Representative Richardson's Plan to Tax All Corporations Organized Under the State Laws.
A New Air Ship.
Saginaw, Feb. 18.—This city is to have a new and the inventor says is simply dead sure it will fly. George K. King is the man who is working at it. He is 30 years old and has been in the air for two months. His two models are now under way, and he hopes to start in the air in a few days. The biggest part of this air-ship is a silk gauze, which is made like a turban and is held in place by a wire. It is a great height, and at its bottom it is 60 feet in diameter. It is held in place by a light and flat platform. Along this platform extends a shafting, also made of very light material. At the end of this shafting are two large propellers, which are 10 feet in diameter. They are made of aluminum or some other light substance. These wheels can be turned at any angle so that they can be directed in any direction. The center of the platform is attached to a central shaft, which is six feet in height. Here is where the force is applied, as the gas-bag is supposed to be kept expanded by the force of the air. It will be a very simple and cheap contrivance, and it is expected that it will be a great success.

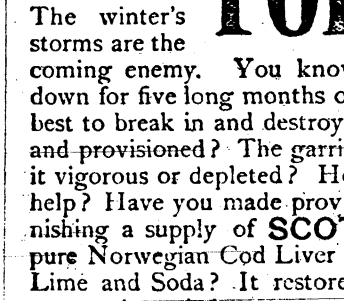
