to the village hall by Oct. 15.

Planning and Zoning committee member Durward

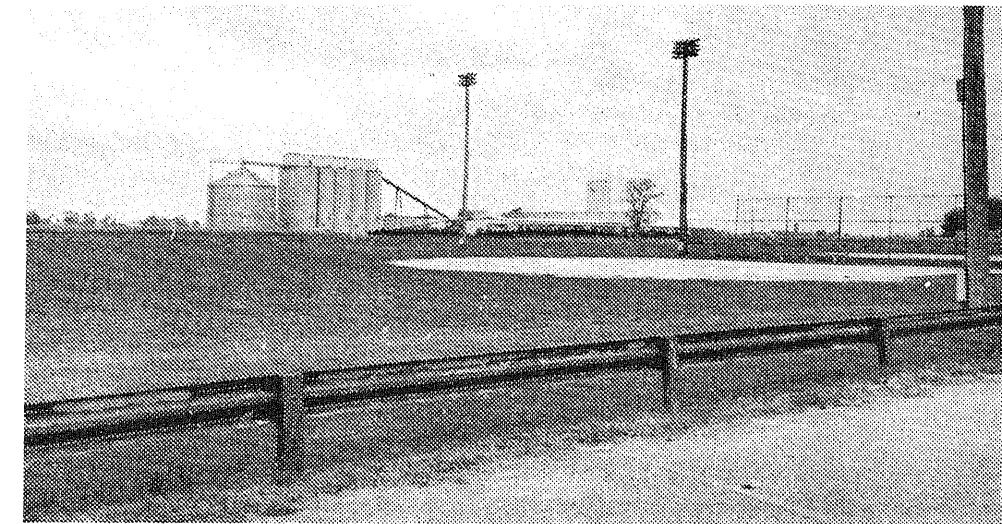
"Butch" Miller said the village is hoping to line up a grant or two from the state to help defray the costs of improving the park.

"Some of the things we can do right away," Miller said.

"What we're hoping to do right now is seed it and main-

tain it. It's still at the discussion stage and any money we need will have to be in next year's budget."

Miller and committee chairman John Smith will be going over the surveys and should present results at the November council meeting.
