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INTO A SINK HOLE

DASHED A FREIGHT TRAIN ON THE T. A. & N. M. R. R.

The Female Suffrage Law Passed by the Last Legislature is Declared Void by the Supreme Court—Irving Latimer, the Famous Matricide, out of Solitary.

Three Deaths in a Burning Wreck.

Three trainmen met a horrible death on the Toledo, Ann Arbor & North Michigan Railroad at Hastings, Michigan, north bound freight train jumped the track and the engine sunk in a sink hole. A coal and oil car immediately back of the tender caught fire and two of the victims were burned to death in the flames from these. The dead were J. H. Bealer, engineer; George Roberts, fireman; Thomas Mulligan, brakeman. All were married, and lived in Owosso. The engine was completely capsized in a ditch, two oil tanks were piled on the engine and three cars of coal on top of the latter and the wreck took fire in a flash. The bodies of the fireman and engineer were burned to ashes. Three men who were in the caboose at the time of the accident were not hurt. The track was through a tamarack swamp and had been raised six or eight feet. The weight of the new dirt and the freight train sunk the track three feet or more. All trains have had orders for the past month, not to exceed ten miles per hour in running over this spot. Engines go at a slow rate when the accident occurred.

The fire was intense for a while. An attempt was made to reach the buried men before the fire caught them, but the heat was so intense that the rescuers were driven away.

Female Suffrage Law Knocked Out. The supreme court in the mandamus proceedings brought to test the constitutionality of the act passed by the last legislature granting school and municipal suffrage to women, has handed down an opinion written by Judge McGrath and concurred in by the entire bench, declaring the law wholly unconstitutional and void. The court says that the general rule is that the source of all authority to vote at popular elections is the constitution. The constitution is constituted by the fundamental law, that the qualifications of electors must be uniform throughout the state, and that wherever the constitution has prescribed the qualifications of electors they cannot be changed or added to by the legislature or otherwise except by an amendment to the constitution.

Section 1 of article 7 of the constitution, which provides who shall be electors and entitled to vote, is quoted, and the statement made that its terms are applicable to "all elections." The court says that to empower the legislature to confer the elective franchise upon classes of persons other than those named, some other provision must be pointed out which confers that authority in express terms or by necessary implication.

In support of the act it was argued that the constitution in section 13 and 14 of article 15 empowers the legislature to provide qualifications for voters in village and city elections; that the celebrated case of Beiler vs. Burr, 76 Michigan, with others, were quoted to support the contention. The court says, however, that these cases involved only the validity of acts conferring upon females the right to vote for school district officers under existing laws which like our own, name no school district officers, do not prescribe or suggest how such officers shall be chosen, but in express terms relegate to the legislature the duty of providing for and establishing a system of public schools.

The constitution has already provided for electors, and when it provides that an officer shall be elected, it certainly contemplates an election by an electorate which it has constituted. No other election is known to the constitution, and therefore it provides that the legislature may divert the manner in which an officer shall be elected, it simply empowers the legislature to provide the details for the holding of such election. The court, therefore, unanimously held the law invalid.

Latimer Released from Solitary. E. Irving Latimer, the matricide and murderer of Night Captain Haight, at Jackson state prison has seen the last of solitary confinement. The prison board has ordered him to be set to work. Not losing a pound of flesh during his confinement, he is in a fine condition of health. Latimer in his own words said he would like some reading matter he having read his only book—the Bible—through three times.

Railroad Men Who Drink Discharged. General Manager Spicer of the Chicago & Grand Trunk has issued an order warning all employes to keep out of saloons on pain of summary dismissal. The direct cause of the order was the recent suicide of Switchman James Orrell at Nichols while under the influence of liquor.

TESTED THE STATE MILITIA.

Grand Rapids Companies Called Out Unexpectedly and Make a Good Showing.

Col. C. H. Rose, of Grand Rapids wanted to call out the militia in that city as a test, and a call was accordingly issued at 6:30 p. m. to the captains of the three companies to get their companies assembled in ready marching order, with haversacks and canteens, and ready for business in the armory at 6:15. The officers and men were taken completely by surprise, but they responded nobly. Each company has an admirable system for notifying the members on short notice, the companies being divided into squads, in charge of sergeants and corporals, so that they can be assembled very quickly. As the non-commissioned officers received the word, the greatest excitement prevailed. It was rumored that a riot was in progress in Grand Haven, while other reports said that Mayor Stuart had been killed. The men were taken from their work in factories and offices, and they responded handsomely. At 6:15 Company B had 30 men in line, Company E and Company H 22. They were already ready for business, and a half hour later every member in the city was under arms, making a total force of 140 men for the three companies, with ammunition in their cartridge boxes, haversacks and canteens filled. When the men were told that it was simply a test call they were greatly disappointed, but they were assured that whenever they were called again it will be for business. The quick response was very satisfactory to all interested.

An Insane Mother's Awful Deed. Mrs. Albert Hager, wife of a farmer living near a village eight miles from Midland, committed suicide and killed her little 7-year-old girl. There was no one else at home when the deed was done. Visiting friends found the bodies in a 37-foot well soon after the deed was committed. The unfortunate girl had evidently been stung in the descent so that death did not result from drowning, as there were awful cuts and gashes on their heads and shoulders. She had been some years ago an inmate of an insane asylum, and it is likely that she made the deliberate preparations under the influence of the malady. A shroud lay on the table and some cotton batting, also a sheet of paper on which was written: "Jesus cleansest white as snow. Her 11-year-old boy, by a former husband she whipped and sent away from home while the little girl who was exceedingly beautiful, she put to sleep and then hurled her to death, following herself. She had experienced much trouble in her 40 years of life.

