The arrivals at the prison of late have been in excess of the discharges. The convicts at present number 800, a larger aggregate than the rolls have shown for some considerable time past.

A party of Jackson men are in camp at Maple Island and Island Island, in Michigan Center, and are engaged in shooting wild fowl, and spearing fish by torch light. They are having good success and plenty of fun.

The fight for the U. S. senatorship was ended on Thursday afternoon last, by the appointment, by Gov. Crawford, of Hon. F. C. Beaman of Adrian, to fill the unexpired term of the late senator Chandler. We had prepared an article for the Enterprise, setting forth that Judge Beaman came to Michigan in 1834, was admitted to the bar of Lenawee Co., in 1839, and settled in Manchester where he began the practice of law, etc., and was intending to put on a few airs over the appointment of a former Manchester man to the high office of U. S. senator, but and manager of the weekly Enterprise, he has declined the proffered honor, on the ground that he is not a native of Michigan, and that the Governor has appointed Ex-Governor Tallmadge.

From Kansas. So many said to me before leaving Michigan, "Please write to me all about Kansas; that I take this method to inform them, though my knowledge of the country is by no means extensive, for one needs to be here years, and be very observing of that before saying with truth for or against Kansas." I take and accept, having in the business of this country (Wisconsin) any young man of ordinary ability, with a capital of five hundred or a thousand dollars, without owning a foot of land, may become independently rich here in a few years with very little manual labor. As an example, I know a young man here who is now paying thirteen percent for money that he has invested in cattle. Last fall he purchased calves at ten dollars a head, and sold them this fall for fifteen dollars, making fifty percent on the amount invested, and has already read another "lunch" on hand. Another man who came to this country about twelve years ago, and went into cattle and hogs, on a capital of perhaps three thousand dollars, is now paying a tax on eleven thousand dollars, "dated property," and has seventeen hundred acres of land beside.

Capitalists make contracts with farmers often in this way: The first party furnishes one hundred or more calves, the second party to keep them until they are three years old, returning to the first party one half the number furnished. It will readily be seen that this pays well for either of the parties, with calves at ten dollars and three-year-olds at thirty. Money is made much faster with sheep, though the risk is greater.

Of sheep men there is quite a number in this country, of whom I will only mention one, who has eleven hundred, which averaged him a little more than eleven pounds, last spring, for which he received eighteen cents a pound. General farming will hardly pay, with corn at 20 cents for seventy-five pounds, wheat from sixty to seventy, potatoes fifty, and corn beans nine to ten a bushel. I happened into a harness shop a few days ago, one end of which was occupied by a shoemaker; a stranger came in for a pair of boots, finally offering to give for them a load of corn and the rest in money; he got the boots.

There are in this county upwards of sixty schools. All have uniform text books. Many own all the books used. In many of the districts they have one hundred and in some as high as one hundred and fifty dollars worth of furniture. I could not help but notice in some of the schools that I have visited, how little everything moved on; this one would want a pencil—either slate or lead—stopped to get a book, and that one needs a book to get a book, and so on.

Many would like to know about fuel, plenty of it can be had for one dollar and twenty-five cents a cord, delivered, and at the door. Coal in the bin, from ten to twelve cents a bushel.

Since I came here the weather has been, for the most of the time very warm and pleasant. During two months of my Kansas rambles, I have never grown weary of sightseeing. One seldom feels a sense of dizziness or desolation. Even these rambles have a charm for the visitor that is not met so infrequently.
