Jackman Citizen: Will N. Adams, of Blackman, who exhibited such a fine lot of merino sheep at the state fair, has returned from Grand Rapids, where he had 200 head on exhibition. He took first premium on yearling ewes, second on three year old ram, second on two year old ewe, second on three year old ewe; and second on lambs.

Sale of Merinos and Wool.

P. P. Sheeler sold to Neamah Hallsted one yearling ram, from the Grosvenor sheep, for \$75, by the same to L. man Knowles one yearling ram, own breeding, (registered) for \$50, by the same to Jerome Segar of Pittsford, one ram lamb for \$40. Also to Chas. Graham of Adrian, one yearling ram, of own breeding on private terms. Mr. Sheeler expects to start for Vermont in a few days to replenish his flock, and hopes to be able to meet the wants of all on his return.

O. L. Short has sold his two year old stock ram, Bonanza, to P. C. Hayward of Raisin for \$100. Mr. Short says of his wool clip. From 120 sheep weighing 1,375 pounds, and sold in the Boston market, the Delaine wool brought 22 cents per pound, the remainder 29 cents per pound, of which 55 fleeces were from rams.
