A Valuable Property.

Three samples of ore from the Wolverine silver mine, situated in the "Tin Cup" mining district, Gunnison county, Colorado, owned by our townsmen, Chas. A. Knapp, Hall G. Sutton, Geo. P. Anderson, and A. N. Perrault, of Colorado, assayed by E. J. Weeks, of the firm of E. J. Weeks & Co., of this city, the result of which may certainly be very satisfactory to the owners of the mine.

The following is the assay of Mr. Weeks' specimens:—

Specimen No. 1.—General character, silver and lead carbonate. Contains silver per ton of 2,000 lbs., 2,291.12 oz. assay.

Specimen No. 2.—General character, silver and lead carbonate. Contains silver per ton of 2,000 lbs., 2,291.12 oz. assay.

Specimen No. 3.—General character, silver and lead carbonate. Contains silver per ton of 2,000 lbs., 2,291.12 oz. assay.

The value of these several ore specimens is as follows: No. 1.—\$2,678.45 per ton; No. 2.—\$1,284.85 per ton; No. 3.—\$2,844.86.—Jackson Citizen.

In addition to the mines above named as having been assayed, there are the following that form a part of the combination with the Wolverine, with a cash value to the ton of: Mary Main, \$3,922; Tomanna, \$2,758; Jimmy Mack, \$3,904; Tin Cup, \$2,721; Gold Cup, \$7,907.20.
