HOW MURDERERS ARE WALLED IN LIVING TOMBS.

Some Thrilling Stories of Santiago's Penitentiary Life—The Romantic Tragedy of a Rich Young Lieutenant.

One of the institutions of this famous capital to which the citizens point with pride is their model penitentiary, writes Fannie B. Ward, in a letter from Chile to the Philadelphia Record.

Certain it is that if the majority of Chilean Rotos (the word literally translated meaning "ragged people," here used to designate the poorer class) were confined for a term of years in the Santiago penitentiary, their condition would be vastly bettered.
