

In committee of the whole on the legislative appropriation bill amendments were adopted approving that hereafter no public building shall be draped in mourning; that the executive departments shall not be closed out of respect to deceased officials, and prohibiting the use of public funds for funeral expenses of government officials for employes. The committee arose, the bill was passed and the House adjourned.

SENATE —Forty-8fth day—The car coupler bill was again a subject of discussion and went over without action. A memorial was received from the Chicago Chamber of Commerce favoring the annexation of the Hawaiian Islands. The House bill which provides for sundry light houses and other aids to navigation, and which was passed by the Senate. was reconsidered, the Senate amendments rejected and the bill passed just as it came from the House. A bill was passed to problibit the transportation of merchandise from one American port to another American port through a foreign port. Executive session. djourned House—The day was occupied by a very listless discussion, in committee of the whole, on the pension appropriation of \$166.400,000—the theme being the need of retrenchment. The evening session was taken up by the consideration of private pension bills.

SENATE.—Forty-sixth day.—The bill to promote the safety of employes and travelers upon rallroads by compelling railway companies to equip their arts with automatic couplers and continuous brakes and their locomotives with driving wheel brakes, was disposed of. The autositiute or the House bill of last session was greed to and the bill passed, yeas 30, nays 10. The bill goes back to the House. The conference report on the fortification bill was agreed to. HOUSE.—The general debate on the pension appropriation bill was continued. No other business.

SENATE—Forty-seventh day—The bill for the construction of the Nicaragua ship canal occupied the attention of the Senate. It provides that 3 per cent bonds of the company to an amount not exceeding \$100.00.000 shall be guaranteed "principal and interest" by the government of the United States—these bonds to be issued according as money is actually paid out and expended by the company in the construction of the canal. The government is to own the capital stock of the company with the exception of \$12,000.00 of it which is to be retained by the company and except the shares to be delivered to the governments of Nicaragua and costa Rica. The bill was laid over. A motion to call up a bill admitting four territories as states was voted down. Executive session. Adjourned. Horse—The bill was passed authorizing the Union Railroad company to construct a bridge across the Monongabela river in Allegheny county. Pa. The District of Columbia committee occupied the remainder of the day.

HAWAII IS OURS.

The United States Minister at Honolulu Establishes a Protectorate.

The steamer Australia has arrived at San Francisco and brings the good news of the action of United States Minister Stevens in establising a protectorate over the island, by issuing the following proclamation;

UNITED STATES LEGATION,) February 1, 1893

To the Hawaiian people: At the request of the provisional government of Hawaiian Islands, I hereby, in the name of the United States of America, assume protection of the Hawaiian Island for the protection of the life and property and corunation of public property and occupation of public buildings and Hawaiian soil, so far as buildings and Hawaiian soil, so far as may be necessary for the purpose specified, but not interfering with the administration of public affairs by the provisional government. This action is taken pending, and subject to negotiations at Washington.

(Signed.) JOHN G. STEVENS.
Envoy Extraordinary and Minister

Plenipotentiary of the United States


