

The schools and legislature will close this week. How joyful the news.

Money, as it travels the circles of business changes hands in succession. Payments, like trains, if delayed at one point, are likely to be behind all along the line.

A couple of slick tongued fellows are working the farmers. They have a cook stove to sell for which they ask the enormous price of \$68, but as they are to be in the neighborhood selling stoves for several weeks they agree to board with him at least 10 days, allowing \$3.50 for night's lodging and two meals for themselves and teams.

"No person will be retained in the service of this company who is known to frequent saloons or places of low resort; or who is known to make habitual use of intoxicating liquors. Every person in charge of employes is hereby directed to dismiss from the service any who are guilty of these practices, and they will, themselves, be held personally responsible for having such in their employ; for such are certain, sooner or later, to cause injury to lives and property."

The board of supervisors met yesterday and are in session this week. The new law effecting the board of county school examiners necessitated the election of one county commissioner (formerly clerk) and two examiners. C. F. Field editor and proprietor of the Tecumseh News, was elected examiner, with a salary of \$1,200 per year, and will serve from July 1st next to July 1st, 1893, after which the election will be by the people, occurring at the regular spring balloting.

Tecumseh News: The experiment of teaching the elements of vocal music in our union school, which was begun two years ago, has, we believe, been satisfactory. Although the best results have not yet been obtained, the experiment has progressed far enough to prove its practicability, and if it is continued two or three years longer the results will, we are confident, be highly gratifying to all concerned.

Of Interest to Soldiers. They Can Soon Get the Cash Provided for by the Benson Bounty Bill.

In order to give the soldiers prompt and full information in relation to the "Benson bounty bill," approved June 16, clerk Wood of the board of state auditors is sending out circulars, that all entitled to the bounty may get their pay. The bill conforms to the recent supreme court decision in the Smith case and only applies to those who enlisted after February 5, 1864, and were credited to the call of February 1, 1864.

Since the above was put in type all proceedings have been brought up standing because the state authorities and those at Washington are unable to decide for which particular call the men enlisted.

Norvell Farmers' Club.

All but four of the faithful members of the club were in attendance at Bancroft home on Saturday June 20, and enjoyed a very pleasant and profitable time.

After some preliminaries were disposed of Mrs. P. P. Cole read an excellent selection for the occasion entitled "The old ways and the new."

The call for a discussion by the ladies on system in house keeping seemed to be a surprise to them and therefore little was elicited.

S. W. Holmes was called upon to speak on the affirmative of the question: Resolved that we should crowd our farms to the utmost extent. He believes that every man should crowd his business be it what it may, and the farmer is no exception to the rule.

C. J. Harper on the negative pointedly asked if we crowd today at a profit, are we sure we can do so in the future? To crowd the farm with stock is less injurious than to crowd with grain but even this involves a large outlay in buildings and help and if either is over done prices will be low.

W. R. Mount was of much the same opinion, has found it unwise to crop too often. W. Bancroft believes that whatever is worth doing at all is worth doing well, and so would crowd his business but not his farm.

A. R. Palmer cited several instances to show that it is quite possible to crop land too much and that good authorities favor letting it lie in grass to recuperate, and believes that one crop of wheat yielding 25 bu. per acre is more profitable to the grower than four crops of 12 to 14 bu.

L. D. Watkins believes in intense farming, that is in getting everything off the farm that is possible without lessening its fertility.

T. B. Halladay thought there was a difference between intensive farming and crowding a farm. In the one case the farm was growing no worse. A man-in debt and going to lose his farm would crowd it by taking everything possible off without any reference to the future.
