HOW TO AVOID PARTURIENT APOPLEXY IN COWS.

Milk Fever—Stk Knt to Sheep—Venice and Pringles—Tookshins in Flocks—Farm Notes and Hints.

These who have witnessed the death of any of the animal kind from parturient apoplexy or milk fever would gladly avoid a repetition of the same.

The difficulty is most likely to afflict cows in "good habit" and which usually precedes any attack on the part of the animal.

An English writer, after having lost several valuable cows by this disease, studied up on the subject and adopted preventive measures.

They are greatest danger to be apprehended in making a cow up to calving and continuing her full feed up to the last time, especially in the deep milkers.

As soon as the cow is dry before calving, usually four to six weeks, it is best to feed her on hay and corn.

With all this information before them, nine out of ten who lose cows from parturient apoplexy are completely guilty of it to some extent.
