Terrific Boiler Explosion From Nashville, Tenn., comes the report of the explosion of a twenty-five horse-power boiler in a slaughter-house. Scarcely anything could be found of Frank Duffy, a lad nineteen years old. Several others were seriously, and perhaps, fatally injured.

An Unprecedented Feast Robert Barnes, of Medina, Ohio, accomplished the extraordinary feat of running from that place to Akron a distance of twenty miles in two hours and twenty minutes, on a wagon of \$30. This is the fastest time on record.

Silver Found in New Hampshire A rich vein of four feet down the ore was found at Meredith, N. H. Forty feet down the ore was found 380 to the ton, and of lead \$39. At six feet to the depth the vein is said to be much richer.

The Cholera Murder The trial of Henry J. Gully for the murder of Cornelia Chubb, her brother and father, on April 29, 1877, has begun at DeKalb, Miss., with thirty-two witnesses for the state and thirty-eight for the defense. The wife and mother of the murdered family on the stand tells a singularly affecting story.

A Son Shoots His Father James Coyle and his father, the former killed the latter, shooting him with a shotgun. The difficulty arose from a dispute of tobacco, from which old Coyle applied some epithets to young Coyle, who had interfered. As the old man advanced upon the young one with a stick the son fired upon him with a shotgun and killed him instantly. Coyle and his wife were arrested and refused bail. They will be speedily tried.

A Remembrance of the Old War Prisoners A dispatch from Toledo, Ohio, says: It has been decided to have a grand reunion of the prisoners of war during the late rebellion in this city on the 1st and 2d of October, and already about 2,000 of the old soldiers have responded.

The Massachusetts Greenbackers The greenback party of Massachusetts have held a state convention, and placed the following ticket in nomination: For Governor, Benjamin F. Butler; Lieutenant Governor, Wendell Phillips; Secretary of State, Jonathan Arnold; Treasurer, Wilbur F. Whitney; Auditor, David S. King; Attorney General, Horace B. Sargent.

Three Thousand People Without Nerve A man by the name of Bales was sentenced, last Friday, at Athens, Ala., to be hanged, but counsel for the defense appealed the case to the Supreme Court. Impatient to await the slow hand of justice, three thousand people collected at the gall, broke in the iron door and took the prisoner out to the words, toynch him. A tree was selected, and a rope thrown over its branch, and Bales drawn in a wagon under it. No one would be the knave; whereupon, the sheriff drove the prisoner back to jail.

Surprised His Father-in-Law John Sharp, of McArthur, Ohio, last Monday murdered his father-in-law, "Squire D. T. Benjamin, for endeavoring to quiet a disturbance between himself and his wife. Sharp attacked the old man with a bidgewon of wood from behind. He then turned his attention to his wife, who was standing by, and struck her with the billet, injuring them both seriously. He then, and at latest reports had not been captured, although the Sheriff of Vinton county and a posse of men were scouring the country for him.

Short Time for English Cotton Operatives, meeting of representatives at Oldham, England, of cotton manufacturing companies was held, at which 4,000,000 spindles were represented. It was resolved to adopt short time by working alternate weeks or three days in each week for one month. Fifty companies, operating 2,000,000 spindles, have decided to go on short time immediately.

Yellow Fever As cooler weather advances, the number of new cases and deaths in fever-stricken Memphis diminish. Yet, there has been but little change for the better. There are hundreds suffering from the effects of the fever's ravages, and the work of the Howard has in no way decreased. Jay Gould has sent by telegraph his second donation of \$50,000, and Pittsburgh has also sent \$10,000.

Infanticide and Suicide Mrs. Bonstedt, residing at Shawnee, Jackson county, Mo., killed two of her children, little girls, by giving them morphine, and then tried to commit suicide by taking the same drug, but not having enough to produce death, she attempted to kill herself by hanging, but was discovered before life was extinct. Supposed cause, mental derangement, occasioned by domestic troubles.

Educational Matters A dispatch from Washington says that the present report of the Commissioner of Education shows the income for states and territories (Wyoming not included) to be \$86,886,166; expenditures (Wyoming included), \$80,233,458; school population for thirty-eight states and territories, 14,727,443; number of normal schools, 152; with instructors, 37,052 pupils, and 2,763 graduates, of whom 1,571 are teaching. Ohio reports the greatest number of normal schools, 14.

Indian Troubles in Mexico Dispatches received at Santa Fe, New Mexico, state that on the 4th instant, about thirty horse and some mules, belonging to Capt. Hooker's command, stationed at Brownsville, in Southern New Mexico, were jumped man by Indians, and the herd guard, some seven or eight soldiers of the 3rd Cavalry were killed, and all the animals destroyed. The Indians are reported about forty strong, including the notorious Chief, "Cochise," and others from the Mescal Mts.

The National Liberal League Convention The National Liberal League Convention held at the Grand Opera House, Cincinnati, on the 13th and 14th instants, was evidently a success in point of attendance and enthusiasm. About 1,000 delegates, representing an enormous majority in an year, with no general election pending, was of course, a magnificent gathering. It is believed that they have made a splendid fight for the most important principle, the National Liberal League.

What a False Report Did At Cleveland last Wednesday two who were heard in quick succession on the third floor of the Kennard House, and persons residing there, as well as those in the neighborhood, were alarmed by the report of a fire in the Kennard House. It was found that the fire was a false alarm, and the persons who reported it were severely reprimanded.

A Georgia Epidemic A special dispatch to the Cincinnati Gazette from Atlanta, Ga., says: "A strange and fatal disease of malarial fever type is creating consternation among the people in three or four counties in the western part of this state. Out of fifty-eight persons attacked within the past three weeks, only three have recovered. The disease has some characteristics of typhoid fever, but is more rapid and fatal. The temperature is high, the face is flushed, the victim shakes, and the blood breaks from the ears, eyes and nostrils. The body is covered with large black spots as death approaches. The disease is spreading without appearing to be contagious, and there seems no way to check it. No local cause can be assigned for it. The people are panic-stricken. Physicians from this point will visit to the troubled district."

Kentucky Blunder-Letting It is said that the Underwood war in Kentucky is being fought at a higher fever heat than ever before. Four assassinations occurred two years ago among the Underwoods. A general to the Cincinnati Commercial of last Saturday, says: "Until two months ago, men were seen to be quiet enough, but then one of the Underwoods was fatally murdered by the opposing party. Strange to say, the Underwoods withdrew from the war."

Wealth of the Bonapartes The first Napoleon endowed all his family splendidly, as the master of Europe might have been expected to do. The records of St. Helena show that the sum was variously estimated at from \$200,000,000 to \$100,000,000 of our money was at the command of the exiled Emperor in Amsterdam, Frankfurt and London. Notwithstanding the idle stories which have been current for years as to the pecuniary embarrassments of Napoleon III, before he became ruler of France, it is also likely certain that he was a very rich man. In 1846, he inherited a very handsome property. He had always enjoyed, too, a liberal allowance from his father, excepting for a time after the affair of Strasburg, of which the ex-emperor died immensely rich, as did Lucien also, and Jerome was wealthy, not only through the liberality of his brother, but in the right of his wife, a Princess of Wurtemberg. The fortune of the Bonapartes came by the scepter and the sword, like a good many other fortunes.
