Chicago people seem to want \$2 a day for lodging only. We are afraid that the grasping propensities of the inhabitants of the windy city will have a tendency to keep thousands away, especially if the railroad refuse to make a low rate. Let us see how much money a person must have, supposing the railroads will charge half fare for the round trip and the tickets good for seven days. Railroad fare \$6 40; board, say \$1 a day; lodging, \$2 a day for seven days, \$21; admission to the grounds four days, 50 cents each, \$2; street car fare five days, 50 cents. It will take about two days to go and return. This makes \$29.90, and does not provide for any extras, and there will undoubtedly be enough of those to bring the figure up to at least \$35, and if one wants to go to a theater or drink a glass of lemonade he must calculate on a longer pocket-book. We would advise every reader of the Enterprise to make calculations on the above basis. It will be a sight worth seeing and one that many will never have another opportunity of seeing.
