A Paper Read at the Norvell Farmers' Institute Dec. 31st, 1892, by Mrs. C. P. Holmes.

History repeats itself in many ways, and when oppression compelled our ancestors to leave the old world and seek a refuge on the shores of the great unknown region.

In 1776 one of the inalienable rights of man was declared to be the pursuit of happiness, and ever since that time the search for happiness has been carried on more or less successfully by each individual.

Indeed, if we choose to go backward in the journey of years to find the first searchers for this oft-times hidden treasure, we shall find no stopping place until we come to our first parents, who were not perfectly happy.

Since, the great object of life is the attainment of true happiness. Rev. Liman Abbot tells us "the man who would make the most of life must make the most of his environment as well as of himself."

If our place is on the farm let us make the most of our surroundings and get all the pleasure and satisfaction possible.

There are without doubt many disagreeable things to meet and unpleasant work to do, but we must bear in mind that sweet is only sweet compared with sour, or in other words, our pleasures are only pleasures by comparison.

It seems as though we sometimes take life according to the negro's rendering of the old adage, "the bitter with the sour," but we are not always so unfortunate.

Not the least one of the benefits of farm life is the health enjoyed, for I believe the farmer and his family, as a whole, have better health than almost any other class of people, and why should he not?

Our future life depends largely upon the care and training we give our children, and while they are young and we have them around us, we can sow the seed that will spring up and bear fruit of joy in after years.

Much has been written and said upon this subject, but it is of too great importance to tire of, and, although no two people will think exactly alike about it, I believe a mutual exchange of ideas is always profitable.

We who live on farms have fewer evils to battle in training our children than those living in cities and villages, and we can well afford to dispense with the pleasures of lectures, concerts, etc., plan and work a little harder to make home more attractive than to have our choicest treasures in danger.

Boys in the city can be, and are, trained into upright and useful men, but it is in spite of city influences and not from the assistance rendered by them.

It is only a few minutes' walk from any home in the city to a place of this kind, and one of the greatest advantages of life upon the farm is the greater ease with which we can keep our boys away from such places.

To any sacrifice of personal enjoyment too great for the moral welfare of our children? Every right minded parent will say most emphatically, No!

The God of nature has opened his storehouse for the benefit of our children and scattered with a liberal hand on all of the land around us, many things of interest, if the minds of our children are trained to understand and appreciate them.
