WAR GOVERNOR OF MICHIGAN DIED AT JACKSON.

Drifted Calmly From This Life into the Great Eternity-A Brief Sketch of Michigan's Grand Old Man-Village of

Ex-Governor Austin Blair, died at his home in Jackson. Like a tired child sinking to rest on his mother's breast the distinguished orator, law-yer, scholar and statesman entered his

Austin Blair was born in a log cabin at Caroline, Tompkins county. N. Y., Jan. 4. ISIS. The first 17 years of his life was spent upon the farm. Upon graduating from Union college Mr. Blair read-law for two-years in the office of Sweet & Davis, at Oswego, N. Y., and was admitted to the bar in 1841. In June of that year he came to Michigan. settling in Jackson, but soon afterward removed to Eaton county, where he was the same year elected county clerk. TREATY PORTS OPEN.

Washington: President Cleveland has practically decided to unite with Great Britain, Germany and Italy to Great Britain, Germany and Italy to preserve forcibly the neutrality of what are known as the treaty ports of China during the war between that empire and Japan. The Chinese government has been fully informed of the intention of the powers through its minister at Washington, and it is understood that the emperor will submit without protest to their forcible occupation of his principal ports, because he knows it would be useless to do otherwise. It is not a question of pride with him, but of prudence. The Japanese government assents cheer-

pride with him, but of prudence. The Japanese government assents cheerfully to the arrangement and has intimated that a similar occupation of her principal commercial ports would meet with no resistance.

It is said that the Russians would not be unfriendly to the arrangement, but by holding aloof until the preliminaries are agreed-upon she will be in a position to demand whatever concessions she requires as the price of her participation. The exigencies of European politics make it advisable for France to know the intentions of for France to know the intentions of Russia before disclosing her own, and her situation at Tonquir and Cochin. China makes it necessary for her to proceed with great caution in all that concerns Chinese affairs.

The plan for the governments named—Great Britain, Germany, Italy and the United States—to seize and occupy by their naval fleets the harbors of Amoy, Canton, Ningpo, Chin-Klang, Foo-Choo, Shanghai, Hankow and Tien-Tsin is to prevent their blockade by the Japanese or any other interfer-ence with their foreign commerce, and to protect the personal and property rights of foreigners residing in those cities. The local Chinese officials will be permitted to continue in the exer-cise of their lawful authority, but the foreigners will assist them when neces-sary in the preservation of order and the protection of property. by the Japanese or any other interfer-
