Michigan Crop Report, Feb. 1. For this report returns have been received from 775 outgrowers, representing 369 townships, and fifty-one of these reports are from 295 townships in the southern four-fifths of counties.

Reports have been received of the wheat crop in the northern counties, which is 31 per cent. of the whole number of bushels reported marketed is 70,874, of which 155,470 bushels were marketed in the first or southern tier of counties, 159,731 bushels in the third tier, 157,822 bushels in the fourth tier, 41,295 bushels in the fifth and sixth tiers, and 4,177 bushels in the northern counties.

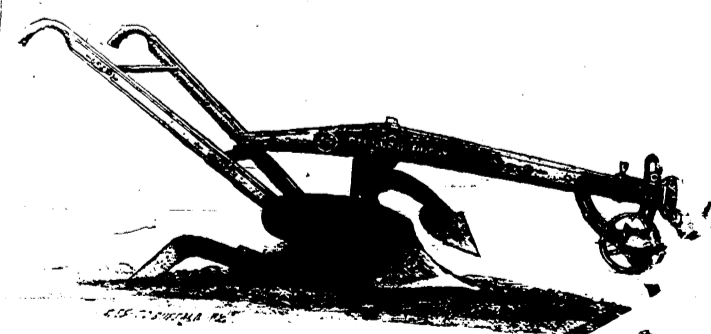

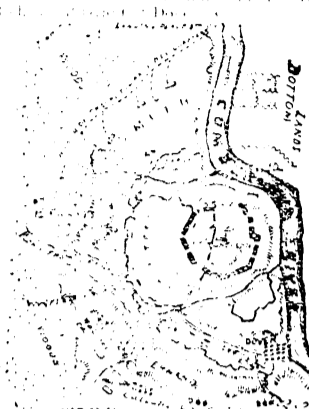

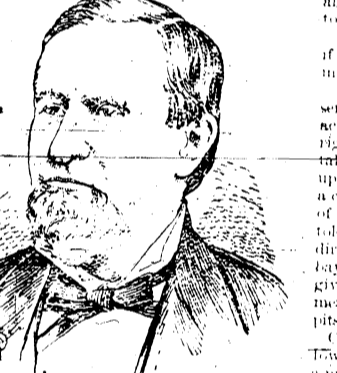


COMMANDER FOY.

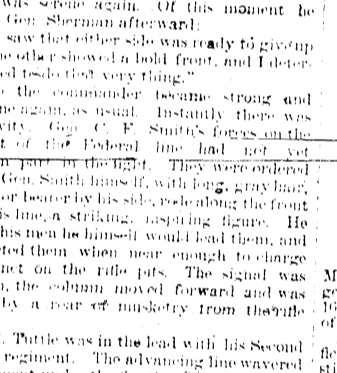
### WHERE WAS GRANT?

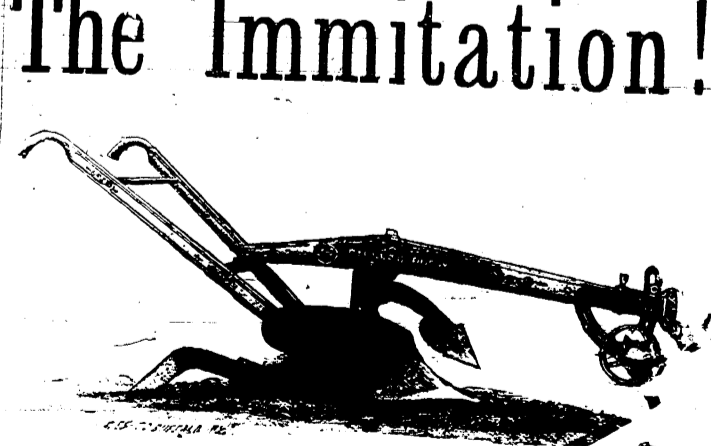
