A GREAT TOBACCO BOX.

5 Grows Into a Massive Chest. The greatest tobacco box in the world, and the strongest as well, is the property of a society known as that of "The Past Overseers of St. Margaret and St. John, Westminster. It is simply a getting together of those who have held the office

of overseer of the parish for the purpose of eating an annual dinner, which they have regularly done for now nearly 200 years. Incidentally they have become also custodians of the "Westminster Tobacco Box." The story goes that in the year 1713 one of the overseers who had been in the habit of bringing to the tavern dinners his own private tobacco box and putting it at the service of his friends, presumably with a better brand than the common one in it, presented to the com-pany a tobacco box for its own use when he should have got beyond the need of dinners. The society accepted the box, and placed upon it a silver rim and a plate upon which were engraved the name and the good deeds of the donor.

The next overseer put upon the box another plate with his name and official

achievements upon it. His successor did the same, and so grew up the custom that the box should be delivered to the care of each new overseer, who, upon retiring, should add to it a plate engraved with his name and some suitable inscription. Before long the box became quite overlaid with silver plates, and then it was fitted into a large box, and the new plates were put upon that. This in turn was inclosed in a still larger box when it had been covered with decorations, and this operation was repeated until now the original little box has grown into a nest of half a dozen or more boxes, the outer one being a massive silver covered, hexagonal chest, which was made from a beam that was once in Westminster Ab bey. Silver plates of all sizes and shapes and decorated with all manner of figures, pictures and inscriptions cover all the boxes. In most cases the notable event of the year has been recorded by picture or words upon the plate of the oversees for that year, and the box has thus be come a condensed chronicle of the his

tory of the past century in England.
At each annual dinner the box is with a regular ceremonial handed over to the new overseer by the senior church war-den, and the overseer is commanded to take due care of the article, to produce it at all parochial entertainments to which he shall be invited or have the right to attend, and to always keep in it tobacco enough to furnish at least three pipes, under penalty of forfeiting six bottles of Besides this he has to furnish bond in \$1,000 as security for the care of the box. One of the peculiar regulations of the dinner, introduced in 1825, is that it must be served at 5 o'clock by the striking of a certain church clock, or the landlord forfeits two bottles of wine, and if he fails to produce his bill promptly at 8:30 o'clock he loses another bottle.

Once in 1793 an overseer named Read had a claim against the parish and he re fused to give up the box and threatened to destroy it unless the claim was naid A suit in chancery was begun, and Chancellor Loughborough decreed that the box must be turned over to the so ciety and that the overseer must also pay the costs of the suit, whereat the society had a special dinner and rejoiced greatly and entered upon its books the record that the solicitor who conducted the suit for the society should be made an honor-ary member, "that he may often have an opportunity of contemplating the box and its recovery. In 1785 thieves robbed the dinner table of all the silver, but luckily the box had been taken care

Lurking Danger in Oysters. It is in order, says Mr. Murray, to advise housewives how they should order their oysters opened; for, while there may not appear to be any danger in so innocent looking a thing as an oyster, there is, nevertheless, great danger of its killing us if by chance we should swallow a ragged piece of oyster shell when eating oysters. There is just one way to prevent this danger, and that is to refuse all oysters which have been opened by the process known as "smashing." This operation spoils the appearance of the oyster and its shell, and small particles of the shell are hammered into the body of the oyster, which, when introduced deadly as the mistakes of the druggists. Insist on it that your ovsters are opened by the stabbing process, and you avert this danger. Children should not be allowed to eat oysiers, raw or cooked, un less they have been thoroughly and care fully examined for minute particles of shells. I am very serious about this oyster opening business, for, having lost a very dear friend through his having carelessly swallowed a piece of oyster shell which clung to the oyster, I fee that I cannot be too emphatic on the sub ject.—Boston Herald.

Boatmen of Havana Harbor.

By and by some one will immortalize the Havana guadano and its swarthy guadanero in song. There is nothing fragile or dainty about these little harbor boats or their boatmen, but no Mediterranean port can show you more pictur esque waterside characters than are found in Havana bay. There are upward of 2,000 licensed guadanos. Each boat is hooded astern to protect from the sun, is rigged with a single mast and sail, painted in all sorts of fantastic colors painted in all sorts of fantastic colors and its speed and seaworthiness are sometimes marvelous. They are a jangling, wrangling lot, their owners, the guadaneres, but peaceable and sunny withal. They are full of song and wine, and sleep the year round. Many live in their little light. boats. They keep alive the legends of chivalry by murmuring love songs to everything of the female form; and in the moonlight upon the harbor the whole sensuous night pulses to the rhythmic numbers of their weird guarachas.— Edgar L. Wakeman in New York Mail and Express.
