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Winter Care and Management of Stock.

A Paper read before the Norvell Farmer's Club.

BY R. D. PALMER.

The stock usually kept by farmers consists of horses, cattle, sheep, swine, and we may include also hens, turkeys, geese and ducks.

The first essential in the care of all stock is food and water. Without these it cannot exist. The second is shelter. The state or condition of all farm stock during the winter season is almost altogether artificial.

In our hard winters, stock is very much in the condition of a caged bird, being obliged to subsist upon just such food as the farmer provides.

Science has done much in analyzing the foods we use for our stock, though I am not sure that it has done more than to give a reason for results already attained by actual experience.

In the wintering of mature horses for farm work, I do not deem it advisable to keep them in very high flesh.

Cattle will probably suffer less from want of ventilation than either horses or sheep. They are not required for muscular labor like the former and they are not so subject to disease as the latter.
