EVERY SOLDIER WHO HAS BEEN PAID BOUNTY IN FULL FOR HIS SERVICES IN THE ARMY OF THE UNITED STATES IS ENTITLED TO A PENSION. THE LAW PROVIDES THAT SUCH SOLDIERS SHALL BE PAID A PENSION OF FIFTY PER CENT OF THEIR BOUNTY. THE PENSION SHALL BE PAID FOR THE REMAINDER OF HIS LIFE. THE PENSION SHALL BE PAID TO THE SURVIVORS OF SUCH SOLDIERS IN CASE OF THEIR DEATH.