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BANK CASHIER IN THE TOILS.

Nelson Bradley, of Lansing, Charged With Making False Reports and a Shortage.

The latest sensation in the bank troubles of Lansing is the arrest of Cashier Nelson Bradley, of the Central Michigan Savings bank. He is charged with making a false report of the condition of the bank, the maximum penalty for which offense is 30 years in state's prison. When the bank was closed in April last State Bank Commissioner Sherwood asked for a special report. This was soon prepared. It told a rather flattering story of the bank's affairs, and Mr. Sherwood felt it his duty to investigate. He found that the amount of rediscounted paper, which Bradley listed at \$3,827.99, should have been \$100,000. Overdrafts were reported at \$40,009.48, instead of \$81,240.15, as they should have been. Receiver Stone makes still more damaging charges. If what he says is true, Bradley has been guilty of even a greater offense. Mr. Stone charges that during the past nine years he has misappropriated something like \$2,000 to his own use and benefit. The alleged modus operandi was to credit the bank and exchange account of the bank to his own account and make investments in his own name. Since the bank has closed he has made good enough of this to reticence the shortage to \$12,000.

Nelson Bradley has been a resident of Lansing for nearly 20 years. He received his education at the University of Michigan. He entered the city almost without a cent, and is now rated at something like \$200,000. He was most assiduous in attending to his duty, being at the bank early and late, and everybody had the utmost confidence in him.

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SHOT BY A LUNATIC.

CARTER HARRISON, MAYOR OF CHICAGO, ASSASSINATED.

Shot Three Times in His Own Home—The Murderer Gives Himself up and Says He Broke the Deed Because the Mayor Did a Promise.

Another crazy crank has done his deadly work, and Carter H. Harrison, five times mayor of Chicago and one of the best known men of the west, is dead.

The terrible deed was committed in the mayor's own home. Shortly before 8 o'clock in the evening the door-bell rang, and when Mary Hansen, the domestic, opened the door she was confronted by a man about five feet five inches tall, smooth shaven, his rather clean cut features lit up by a pair of dark eyes.

"Is Mr. Harrison in?" asked the man in a quiet, pleasant voice.

"No," she replied, the girl, as she threw the door wider open to permit his entrance.

"I would like to see him, please," said the man, as he walked toward the back end of the hall. Mr. Harrison was in the dining-room which opens into the living-room. He heard the man ask for him to rise, and stepping into the hall walked toward the fellow who by the time he caught sight of Mr. Harrison had advanced about 10 feet from the doorway. Without saying a word he drew his revolver and commenced firing. He pulled the trigger; but three times, and every bullet hit the mark. One ball shattered Mr. Harrison's left hand, another passed into the right side of the abdomen, making a wound that would have been mortal in a few days. The third bullet grazed the chest slightly above the heart. This wound was the immediate cause of death. As soon as the murderer began to fire Mr. Harrison turned and walked rapidly toward the dining-room. He walked through the door just as the shooting occurred, and passed into a butler's pantry, opening of the room where he fell to the floor.

The murderer replaced the revolver in his pocket and deliberately turned to walk out when Mr. Harrison's private coachman who had entered a rear door in the dining-room, rushed into the hall and fired two quick shots at him, but missed both times. William Preston Harrison came running down the stairs, neighbors and passersby hurried into the house to see what the trouble was, and the villain fled. He was pursued by the police for the next few minutes. Mr. Harrison was carried into another room and placed on a couch by neighbors and friends. "I'm shot in the heart and I'm a dead man," said the wounded man. Mr. Harrison sank rapidly and in 30 minutes after receiving the shots he was dead. Miss Anna Howard, of New Orleans, to whom Mayor Harrison was to be married in a few days in the house at the time and her grief was most pitiable.

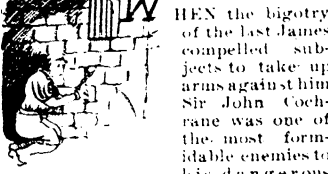

FRANKS OF FIGURES. "Dozen" and "dozen" do not Always Bear Their Literal Meaning. If an ordinary business man was asked to state how much is one thousand one hundred and one dozen he would most likely reply, without any hesitation, one thousand one hundred and twelve (1,112). He might, without violating the customs of the country, put the figures at 1,185 or 1,334. A dozen is commonly supposed to be twelve single things, says the Great Divide.

A dozen is just one "dozen," composed of twelve "units." A dozen of fish in some localities is twenty-six, and a dozen of pottery in the wholesale trade may mean two or it may mean fifty pieces, not depending on actual number of pieces, but on the size, weight, etc., of the jugs, bowls, plates, etc.

A printer's 1,000 is only 900, but it takes 1,277 staves to make 1,000 in some sizes that are made for export. In many of the trades, the terms "dozen," "hundred" and "thousand" do not bear their legal English meaning, but a technical one peculiar to each trade, as in stone work, lath, shingles and cotton yarns. This technical perversion of plain English extends to most of our weights and measures. Thus a gallon may be 231 cubic inches or it may be 265. In the school arithmetic four quarts make a gallon, eight gallons make a bushel, but in practice it takes forty quarts to make a bushel of corn, beans, etc. That is because only the liquid quart cup (231 cubic inches to the gallon) is in use, while the dry measure gallon contains 265 cubic inches.

Mysterious Disappearance. There is something that I want to bring to your attention," he explained as he stepped into police headquarters. "Very well." "It's a case of mysterious disappearance." Stereotyped Plates. Curved stereotyped plates were invented in 1815, but were little used for half a century, after that date. Since 1865 they have come into general employment in every newspaper office in the country whose edition is printed on a fast steam press.
