The man who captured him in the open country and brought him there was also infected The institution has about 400 inmates at this time, many of whom are in a state of alarm.

The President replied briefly that he would examine into the matter; that in appointments to public office, the fitness and qualifications of the individual should be considered; the color, black or white, could in itself be neither a rec-

ommendation nor a bar.

The pressure upon the President for the three weeks that it has lasted has been greater than at any opening of any Republican administration since the first. 
