WASHINGTON, Sept. 1.—The great building of the state, war and navy department will soon be completed.

It will cost \$10,000,000, and will require as much granite as the pyramids. It is made of granite blocks, and the granite weighs all the way from a quarter of a ton to a ton each.

Among the busy men who will read this is the architect, Mr. John Russell Pope, who has as many dollars as there are bricks in the interior construction of this big building.

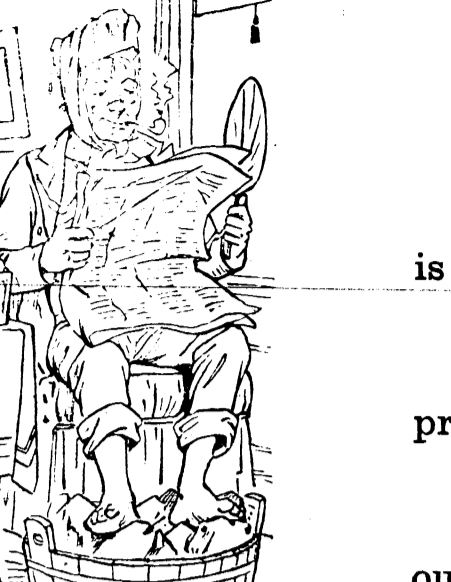

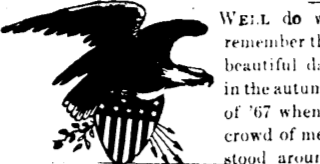

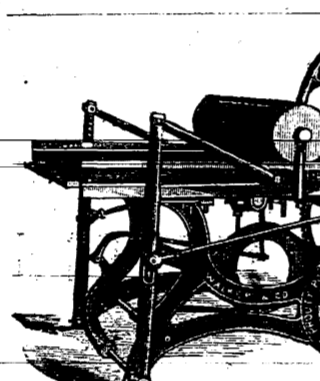
Results of Our Labors During the Past 20 Years.
