

TIC HABITS.

An Intensely Interesting Account of these Simple Cotters by Edgar L. Wakeman - How they Live and What they Est - A Hardy and Unique Class.

In one of his highly interesting letters about foreign fork and their customs Edgar L. Wakeman tells of the Scotch fishermen. He says these people every year supply the world with over a million barrels of cured herring, alone. There are some 70.000 of these fishermen, with their families. After these men and women return to their western homes, in September, the crops of their little crofts are to be gathered. These comprise oats, a bit of sickly grass for the hay of the "beasties" in winter, potatoes and the universal Scotch "kaii" or cabbage. Then the women take to their knitting and land-looms, and if there be winter herring-fishing in the sea-lochs near their homes, this is prosocuted by the men in small open boats of eighteen to twenty-two feet keel at much bodily risk and under tortuous severities of wird and weather. 
