The ride from Erie Station to Grand Canyon on a beautiful July day is charming in the extreme.

In ascending Mary's Mountain, which has an altitude of 3000 feet, it was necessary for the men to lighten the carriage by walking and the exercise in that rarified air made us breathe free.

We stepped for dinner at Trout Creek Camp, three tents provided over a jolly breakfast, and the lunch was most plentiful.
